Sea Bass Season Extended

The recreational season for catching black sea bass in Maryland waters (Chesapeake Bay and 0-3 miles off the coast) will now be open through 11:59 p.m. September 21, 2014. The season will reopen 12:01 a.m. October 18, 2014 and close 11:59 p.m. December 31, 2014. The recreational season is closed all other dates. The possession limit will remain 15 fish per person. The minimum size will remain 12.5 inches.

For federal waters in the Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ) (3-200 miles off the coast), the regulations are the same as Maryland's.

MD public meeting to be held for 2015 striped bass changes

The Maryland Department of Natural Resources Fisheries Service wants all stakeholders to be aware that the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission (ASMFC) is considering management options to reduce fishing mortality along the Atlantic coast and in Chesapeake Bay for both commercial and recreational fisheries. These reductions are being considered by ASMFC to reverse the declining trend in female spawning stock biomass.

To assure that all stakeholders are fully prepared to provide their feedback at ASMFC's upcoming public hearing, Fisheries Service is hosting a public information meeting on Thursday, September 18th at the Florestano Building, Room 101, (Lecture Hall-101) at the Anne Arundel Community College on 101 College Parkway in Arnold, MD

The meeting will provide an overview of the current science and management for striped bass followed by a summary of the various stakeholder perspectives, including those of the Department. There will be a question and answer session following the presentation to clarify any information in the ASMFC Striped Bass Fishery Management Plan that may be unclear or confusing.

Last week was a rough one for fishing in Ocean City. The weather was downright lousy, keeping most anglers at the dock.

We did get some good news on Thursday when it was announced that the black sea bass season would be extended for a couple of days until September 21st. Hey, it's not much, but we rarely get good news from the government, so we'll take it.

Thursday was really the first day that boats could head offshore and most returned with good catches of dolphin and a few white marlin releases from the Washington Canyon.

Friday's forecast called for rough seas, forcing the Marlin Club to postpone fishing on the 1st day of the Challenge Cup, pitting our anglers against those from the Cape May (NJ) Marlin and Tuna Club, essentially turning it into a 1-day shootout on Saturday.

Unfortunately, for the 3rd straight year, the Cape May team came out on top with their top 6 boats recording 27 white marlin releases versus Ocean City's 11 white marlin and 2 blue marlin releases. All of the action was above the Washington Canyon in 60 fathoms.

The good news is that a few yellowfins were also caught on Saturday in the Washington Canyon, something we haven't seen in some time. Hopefully,

we still have a shot at another good yellowfin bite before the end of the season. In the bay, flounder fishing was tough with dirty water conditions frustrating anglers all week. You know the wind is whipping when we have www.coastalfisherman.net

whitecaps in the bay. Anglers fishing around the Rt. 50 Bridge continue to find a few stripers and bluefish lurking around the pilings. We also heard of a few flatties caught by anglers fishing with live spot around the bridge, in the Fishbowl and in the West Channel.

Due to the bad weather, we didn't see many boats heading to ocean wrecks and reefs during the week, but on Saturday, the headboat, "Morning Star" was able to break the Inlet and returned with several limits of sea bass for anglers dropping squid and clams. Not only did they have a lot of sea bass, something we haven't seen much this past season, but the largest knothead weighed in at 5 lbs. 5 oz. With sea bass season open until the 21st, now is the time to jump on the action and book your spot on the rail. If you can't get out before the 21st, the sea bass season will reopen on October 18th.

This is the last issue of the Coastal Fisherman for the 2014 season. As usual, it was a fast summer and we saw a lot of nice fish arrive at the dock, including several new state records. Although we saw a lot of memorable catches, the 131 lb. wahoo caught by John Scharr back in July is a record that probably won't be broken anytime soon, and in my opinion, would be a top candidate for "Catch of the Year".

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the people who make it possible to bring you the Coastal Fisherman each week.







DRIFTIN' EASY BY SUE FOSTER

It's the last Coastal Fisherman of the year.

