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On the second to last day of The MidAtlantic tournament, the crew on the "Goin' in Deep" had the crowd buzzing when they arrived at the Sunset Marina scale with a 680 lb. blue marlin caught by angler Larry Hesse of Bay Head, NJ and a 184 lb. yellowfin tuna muscled in by Mike Cassidy. The 120 3/8-inch blue marlin was hooked on a Pakula lure while trolling outside the Wilmington Canyon and held on to win 1st place in the Heaviest Blue Marlin category. The yellowfin (pictured on page 61) took top honors in the Heaviest Tuna category. Rounding out the "Goin' in Deep" team were Larry Hesse, Jr., Anthony Scardino, Rob Zuceck, Capt. Walter Harmstead and mates Justin Tonks and Mike Ajamian. For their first place finishes, the team took home \$1,110,634 in award money.


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

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

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There wasn't much change to the fishing scene last week with below average bites in the bay and offshore but good action on inshore reefs and wrecks.

The MidAtlantic Tournament dominated the news last week with the 89 boats fishing out of Ocean City taking the majority of the prize money. It's easy to see the current state of the offshore marlin bite by comparing the number of marlin hooked in the tournament this year versus last year.

> White Marlin: 2017 - 420 2016 - 798

Blue Marlin: 2017 - 34 2016 - 30

The big news coming out of the tournament was the 680 lb. blue marlin caught on Thursday by Larry Hesse on the "Goin' In Deep" and the 184 lb. yellowfin caught on the same trip by Mike Cassidy. Both fish came from outside the Wilmington Canyon with the blue marlin hitting a Pakula lure and the yellowfin being hooked on a trolled ballyhoo. No doubt the blue marlin was an impressive fish, but the big allison yellowfin was the largest we have seen in Ocean City since a 184 pounder was caught on the "Sea Wolf" during the MidAtlantic back in 2006.

On the same day, James Kontos on the "Let It Ride" arrived at the tournament scale with a 677 lb. blue marlin that was hooked in the Washington Canyon with only 27 minutes left in the fishing day.

The vast majority of white marlin caught in the tournament came from the Washington Canyon. The winning 75 pounder was caught on the final day of the tournament by Kyle Mayer on the "Waste Knot" while trolling a naked ballyhoo in 50 fathoms in the Washington Canyon. The 2nd place white marlin was brought in by the first boat to arrive at the scale on opening day. The 72 pounder was caught by Jay Monteverdi on the "Taylor Jean" after he hooked it on a ballyhoo in 1,000 fathoms outside the Washington Canyon.

Local boat, "Billfisher" took top honors in the Total Points category with 12 white marlin releases and a pair of blue marlin releases during their 3 days of fishing between the Washington and Norfolk Canyons. Ocean City boat "Marlin Gale" also had a good tournament with releases of 11 white marlin and a blue marlin. Close behind was the "DA Sea" with 10 white marlin releases.

With the monster yellowfin caught on the "Goin' In Deep" sitting on top of the leaderboard in the Heaviest Tuna category, everyone else was playing for 2nd and 3rd. A boat fishing out of Cape May caught a 126 lb. bigeye tuna early in the week and held on to win 2nd place and a pair of Cape May boats each caught a 72 lb. yellowfin to tie for 3rd place.

Large dolphin continue to be scarce this season. The winning

dolphin was a 23 pounder caught on the "Speculator" on the second day of the tournament in the Washington Canyon.

The heaviest wahoo was a 67 pounder caught on the "Contrail" with a 33 lb. speedster boated on the "Top Dog" being the heaviest caught out of Ocean City. Their wahoo was caught on the last day while trolling deep in the Norfolk Canyon.

Outside of the event, the bright spot of the week was definitely the flounder action on ocean reefs and wrecks. This bite has been getting better and better recently, both in the number of fish being caught and their average size. You can really see it throughout the pages of this weeks issue. Although the Old Grounds gets the majority of publicity for producing nice catches of flatties, we saw the Bass Grounds turning into a hot spot last week. Several quality fish weighing up to over 7 lbs. were caught by anglers dropping belly meat, Gulp, shiners or big minnows to the bottom. Those placing skirts or squids in front of their baits seem to be having the best luck.

Site 10, which had been a hot location in previous weeks, was kind of hit-or-miss last week. Some anglers went out and found good flounder action while others hooked nothing but small croakers and sea bass.

