

With a 501 lb. thresher shark at the top of the leaderboard heading into the final day of the 21st Annual Bahia Marina Mako Mania Shark Tournament, most spectators figured it was a lock to win the Thresher Division, but the anglers on the "Teaser" had a different outcome in mind. On Sunday, they brought this 583 pounder to the scale to take over the first place spot. Mike Fritsch of Aberdeen, MD hooked the 97-incher on a whole bluefish at the Fingers and fought it for 2 hours before getting it to the boat. Since the shark was too big to get into the cockpit, they had to tow it 28 miles back to Bahia Marina, a long trip when traveling at 10 knots. Rounding out the "Teaser" team that took home \$15,765 for their 1st place finish were Ricky Windsor, Capt. Rich Daiker and mate Mike Miller.







Frank Perna of Alexandria, VA caught this 84 lb. bluefin tuna last Saturday while trolling ballyhoo in 61.7-degree water in the Baltimore Canyon. Frank was fishing on the "Indian Giver" with Jim Bunting of Georgetown, DE. They also released a bluefin similar in size during their trip. Weighed at Hook'em & Cook'em in the Indian River Marina.



After being motivated by the thresher shark on last weeks cover of the *Coastal Fisherman*, the anglers on the "Constant Threat" decided to go after their very first thresher and the decision really paid off. Doug Mazzullo of Kent Island, MD muscled in this 358 pounder after hooking it on a bluefish fillet at the Parking Lot. Doug was fishing with Ryan Detamore, Bekki Mazzullo, Capt. Doug Howell and mate Charlie O'Reilly. Weighed at Sunset Marina. Congratulations to the "Constant Threat" team!







Ocean City-Fishing Report by Larry Jock

We finally had a nice weekend for fishing in Ocean City. The wind picked up during the afternoons, but the mornings were beautiful and the sun was shining.

The record-setting 21st Annual Mako Mania Shark Tournament at Bahia Marina was exciting. Although, angler Shane Moore on the "Moore Bills" caught a good size, 228 lb. mako on the second day of the tournament and held on to win the big money, it was the Thresher Division that had those at the scale on the edge of their seats.

On the first day of the tournament, Ocean City angler Kevin Rohe caught a 501 lb. thresher to take over the top spot in the Thresher Division. I'm sure everyone thought that fish had a lock on 1st place (I know I did), but as it usually does in fishing tournaments,

the leaderboard changed on the final day when Mike Fritsch on the "Teaser" arrived with a 583 pounder that they caught in 20 fathoms at the Fingers. The fish was so big that the guys couldn't fit it in the boat so they had to tow it back the 28 miles to Bahia Marina. This fish actually knocked the 241.6 lb. thresher caught on the first day by the "Teaser" guys out of 3rd place, but I'm sure the anglers didn't mind. Vaughn Charlton on the "Game On" caught the 3rd place thresher on Day 2 when he hooked a 434 pounder on a skirted mackerel in Massey's Canyon.

The Mako Division was also exciting. The "Jenny Poo" was the first boat to arrive at the scale, loaded with a 191.2 lb. mako caught at the Hot Dog that took the lead after Day 1, but fell to 3rd place by the end of the tournament. Several

other makos were caught on the first day, primarily in 30 fathoms around the Hot Dog. On the second day, "Mako Me Crazy"was the first to show up with a mako, with theirs weighing 196.3 lbs., good enough to vault them into the lead. The make ate a whole bluefish in 59.6-degree water at the Hambone. The charter boat, "Moore Bills" arrived a short time later with their 228 pounder that jumped into the lead and never looked back. Shane's mako went after a bluefish fillet in 59-degree water below the Tea Cup. The anglers only had their lines in the water for 30 minutes before Shane's hook-up at 8:00 AM.

The Bluefish Division in this tournament is always a mystery to me, and I mean a mystery as to why more boats don't spend at least some time targeting the choppers. The "Teaser" took the top 2 spots with a 7.3 pounder and an 11.2 lb. bluefish to win \$10,310 in award money. An awesome payout!

Overall, it was a record breaking tournament on many levels, including 77 boats, 337 anglers and a total payout of \$134,480. Shawn Harman, Earl Conley and the entire staff at Bahia Marina, once again, did a fantastic job running the tournament and making it a fun event for both anglers and spectators.

Although you could make a case for sea bass being the star of the week, it would be tough

to vote against sharks, with several nice ones hitting the scales around town.