So what can I say about 2014 season? the Flounderwise, most people did OK in the spring and early summer. Then, as my friend that fishes the 3rd Street Bulkhead says, "Shorty came to town!". Yes, we had lots of "short" flounder in the bay this season. One man by the name of "Ganzz" posted this comment a few weeks ago on Stripers Online about flounder fishing from the Rt. 50 Bridge: "Spent three days fishing from the Route 50 Bridge in Ocean City, MD. It was three of us using a spreader rig. We caught a total of 97 flounder, with 4 keepers." Well, that says it all! The Oceanic Pier reports were the same all summer long, except for a couple of good weeks early in the season. "Lots of action, lots of "shorts, with only a few keepers." With a size limit of 16-inches you would think it would be easy to catch your limit of flounder, especially from a boat.

Anglers fishing off the bulkhead between 2nd the

4th Streets did very well on keeper flounder for the locals who knew how to fish that snaggy bottom and work the tides. It's really deep in the main East Channel and that's where a lot of the keeper flounder were caught and will be caught, probably into mid-October. Maybe we'll have a surprise November run like last year!

2014 was a great year for flounder fishing offshore on artificial reef sites. From midsummer until now, almost all of the party boats and local boats big enough to get offshore did great catching keeper flounder. Party boats in Delaware practically gave up on sea bass and targeted flounder for most of the summer. I know in Ocean City, boats would target whichever one would bite the best, and many days it was flounder over sea bass.

We had a nice croaker run in the bay, though they did not have much size to them. Spot, on the other hand, tended to run large again and anglers had a hard time finding small ones to use for flounder fishing.

The great puppy drum run we had in the bay last year didn't happen this year. It's possible it still might, but most people down in VA are saying that that red drum have gotten bigger and bigger every year and that this year, they may have grown too big for the bays and went back out in the ocean. Of course, we haven't seen many in the ocean yet either, but that could still be coming.

We did see some nice black drum in the surf early in the season and hope to see more this fall.

We saw some keeper stripers this spring in the surf, but not nearly enough to call it a great run!

Summertime came quick, and for the most part, fishing was decent in the surf with kingfish, spot and croaker, but not quite as good as last year. I don't think any year could have been as good as the 2013 year on kingfish! This year was definitely the year of big rays and sharks in the surf. There was a lot of action and tons of fun had by all who were into "pullage" and wanted to have some big thing on the other end of the rod pulling long and hard!

So far this September, we are seeing a really good run of snapper blues in the surf.

This is great because we just didn't have much of a snapper blue run the last couple of years. Last year, the blues were all being caught in the bay and off the Rt. 50 Bridge, but not in the surf. This is great for surf anglers because almost anyone can catch snapper blues. A 12 to 15-inch bluefish is not bad to eat either!

We didn't have much of a trout run this year. It started off looking good and then dropped off. Delaware waters saw more of them then we did in Ocean City.

Speaking of Delaware, anglers fishing from the rail in the Indian River Inlet seemed to have a good year up there on flounder, croaker, snapper blues and spot. Stripers were hit and miss during the summer, but the spring run wasn't bad. Not as good as the year before, but it definitely had it's moments. You just had to be there when those moments happened! That's fishing, right?

Tautog action was strong in the spring. Then, as soon as the flounder bite started, most locals switched over and left the tautog alone. Anglers in boats would pull up to the Homer Gudelsky Park (West Channel) area after getting their limit of flounder and pull in a couple

tautog to top off their catch. Then, the size of the tautog fell off in the heat of the summer and we didn't hear much about them. The spring run of tautog from the Oceanic Pier was good and anglers were swinging them over the rails of the Route 50 The 3rd Street Bridge. Bulkhead produced its share of keeper tautog in the spring, then slowed up in the summer. Anglers caught spot, croaker and flounder down there. This fall should see a pick-up in tautog fishing once again. Since the size limit went up to 16-inches, I just don't see anglers targeting them as much as they used to. Only when nothing else is biting.