No matter where you fished for flounder, you had to deal with a large number of throwbacks. That has been the case all season for those drifting in the waters behind Ocean City and Assateague Island. Some

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larger fish have been caught recently in the deep holes of the East Channel, but the overall bite continues to be slow.

Anglers fishing around the South Jetty have found some black drum more than willing to eat their offerings of clams and sand fleas. Also around the South Jetty, Pat McFarland on the charter boat, "Lucky Break" boated a beautiful 13 lb. 2 oz. sheepshead last week while using sand fleas for bait.

With a slow marlin and tuna bite, more and more boats are opting to save their day with some tilefishing and good catches of both bluelines and goldens have come from those dropping squid in the Baltimore Canyon.

In addition to the wahoo caught during the tournament on the "Top Dog", we did see a 55 pounder hooked last week at the Rockpile by Rick Johnson on the "Tunatamer".

The first longfin tunas of the season were caught on Friday by Keith Fraser and Ken Garufi on the "FFMD" while trolling in 1,000 fathoms outside the Norfolk Canyon.

Just a reminder that cobia fishing in Federal waters will be reopened on September 5th. The minimum size is 36-inches and anglers are allowed to keep 1 per person or 6 per boat, whichever is more restrictive.


Upcoming Tournaments

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Marlin fishing has been kind of hit or miss lately, and I have been more than a little frustrated by those pointy nosed suckers. As a matter of fact I even tried to quit my cocaptain position on the "Last Call" the other day. Funny thing is that rat who runs my cockpit (Mr. Evans) didn't try to talk me out of it!

For some reason or another I retracted my resignation and found myself trolling along West Wall of the the Washington Canyon a day or so later. I was perched on my helm chair pouting to myself and generally being a spoiled 40-some-year-old brat when my pal, Capt. Jeremy on the charter boat "Wrecker" gave me the coordinates for a lobster ball that was holding some mahi-mahi. If there is anything that will lift my spirits it's a good old fashion massacre, mahi so T immediately aimed the pointy end of the "Last Call" towards Jeremy's numbers. A half hour or so later when we trolled up to the ball, a few mahi came out to greet us. The one thing Mr. Evans and I always agree on is that it is imperative to teach those little

green and yellow devils a lesson for swimming too close to the "Last Call", and he immediately went into kill mode while I kept the stern of the boat near the lobster ball. Unfortunately for us it was only a small bounty of mahi on the ball and our kill count stopped at a measly four fish. Our charter was happy to welcome those four fish to the boat though, and I am pretty sure I heard them preparing their dinner menu before the tails stopped flapping in the fish box.

On our way to the lobster ball I noticed a current break and a debris edge. It was about a mile back in the direction we had come from, so I aimed back towards it hoping that some fish would be hunting along the break. Mr. Evans put the trolling baits back out and was untangling our left side dredge teaser when something grabbed the left flat line. Neither one of us were looking in that direction so we had no idea what type of fishy had snuck up on us. And since the hook did not find its way into the fishy's mouth, we were both left wondering for

another minute or so until a marlin rushed after the left squid chain teaser. I yanked the teaser away from the marlin and Mr. Evans fed it the right flat line (after trying to unsuccessfully feed it the already half-eaten left flat line). This time the hook found it's mark, and a split second later a very angry blue marlin took to the air and charged towards the boat.

I am not quite sure how fast the marlin was going. I know that I had to jam the throttle levers full ahead to keep the fish from landing on top of us. As the boat lurched up onto plane the fish kept coming forward, spending more time in the air than in the water. Everyone in the cockpit was yelling for the angler to wind and I kept hoping the fish would settle down. After a few minutes of wild fish jumps and some hairy boat handling (I guess whenever I am driving it is hairy boat handling. I am quite hairy after all, so I may need to think of a better term for it in the future) the fish settled down and the real battle began. Sometime during the next 40 minutes or so I learned that my angler was 67 years young and that this was his first chance ever at a marlin. Talk about being thrown in the deep end!

My angler did a great job. The fish tried it's crazy antics

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two more times over the 2 hour and 35 minute fight. There were some tense moments, but when the spray settled we had a very clean release on a 200 pound class blue marlin. Those of you who are "Facebook Friends" with me can check out a short video of some of the jumps on my page.