"Restless The Lady" brought a couple of nice size threshers back to the Talbot Street Pier last week. On Wednesday, Capt. Todd Kurtz took his group to the Marine Electric and returned with a 494 lb. thresher that they hooked on a whole squid. Hats off to Brad Robertson for muscling in the big shark all by himself. The following day, anglers on the "Restless Lady" headed to the Chicken Bone and boated a 374 pounder on a bluefish fillet.

On Saturday, inspired by the thresher on last weeks cover of the Coastal Fisherman, anglers on the "Constant Threat" decided for the first time to try for a thresher and were rewarded with a 358 pounder at the Parking Lot.

In addition to the several makos weighed during the tournament, we also saw some mako sharks caught throughout the week. The "No Quarter" boated a 202 pounder in 60-degree water at the Sausages and later in the week, anglers on the "Marli" had a 135 pounder in 30 fathoms in the Washington Canyon. The largest make of the week, and probably the largest we will see this year, was caught out of the Indian River Marina when John Pendell captured a pounder on Saturday at the Elephant Trunk.

Some offshore boats ventured further from the beach in search of marlin, tuna and mahi. Incredibly, the first white marlin of the season has not been caught yet, although a few were hooked "over the fence" below the Norfolk

Canyon, 126 miles from the Ocean City Inlet.

On Friday, Capt. Brian Porter on the "Boss Hogg" took his anglers to that batch of water and ended up with 11 yellowfins and a pair of dolphin.

Over the weekend, boats returned with yellowfins and mahi from 65-degree water in the Baltimore Canyon and from deep behind the Washington Canyon.

On Sunday, anglers on the "Bonnie Lynn" got back from an overnight trip northeast of the 461 Lump where they went 5 for 6 on yellowfins with a pair of keepers in the 40 lb. range. They also caught 2 mahi, a 66-inch mako and lost a swordfish while fishing during the night. The "Hammer Down" went to 200 to 500 fathoms outside the Poor Man's and went 2 for 4 on yellowfins.

Inshore, the sea bass bite has been very good but anglers are having to run to at least 100-feet of water to find the larger fish. The best spots seem to be the Great Eastern Reef, the San Gil and the Del-Jersey-Land reef site. Anglers are also starting to see a few keeper size flounder mixed in as well.

In the bay, flounder fishing was good behind Assateague Island and in the Thorofare. Right now, the throwback ratio is extremely high all over the bay, but particularly behind Assateague where anglers were hooking 16 shorts before they could get their keeper. The flats Thorofare north of the continues to produce nice catches for those either drifting minnows and Gulp! artificial baits or slow trolling belly strips.

Striped bass were caught last week around the South Jetty and in the surf. Smaller stripers were found around the Rt. 50 Bridge for those tossing Gotcha plugs and topwater lures.

The bluefish bite has died down considerably with smaller snappers dominating the action. On Thursday, Big Bird Cropper and Dave Hrycyk had a superb day, hooking 37 snapper bluefish (keeping 20) and releasing 25 small stripers around the bridge and South Jetty.

The first sheepshead of the year was caught by Paul Lebling on Wednesday when he was fishing around the South Jetty with Ayrton Pryor. The 6 pounder hit a spec rig that was probably intended for a striped bass or bluefish. They did end up catching a dozen bluefish, weighing up to 6 lbs., in addition to 12 small stripers during their trip.

Upcoming Tournaments

We have a rare weekend off this week, so the next two tournaments on the schedule are the 28th Annual MSSA Tuna-Ment on June 16th to 18th and the Marlin Club Small Boat Tournament on June 17th and 18th. The weigh-ins for the MSSA Tournament will be at Atlantic Tackle and the Small Boat Tournament will be held at Sunset Marina.





This may come as a surprise to some of you, but I actually lose a fish every now and then.

Ι will allow a few moments now for you to recover from your shock. Maybe some time to clean up your spilled coffee or head to the store and grab a new copy of this issue since you might have spilled said coffee all over the copy you were reading.

.....humming myself......tum di dumdi dum....lalalala lamanam.....

Have you regained your composure? OK. Let's start again. I know it is hard to fathom that your beloved columnist, your weekly purveyor of piscatorial propaganda, the guy that

writes all these stories and digs out old pictures and clips to back up his bull, yeah this guy....has been bested by a finny opponent. Or two. But yes, it is true. I do not catch every fish that is daring, or dumb enough to swim up and nibble on my bait. On rare occasions they do in fact get away.