Anglers fishing off the Route 50 Bridge had a good summer on blues and short stripers at night. The action was hot but legal size stripers were not plentiful. In the spring and fall we see more keeper stripers being caught and hopefully this will increase as the year goes on.

The Ocean Pier had a good year on spot, kingfish, croaker, small trout, small bluefish, and of course, sharks and big rays caught at the end of the pier.

Thanks to Larry Jock and his family for another great year of the best fishing paper ever! Thanks to Tom Jock for setting up great ads and thanks to Mary Jock for delivering papers and making me chicken corn soup when I was convalescing. Thanks to all my customers and friends who helped me along with their kind thoughts and encouragement.

I hope to "Drift Easy" again next year, so until then... good fishing!



Joe Morris at Lewes Harbour Marina said that wind plagued boaters most of last week, making it difficult to get out and keep track of recent flounder movement. A few crews did endure crappy conditions, and found flatties still hanging around on the Old Grounds and at Site 11. Captain Brent plowed his way off to Site 11 in rough seas on Thursday aboard the charter boat, "Katydid", where his flukers managed to put 13 keepers in the box, despite challenging circumstances. They also had some triggerfish and sea bass mixed in. "Max" Maxwell was perched in his usual position on the pulpit as the charter boat drifted the Old Grounds in lumpy seas on Friday. His persistence in jigging bucktails tipped with cut bait paid off, and he caught many flounder, allowing him to cull a limit of four nice keepers.

Retired Washington DC police officer Leroy Flemmings fished the Old Grounds on Saturday in a stiff breeze aboard the "Martha Marie". He did pretty well with sea bass and flatfish in spite of the weather, boating his personal best flounder that tipped the scales to 5.75 pounds.

Snapper bluefish were saviors for the few boats that braved sloppy seas on the lower Delaware Bay on Saturday. The rip over the shoal outside the Outer Wall's north end was alive with blues during the running flood tide. The little choppers fed actively on silversides,

anchovies, butterfish and peanut bunker schooled up in turbulence on the structure. Bucktail jigs cast amidst bluefish grazing on baitfish got bit in short order. Blues also blasted bottom rigs baited with a shiner or strip of mullet or squid.

Captain Brian's group on the charter boat, "Lil' Angler II" celebrated it's youngest member Hyden's birthday on Saturday by catching 60 bluefish outside the Outer Wall. A crew from Dover Air Base came down to get in on some fast snapper action with Captain Pete aboard the "Top Fin" on Saturday and returned with a load of 60 blues. Captain Brent headed to the Wall for a

couple hours of catching aboard the "Katydid" on Saturday and his anglers carried home 50 fish.

Croakers and spot are still in the Bay and some of the largest specimens have been caught near shore. Dustin Best and his family were vacationing from Ohio and fished the Port Lewes Pier on Thursday and Friday. They had a cooler full of big hardheads, jumbo spot and even some trout while working speck rigs with Fishbites in close.

Reef Site #8 held hardheads, kingfish, spot and trout, but wind made it rough getting there and staying in position on many days. Captain Brent's fishermen on the "Katydid" put up with

nasty seas on Friday morning for a short trip, and did manage some "Cadillac" croakers, chunky sea bass and a bonus black drum. Persistent northeast wind pushed baitfish and bluefish into the surf and surfcasters reported decent catches of snappers on Saturday at Herring Point. Fresh mullet on float rigs was the preferred offering.

Further south at the Hook'em & Cook'em Tackle Shop in the Indian River Marina, Capt. Bert Adams reported that anglers fishing in the Indian River Inlet are finding plenty of croakers, a few weakfish and flounder, some small striped bass and snapper bluefish during the incoming tide.

Headboats fishing out of the Indian River Marina battled the weather all week, but when they were able to hit some ocean structure they found flounder and sea bass taking offerings of squid and cut bait. Capt. Bert said the bite all depended on getting the right drift and the rough weather made it very difficult last week.