That was our last bite of the day, but the guys in the charter were very pleased with the day, especially the gentleman that caught the marlin. He told me he had been waiting his whole life to catch a fish like that. Those are the kind of moments that make me glad I decided to rescind my resignation from a few days prior. So I figured I would give it another shot the following day.

My charter the next day consisted of 3 generations of the Griskowitz family. Α grandfather, 2 fathers and 3 sons. One of the fathers told me that they had chartered Capt. Mark Sampson the previous two years and had caught a mess of sharks, but now they wanted to try and catch a marlin, or 6. I warned them that fishing had been a little hit or miss, but that did not dampen their spirits any and a few hours later we were trolling near the Washington Canyon again. This time we started at the spot known as the 800/800. There was no





luck there so I went east of the canyon to several hundred fathoms. Still no luck. I trolled back into the canyon and crossed over to the west wall of the canyon. No dice. I said the heck with it and aimed back towards the 800/800. After passing by several lobster balls with no luck, I had all but decided that I was giving up on the balls for the day when I spotted two more that I had not yet been near. As I came past the first one my left long rigger bait popped out of the outrigger clip. Mr. Evans picked up the rod right as we both saw a bill stick out of the water behind the bait. I will give Mr. Evans plenty of grief when we are fishing and in my Coastal Fisherman columns, but he is pretty dialed into this fishing thing. And sure enough, he came tight on the marlin. The fish came up jumping and the youngest of the Griskowitz family, Kyle, was in the fighting chair. He had wanted his uncle to take the first turn

since he had missed the trip with Capt. Mark the year before, but his uncle insisted that he go first (I thought that was really cool, on both of their parts). As we were watching the fish jump and maneuvering to keep it astern of the boat everyone was thinking white marlin.

The closer we got to the fish, however, I started to think differently. I didn't want to give any false sense of excitement (not that a white marlin is not exciting in it's own right), but I was pretty sure that it was a small blue marlin. When he grabbed the leader to make the release official, Mr. Evans confirmed my suspicion. He hollered, "Am I seeing what I think I am seeing?" I told him he was. It was in fact a 100 pound class blue marlin.

We took our time with the fish and got it up close to the boat for some better pictures. Mr. Evans grabbed it by the bill and young Kyle got out of the chair to get a close look at his fish. I never got his exact age, but I am thinking Kyle was in his early teens at the most. He came up to the bridge a little while later and told me how tired his arms were and then he thanked me for finding him his first marlin.

Yup, marlin fishing has been a little hit or miss lately, and I have been more than a little frustrated by those pointy nosed suckers. But these two blue marlin, caught by an older gentleman and a younger gentleman, reminded me why it is that we do this fishing thing. To catch a fish of a lifetime for one angler and to catch the fish that will start an angler on his way to a lifetime of catches, yup that's why we do this. Like I said in one of my earlier columns this year, that's why we call it fishing!

Snow Hill - All city-owned riverfront property which includes Byrd Park, Sturgis Park, and city bulkheading adjacent to the municipal parking lot near the Route 12 bridge over the Pocomoke River.

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There's not a whole lot to report this week. A couple of days of bad weather mixed with slow fishing doesn't make for a very interesting report.

Before we get to the report, I want to clarify the listing of the results last week of the Paradise Grill Flounder Pounder Open. Unfortunately, when I pulled the results from their website when the tournament was over, I assumed the results were current. Unfortunately, they had not been updated since the day before, so David Walker's 2nd place fish and Russ Coward's 3rd place fish, which were both caught on the final day, were not included in the results. You will find pictures of the top three fish along with the write-up on pages 64 and 65. I apologize for the confusion last week. Now on to the report.

The big news of the week concerned a pair of new

Delaware state record fish being caught. First, was the state recognizing the 6.39 lb. Spanish mackerel caught by Jeff Nichols on August 20th. Jeff hooked the record-setter on a trolled cedar plug at Site 11. The old record held for 17 years.

Another state record was broken late last week when Tom Schanno of Halethorpe, MD muscled in a 46.5 lb. golden tilefish while dropping a butterfly jig in 500 feet of water in the Baltimore Canyon. The fish measured 47-inches and had a 29-inch girth. Just this year, the State of Delaware added the golden tilefish to their list of species that can qualify for state record recognition, so this will be the first fish to earn the title.

Outside of the excitement of new Delaware state records, anglers are generally frustrated with the overall lack of action, but there is some optimism. Everyone is hoping that the bad weather rolling in early this week will shake things up a bit and get things moving.