I used to fish with a guy down in Islamorada by the name of Carlos Delvalle. Carlos is a burly fellow, much like myself. He always seems to be smiling. Many of the locals down there just call him "The Cuban". Without a doubt, Carlos is one of the best all around fishermen I have ever had the pleasure of wetting a line with. Anything from bottom dwellers to blue marlin,

snappers to sailfish, Carlos is well versed in the techniques to trick the fish onto his hook. Yet surprisingly enough, he has had a few fish get away from him as well.

My old buddy Carlos used to always tell me about "The Genie". For example, we would be out fishing on one of those days when the fish just wouldn't cooperate and I would say something like, "I would give anything for just one measly bite right now." And Carlos would tell me right away to make sure I wish for exactly what I want. "Wish for a sailfish Franky. Wish for a bunch of bites Franky! You never know when The Genie might be listening!"

And I have always tried to follow this advice. The logic is pretty sound. Well, at least to me it is.

Another thing Carlos was fond of talking about was the day when he would actually find "The Genie". Any time we lost a fish Carlos and I would try to figure out what we should have done differently. Maybe turn the boat different or run ahead faster. Maybe pull harder on the leader and take a wild gaff shot since the fish ended up getting away anyway. Stuff like that. Usually these talks would end with Carlos saying, "Franky, when I find

The Genie don't be surprised if you get another shot at that fish!"

Over the years, I have spent quite a bit of time looking for "The Genie". Like I said, now be ready for it this time, sometimes I lose a fish. And if I can ever find "The Genie" I have a fish or two that I am pretty sure I can successfully capture now that I have relived their escape in my mind over and over again through the years.

One such fish was a BIG mako shark that got the best of me back when I was 15 years old.

I was working as the mate on the "Last Call" at the time. We had a group of our regular clients out for a day of sharking. Early in the day we all saw this monster make swim through our chum slick. And just like my shark guru buddy Capt. Mark Sampson says, the line in the movie Jaws is wrong. These things are not just eating machines. This mammoth mako swam through the slick and didn't pay one minute of attention to any of my baits. The crew was very dejected to say the least. And to make it worse we did not have any bites the entire rest of the day.

Around 3:30 in afternoon Dad told me we should probably think about winding the baits in and

heading for home. I was still thinking about what could have been if only that beast that swam through our slick in the morning had bit. Well, maybe "The Genie" can read thoughts, because right at that moment we got bit. It was not an exciting bite. No big splashes. No blistering runs. Just a steady pull and a long battle.

A little under two hours later we got the first look at what we had hooked. Scratch that. Unless there were was another mastodon sized mako in that spot that day, we got the second look at what we had hooked. And it was incredible. It was the biggest mako I had ever seen at that point in my life. All these years later I will say that it still ranks in the top three I have ever seen size-wise, and is definitely the biggest I have ever had hooked.

As the leader was coming into range for me to grab, I looked up at Dad and told

him that I would need help gaffing this one. He told me to let him know when I wanted him to come down from the fly bridge and give me a hand.

The fish was swimming lazily, slightly on its side. It sure looked tired. As I took a set of wraps on the leader I told Dad it was time. The boat was coasting ahead slowly and the fish appeared to be beat. Dad left the helm and started down the bridge ladder to the cockpit. And then it all went wrong. I swear that fish looked at me and then looked at Dad. I know. Sounds far fetched. But that great big black eye made contact with mine and I am sure it looked at Dad next. The fish righted itself and made some powerful thrusts with its tail. I held onto the leader for all I was worth as the fish shot forward. When I first took hold of the leader I was in the aft starboard corner of the cockpit. When the fish surged forward I was dragged along the covering boards until my ribs cracked against the side of the deckhouse. I can still see the water flying and Dad taking a desperate swipe at the fish with the flying gaff as it went under the bow of the boat... just before the leader broke.

Fish are always big when you lose them. I mean I seldom if ever lose a fish, let alone a small one, so I won't commit to paper how big I think that fish was. If you catch me at the right time, on the right evening, I may give you my guess. But let's just say it was big.

And if I ever find that "Genie" I may just be able to tell you exactly how big it was. And dig out the picture to prove it.



On the first day of the 2017 Bahia Marina Mako Mania Shark Tournament, Jeff Jones of St. Petersburg, FL arrived at the scale with a 156.4 lb. mako shark caught on a whole mackerel in 45 fathoms south of the Baltimore Canyon. 



