

It was a beautiful weekend for fishing and that only added to the excitement during the 18th Annual Ocean City Marlin Club's Kid's Classic Tournament. Almost 200 young anglers and 55 boats participated in the two day event with 14 different species on the leaderboard. With a good balance of offshore and bay fishing the scales were busy. The Bluefish Division is popular with the fish usually being plentiful, however day one saw only one weighed. Day 2 saw only a couple more, but it would have been hard to beat the big 8.4 lb. chopper blue caught by the crew of the "On Point" with anglers Luke Zeccola, Perry Roberts, Isabella Zeccola, Hayes Roberts and Adalyn Roberts. Finishing in 1st Place for Heaviest Bluefish, it was almost twice as heavy than the 2nd place fish.



Curt Presnell and his son Cody had a nice father and son day on the rip. They pulled in a nice 62.5 lb. yellowfin tuna while trolling near the 800 Square on their boat the "Fortuna".

This Week Last Year

- High winds and soaring temperatures put a hurt on the offshore bite.
- Most of the action during the OC Marlin Club's Kid's Classic was inshore or in the bays.
- Captain's began chunking for tuna at the inshore lumps with good success at the Hotdog with the Baltimore Canyon being the place for trolling. There were tuna in the southern canyons, however shark attacks on the tuna as they got close to the boat continued to be some of the worst captains had seen in years.
- The first longfin tunas of the season were reported. It was a double hookup for sisters Morgan an Kayler Michael in the Baltimore Canyon.

It was a beautiful week in fabulous Delmarva and a steady stream of boats from Lewes to Cape Charles got out on the rip all week. The word for the offshore bite this past week would be picky but consistent. Most boats looking for tuna were able to boat mid range single digits with a few exceptional catches. Some are still trolling and others have switched to chunking inshore at the lumps. Billfishing remains slow, however a few boats willing to reach deep water past the canyons have been having some success with multiple releases including the first reported sailfish. Peanut mahi abound at the sea bass pot buoys and some little tunnys and bonitas found their way to the scales this

week. So let's get into the details!

Tuna

With the tuna bite being picky this week, we did not see a huge amount of boats heading out, but there were many especially on the weekend. The reports we got were of solid mid single digit catches of 50 to 60 pound vellowfins. Interestingly there seemed to be an even mix of fish caught on the troll and nice catches by captains chunking butterfish. those that chose to troll, the southern Poor Man's Canyon



was the hot spot with the northern Washington second. "Marli" reported The couple trips to the Poor Man's returning with good sized yellows and a number of boats fishing offshore in the 18th Annual Ocean City Marlin Club's Kid's Classic Tournament returned with fish from there as well. One of the "Marli" trips had an As the interesting twist. crew was fighting the largest tuna they got that day and as it got closer to the boat, mate Jake Pilkerton noticed it was tangled in a heavy line as was the boats rudder! So overboard he goes to clear the rudder while mate Jax "the Cactus Kid" Moore gets the yellowfin in the boat.

www.coastalfisherman.net Overall they pulled in about 150' of heavy line to dispose of properly! Another notable highlight of the week for trolling occurred on Sunday when the "Wrecker" brought in 16 yellowfins. They pulled a couple while chunking at the Hotdog, but got the rest after switching to the troll toward the Poor Man's Canyon. They were all good size in the upper 40 to 60 pound range.

For those that chose to chunk, the inshore lumps were the target. The hotspot was the Hambone with many boats finding 55 pounds or more fish. The top tuna during the Ocean City Marlin Club's Kid's Classic Tournament was found there by the "Soft Money" and it tipped the scales at 69 lbs. Nearby lumps, the Chicken Bone and Hotdog were also good spots.

The hot bigeye bite from last weekend's Ocean City Tuna Tournament has cooled significantly. We had reports of less than 5 eyeballs with 2 caught last Thursday. Capt. Luke Blume on the "C-Boys" called us to grab a picture of a 188 pounder they reeled in from the Washington and the "Moore Bills" reported a 193 lb. fish. Both were weighed at Sunset Marina.

We had no reports of bluefin or longfins this past week, however about a couple dozen little tunnys and bonitas came to the scales during the Kid's Classic. It is hard to differentiate these







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www.coastalfisherman.net two but the visual difference is on the tops of the fish. The false albacore (little Tunny) has a patterned stripe while the atlantic bonita has long running stripes.



Billfish

A highlight for this week was the report of the first sailfish caught for season. The "Blood Money" made an overnight trip starting last Thursday and headed to deep southern waters, 1100 fathoms east of the Washington Canyon. They were rewarded with the sailfish as well as going 3 for 4 on white marlin and catching a tuna. If I know this crew, the tuna was probably a mistake! The "Billfisher" repeated this strategy during the Kid's Classic running 98 miles east of the Washington as well last Saturday. They came to the scales flying 4 white marlin release flags as well as a sailfish release. They also had a single tuna!