At Rick's Bait & Tackle, Capt. Mike Behney said that most of the reports he has received have not been good, but the best news continues to come from anglers fishing ocean reefs and wrecks for flounder. Sites 10 and 11 have been the top producers for anglers fishing with belly meat, Gulp Throwbacks and minnows. have increased on ocean structure but some really nice size fish are being caught on a more consistent basis.

Mike reported decent numbers of flounder in the Indian River Bay, but there are still a tremendous number of short fish to be weeded through in order to catch your keeper. Although the standard Gulp,

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shiners and minnows continue to work well, Mike is excited about the new Ottertail artificial baits he is selling. Basically, they are indestructible Gulps that also have the benefit of being impregnated with scent. Actually, Mike said that some of his customers are soaking them in Gulp juice with great results.

Anglers fishing in the Lewes Canal are still struggling to catch keeper flounder with a lot of small fish dominating the action. They are also finding small croaker and spot interested in Fishbite bloodworms or small chunks of cut bait.

There continues to be a good triggerfish bite around both the Inner and Outer Walls and at the Ice Breakers in the Delaware Bay. Mike said that he hasn't heard of any reports of sheepshead being caught.

Trolling spoons and feathers on inshore lumps, specifically Fenwick Shoal, is still producing catches of snapper bluefish and Spanish mackerel. Kingfish were caught around the 12 Fathom Lump.

At Hook'em & Cook'em in

the Indian River Marina, Capt. Bert Adams reported a few flounder being caught in the Indian River Inlet along the south side and by the Coast Guard Station. Most anglers are having luck with Gulp artificial baits but live minnows are working the best right now. There was an 8 pounder caught just outside the entrance to the marina by an angler drifting Gulp artificial baits.

There continues to be a good triggerfish bite along the jetty rocks by anglers soaking sand fleas.

Snapper bluefish and small striped bass are being caught in the Inlet at night by anglers tossing spoons and bucktails.

Bert said that small croakers are being caught by the rocks at the Causeway.


Surfcasters are not seeing many kingfish anymore but are still hooking into small bluefish and stripers right in the suds. Most are finding good luck tossing 1/4 to 1/2 oz. Kastmasters.

The headboats, "Capt. Bob II" and the "Judy V" both saw an improvement in the flounder bite on ocean structure last week when weather permitted breaking the inlet. The best bites were first thing in the morning before the change of tide. Anglers aren't targeting sea bass but the boats are still returning with a dozen keepers each trip of fish in the 13 to 14inch range.

Offshore, the bite remains slow for both marlin and tuna. Anglers trolling for marlin are finding most of the fish between the Washington and Norfolk Canyon. There were three blue marlins brought to the scale last week during The MidAtlantic tournament with one coming from outside the Wilmington Canyon and the other two from the Washington Canyon.

The yellowfin tuna and dolphin we saw last week seemed to come from either the Washington Canyon or from between the Wilmington and Baltimore Canyons. The number of fish being caught is still low but the quality of fish remains strong with fish coming in weighing up to 72 lbs.

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


Modern satellite technology provides many ways to keep in contact with others while away from traditional cell phone coverage. Up until recently, communication using satellites was expensive and inconsistent.

Back in February of 2016, Garmin bought Delores, a Yarmouth, Maine mapmaker, primarily for the inReach series of two-way satellite communication devices. The inReach devices are a futuristic type of walkie-talkie that uses the Iridium satellite constellation to provide global pole to pole coverage.

In January of 2017, Garmin introduced the newly redesigned inReach, with two models, SE+ and Explorer+. The inReach device is designed as an outdoor product for use in areas without cell phone coverage, which makes it great for boaters. The inReach is basically a two way messaging device with built-in GPS to track the device's location. The inReach device can send and receive text messages to another inReach device or to a phone. If you are cell wondering, the inReach device cannot make phone calls, even paired with when Smartphone.

The device is handheld, with a small screen, as compared to a Smartphone screen, measuring 2.3-inches diagonal. The inReach's water rating is IPX7, which is suitable for splashes, rain or snow, showering and incidental exposure to water of up to 1 meter for up to 30 minutes perfect for all weather during boating use. The battery life is great as compared to a smart phone, with more than enough battery power when fully



charged to leave the unit on and tracking for a multi-day trip. Garmin promotes up to 75 hours of run time at 10-minute tracking with 1-second logging and longer run time with less data usage.