Delaware Fishing Report by Jarry Jock

It was a pretty weekend. Winds died down in the morning, but definitely picked up in the afternoon.

This time of year is when anglers like to target big sharks, particularly threshers and makos. The Mako Mania Shark Tournament was last weekend and I know quite a few Delaware boats entered this year. Threshers were found in 20 to 30 fathoms with the winning pounder coming in from the Fingers and the 2nd place fish was caught inshore of the Rockpile. There were also some caught in Massey's Canyon. Makos were caught in 30 fathoms around the Hot Dog, Sausages, Tea Cup and inshore down the Washington Canyon. The area around the Hot Dog was

definitely the best location for makos last weekend. Water temperatures were in the very low 60's.

At Lewes Harbour Marina, Tommy reported that the flounder bite is improving in the Lewes Canal, both in the number of fish being caught and in average size. Minnows have been the bait of choice, but anglers are also having good luck with Gulp! artificial baits, specifically the Swimming Mullet. Smaller striped bass are also being hooked in the Canal, with the average size being around 28 to 29-inches.

Like elsewhere up and down the Delmarva coast, the bluefish bite is definitely slowing down and we really aren't seeing the number of big choppers that we saw for quite a while last month. Mostly what we are seeing are fish in the 5 lb. range but they are still going after practically anything thrown their way. They love the swim shads, and those lures are deadly, but it can be an expensive outing if you decide to go with the rubber. Sticking to metal lures or topwater plugs will still produce good numbers of fish and keep your expenses down.

Those looking for black drum are hitting their prime time with big fish over 70 lbs. being pulled from the area around the Coral Beds and on the "dark side" closer to Jersey. Clams, both chowder and surf, have been the bait of choice for big drum.

In the surf, bluefish have

been more scarce but kingfish are being caught along with a couple of stripers. Tommy said that the quality of stripers has improved in the suds.

Not many weakfish have shown up at the cleaning table, a few snipers have been targeting them around the Coast Guard Station.

Outside the inlet, sea bass fishing has been very good. Anglers on the charter boat "Katydid" have put a whooping on knotheads while fishing with clams on ocean structure and natural bottom. Early in the week, Lex Robertson's 3.2 pounder was part of a boat limit caught on clams. The best spot this spring has been the Del-Jersey-Land reef site. Headboats have reported smaller sea bass closer to shore with larger fish in 100 to 120-feet of water.

Down in Fenwick, Rick at Fenwick Tackle said that he didn't see much this past

week, only some stripers caught from the beach in Bethany on Saturday and a few bluefish, also from the surf. Flounder fishermen that come into the store have been targeting the Thorofare flats for their fish with slow trolling belly meat or Gulp! Swimming Mullets providing the best results. There were no reports of fish coming out of the Ditch.

At Hook'em & Cook'em Tackle shop in the Indian River Marina, the big news was the 461 lb. mako shark caught by John Pendell, Jr. during a trip to outside the Elephant Trunk. The 100-inch mako ate a bluefish fillet.


A few boats ventured further offshore in search of marlin, tuna and mahi. Frank Perna on the "Indian Giver" caught an 84 lb. bluefin tuna in 61.7-degree water in the Baltimore Canyon on Saturday. They also released another bluefin similar in size during their trip.

In the Indian River Inlet, a few flounder have been caught including a 6 pounder by Tommy Cline and a 7 lb. 10 oz. flattie by John Billbrough. Tommy hooked his on a jig head tipped with a chartreuse Gulp! bait and John caught his 30-incher on a bucktail. Most of the flounder are coming from the areas around Burton's Island, the Coast Guard Station and the VFW.

Anglers fishing off the rocks are primarily getting small bluefish and a few short stripers.

The headboat, "Judy V" has been targeting bluefish closer to shore and customers have come back with quite a few in their coolers. Those looking for larger sea bass have had to run further off the beach into 110+ feet of water.

Until next week, keep those lines tight and have some fun! That's what it's all about.

Diesel fuel is the largest operating expense of a diesel engine. A constant clean supply of fuel is crucial to proper operation and efficiency. Diesel fuel can degrade if left to sit unattended, collecting moisture and then growing microbiological "bugs".