Two blue marlin releases made their way to us from the "Old Hatt", who had one in the Poor Man's and the "Sandbob" in the Washington Canyon.

Everything Else!

There seems to be ample peanut mahi around the buoys for the sea bass pots. The "Spring Mix II" worked them on Sunday and brought in 21. Some gaffers have been picked up by boats trolling for tuna. The "Wigg One" took top honors for dolphin in the Kid's Classic with a 17 pounder from the Poor Man's.

Blueline tilefish and triggerfish are plentiful in the canyons and some of the inshore spots like the Fingers. While we did not get many reports of golden tilefish this week, we have noted several restaurants in town have it on their menus this week, so the commercial catch must still be going strong.

Believe it or not we do not have a tournament this weekend, but rest assured we have some big ones just around the corner. Next up is the Big Fish Classic hosted at the Talbot Street Pier. This is always an exciting and entertainment filled event. Check out the details in the Upcoming Tournament section!

FISHING REPORT by Capt. BJ Pietryak

Last week in Ocean City the weather was better, however fishing was slower. Summertime is upon us and small undersized fish are everywhere.

Sea Bass, Flounder & Triggerfish

The "Judith M" with Capt. Eric Shoaff was fishing the near shore structure, and although having to pick through a ton of small fish, they did manage to bring home some quality fish including a few keeper bass from the near shore wrecks despite the rising water temperatures.

Captain Victor Bunting of the "Ocean Princess" reports some decent fishing. He stated that the best fishing was near the African Queen, however the Bass Grounds were a close second. Clam bait was the ticket for capturing keeper sea bass. Some nice flounder are coming in off the wrecks.

The "Angler" was out in this area last week. Captain Chris Mizurak reported some nice flounder caught along with a few bass. He also reported the big catches last week were Tom Price, who had limits with fish to 5 lbs. Also fishing the "Angler" was Tom Adkins with limits up to 4 lbs. Great job to both anglers!

Further Offshore

At the Great Eastern Reef

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"Tipsy Tiki's" Captain
Jeremy Michalski took out
Brian Dreiton for a great day
of fishing. The crew brought
home 8 flatties up to 22" and
17 bass up to 18". Despite
a broken boat knife the trip
was a huge success.

Jack and Garrett Bucy were out at the Jack Spot using clam and squid, and reportedly slaved the black bass. This time of the year the deeper area such as the above mentioned Great Eastern Reef, as well as the Jack Spot are great places to target bass. The deeper water keeps temps down for fish, and the distance to them keep many boats providing inshore less fishing pressure.

Bay Areas

The back bays of Ocean City produced a lot of nice fish this week. The charter boat "Lucky Break" was fishing the Rt. 50 Bridge. Adrian Romero of Delano, California caught 10 species of fish including a slammer bluefish. The "Lucky Break" fishes various bay spots as well as the OC Inlet.

Robert Giuffrida absolutely crushed the flatties last week catching limits for the boat. They also reported throwing back over 40 tog and a couple of triggerfish. That is quite the haul gentlemen! Also in the back bays, anglers Brenda Applebaum, Jim and Katie Ruth, and Charlie Mainwere were fishing near Jolly Roger Water Park on the boat "Nacho Boat" and caught a few flounder with the largest coming in at Just

Preston Walls was fishing the Thorofare with live mullet and caught a nice 22" flat fish. Cari Beth Shappell, Michael Guigley, Kim Petersheim and Judy Ziegenfuse fished the West Channel and caught 4 keepers up to 21". Cosmo Berezowski from Hebron, Maryland caught 6 keepers. The heaviest catch for Cosmo was a huge 23"at 5 lbs. 12 oz. He fished from

The area just north of the Rt. 50 Bridge has been the hottest spot last week, however as the summer season comes to full swing this area is very crowded. The main inlet area is also a good spot to fish, but be careful of the hard currents especially when fishing near the rock walls.

Blake Gunther's boat using

David Germroth and Fred Zolonas caught some nice flounder measuring 17-22". Fish were caught on squid and minnows. This time of the year is also a great time to drift small live spot. Big trophy fish can't resist a live spot on a circle hook. You will not get the bites you do with Gulp or squid, however, the bites you do get will be of better quality.

In the back bays near the Verrazano Bridge I have received reports of small rockfish and sea trout holding along the rocks near the bridge. Swim jigs and paddle tails are the hot bait when targeting these fish. They will often hold right along the rocks so cast up the current and allow the bait to bounce on the bottom just inside of the jetty walls.

