

It was a battle of the bigeye tuna in the 30th Annual Ocean City Marlin Club Canyon Kick-Off. Over the 3 days of fishing, 9 bigeyes were brought to the scale at Sunset Marina and none were larger than the 224 pounder caught on the second day by Ron Marquette on the "White Lightning". Ron hooked the tuna in the Washington Canyon while fishing with Bud Morgan, John Brown, Tyler and John Dolnetsch, Greg Garland, Jacob Calloway, Capt. Luke Blume and mate John Griffith. The anglers also caught two other bigeyes, weighing 163.4 and 208.0 lbs., and released a white marlin during the trip. The 1st place finish in the Tuna Division earned the "White Lightning" team \$8,078 in award money.

Flounder fishing really turned on in the bay on Thursday, as shown by this group of anglers who fished on the "Get Sum" with Capt. Nick Clemente and mate Brian Behe. They ended up with 8 keepers in the box, measuring between 18 and 20-inches, while drifting live spot and Gulp! artificial baits in the middle channel, north of the Rt. 50 Bridge. Ocean City Fishing Report

by Larry Jock

If you were around the docks in Ocean City last week, and especially over the weekend, you saw the results of some incredible fishing.

Bigeye Tuna

Anglers trolling in the Washington Canyon near the 800/800 found bigeye tuna in the same place and at the same time as last year. Capt. Eric Blanks on the "Lucky Duck II" told me he literally plugged in the same coordinates as last year, and there they were mixed in with the whales. In total, 16 bigeyes were landed over the weekend. Here's how it played out:

Saturday "White Lightning" (163.4, 208.0, 224.0) "Lucky Duck II" (139.0, 188.6, 218.2 219.0) "Billfisher" (191.8)

Sunday "Reel Chaos" (180.0, 189.0, 209.0) "Sea Slammer" (223.0) "White Lightning" (210.8) "Tighten Up" (176.0) "Moore Bills" (160.0) "Foolish Pleasures" (137.0)

Yellowfin Tuna

Yellowfins were scattered up and down the 50-75 fathom line. Some boats that were targeting bigeyes in the Washington Canyon over the weekend also returned with yellowfins in the box. Others trolling ballyhoo and spreader bars further north in the Baltimore and Wilmington

The bigeyes weighed 180, 189 ad 209 lbs. and were caught on trolled ballyhoo and spreader bars around the 800/800. The anglers also caught 2 yellowfin during the trip. Canyons had nice catches, with some hitting double digits.

Bluefin Tuna

We saw quite a few large bluefin tuna show up at the scales last week with the bite stretching from the Crotch to the Tea Cup, but centered at the Hot Dog and in the Baltimore Canyon. Early in the week, "That's Right" released an 80-incher but returned with a pair (44" & 52") from the Hot Dog. On Thursday, "Moore Bills" was trolling in the Baltimore Canyon and decked a 59-incher. On Saturday, "Worry Free" was at the Sausages when they hooked

an 81 lb. bluefin and the "Myra HT" returned with a 70 pounder from the Hot Dog. Finally, on Sunday the "Jezebel" was at the Hot Dog and boated a 78.4 lb. bluefin.

A reminder to everyone that the giant bluefin season is closed south of Great Egg Inlet, NJ.

Marlin

Overshadowed by the bigeye tuna bite, we saw a good number of white marlin releases last week from the Washington Canyon to the Wilmington Canyon. The marlin are in there feasting on little tunas, so anglers that picked up yellowfins had a good shot at a white marlin.

There was also at least one blue marlin released last week. On Saturday in the Canyon Kick-Off, the "Double Trouble" released a blue marlin in the Baltimore.

Dolphin

Anglers chasing yellowfin tuna continue to return with a couple of dolphin in the box and the average size of the mahi is definitely increasing. Most of the mahi were hooked in the Baltimore Canyon and around the Hot Dog.

Grouper

On Sunday, Gregory Benn from Fenwick Island caught a 50 lb. snowy grouper during a trip to the north wall of the Norfolk Canyon. Gregory used a diamond jig to hook the monster that hopefully will be recognized as a Maryland state record catch. Right now, Maryland does not have a snowy grouper category for their state records.

Flounder

This was probably the best week of flounder fishing so far this year. The best bite was in the East Channel around the Cement Plant (near the Rt. 50 Bridge), along the rocks at Martha's Landing Channel) and in the waters surrounding Harbour Island. We also saw several fish caught in the bay behind Assateague Island, in back of Castaway's Campground and further south near the Assateague Bridge. Rocky bottoms, whether at the South Jetty, along the bulkhead in the East Channel or along Martha's Landing, seem to be the favored spots for flatties this

J.J. at the Oceanic Pier also reported an excellent flounder bite by anglers fishing off the

www.coastalfisherman.net end of the pier.