Bugs

Today's ultra-low-sulfur diesel (ULSD) does not contain the sulfur that helps kill microbiological "bugs" (bacteria and fungi) that can diesel live in fuel. Microbiological "bugs" can grow in a diesel fuel tank when there is a presence of water. Microbial colonies proliferate at the interface between fuel and water in the

tank. This growth is often mistaken as algae which needs light to live and grow; there is no sunlight in a closed fuel tank so algae cannot survive.

Microbes are everywhere; they need food and water to live. In this case, the diesel fuel is the food and if there is water in the fuel, the microbes can easily make a home in your fuel tank. Once they start to grow and multiply they can eventually damage your fuel supply.

These "bugs" can be viewed with a microscope, though the presence of microbes is usually more often discovered by looking at your used fuel filters. If the fuel filter is coated with stinky, slimy black goo, then you probably have a microbe problem. There are laboratory tests available that can analyze

your diesel fuel and report back the presence of contamination and microbes in your fuel.

Removing bugs

If you have a microbe problem in your fuel, the best way to eliminate them is to remove the water, then kill and remove the remaining microbes. If not done properly, the microbes can easily grow back.

While you cannot sterilize your fuel and tanks, you can reduce and discourage biological activity to a level where microbes are not a problem.

There are fuel additives called biocides that can kill the living microbes and are often added to the fuel tank as a maintenance dose or kill dose. If you add a kill dose, expect the microbes in the tank to die resulting in a bigger problem until the fuel returns to its normal composition. The dead microbes will clog up your fuel filters until all of the debris are eliminated from the



tank. This do it yourself approach can take days or weeks to rid the tank of live and dead microbes, with numerous fuel filter replacements while operating your boat.

If you have a bad microbe infestation, it is best to call in a professional fuel cleaning company. They will have the proper tools and equipment to pump out your contaminated fuel, filtering it multiple times and returning your cleaned fuel to the tank. During this process, the interior of the tank needs to be cleaned too, since the microbes can attach to the sides of the tanks and baffles. Generally the cleaning companies use high pressure fuel to wash down the tank sides and bottom. A process like this can take a day or more on a large boat.

Water

Eliminating the water in your diesel fuel can reduce or eliminate the ability of microbes to grow and live in your tank. There are three

types of water that can exist in diesel fuel - dissolved, emulsified and free.

Dissolved water is the result of diesel fuel being hygroscopic. Diesel fuel can attract and hold water from the environment. This can be from humidity in the air or water forming by condensation on the inside of the fuel tank.

Emulsified water is when water is thoroughly mixed into the diesel fuel. This situation is similar to a bottle of vinegar and oil salad dressing. Shake it up and it is mixed nicely, let it rest a while and the dressing settles back into two components. On a boat, emulsified water can occur after refueling or a rough day at sea and usually settles out once the agitation action has stopped.

The most common form of water in a fuel tank is free This is water that water. gathers at the bottom of the fuel tank. Water is heavier than fuel and therefore will settle to the bottom of a fuel tank. A fuel tank's pick-up lines that supply fuel to the engine are often an inch or more off the bottom of the tank, allowing water and contaminants to remain at the bottom of the tank without being ingested into the engine. Once the level of water increases above the pick-up, water will introduced into your filters and possibly the engine. If you get water in your fuel filters, there is probably more water in the bottom of tank. The easiest way to check the fuel tank for water is to use a

water finding paste, coated on a dipstick that can reach to the bottom of the fuel tank. This will allow you to determine if you have water and the amount.


Removing water


If you do find water in your tank, it needs to be removed or else microbial growth will occur. The water at the bottom of the tank serves as a perfect medium for these microorganisms to live in. The microbes feed and live at the fuel/water interface and can even float in the free water below that level. Some fuel tanks have a way to drain water from the bottom of the tank, while other tanks may need to be pumped out using a tube or hose that can reach to the bottom of the tank.

Sampling your fuel and testing for water and microbes should be part of your preventative maintenance schedule. Some boats are equipped with a fuel polishing system, a way to filter your fuel when the engines are not in operation. Changing fuel filters at regular intervals or even more often is a good practice. There is no such thing as "too clean" when it comes to your fuel.