Surf Fishing


Assateague Island was also a hot spot this week with several anglers getting in on the over slot redfish bite. Strom Cline was out with the family and said his son's girlfriend caught a beautiful fish of a lifetime. It was not weighed but measured at 45" long. Many anglers fish a lifetime and never catch a red drum that big. Great job and a fantastic catch! The closer you get to the Virginia line the better your chances at landing one of these trophy fish. In the next week or two as the water heats to

our summer high temps, the fish will migrate out of the areas until mid September.

Crabs & Clams

Crabbing in Assawoman Bay is a little slower than past years with the catch counts down a bit. The upside to this is it's some of the biggest crabs we have seen in years. Carl Littleton, owner of Bob's Marine, said he has been averaging around 7-9 crabs per pot with almost half being jumbos of 7" or more. Bunker as the bait is working best. I personally tried chicken a week ago and got one of the smallest harvests I've gotten all year. This week I went back to bunker and got 38 crabs for 4 pots. Out of those crabs at least 12 were jumbos with many in the 6-7" range.

When we think about trolling, most anglers envision a large tournament sportfish, with a cockpit full of anglers, cutting across the fishing grounds at a smooth 8 knots. For many other anglers, trolling means using a bow mounted electric trolling motor in their center console fishing boat to aid their fishability.

Over the past few years, the trolling motor marketplace become filled with stronger and longer trolling motors, with new manufacturers entering the marketplace. An electric trolling motor is a secondary source of propulsion for a fishing boat, usually a center console boat. The trolling motor is used to help

maneuver the boat while fishing or to take advantage of the stealthy quiet population that does not alert the fish to your presence like a gasoline outboard. Over 60% of the trolling motor market sales for a bow mounted trolling motor with the balance stern installed. Minn Kota is one of the most popular brands of mass-produced trolling motors, Rhodan is a small manufacturer of popular trolling motors and makes

one of the longest trolling motors at 96". Lowrance and Garmin both offer their own trolling motors, the Lowrance Ghost and Garmin Force are both popular, partly due to the integration into the multifunction associated displays.

The biggest change over the years for trolling motors is the increased size and power, allowing trolling motors to be used on larger and taller

With lithium style batteries becoming readily available, much smaller and lighter batteries are available, and single 24v and 36v batteries are available that are in one compact case. The most significant example of a new battery offering for trolling motors is a single 36V lithium battery that is the same size as a BCI group 31 battery and weighs 33 pounds. In the past, boaters would have required three deep cycle batteries at over 150 lbs. total weight and much more room.

These lithium batteries allow boaters to install most

a trolling motor:

Thrust – This is the amount of force that a trolling motor can produce and refers to the power of the motor, usually rated on pounds of thrust. The weight of the boat helps determine the minimum amount of thrust needed, a good rule of thumb is to have 2 lbs. of thrust for every 100 lbs. of fully loaded boat weight (people and gear included).

If things like wind or current are major factors where you fish, you will want a little extra thrust.

Voltage-Indicates how much battery power your trolling requires. motor Trolling motors are available in 12volt, 24 volt and 36 volts. A while back you would need one dedicated battery for 12 volts, two batteries for 24

fishing boats. There are three any trolling motor and are key specifications that define not constrained by battery requirements.

> Shaft Length - Choosing the proper shaft length of your trolling motor is important if it is too short, the prop will not be sufficiently submerged. In general, it is recommended that the center of the motor section is submerged by at least 12 inches. Larger boats or boats with taller bows can now find a trolling motor that works for their boat since most manufacturers offer much longer trolling motor





As an example, Minn Kota now makes their own heavy-duty connector, the MKR-26 trolling motor plug receptacle provides continuous power rated to 60 amps and up to 48V, this will meet the requirements of most trolling motors offered wiring and today. The circuit breaker also needs to be capable of carrying the electricity from the battery to the trolling motor. For example, the popular 112 lb. thrust Minn Kota requires #8-gauge wire run from the battery to the trolling motor and a 60-amp circuit breaker.

Mounting - Some of these

mounting bracket. A quick release bracket consists of two pieces, one part that bolts to the trolling motor and one part that bolts to the boat. This allows you to remove the trolling motor when not in use.

Mounting a trolling motor takes some planning, since when in the stowed position the motor and shaft rest horizontally, often encroaching into the deck space on the boat or worse over the gunwale, exposing the unit to potential damage while docking etc.

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Last week in Delaware we saw calmer seas and pretty decent fishing near shore. The sea bass caught are mostly undersized with a few keepers for those who pick through them. Flounder is definitely improving but still a lot of undersized fish around.

Flounder, Sea Bass & Tog Old Grounds

Collin and Caleb Neely were out at the Old Grounds and brought home keeper sea bass and flounder for dinner. The two brothers also released several undersized fish. After an epic battle of who had the most fish caught, it was called a tie.