From the beaches in lower Delaware, surfcasters are mainly finding a few kingfish and some snapper bluefish.

This is the final issue of the *Coastal Fisherman* for the 2014 season. I would like to thank Joe Morris and Bert Adams for providing quality fishing reports throughout the season. I would also like to thank Bert and Deanna Adams at Hook'em & Cook'em, "Pockets" at Bill's Sport Shop, Libby at Fenwick Tackle and Capt. Mike at Rick's Bait and Tackle for sending in pictures every week of their customers with some great catches.

Grilled Lime Shrimp and Vegetable Rice

1 can coconut milk

2 garlic cloves, minced

1 tsp. salt

3 TBSP. red pepper jelly

2 TBSP. olive oil

1 tsp. Asian hot chili sauce (such as Sriracha)

1 tsp. lime juice

2 lb. large shrimp, peeled

1 ¼ cups uncooked jasmine rice

2 ears fresh corn

5 assorted mini bell peppers

1 sweet onion, cut into ½-inch slices

2 tsp. olive oil

½ cup chopped fresh herbs, such as parsley, mint, basil, and cilantro

Preheat grill to mediumhigh heat.

Bring first 3 ingredients and 2/3 cup water to a boil in a medium saucepan over high heat.

While coconut milk mixture comes to a boil, whisk together red pepper jelly, next 3 ingredients, and ¼ cup lime juice in a small bowl.

Reserve 2 TBSP. of lime mixture.

Combine remaining lime mixture and shrimp.

Let stand 20 minutes.

Stir rice into boiling coconut mixture.

Cover, reduce heat to low; simmer 20 minutes or until liquid is absorbed.

Remove from heat; keep covered.

While shrimp marinates, brush corn, peppers, and onion with 2 tsp. olive oil; grill, covered, 8 minutes or until slightly charred, turning

halfway through.

Remove, discard seeds from peppers; chop peppers.

Cut kernels from corn cobs. Chop onions.

Combine with peppers and corn in a bowl.

Remove shrimp from marinade, discarding marinade.

Grill shrimp, covered, 3 minutes on each side.

Remove from grill.

Sprinkle with 1 TBSP. lime juice and toss with reserved 2 TBSP. lime mixture.

Stir remaining lime juice into the rice.

Stir rice mixture and herbs into grilled vegetables.

Serve remaining shrimp over all.





Stir in flour; cook 1 minute. Stir in cooking liquid and 1/3 cup water; bring to a boil.

Cover and reduce heat; simmer 30 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Stir in clams; half-and-half, and milk; cook 1 minute or until heated through.

Stir in herbs.

Peel and devein shrimp.
Rinse under running water,

Rinse well, drain and dry thoroughly with paper towels.

Set aside while preparing the sauce.

Place the bacon fat or vegetable oil into a dutch oven.

Place the pot over mediumhigh heat.

Add the onions, peppers and celery.

Cook until they become slightly wilted and a little brown.

Turn down heat to low and stir in the garlic, thyme, oregano, bay leaf and cayenne; cook for 30 seconds.

Add the flour and continue to stir for 1 minute.

Add the tomatoes and their juice and simmer, covered, over low heat (about 10 minutes) until it is very thick.

Stir the sauce once or twice during cooking time.

Season it well with salt, pepper and Tabasco and set aside.

In a separate bowl, mix the scallops and shrimp together; season with salt and pepper.

Remove ½ half of the sauce to a bowl, spreading the remaining evenly over the bottom of the pot.

Distribute the seafood evenly over sauce and spread

reserved sauce over top of seafood.

Place over medium-high heat and without stirring, heat the mixture until bubbles are at the surface.

Reduce heat to low, tightly cover, simmer 8 to 12 minutes.

Discard bay leaf. Serves 6.

Sea Bass Simmered in Tomato Sauce

4 slices of lean bacon, minced

1 medium onion, chopped ½ cup dry white or red wine

2 cups chopped tomatoes (drained if canned) Salt and black pepper ½ cup parsley, minced 1½ lbs. sea bass fillets, in 4 pieces

In a large skillet, cook the bacon over medium heat, stirring until crisp.