Nothing rivaled the 31-incher we saw caught the previous week by Bob Gummer off the 1st Street Bulkhead, but several fish over 20-inches were caught. Big Bird Cropper pulled a 22" and a 23" flattie from the Rt. 50 Bridge pilings while using a jig head tipped with a salt and pepper rubber swim shad on Friday. Also on Friday, Laurel Pinckney on the "Ocean City Guide Service" pulled a 23.5 incher out of the East Channel while using live spot for bait.

There is a lot of bunker and spot in our bays, so if you can fill your live well with live bait, you have the best chance at catching a keeper. Otherwise, 4-inch and 6-inch Gulp! Alive Swimming Mullets have also performed well all season.

Sea Bass

Boats headed out to ocean reefs and wrecks in search of sea bass are seeing their throwback percentage decreasing but still very high. Capt. Monty on the "Morning Star" reported that 50 fish per person would be a slow day, but a high percentage are tossed back. Numerous pool

winners were above 3 lbs.

Striped Bass

The striper bite around the Rt. 50 Bridge at night has been very good for anglers fishing with live spot or eels. The top of the high tide was productive but not necessary to catch fish. Small stripers were also hooked around the South Jetty.

From the Beach

We are into our usual selection of fish being caught off the beach during the summer months. Anglers are getting into kingfish, spot, snapper bluefish, skates and some larger sharks at night.

Anglers looking for some fun and targeting the smaller fish are doing well when baited up with Fishbites bloodworms.

Upcoming Tournaments

I know it is hard to believe, but there are actually no tournaments this upcoming weekend in Ocean City. The next event is the Ocean City Tuna Tournament on July 13, 14 and 15 at the Ocean City Fishing Center.



Driftin' Easy


It's summertime and it's time to scale down. Put away the 12-foot heaver and the 10/0 hooks. Unless you want to catch big sharks, it's time to use Kingfish Rigs made with size #6 or #8 hooks and bait up with little strips of cut bait and worms.

"What can we expect to catch?"

Kingfish, Norfolk spot, sea trout, snapper blues and croaker are the fare in the summer surf! Occasionally, surf anglers will also pick up a flounder along with the usual dog shark, skate or ray. What I do this time of year is start with a Kingfish Rig baited with a piece of real bloodworm or Artificial FishBite Bloodworm. Then I add a tiny strip of box squid or any kind of fresh or

frozen cut bait such as bunker, spot or mullet on the same hook. This may seem like a lot of trouble to bait a small size #6 or #8 hook with two kinds of bait, but if the fish are there, it will work! Adding the strip of cut bait to the worm bait will give you a larger size pan fish and also give you the chance to catch bluefish, flounder or trout they are there. bloodworm bait will most likely catch you spot or kingfish. More variety will be available for you if you add the cut bait. (Cut bait alone may reduce vour chances catching the spot or kingfish!). Remember, two baits on a hook are better than one!

Once you catch a spot or small legal bluefish you have some good fresh bait that you can strip up for cut bait. If you start catching larger fish like



This being said, one of the most important things you can take to the beach is a sharp knife to cut small strips of fresh bait. Even one of those inexpensive bait knives will work fine as long as it is sharp. I keep one of those five dollar ceramic knife sharpeners in my tackle bucket and give it a couple swipes to sharpen the edge up before filleting up some strip baits. If you are using frozen bait like finger mullet or bunker, it actually strips up easier when it is partially frozen! (Carry a little cutting board or block of wood.)

"Do Fishbite Bloodworm baits work as well as the real thing?"

I like a real worm, but I also like the Fishbites. Fishbite bloodworms actually last on the hook longer and aren't bad as long as you change the bait once they start to fade out on the hook. The secret red material will actually melt off the white mesh after a while and won't secrete the scent as well once it's been on the hook for a while. I always carry a small pair of sharp scissors to cut the old stuff away and put on a new strip. Add a strip of cut bait to the Fishbites and you have an excellent bait. If you use squid with your Fishbites or bloodworm, use box squid over the cut and marinated stuff. It's real California squid and has a better flavor in my opinion. Save the cut and marinated squid for flounder or shark fishing.

"Should I cast out as far as I can?"