Scott Klenfelter reported he was out fishing with his daughter Shiloh Kleinfelter who is 13 vears old catching her first keeper flounder. The smile on her face said it all. Great job Shiloh! "Bad Wind Charters" was back at it again this week catching a boat load of flatties up to 6 lbs. for their clients. They reported that of course Bruce got the biggest one again. Dan McGeedey caught a beautiful 7.43 lb. citation flounder on ocean structure using Gulp and squid. Dan was fishing on the "Katydid" and the fish was weighed in at Lewes Harbour Marina. Kevin Mcnelis came

home with 2 nice fish weighing 4 lbs. and 3.8 lbs. The fish were caught on ocean structure using white Gulp. The "Judy V" out of Indian River Marina's Hook'em and Cook'em Tackle reports fishing was pretty good this week with some nice flounder caught as well as a few sea bass. The best time to fish the headboat is mid-week when the boat is not as crowded.

Mate Evan Trakas and Aidan Riley of the "Judy V" fished on the boat "Can Of Corn" and ended the day with 3 flounder and 20 triggerfish. A few sea bass were caught but most of the keepers have come further offshore in deeper water.

Jersey Delaware Reef

Horace Hockenstien was fishing in the deep water when he caught a boat load of flounder. He stated that the deeper, further out wrecks are the key to finding water that has not been fished over. When fishing this area try the northern point near the subway cars instead of the wrecks or ferry. Many anglers will target the big wrecks due to the ease of seeing them on their depth finders, and therefore leave the smaller subway cars untouched. Herb Kaufer and his high school friend headed out to the reef with Captain Mike Faust on the "Chasin' Tail" and were rewarded with a nice bunch of keeper sea bass.

Daryl Mergenthaller Jr. was out with Fred Robinson and Joseph Nicholas Jr. ending the day with a few sea bass, tog and even a few nice sized triggerfish.

The boys from "Flip And Fins" fished this area with sand fleas and brought home a mix of bass, sheep, trigger and ling. That's quite a variety for a dinner table! Site A Buoy was also pretty productive this week with flatties caught along the inshore coral as well as the deeper outside on the channel coral. Gulp baits tipped with squid are reported as the top bait.

Indian River Bay

The bay area has slowed down a bit with tons of smaller fish being caught. Old Inlet Tackle reports that tautog, sheepshead and black drum are keeping the inlet anglers busy. They report that live sand fleas are the ticket. They further reported that flounder are being caught using light jig heads with white Swimming Mullet Gulp baits fished tight to the rocks. The main spot for the flat fish has been in the back part of the bay, and we are receiving

www.coastalfisherman.net information that croaker have also showed up in the back of Indian River Bay. Croaker are a great way to keep the young anglers engaged in fishing because when you find the pods of fish they are usually more than willing to bite any bait put in front of them. Small pieces of squid on a small hook with a very light weight is the best rig and bait for targeting these fish. As for the rod, any light weight rod and reel will work, even a child beginner rod.

The Flounder Pounder Bay Tournament was Saturday and Sunday. There were over 800 anglers. Brandon Groce took first place with a 6 lb. 25.75". Second place was Vito Difrancesco with a 5.7 lbs. at 23", and third place was Devin Fortney weighed at 5.6 lb and 23". The women's division was won by Laura Forester with a 4.2 lb. and 23.25" fish. Laura was also 6th place overall.

North & Delaware Bay Areas

Parker Pastorius was fishing the outer wall with sand fleas and caught a spectacular 10 lb. sheepshead. Bill Santana caught 4 stripers from 8-9 pm last week. Good to see that a few of these fish are staying around even as the water warms. Tim Shaw was fishing bay structure and caught a nice 9.36 lb. sheepshead on sand fleas. This qualified him for a state citation. The fish was weighed in at Lewes Harbour Marina. Brian Kelly was also herding the sheep and caught a



www.coastalfisherman.net nice 7.8 lb., as well as a citation 10.4 lb one. Fish were caught on sand fleas. Kyle Falgowski also made a great showing with a 9.75 lb. sheep caught on sand fleas off the ferry wall.

Cobia

There is a pending new state record for cobia. Scott Brooks of Hockessin, DE was fishing just in front of Bethany Beach and caught a fish of a lifetime. The new pending state record is a 90 lb., 63" cobia. The fish was caught using a white bucktail tipped with a white worm. The fish was weighed in at Hook'em and Cook'em Tackle at Indian River Marina.

Surf Fishing

The surf has been pretty good for kingfish and spot lately. Last week saw the first pompano caught by angler Josh Willey measuring at 16.5". The fish was caught on sand fleas. Nice to see these fish returning again this year.