Remove the bacon with a slotted spoon; drain on paper towels.

Add the onion and cook until softened.

Add the wine and let it bubble away for a minute.

Add the tomatoes, stir, cook for 10 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Season with salt and pepper and half the parsley.

Lay the fillets in the sauce and spoon some of the sauce over them.

Cook about 8 to 12 minutes, depending on the thickness of the fillets.

Serve each piece of fish with the sauce, sprinkled with the bacon bits and parsley.

Serves 4.

Coastal Bays 2013 report card brings mixed results


The Maryland Coastal Bays Program unveiled their report card that showed slight improvements in the Chincoteague Bay, but continued to indicate serious phosphorous problems throughout all of the embayments behind Ocean City and Assateague Island. Local, state, and federal partners help create the detailed annual assessment on the health of the back bays using rigorous monitoring results to derive a scientifically defensible score.

Overall, the Coastal Bays received a C+, the same as 2012, but with a slight improvement since last year, which was mostly driven by some water quality improvements in the Chincoteague Bay which improved from a C+ to a B-. Scores for total nitrogen in Assawoman, Isle of Wight, Sinepuxent and Chincoteague bays were good to excellent, and were moderate to poor in Newport Bay and St. Martin River. Total phosphorus was generally moderate to poor.

Scores for hard clams were moderate to very poor except Isle of Wight Bay which was very good. Clam scores also improved in Sinepuxent Bay. Seagrasses declined in every area.

Beginning around 2002, water monitoring stations throughout Chincoteague Bay began to show increases in nitrogen and especially phosphorous. Since 2002, the Chincoteague Bay has lost almost 11,000 acres of its more than 16,000 acres of seagrass due to warmer than normal temperatures and increasing nutrient levels. Grasses now cover only about 5,400 acres of the Chincoteague Bay, about 24 percent of the program's goal.

This, coupled with brown tide blooms in the Chincoteague Bay, spells trouble for an area once considered one of the most pristine in Maryland. While the northern bays are still in relatively poorer condition than the southern bays, work to remove point sources and control stormwater has paid some dividends north of Routh 50 and in the Newport Bay with some sites having improving water quality. However, water quality only passes nitrogen thresholds at 45 percent of sites and phosphorus thresholds at less than 1 percent in the coastal bays. Such poor water quality combined with high

temperatures has decreased seagrasses some 75 percent in recent years.

To combat the decline, the Coastal Bays Program recently finished the update Comprehensive its Conservation & Management Plan (CCMP). The plan details how Worcester County, Ocean City, Berlin and state and federal partners will work together over the next decade to improve water quality and biological diversity in the barrier island system. Included in the effort is an ambitious plan to meet the goals set forth in the federally mandated Total Daily Maximum Load (TMDL), which caps nitrogen and phosphorous inputs to the Coastal Bays.

Hundreds of volunteers also work with the Maryland Coastal Program, Bays including local residents and visitors, to support environmental initiatives to promote protect, and preserve the coastal bays, by volunteering to count horseshoe crabs, terrapins, and birds, collect water clear samples, neighborhoods, wetlands, and dunes of trash, and assist in many other activities.

The report card is a scientific collaborative effort Maryland between the Program, Coastal Bays Maryland University of Center for Environmental Science - Integration and Application Network, the Maryland Department of Natural Resources, and the National Park Service.

CHIM LINES

BY CAPT. MARK SAMPSON

I once accepted an invitation to go fishing with a fellow for a few hours on a local lake. When I asked if there was anything I could bring, he said, "Don't worry. I'll have everything we'll need. Just be at the ramp at 7:00 am." And so I did. The problem was, he wasn't there until 7:45 because he needed to stop at a tackle shop to get supplies. By 8:00 we had the boat in the water and were on our way to the corner of the lake where he said the fish would be waiting.