Ginger-Garlic Shrimp with Tangy Tomato Sauce

1/2 cup vegetable oil 1/4 cup finely chopped parsley

2 TBSP minced garlic

2 TBSP finely chopped basil

1 TBSP minced fresh ginger

2 TBSP fresh lemon juice

2 tsp. kosher salt

1 tsp. crushed red pepper

21/2 lbs. large shrimp

1 TBSP vegetable oil

1 TBSP minced fresh ginger

1 large garlic clove

3 stalk fresh lemongrass

11/2 lb. tomatoes

1 TBSP fresh lime juice

2 TBSP Chopped cilantro

Kosher salt

In a large bowl, mix the vegetable oil with the parsley, garlic, basil, ginger, lemon juice, salt, and crushed red pepper.

Add the shrimp and toss to coat.

Cover and refrigerate for at least 2 hours and up to 4 hours.

Meanwhile, in a medium saucepan, heat the vegetable oil.

Stir in the ginger, garlic, and lemongrass and cook over moderate heat until fragrant, about 2 minutes.

Add the tomatoes and cook over moderate heat, stirring occasionally, until slightly thickened, about 10 minutes.

Let cool to room temperature, then stir in the lime juice and cilantro.

Season with salt.

Transfer the sauce to ramekins.

Light a grill.

Loosely thread the shrimp onto 10 skewers.

Grill over moderately high heat, turning once, until lightly charred and cooked through, about 5 minutes.

Transfer the shrimp to plates and serve with the tomato sauce.



Probably more so than any other part of the bay, there has always been a lot of fishing activity in the downtown waters that include the Ocean City Inlet, the Rt. 50 Bridge area, the "Fish Bowl" and the "East Channel" that runs north to about 9th street. Throughout this zone flounder, bluefish, rockfish, tautog and shad are such regular catches that it's not surprising this is the most heavily fished section of the bay with anglers dropping lines from boats, the bridge, Gudelsky Park, the North Jetty, as well as the Oceanic Fishing Pier, 9th Street Pier and 3rd Street Bulkhead.

With so many fishermen vying for so many different types of fish using a multitude of tackle and

techniques including spinning gear, bottom rods, fly rods, surf rods, live bait cut bait, jigs, plugs, spoons and flies, there's a lot of crazy stuff that goes on in that chunk of water! But despite all the differences that might exist from one angler to another, the one commonality that all downtown anglers share is the need to deal with the current that flushes through that area. Whether they are in a boat, on a pier or dropping lines from the bridge, every fisherman must take into consideration what the current will do to their bait or lure each time they make a drop or cast into the water.

Properly working the current is one of the most critical factors in fishing because most inshore species

of fish base most of their and movements feeding around the stages of the currents and tides. Notice that I made a distinction between "currents" and "tides." Tides are properly described as the vertical movement of water (up or down) and are caused by the gravitational pull of the moon and are, therefore, very predictable and reliable. Tides either rise, fall or stand. While currents, on the other hand, are the horizontal movement of water which is certainly affected by what the tide is doing, but wind, rain and other natural forces also influence the current. Currents are known "flood" when coming in, "ebb" when going out or "slack" when they are not moving. Anglers and boaters must keep in mind that currents and tides do not always work together. That's why it's common to have a rising tide with an ebbing current or the other way around. While that might not seem to make sense, trust me -


Just focusing on currents and how they affect downtown anglers, it's good to be aware that the strength of the current will vary depending upon just where you're dropping your line. Because the east and west side of the bay are fairly close together, the water relatively shallow and the bridge pilings create a bit of a damming effect, the current closest to and below the Rt. 50

it's true!

Bridge is some of the strongest in the bay. All of those factors add up to help make it a great place for fish to hang out and fishermen to have some fun. The strong current can also make the Rt. 50 Bridge area a challenging and sometimes dangerous place to fish.

Those who spend much time fishing on, under or around the bridge know that when the current is pushing hard the strength is not the same in all locations. The velocity of the current at any given spot depends upon the depth of the water and the proximity to the shoreline and nearby sandbars. When anglers find that the water is moving too fast, or even too slow, for whatever type of fishing they are trying to do it's often possible to simply move east or west to find better conditions. The same holds true for waters above and below the bridge as the maze of channels, islands and shoals create variations in the current flow.

Obviously, just how the current will affect an angler's efforts is determined by what they're trying to do. The most difficult scenario is when the current is ripping and you're fishing from a stationary platform such as the bridge or an anchored boat. Under those conditions it can be really challenging to get a bait or lure down to where the fish might be hanging, but there are a few techniques that will sometimes make things work

- such as casting up-current, and cranking the reel just fast enough to keep the line tight and allow the bait or lure to work as intended. If the current is really strong, this will require a super fast retrieve and unless the angler can cast a country mile they won't have a lot of fishing time between each cast.