Grilled Bigeye Tuna with Couscous Ragù

Ingredients:

Kosher salt

1/2 cup couscous

1/4 cup plus 1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil

1 pound mild or spicy sausage, removed from its casing

1/4 cup minced garlic

1 tablespoon minced shallot

1 quart coarsely chopped escarole

1 cup shellfish stock

5 tablespoons unsalted butter, cut into cubes

1 tablespoon thinly sliced basil

1 tablespoon thinly sliced flatleaf parsley leaves

1 tablespoon minced chives Freshly ground white pepper



1/4 cup Dijon mustard

2 tablespoons mustard powder

2 tablespoons thinly sliced cliantro

4 bigeye tuna fillets, about 6 ounces each

Sea salt

Directions:

Fill a medium pot halfway with salted water, bring to a boil over high heat, and add the couscous. Cook until al dente, about 10 minutes. Drain and set aside.

Heat 1 tablespoon of the oil in a large, deep sauté pan over medium heat. When the oil is shimmering, add the sausage and cook, stirring periodically, until it is cooked through and has rendered enough fat to coat the bottom of the pan, about 5 minutes. Add 2 tablespoons of the garlic and the shallot and cook without browning, stirring for 1 minute.

Stir in the escarole and cook until slightly wilted, about 2 minutes. Pour in the stock, stir in the couscous and cook for 3 minutes. Add the butter, a few pieces at a time, stirring until incorporated and emulsified.

Once all the butter is added, stir in the basil, parsley, and chives and season with salt and pepper. The ragù should be thick enough to coat the back of a spoon. If it is too thin, continue to cook, stirring until the proper consistency is achieved. Remove the pan from the heat and set aside. Cover to keep the ragù warm.

For the tuna:

Heat a grill to high or heat a grill pan over high heat for 5 minutes. Put the dijon mustard, mustard powder, remaining 2 tablespoons of garlic and the cilantro in a medium bowl and whisk together. Continue whisking slowly, adding the remaining ½ cup oil in a thin stream to make an emulsified

www.coastalfisherman.net marinade.

Season the tuna with salt and pepper and brush the marinade on both sides of the fillets. Grill the tuna until rare, about 2 minutes per side. Transfer to a cutting board, allow it to rest for 2 to 3 minutes, then cut each piece crosswise into 4 slices.

To serve, divide the ragù among 4 serving bowls, top each with 4 tuna slices and season the tuna with sea salt.

Panko Crusted Rockfish Fillets

Ingredients:

Fish:

2 rockfish fillets*, 3/4 - 1 lb.

2 tablespoons of olive or vegetable oil for frying

Flour Dredge:

1/3 cup flour

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon pepper

Egg Wash:

1 egg

2 tablespoons milk

Panko Crust:

1/2 cup panko bread crumbs**
3 tablespoons grated parmesan

1 teaspoon of Old Bay seasoning Directions:

Place a large oven safe skillet into the oven and preheat to 425 degrees.



Set up the dredging assembly line:

In a large bowl combine together the flour, salt and pepper. Stir and pour onto a large plate.

In the same bowl combine together the panko, seasoning blend and parmesan cheese.



www.coastalfisherman.net Stir and pour onto a large plate.

Wipe out the bowl and use it again to whisk together the egg and milk.

Prep the fish:

Check the fish fillets for any bones and remove. Slice fish in half if necessary.***

Dredge fish first in the flour, shaking off any excess.

Dip fish into the egg mixture, allowing any excess to drip off.

Coat fish in the panko mixture, shaking off any excess. Place on a clean plate and allow to rest 1 - 2 minutes so the panko can adhere.

Fry the fish:

When the oven and frying pan are preheated, add the 2 tablespoons of oil to the hot pan. Allow to heat 1 minute. Carefully add fish fillets to the hot oil.

Cook in the oven for 3-4 minutes, then carefully flip over.

Cook an additional 3-4 minutes. Check with a meat thermometer for an internal temperature of at least 140 degrees.

While the fish cook, set up a cooling rack over a couple layers of paper towels.

Remove fish from the pan and place on the cooling rack. Allow serving.

Notes:

*If rockfish is thicker than 1" at the thickest point, you'll need to add an extra minute or two to the cook time.

**Many of the rockfish fillets are too big to handle without splashing grease or having them fall apart. Slicing them into more manageable fillets makes this cooking method much easier.

***If your rockfish fillets are large enough to cut into more than 2 pieces, you may want to add an extra tablespoon or two of panko to the crumb mixture. To adapt for the air fryer:

Cut the oil from 2 tablespoons to 2 teaspoons. Combine the oil with the panko parmesan mixture, stirring to ensure the oil is absorbed by the panko, then dredge as instructed. Air Fry at 400° until crispy, about 6 - 8 minutes, turning over half way through the cook time.