And he was right! When we got there the water was alive with fish that were swirling and splashing and doing all the things that hungry fish do.

All we had to do was get a hook in the water and we'd be in business. But I quickly realized that it wasn't going to be that simple because when my buddy started pulling out the tackle, I saw that the rods needed to be strung and all the lures he'd just bought that morning were still in the little plastic packages. It

took us about 20-minutes to get everything tied up and ready before the first cast was made, and wouldn't you know it, by then most of the fish activity we'd been seeing on the surface had stopped, and though we did get a few bites, our success was pale compared to what it could have been if we were ready to cast when first we rolled in. If only my friend had spent a few minutes getting things ready the night before, things would have been a lot different and a lot better!

One thing I've learned from fishing all my life is that the best way to ensure a smooth and productive trip is to prepare all bait, tackle and equipment as much as possible before even approaching the water. But folks should know that the level of readiness to which I'm referring goes beyond simply making sure that there's enough bait and tackle on board or sandwiches made for the day. It involves spending time before the trip getting tackle and gear ready so that when you arrive on the scene, and it's time to get your line in the water, it's just a matter of dropping your bait or lure over and you're fishing. No wasted effort and no wasted time.

The first thing on the list would be all terminal tackle. In other words, everything that might go on the end of the line, including hooks, lures and leader. Take leader, for instance. It doesn't matter if you're wreck fishing for sea bass or trolling for tuna, the last thing you want to be doing while out on the fishing grounds is measure, cut and tie leaders. Trolling leaders can be attached ahead of time to any hooks or lures that will be

www.coastalfisherman.net used so that they can be quickly snapped on and off the line when needed. Prepared leaders can then be neatly coiled and stored in zip-lock bags or some other container that will allow them to be quickly put to use when the time comes. Bottom fishermen should rig their rods with the necessary terminal tackle and then also have a bunch of extra rigs tied-up and stored so that when they break one off on a snag, they can quickly attach a new one and be fishing again in just a few minutes.

"Being ready" can also mean being prepared, not just for what you expect to catch but also for whatever other opportunities might come along. No matter if we're shark fishing or bottom fishing, whenever we're offshore there will always be an extra rod or two rigged and ready in the event of a surprise opportunity to hook a dolphin, bluefish, cobia or any other fish that might show itself while we're out. Fish will often pop up quickly, unexpectedly, and be gone long before anyone has time to rummage through a tackle box, grab a lure, tie it on and make a cast.

Keeping tackle boxes, cabinets, or drawers clean and orderly is a great help to always being prepared for action. If someone is trying to quickly get their line in the water, but end up grabbing a lure out of a tackle box that comes out as a tangled clump with four other lures and a wad of knotted leader, the only thing they are going to catch will be an aggravating lesson in frustration while trying to get it untangled, on the line and in the water

before the opportunity swims away. When it's "crunch time" on the water, having all of your tackle properly cleaned, orderly and stored where it's readily available can be the difference between catching fish or going home skunked.

Another way to be ready for the day is to go ahead and cut or prepare whatever bait will be used before heading out on the water, so that once there it's just a matter of sticking it on the hook and dropping it in. When the action is hot, no one wants to have to take time out from catching fish just to cut more bait. It's always easier and more efficient to prep bait at the dock and put it in a cooler, plastic containers or in zip-lock bags than mess with it while fishing.

While going through all the preparations for what will hopefully be a successful day on the water, anglers should not lose sight of also being ready to deal with whatever fish they catch. All the tools needed to help with the landing process such as nets, gaffs, knives, rags, pliers, gloves and rulers should be on hand and ready for use. More that just a few fish have been lost at the last second because the net or gaff wasn't handy when the fish was ready to be taken. Preparation is always a key to successful fishing!

"There is an app for that."

It seems like everyone has a smart phone, tablet or other handheld electronic device. Most of us wouldn't leave home without it. For boaters, there are many apps that may be helpful, fun or even serious, depending on your needs.