Anglers can also cast across and slightly into the current, like at the 10 and 2 o'clock position, and allow the lure or bait to be swept along as you work it back. The result will be that the end of your line will travel in a large arc, then, once it gets down-current it will be "game-over" until the next cast. Just like when you're casting directly into the current, if you cast across the current you'll only be in the strike zone for a short while before it'll be time to throw again.

Bridge fishermen can only cast to their left or right if they are on the down-current side of the bridge, otherwise their terminal tackle will end up being swept into the bridge pilings. They can, however, use the current to their advantage by using a float above a bait or lure that's set at a specific depth and allow the flow of water to pull their offering way out and away from the bridge.

When currents are strong, anglers might do well to leave the extra-light line behind and use tackle that can apply adequate pressure to bring a decent size fish into a strong flow of water. Particularly around the bridge where it's always possible to hook into a big-dog rockfish that will turn side-to in the current and just let the flow of water help keep it away from the angler trying to bring it in. Considering how much the bridge pilings just love to liberate big fish, anglers should always fish around them with heavy enough tackle to haul a good fish in before it becomes just another fish story about the one that got away!

Strong currents running toward the bridge can create a real safety concern for those fishing from boats. An engine failure at the wrong time can allow a boat to be quickly swept into some very unforgiving concrete and steel. No matter where they are operating, boaters should always have an anchor rigged and ready to deploy in case they have a malfunction and need to stop the boat from into dangerous territory. This is especially important when operating near a structure such as a bridge. It's common for folks to anchor up-current of the bridge and allow the boat's

stern to drift close to the structure so anglers can cast beneath it. There's nothing wrong with this tactic but anglers must make darn sure their anchor and line are in good working order and set properly because, if it starts to slip, a boat could slide into the bridge in just a few seconds.

Pier fishermen should also be very careful when fishing over water with a strong current because, if by some accident they should end up taking an unexpected plunge they could end up fighting a losing battle as they struggle to keep from being swept out of the inlet or some other hostile place.

Strong or even moderate currents can create wonderful opportunities for anglers to hook into some nice fish, but such areas are likely to come with special challenges and hazards. Anglers need not shy away from fishing areas such as our downtown waters, but they should always be ready with a plan that allows them to not only catch fish, but also be safe while doing it.



New Jersey Out of Compliance with Summer Flounder, Scup, and Black Sea Bass Plan

The Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission has found the State of New Jersey out of compliance with the mandatory management contained measures Addendum XXVIII to the Interstate **Fishery** Management Plan (FMP) for Summer Flounder, Scup, and Black Sea Bass. The Commission will notify the Secretaries of Commerce and the Interior of its finding. This action was taken pursuant to the provisions of the Atlantic Coastal Fisheries Cooperative Management Act of 1993. The State of New Jersey has failed to effectively implement and enforce the provisions of Addendum XXVIII to the FMP for Summer Flounder, Scup, Black Sea and Bass. Specifically, New Jersey has not implemented the following regulations required

Addendum XXVIII:

- Shore mode for Island Beach State Park only: 17-inch minimum size limit; 2-fish possession limit and 128-day open season.
- Delaware Bay only (west of the COLERG line): 18-inch minimum size limit; 3-fish possession limit and 128-day open season.
- All other marine waters (east of the COLERG line): 19-inch minimum size limit; 3-fish possession limit and 128-day open season

The implementation of these measures is necessary to achieve the conservation goals and objectives of the FMP to end overfishing of the summer flounder stock. In order to come back into compliance the State of New Jersey must implement all of the above measures. Upon notification by the Commission, Secretaries of Commerce and the Interior have 30 days to review the recommendation and determine appropriate action, which may include a federal moratorium on fishing

The Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control (DNREC)/ Division of Fish & Wildlife proposes to amend Delaware's tidal finfish regulation 7 DE Admin Code 3511 Summer Flounder Size Limits; Possession Limits; Seasons, increasing recreational minimum size limit from 16 inches to 17 inches to prevent overfishing and remain compliant with Addendum XXVIII to the Summer Flounder, Scup, [and] Black Sea Bass Fishery Management Plan.

A 17-inch recreational minimum size limit for Summer Flounder is currently June 7, 2017 Coastal Fisherman Page 65 in place through an emergency Secretary's Order No. 2017-F-0012. This action proposes to adopt the measures through