The built-in antenna needs to have a good view of the sky to send and receive messages, often working reasonably well from a boats covered bridge. Even if the unit does not have a signal, messages are queued for both sending and receiving once a good signal is obtained.

The cost for service is very reasonable for a satellite device, with prices starting at \$12 month and going as high as \$99 month. The higher monthly costs include a larger message allowance, up to unlimited, and more tracking points sent to an on-line map.

On the subject of tracking, the device originally designed by a map company has the ability to plot and track the devices location on an on-line map, while in use. This map is available on a MapShare[™] internet web page to message recipients and other users depending on how you set-up the device. It even includes Facebook integration, automatically posting a link to your tracking map on your Facebook account. There are many ways to access this tracking data. The most common is when a text message is sent by the device, the location is sent in a website

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link, allowing the recipient to see where the sender is located. If you are trying to keep your fishing spot a secret, you may want to disable this feature.

The two models, the yellow SE+ and orange Explorer+ are very similar, sharing the same size, shape, screen, buttons etc. The Explorer+ adds a preloaded topographic map of the digital USA, compass, barometer, and accelerometer and 2BG storage for maps. Maps of other countries can be loaded into the Explorer+ if Unfortunately for desired. boaters, the unit is not compatible with the familiar Garmin marine charts.

Even though the SE+ does not include a map, it does have the ability to plot points and routes on a screen. Using either device, this plotting ability can be helpful as a back-up navigation device if your primary navigation electronics experience a failure. The digital compass in the Explorer+ works like a traditional compass and does not need a GPS signal and be moving to calculate your heading. This feature makes a good back-up to your boats compass in the event of a failure.

Both models have the ability to create and save waypoints and routes, in addition to creating breadcrumb tracks. You can also navigate to saved inReach waypoints. Just like a traditional chart plotter, you



could save a waypoint at the inlet or your dock and navigate back to that saved point when it's time to head back home.

It is immediately evident once you begin to use the device that the small screen and buttons limited make composing a message slow and painful, navigating the tiny onscreen keyboard with a tiny pointer. Luckily the inReach has built-in Bluetooth and can connect to your Smartphone using the free Earthmate app, allowing you to use your phones phonebook for your contacts and using your phones keyboard and screen to and compose and read messages on your Smartphone screen along.

The yellow SE+ is priced at \$400 and the range Explorer+ is \$450.



Juice of 1 lime Rose's lime juice 2 TBSP olive oil 1/2 tsp. celery salt 1/8 tsp. black pepper 6 drops Cholula hot pepper sauce (or to taste) 1 TBSP chopped scallion 1 TBSP water 1 tsp. honey 2 mahi fillets

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

Balsamic Scallops with Prosciutto


1/2 cup balsamic vinegar
2 TBSP. light brown sugar
8 jumbo sea scallops
8 paper-thin slices
 prosciutto
2 TBSP. olive oil
1/4 cup white wine

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Bake fish for 10 to 15 minutes at 350-degrees or until fish flakes easily with a fork.

Serve fish on bed of baby spinach with chopped zucchini, tomatoes, and sprinkles of cheese.

Top with small amount of balsamic vingerette dressing. Serves 2.

Canadian Cocktail Sauce

1/4 cup ketchup
2 TBSP prepared horseradish
1 tsp. chopped garlic
1 tsp. chili powder
1/2 tsp. ground allspice

Stir together ketchup, horseradish, garlic, chili powder and allspice in a small bowl.

Cover bowl and refrigerate for at least 4 hours before serving.



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So often we hear details about someone losing a really big fish, and from the description of what happened it becomes obvious that the crew was simply not properly prepared for success with a fish of those proportions. Every fisherman wants to hook and land a big fish. Then finally have they an opportunity to do so and they manage to flub it up! Well maybe not always, but you sure do hear plenty of stories about "the big one that got away" more than you do about little ones that manage to make their escape.

The best way to ensure that you actually land that dream fish when it finally makes an appearance on the end of your line is to prepare ahead of time for the eventuality that some day it's going to happen. It's like playing a slot machine you know that if you pull the handle enough times, sooner or later you'll hit the jackpot, and if you're prepared you'll have a little bucket sitting on the floor beside you to collect your winnings. If you're not ready to win, you're bound to end up crawling about the casino floor scrambling to pick up your winning nickels as they overflow from your shirt pockets. Being prepared to win is the first step in winning!