Spot, croaker, and kingfish are usually just beyond the crest of the waves. You can

actually overcast for these pan fish. What I do is cast out as far as I can and THEN, very slowly bump my rig back in towards the shore. That way, I can find out where they are biting. I also think pan fish like a slightly moving target. Also, when your rig is slightly moving, your bait is less likely to be stripped off by crabs in the surf.

Even though you are slowly retrieving your bait, you still want to use a pyramid or hurricane type sinker so it doesn't roll in too fast. A round sinker in the surf may go up or down the beach and wash in too fast. The only time you can get away with a bank sinker is if the current is very still and the surf is very calm and that doesn't happen very often!!!!

Look for a beach with a little definition. A little rip current or trough close to shore attracts kingfish and spot. Rock jetties also attract fish. If you see sand crabs digging into the wet sand that's usually a good place to fish. Remember, white crashing water is shallow. Dark rolling water is deeper. You want to cast into the dark rolling water, but if there is an outer bar, cast on the bar and let your rig fall off the bar and drop into the deeper water. A good way to read a beach is to get up on a second or higher floor and look down on the beach, or you can drive to the end of streets and look at the beach at low tide. Anglers are allowed to fish in Ocean City before 10 A.M. and after 5:30 P.M. These are good times of the day to fish because fish tend to feed when the sun is not high overhead. Sun hurts their eyes some old timers say! And don't be afraid to fish after dark. If you do, don't worry so much about using worms and go with some fresh or frozen cut bait. Croaker especially like to bite after dark. Spot generally don't bite at night. And whether you want them or not, you'll probably see Mr. Shark.

Good fishing....



CHIRPING IS NO LONGER JUST FOR BIRDS

Many of today's new fish finders incorporate the use of CHIRP technology and you may see the unit listed as **CHIRP** compatible featuring CHIRP, but just what is it and why would you want

All fish finders are actually at least a two-part system. You must have the main unit transceiver and a display which could be combined into one unit or made as two separate units. You also must have a transducer mounted on the boat bottom either on the transom or through the hull or, in some cases, sitting inside the hull. These transducers are the critical part of the system that sends and receives the

signals from the main unit which ultimately show up on your display screen as fish, bottom, wrecks, thermo clines, etc. Traditional transducers operate at mostly 50 or 200 kHz and transmit pulses of relatively short duration.



The CHIRP (Compressed Hi-intensity Radar Pulse) broadband transducers sweep a pattern of many frequencies in the range of 28 kHz to 210 kHz and their pulses are of longer duration. With all these frequencies sweeping in rapid succession, targets detected in the entire beam width instead of just what is

identified in the 50 or 200 kHz range. One major result is that the sound energy transmits 10 to 10,000 times greater than the conventional transducers. The company making these **CHIRP** broadband transducers is Air Mar, a well known manufacturer who makes most of the conventional transducers used today. These new CHIRP transducers utilize Air Mar's exclusive Transducer ID® new piezoceramic elements. The Transducer ID® feature measures and then stores the operating specs for each transducer which, in turn, enables the transducer to configure itself automatically to the transducer being used. Air Mar manufactures a total of 24 models of these in 7 different mounting options.

However, not every fish finder is capable of using a CHIRP transducer. The main unit must use DSP (Digital Signal Processing) and must indicate that it can use a CHIRP transducer. Your unit may already come with one, but it is a good thing to check at the point of purchase to see if that is the case, or if one can be ordered to go with your unit. At this writing, I and understand Garmin Simrad are the only two manufacturers using it, but others are on the way. Furuno, for example, has announced that it will have a model available in late 2012. If this feature really catches on, you can expect almost all units to start advertising the capability of CHIRP.

According to Air Mar, CHIRP technology results in 5 to 10 times greater detail and resolution, 10 to 10,000 times more energy on targets, precise separation between baitfish and game fish, superior performance in noisy environments and improved bottom tracking at high boat This improved speeds. performance is due in part to something called the "Q" value which measures the rise and fall times of target echoes. Conventional transducers

The flattied weighed 3 lbs. 2 oz. on the scale at Bill's Sport Shop. have a "Q" value of 25-30 whereas CHIRP units have a "Q' value of 1.6 to 30. The lower the "Q" value, the better the performance when it comes to fish separation and bottom imaging, especially in fast changing water depths.

As you can see, the transducer is the key to this system. Having a DSP fish finder will do you no good unless you pair it with a CHIRP transducer. These transducers physically look the same as the conventional ones but they range in price from around \$600 to almost \$1500, so they will not fit everyone's budget. As they become more popular, you could reasonably expect the prices to drop somewhat.