The first group of apps that come to mind are designed for navigation. These were some of the first marine apps offered and have been refined over the years. Some navigation apps are brand specific and designed to connect with and supplement your on-board navigation electronics with brands such as, Furuno, Garmin, KVH, Intellian, Simrad, Spot and others.

Some navigation apps are stand-alone product, harnessing the power of your electronic device and it's own GPS to help you find your Navionics, one of the most popular navigation apps, now offers a free version and works with free NOAA vector charts although you can still purchase Navionics charts that have added features. The Navionics app also has a feature called Plotter Sync, allowing you to connect to Raymarine chart plotters. You can even record sonar logs and upload them to the Navionics app.

Navionics still offers their full feature marine navigation apps that have a full set of features, including Freshest Data option and Sonar Charts.

Nobletec Time Zero has a navigation chart app for the iPad. This app has many useful features, such as local tides, currents and weather on the main screen. If Time Zero sounds familiar, it is similar to the software used by the current Furuno chart plotters.

iNavx is another popular app. This app seems to be compatible with all sorts of charting sources, including the free NOAA charts. You can even share your tracks and waypoints on Facebook, just in case you want to tell the world about your favorite fishing spot.

If you have a Garmin chart plotter, then the Garmin Blue Chart Mobile may be of interest to you. It is a free app that lets you share data between your handheld device and your Garmin marine chart plotter or act as a standalone chart. For example, you can add waypoints and make routes on your iPad while at home, then when you get to your boat, transfer that directly to your chart plotter.

As a boater, the weather is an important aspect of boating, even for a short trip.

Knowing the current weather and forecast is important, especially in our area with the summertime humidity and thunderstorms. Some of the most popular general weather apps are, Weather Channel, Accuweather, WeatherBug, Weather Underground (my favorite), NOAA Radar and many more. There are some very useful weather apps specifically designed for boaters such as, Fishweather, Buoy Weather, BuoyData and Weather Marine (by Accuweather). There is also an interesting weather app called Windmeter. This app is an "anemometer that fits in your pocket". While most boaters would like to know the forecast before it gets too windy, this app lets you measure the current wind speed by listening to the wind using the microphone on your smart phone. Interesting!

Tides and currents are a major factor in catching fish and with boating, so knowing the exact tide is even easier with apps like AyeTides and TideTrac. Many of the tide apps also show the sun and moon activity along with an easy way to look ahead and see the tides for future date.

Not surprising, there are many apps for boating safety and boat tracking. Apps for tracking boats are usually based on VHF land stations receiving a boat's AIS broadcast and display each boat on a marine chart in relation to your current position. Popular apps in this

www.coastalfisherman.net category are MarineTraffic, AISLive and Vesseltracker.



In the safety category, the app SARMOB "turns your smartphone into a lifeguard" using a ingenious man overboard technology. you need to do is to start the app, connect your crew and carry your phone in your pocket. SARMOB works without a mobile network, without extra hardware and is free. SARMOB utilizes the smart phone's built in features to detect a "Man Overboard" situation and help you navigate back to the position where the accident happened. All members have access to the navigational information, numerically graphically. SARMOB works independently of the mobile network, generates datatraffic and is free to use, but it does cost \$7.99.

Lastly, on a more technical topic, a popular marine electronics company, Maretron, offers an app called



-�



N2KView that lets your Smartphone or tablet connect to your onboard NMEA2000 network. This app displays the information such as engines, generators, tanks, navigation rudders, instruments, local weather and more. N2KView is userconfigurable and you are able



to create different screens for your exact needs. Digital analog gauges, displays, graphic displays, warning lights and bar graphs, all can be configured exactly how you want them. You can even set

the operating limits and color bands for analog gauges so you know when things are within limits and when they are not. While the app is free, NMEA2000 gateway device that links between your boats NMEA2000 network and Ethernet network lists for \$695.

Need help learning a new fishing knot? There is an app for that. The app, Pro-Knot advertises 52 fishing knots and 50 rope knots in their latest version which isn't too bad for \$1.99.