So how do you prepare to catch a fish that might, if you're really lucky, only come along once every few years? A good start would be to run some "what-if" scenarios through your head. If you're chunking for tuna, ask yourself "what if instead of hooking the standard 30 to 50

pound yellowfin we tie into a 200-pound bluefin? Do our reels have enough line capacity and are the drags smooth enough under pressure to handle a tussle with a fish like that? Is the terminal tackle, including hooks, knots, leader and swivels, up to the extra pressure that might be necessary to exert on such a fish to successfully land it? In this case I mentioned tuna, but the same questions can be asked of anglers fishing for sharks, flounder, marlin, stripers or any other type of fish that has the potential to grow gargantuan to proportions not often encountered by the average angler.

If in order to fool the average 30 to 50 pound yellowfin, anglers find the need to use light 30-pound leaders and small hooks, they are going to be at an immediate disadvantage when that 200-pounder hits. A small hook and light leader attached to a jumbo fish is not

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a good recipe for success. But if that's what's needed to catch the smaller fish then anglers have to work with what they've got and make the best of it. To land a 200-pound tuna on 30-pound leader (in a reasonable amount of time) anglers will want to apply as much pressure as the terminal tackle will allow, requiring that every knot be perfect, the hook stout enough that it won't straighten out and the leader be flawless. The reel's drag will also have to be smooth as silk and the maximum drag setting set so that it cannot over-tax the breaking strength of the leader. Leaders should be checked at the dock by setting the drag at "full", hooking each leader up to the rod and with a screwdriver in the bend of the hook, someone can take a run down the dock and see how it all holds up. If something is going to "let go" let it happen then and not when that prize fish is on the line. It doesn't matter if someone is targeting tuna or



flounder, knowing that their terminal tackle is put together as best as it can be should give anglers the confidence to push their drag up to "full" if they hook an exceptional fish.

Another part of being ready to deal with a really big fish is having enough line on your reel to handle whatever might come along. A monster size fish is likely going to pull out a lot of line, and even if you're fishing from a boat, it might take more than just a few minutes to get up and running after a fish and actually regain some line. Anglers fishing from a bridge, pier or shoreline have it even tougher because they don't have the option of going after a fish that's hell-bent on taking all their string! Fortunately, with today's thin but strong braided lines, even small reels can hold many hundreds of yards of line and greatly extend the radius that a fish can run. Anglers wishing to be prepared for an exceptionally large fish will need to decide for themselves if it will be to their advantage to use heavier line that will allow for higher drag settings or lighter line that will allow their reel to hold more line.

Of course, even with the most finely tuned tackle, if an exceptional fish comes along but the wrong angler is on the rod, the encounter might be doomed to failure from the start. Anglers come in all sizes, skill-levels and physical abilities. No one wants to hurt anyone's feelings, but sometimes you just have to be practical about things and face the reality that, if it's little 12year-old Jimmy's turn to catch the next fish that bites, and suddenly an 800-pound blue marlin slurps down a rigged mackerel set out on 80-pound tackle, it might be necessary to have the little guy miss a turn and allow "Big Jake" to have a go at the fish. Hopefully the day will come when Jimmy will do battle with a monster, but right then and there if that fish is going to be caught every tool used to bring fishto-fisherman, including the person on the rod's physical strength, stamina and angling skills, needs to be putting out 100% effort.

Hook, leader, swivel, knots, line, rod, reel, drag, boat handling and the angler's capabilities all need to come together in perfect sync to make an unexpected and exceptional catch happen. A failure in a single link in the chain means a lost fish and missed opportunity to land a possible fish of a lifetime.





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

Distinguishing Characteristics


- Forked tail.

Habitat

Mostly bays and protected coastal waterways, but also inhabit inshore reefs. Sticks mostly to rock or shell bottom and loves dock and bridge pilings, artificial reefs and any other structure with barnacles.



Typically found in the 5 to 50 lb. range but catches in excess of 75 lbs. are not rare.. It is the largest fish in the drum family

Distinguishing Characteristics

- Broad, flat tail
- Juvenile black drum have black vertical stripes on dusky white sides.
- Adults are deep bronze to dingy black.
- All size fish have chin barbels.

Habitat

Juveniles like shorelines, bar edges and shallows while larger fish perfer surf, channels and open water. Loves to hang around piers and bridges.