Pan Seared Blackened Flounder

Ingredients:

Creole Seasoning:

- tablespoon hot spanish smoked paprika
- 1/2 tablespoons sweet paprika



1 tablespoon black pepper or pepper blend

1/2 tablespoon cayenne pepper, or to taste

1 tablespoon dried leaf oregano 1 tablespoon dried thyme

Directions:

Combine all ingredients for the seasoning thoroughly. will not need all of it for this recipe; store extra in a sealed jar.)

Rinse the fish fillets and pat dry with towels. If necessary, cut the fish in portions that will fit in your skillet. Coat the fish on both sides with seasoning mix, pressing it onto the fish to get a good layer of seasoning.

Heat a large skillet over high heat and add a thin layer of oil to the pan (suitable for highheat cooking). When very hot, and without crowding the pan, place seasoned fish in the skillet and cook without moving the fish for 3-4 minutes, until nicely "bronzed". Flip the fish over and cook for another 3-4 minutes until the fish is done



(opaque in center). Repeat for the rest of the fillets, adding oil as necessary and keeping the skillet very hot.

Serve it hot, with a squeeze of lime juice... Enjoy!

Air Fried Mahi Fish & Chips

Ingredients:

4-5 mahi fillets - thawed

2 cups panko bread crumbs

1 Tbsp. creole seasoning

2 eggs

1/4 cup mayo



11/4 tsp. lemon juice

11/2 tsp. chopped fresh dill

1/4-1/2 tsp. salt to taste

Steak fries

Directions:

In a small bowl, combine the mayo, chopped pickles, lemon juice, fresh dill and salt. Stir to combine. Cover and refrigerate until ready to use.

In a small bowl, add the two eggs and whisk

In another small bowl, add the panko bread crumbs and creole seasoning. Stir to combine.

Using a knife, cut the mahi fillets into strips or chunks, depending on the shape of the fillets.

Dip the mahi pieces into the whisked egg, then into the bread crumb mixture. Continue until all are breaded.

Spray your air fryer basket with an air fryer safe cooking spray.

Place the breaded mahi chunks into the air fryer basket in a



single layer and cook for 12-14 minutes at 400 degrees F, carefully flipping at the halfway mark.

Remove from basket and serve with a side of steak fries and the lemon dill dipping sauce.

Flounder Française

Ingredients:

1/8 teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon pepper

1/3 cup flour

2 pounds white fish filet, like butter. Drizzle over fish. sole or flounder

2 whole eggs, beaten

1/2 cup chicken broth

1/2 cup lemon juice

1 tablespoon butter

1 tablespoon capers (optional)

Directions:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees and spray a sheet pan with olive oil spray.

Mix salt and pepper with flour and coat the fish fillets with it. Place on a tray or plate in a single layer.

Heat a fry pan on medium high. When it's hot, dip one piece of fish in the eggs and then put it immediately on the frying pan.

Continue with the rest of the fish. When golden brown, flip fish over.

When both sides are browned, transfer fish to sheet pan, and bake in the oven for 5-10 minutes until cooked through.

Over low heat, whisk together chicken broth, lemon juice, and www.coastalfisherman.net

Top fish with capers.

Tips:

The order for the fish is flour then egg, and no additional flour.

Have your bowl of eggs close to your frying pan so you do not drip and lose your coating.

If you're cooking this meal for a dinner party, prep everything ahead up through putting the fish in the oven. Do that at the last minute and it's a breeze!

Black Sea Bass with Zucchini Noodles

Ingredients:

2 4 oz. black sea bass fillets

2 tsp. seasoning mix (see ingredients below)

1 tbsp. butter or ghee

2 large zucchini

1 tbsp. avocado oil, coconut oil or extra virgin olive oil

1.5 tbsp. of diced pimentos

2 tbsp. capers

5 whole pitted kalamata olives, chopped

1/2 tbsp. unsalted butter Splash of lemon juice

Extra sea salt and pepper for the zucchini noodles

Seasoning Mix:

1/2 tsp. ground coriander

1/2 tsp. garlic powder

1 tsp. paprika

1 tsp. ground cumin

1/2 tsp. sea salt

1/2 tsp. ground black pepper

Directions:

Make the spice mix. Combine all spice mix ingredients and mix well.

Prepare the sea bass. Dry the fillets and then sprinkle each sea bass fillet with 1 tsp. of the seasoning mix. Set aside.

Prepare and cook the zucchini noodles. Spiralize the zucchini noodles with the small noodle attachment. Sprinkle with sea salt, pepper and 1 tbsp. of oil. Toss to coat. Heat a 10 inch cast iron skillet over medium heat and add the zucchini noodles. Cook until tender, about 5 minutes, mixing often. Tongs work well for this. After cooking reduce the heat to the lowest setting you can - you just want to keep the noodles warm. Add the pimentos, kalamata capers, chopped olives, 1/2 tbsp. butter and splash of lemon juice. Toss to combine.