Broadband seems to be the new thing that is generating a lot of interest this season and so we see it here in select fish finder/transducer models. Broadband is also being used in some radar dome units and is being advertised also as having superior signal detecting especially at close range. Expect to see and hear more about this as time goes

Delaware Fishing Report

by Larry Jock



There is a lot of good fishing going on right now from Lewes down to the Fenwick line. Inshore anglers are really whacking the flatties and offshore anglers have their hands full with tuna, dolphin and marlin.

Flounder

There were good numbers of flounder caught last week, both by anglers drifting the bays and canals and by those venturing off the beach.

Joe Morris at Lewes Harbour Marina said that the ocean flounder bite was quite good. Numerous flatfish were caught on open bottom surrounding "DB" Buoy, and on the Old Grounds between there and "DA" Buoy. The artificial structure of Reef Sites 9 and 10, and nearby wrecks also gave up plenty of flatties. Boaters drifting squid, mackerel and other cut offerings, along with minnows, smelts and shiners on fluke killers had success. Bucktail jigs tipped with Gulp! or natural cut baits were also very effective. Those jigging on inshore structure had good luck with fluke killer rigs set-up with long leadered hooks placed a foot above a Spro bucktail. Anglers reported the bites split evenly between both hooks.

There were also good bites on Delaware Bay reefs and near the Ferry Jetty. Joe at Whitetail Taxidermy & Outdoor Supplies and Bert at Hook'em & Cook'em both reported an excellent flounder bite in the Indian River Inlet throughout the week. The action did die out on Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning, but picked up again in the afternoon highlighted by an 8 pounder caught from the rail. The key to the Indian River Inlet bite was moving water and fishing close to the rocks, according to Bert.

Joe also mentioned good flattie bites at the VFW Slough and at Massey's Ditch. There were also reports of flounder being caught in the Ditch next to Harpoon Hanna's, where a couple of 5 pounders were decked.

Triggerfish / Sheepshead

Paul at Rick's Bait & Tackle said that anglers fishing the Inner and Outer Walls of Lewes were rewarded with good catches of triggerfish and sheepshead. The best bites came while using sand fleas and clam for bait.

Sea Bass

The good news is that the high throwback ratio that has plagued anglers over the last month improved greatly last week. The bad news is that the number of bass being caught decreased. Bert at Hook'em & Cook'em said that with sea bass spawning, the bite has slowed, but most of those that are being caught are big enough to keep. The Old Grounds, as well as Site 10, have given up generous amounts of sea bass, according to Paul at Rick's Bait & Tackle.

Bluefish

Small bluefish were caught during the incoming tide in the Indian River Inlet on cut bait and metal jigs. Anglers also found bluefish in the 14-inch range on Fenwick Shoal.

Striped Bass

The striped bass summer slot season opened on July 1st in Delaware waters. Only the Delaware River, Delaware Bay and their tributaries are effected. The season runs through August 31st and anglers may keep 2 fish between 20 and 28-inches. These regulations do not apply to coastal waters, the Indian River Inlet or inland bays where the regulations remain at 2 fish per person, 28-inches or larger.

Joe at Lewes Harbour Marina reported good fishing in the Lewes Canal and Broadkill River for slot stripers by anglers casting lures around the drawbridge or along bulkheads, docks and marsh banks with Storm shads, Rat-L-Traps and 8-inch Gulp! eels. Those fishing with natural baits on bottom rigs did well with clams, bunker, squid heads or live eels.

We are seeing the typical summer offerings in the surf. Anglers are catching kingfish on bloodworms, small bluefish on cut bait and at night, crazy kayakers are paddling their baits off the beach and hooking up with big tiger sharks.

Offshore

Offshore anglers were busy chasing yellowfin tuna, bluefin tuna, dolphin and big eye tuna last week. Although there were quite a few eyeballs landed by Ocean City boats in the Washington Canyon, we didn't see the numbers show up on the docks in Delaware. Joe Fenstermaker on the "Hearts and Diamonds" did catch a 76 pounder at the Hot Dog while trolling ballyhoo.

Those trolling ballyhoo and artificial lures at the Tea Cup between the Hot Dog and Baltimore Canyon got into good numbers of yellowfin tuna with a few bluefins mixed in. Some boats chunking butterfish were also rewarded with tuna at the Hot Dog.

Dolphin are also being caught in decent numbers by anglers chasing tuna, and the good news is that there is a noticeable increase in their average size.

The first white marlin out of Lewes Harbour was released by Adam Bellen while fishing on the "Quintessa".