There seems to be an endless list of apps for boaters so if we didn't cover it here a quick internet search is sure to lead you to an assortment of apps to fit your needs.

Anglers are finding it difficult to get out on the water due to windy conditions lately, but the variety is good when they can find a break. The fall favorites continue to ramp up, with spot, speckled trout, puppy drum and king mackerel off to a good start. But, don't dismiss the summer faves just yet. Intercepting these fish as they prepare to depart the area can present very good opportunities for anglers.

Flounder continue to stage the mouth of Chesapeake Bay before leaving the area. Lower Bay waters could become dirty with recent rain, but working the areas near the Third and Islands Fourth of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel (CBBT) with live bait

has been productive recently. Limits of keeper fish are coming for those using live mullet as offerings. Drifting Thimble Shoal Baltimore Channels are also good places to try. Some catches of flatties in the 22inch range are available within Lynnhaven in about 20 feet of water during an outgoing tide. The offshore wreck flatfish action is a good alternative while using strip baits bounced over structure. Expect some sea bass as a bycatch, along with some trigger fish, but sea bass are only available through the 21st of the month.

Cobia are on the move as they prepare to head south, which is igniting some outstanding topwater action. Schools of fish are cruising along the surface near the mouth of the Bay and off the Virginia Beach coastlines as they exit the area. Several boats are hooking up to a dozen fish per day, with the best catches happening for those casting live bait and jigs. Plenty of nice fish are available, with several exceeding 50-pounds last week.

Big red drum continue to delight anglers as schools continue to swarm on lower Bay shoals and near the mouth of the Bay, where several reds were hooked near the 3rd and 4th Islands recently. Surfcasters are on alert, with the drum bite along Fisherman's Island on the rise. Look for big bulls to also show up in the surf off Sandbridge and near the

www.coastalfisherman.net Little Island Fishing Pier soon.

Some Spanish mackerel are still falling for trolled spoons off Rudee Inlet and Cape Henry in about 20 feet water. Predominant easterly winds have maintained mostly clear water close to shore, jumpstarting the king mackerel bite off the Beach. Over the past weeks, kings up to around 35-pounds have taken both live bait and lures on the troll, but the recent rain could change things up.

Sheepshead are likely still around for another month, along with busy triggerfish, with the best action happening over the tubes of the CBBT. Tautog are also lurking in these same areas. Tog will be back in business starting on the 20th of September.

Improving speckled trout catches are drawing more attention from anglers. If you can sneak your offerings past the hungry puppy drum,

good numbers of specks are biting in areas such as Hungar's Creek, the Poquoson Flats, and Mobjack Bay. The Lynnhaven, Rudee and Little Creek Inlets, along with the Elizabeth River, are also giving up fish, with some specks weighing in at over 4-pounds.

Some big spot are hitting in the Lynnhaven and Rudee Inlets and around the lower Bay. Fish pushing to 3/4 lbs. are also coming from around Little Creek. The lower Bay Rivers, the Hampton Roads Bridge Tunnel, Ocean View and along the Virginia Beach oceanfront are also holding nice spot lately. Local piers are good reporting action, especially after a stiff north or easterly blow. Medium and large croaker are lurking in deeper areas along channels, inlets, the Bay Bridge Tunnel, Monitor-Merrimac the Memorial Bridge-Tunnel and Concrete Ships the Kiptopeke. Both spot and small to medium sized

croaker are also responding inside Magothy Bay near Buoy 262, and out of Oyster.

Amberjack are still active at the Southern Towers through October. Deep droppers are having good luck near the Canyon edges with limits of nice blueline tilefish and jumbo sea bass. Blackbellied rosefish, grouper and barrelfish are also adding to the deep water variety.

Offshore, billfish were still at the top of the list before the recent fronts. The bite varies from day to day, but white marlin, along with scattered blue marlin and good numbers of bailer and gaffer dolphin are the main event. A few tuna are around, but they are scattered.