Cook the sea bass. Heat 1 tbsp.



of butter in a 12 inch cast iron skillet over medium heat. If your sea bass has skin, place skin side down first and cook for 3 minutes. Flip over and cook for another 3 minutes. Flip back over and cook until the fish is flaky, 4-5 minutes.

Plate your meal. Divide the zucchini noodles among two bowls. Top with the seared sea bass. You can remove the skin from the sea bass before placing on top of the zucchini noodles, if desired Sprinkle with parmesan cheese or feta cheese if desired.

Grilled Peaches with Cinnamon Sugar Butter

Ingredients:

1 stick unsalted butter, at room temperature

1 teaspoon cinnamon sugar

2 tablespoons granulated sugar Pinch salt

4 ripe peaches, halved and pitted

Canola oil

Mint leaves, for garnish



Directions:

In a small bowl add the butter and stir until smooth. Add the cinnamon sugar, granulated sugar and salt and mix until combined.

Heat grill to high. Brush peaches with oil and grill until golden brown and just cooked through. Top each with a few teaspoons of the butter and garnish with mint leaves.

fisherman As every catching fish knows, doesn't happen on every trip. In fact, I think that for a lot of folks "not" catching fish is a much more common occurrence. So I got to thinking that maybe I'm missing a great opportunity to tap into an overlooked segment of the outdoor writing market by directing my efforts on those fishermen who are tired of always reading about how to "catch fish" and instead write about how "not to catch fish" because that's a topic that all fishermen should be able to relate to!

I'm not referring to the days when anglers do everything right, Mother Nature doesn't send any hungry fish their way. Oh no, that's too easy! On days like that, anglers don't have to try not to catch fish, it just happens. Or should I say it just "doesn't happen," anglers shouldn't try to take credit for it. "How to not catch fish" is about when the actions anglers specifically prevent them catching fish. It's not that the fish aren't biting, it's that the fishermen can't connect when they have a

chance to.

For example; one of the best ways not to catch fish is to have no bait on the boat, which of course is a no-brainer and a situation fisherman would allow themselves to be in. But it does happen. In fact, I recall it happening to a team fishing in the White Marlin Open a number of years ago. In preparation for the first day of fishing the gang spent all afternoon at one of the fellow's full of ballyhoo, mullet, squid and mackerel. The problem was, the next morning when they when the Washington Canyon, they realized their cooler of baits was still sitting on the team member's back deck! In another tournament a team also rigged all their baits before the first fishing day but forgot to put ice in the bait cooler. The next day the weather was hot and sunny but too rough to fish, so the cooler sat in the sun and baked. Evidently the team never opened the cooler lid until they were out on the fishing grounds two days later. I might be wrong but I don't think billfish care too much for "hot" pink squid or baked ballyhoo!

fish is to have no bait on which is actually pretty before it was all over.

www.coastalfisherman.net easy to learn and one that most of us have practiced more than once throughout our fishing careers. I could ramble on about how to put a hook in a bait in such a way that it will easily tear off at the slightest nibble or by water pressure from a strong current or fast retrieve, but the easiest way to fish with no bait is simply to not check the bait regularly. The heck with bringing the bait up just to see that it's still intact, just let it go, fish every bait a long, long time. Leave it in the water long enough that the crabs, small bluefish, sharks, or squid can eat it home rigging a cooler right off the hook. Heck, leave it in there long enough that the snails and sea-slugs can find it and whittle it down to to put their lines out in nothing! The next best thing to fishing with no bait is fishing with bait that's all clumped up with seaweed. Unfortunately, seaweed is just predictable enough that anglers can always count on it being there to deter bites.

I know anglers who have avoided catching fish by leaving the dock without their rods, tackle box, flies, net, gaff, and just about any other essential piece of fish catching equipment imaginable. On a similar note I once had a group of six anglers come out fishing with me who left their food and drink cooler on the dock. It was a long hot day for Another way to not catch those fellows who were seriously considering your hook, a technique having a meal of sushi

A lot of fishermen have become pretty good at not catching fish by fishing where there are no fish. How many times I've watched anglers on the shore or in a boat casting right up onto a sandbar where it's only inches deep. If I didn't know that they were actually trying not to catch fish I'd be duped into believing that they just didn't know how shallow it was.

Anyone can get a tangled line but it takes a pro at not catching fish to get a whopper of a tangle just as a school of fish pops up within casting range. If really done correctly an angler can make it look to their fishing partners like the tangle resulted from fumbling around with the rod and reel in efforts to fire off a quick cast in order to actually "catch" a fish. A good tangle should take so long to straighten out that there is no chance of getting a line in the water before all evidence of the passing school has vanished.

I could go on and on about ways not to catch fish, but I'm thinking that most anglers already have their own list of methods to ensure that they don't have to clean fish or the fish box at the end of the day. Besides, I'm thinking now that this could be good book material, something like "101 Ways Not To Catch Fish" or "How To Fish and NOT Come Home Smelling Like Anyway, I wish everyone a good week of fishing whether you're successful at catching - or not! §

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The tuna were hard to find over the weekend during the 18th Annual Ocean City Marlin Club's Kid's Classic Tournament, but that did not deter the crew of the "Soft Money". Capt. Jeff Kirby and anglers Jessie Simmons Jr., Mya Stellfox and Jason Bernstein set to work chunking at the Hambone. They caught 3 nice yellowfins with the largest popping to the scale late on day 1 at 69 lbs. A few in the over 60 lb. range were weighed, but theirs held on to take 1st Place for Heaviest Tuna.



The Unusual Catch Category is always fun to watch during the Annual Ocean City Marlin Club's Kid's Classic Tournament. Anglers bring anything they find while fishing and the more unusual the better. This year saw a tiny sea horse that fell out of the mouth of a sea bass, a rosefish and even a pair of swim goggles and a plastic bottle! It was however a cownose ray caught near the OC Coast Guard Station by Richard Hoenes III that was selected as Most Unusual. He was fishing on the "Sea Hunt" with Peyton and Garrett Elder.



The competition for the Heaviest Stringer Division for spot was hot during the 18th Annual Ocean City Marlin Club's Kid's Classic Tournament! With up to 5 allowed per stringer, it only takes a couple chubby fish to make the difference. While the spot were reported broadly across the Ocean City Bay, it was the 5 that Ashton, Owen, Sam and Leo West caught near Harbor Island that topped the leaderboard at 3.4 lbs., over a pound and a half heavier than 2nd Place!



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The weigh masters at the 18th Annual Ocean City Marlin Club's Kid's Classic Tournament measured a lot of sea bass over the 2 day event. Each boat was allowed to weigh up to 3 fish of each species per day. With most tipping the scale at just over 2 lbs., it was the 3 lb. knothead caught by the team on the "Buckshot" that locked in 1st Place. Cru Miller, Huck Miller and Isabella Perez also caught a blueline tilefish and a cute little rosie as their unusual catch.






There were 2 'stringer' divisions during the 18th Annual Ocean City Marlin Club's Kid's Classic Tournament allowing for up to 5 fish to be weighed together. One of those was for croaker, and the gang on the "Miss Mary" locked in the top spot on Saturday with a stringer weighing 2.4 lbs. Anglers Connor Hart, Cade Harrington and Coah Harrington were fishing with Capt. Justin Hart around the Verrazano Bridge to Assateague Island. They also caught spot, found a ribbon fish as well as releasing 2 sandbar sharks.



There were tilefish for days laid out on the dock by the "Marli" during the 18th Annual Ocean City Marlin Club's Kid's Classic Tournament, so it was not a surprise that one of the 3 they were eligible to weigh would take the top slot in the Blueline Tilefish Division with a 8.4 lb. fish. Three generations of Hoos were fishing that day in 65 fathoms between the Poor Man's and Baltimore Canyon. The crew of Capt. Mark Hoos, Mark Hoos Jr., Trey Hoos, Jack Hoos, Sophia Perry and Randy Newcomer also caught 2 yellowfin tunas.

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As the saying goes, it only takes one! That was certainly the case for Savannah Gerlach during the 18th Annual Ocean City Marlin Club's Kid's Classic Tournament. She caught the only rockfish brought to the scales and it weighed a hefty 13.4 lbs.. She was fishing with live spot on the "Billfisher" at the Rt. 50 Bridge with Charlotte Gerlach, Colt Duffie and Georgia Duffie along with fathers Billy Gerlach and Jon Duffie.



The crew of the "Fish Bound" have a history of bringing a lot of fish to the scales during the Annual Ocean City Marlin Club's Kid's Classic Tournament, and they did not disappoint at this years 18th edition. Capt. Kane Bounds took anglers Landon Bounds, Connor Vaughan, Nora Vaughan, Jamison Twilley and Brax Giardina 20 miles offshore and fished a natural bottom for this mix of flounder and sea bass. The largest flounder was 4.6 lbs, and held on to take 1st Place in that division.



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The "Billfisher" was the last boat to the scales on the day 1 of the 18th Annual Ocean City Marlin Club's Kid's Classic Tournament. Capt. Jon Duffie made the bet that the billfish were in deep water, so he headed well east the Washington Canyon about 98 miles out. The strategy worked as Colt Duffie and John Charles Duffie released 4 white marlin and a sailfish securing 1st Place in the Billfish Release Division.