Tuna with Summer Tomato Salsa

Salsa:

1 cup chopped fresh tomato

½ avocado, chopped 1 garlic clove, crushed

1 TBSP. balsamic vinegar 1 tsp. olive oil

½ cup cooked corn kernels

1/4 cup minced red onion 1/4 cup chopped fresh

cilantro Salt and pepper, to taste

2 cups potatoes, peeled and cubed

2 celery stalks, chopped 3 bacon strips, cooked 2 TBSP. fresh thyme, or ½ tsp. dried 1/3 cup flour

2 auras battle

2 ounce bottle clam juice

 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. sea salt

2 cups heavy cream

2 cups milk

4 lbs. flounder fillets, cut in 1-inch pieces

Wash and scrub clams well. Bring water to a boil in a large soup pot and add clams.

Add the garlic and 2 bay leaves.

Cover and steam over medium heat for 5 to 10 minutes until the clams open.

Discard any that do not open.

Remove clams from shells, roughly chop and set aside.

Strain the broth through cheesecloth as an added precaution to remove any grit.

Save the broth.

Melt butter in the pot, saute potatoes, celery and onion for 5 minutes until well coated.

Add the bacon, thyme and remaining bay leaves.

Make a roux by sprinkling in flour and stirring until dissolved.

Add the reserved clam broth, bring to a boil, stirring constantly to avoid lumps.

Continue to simmer, stirring for 15 minutes, or until thickened.

Add the chopped clams, bottled clam juice and sea salt.

Pour in the cream and milk, cover and cook until heated through.

Add the fish fillets and continue to simmer another 5 minutes until the fish is opaque.

Season with salt and pepper.



Chum Lines

I don't have to tell anyone what a great tool the internet is for finding information on just about anything. No matter what the topic, "Google it" and in a flash you'll have 10thousand sources information about whatever it is you're researching. And what a great tool for us fishermen; you want to learn how to sharpen a hook, clean a particular fish, or replace an outboard's water pump? It's all there and a whole lot more!

While it's great to get "good" information, it's the "whole lot more" part of the search results that can be very problematic for those who aren't able to sort out fact from fiction. And as easy as it is for anyone with a computer and a connection to get their words published on the web these days, it seems there's just so much fiction out there that it's more than just a little bit difficult to find the truth about anything. I'm talking about stories like the one about the huge great white shark that was caught off Sandy Point State Park a few winters ago by a commercial fishing boat that was towed backwards for three hours. The accompanying photo turned out to actually be of a large that was caught mako somewhere off Nova Scotia. Funny how those internet stories and photos go. I recently saw a picture of "the worlds largest potato" which totally covered an 18-wheeler flat-bed. I wonder how many French fries you could get out of that spud!

I'd guess that those two hoaxes were fabricated merely for fun, and I doubt anyone who might have fallen for either ruse had their life turned upside-down by it, except maybe for the few folks that opted out of doing the Annual Sandy Point Polar Bear Plunge because they didn't want to deal with both hypothermia and a shark attack on the same day, or Mrs. Gertrude Pinefat from Kansas who thought that it was "she" who had the largest potato in the world on a shelf in her root cellar right next to the jars of pickled beets.

When anglers do searches for anything about fishing, it's likely that among the results will be links to any of a number of message boards that are tied-in to some of the more popular web forums such as Atlantic Anglers, Tidal Fish, and Sportfishermen.com, all of which are quite popular among fishermen in our region. These sites are not only great sources of information about all kinds of fishing and boating products, charter and guide services and classifieds, they are also a great way to hear straight from the horse's mouth exactly who has been catching what, where, and how. Because anglers can narrow their searches down to a particular type of fishing (like "tuna") in a certain area (such as Ocean City) they can get reports from fishermen sometimes just hours after their trips. Since postings are dated, readers know the freshness of each report and can even scroll back through time to see what they missed last month when they drove out to Kansas to see the world's 2nd largest potato.

But as good as the message boards, forums, threads or whatever you wish to call them are for the fishermen who choose to use them, they have an inherent flaw that everyone has to watch out for. Since the postings are made by almost anyone who has registered with the site, it's not unheard of to have someone

spouting off as if they were experts on whatever it is the subject matter happens to be that day, but actually have no idea what they're talking about. Though I personally choose to be more of a forum "reader" than a "poster," some of what I've read tempts me to jump in and set someone straight who is obviously way off track on whatever they're blabbing about, but I resist the urge because I've found that a lot of folks don't like to be corrected publicly and I'm not inclined to get into an online argument with someone I don't even know. There are some very knowledgeable fishermen who make regular posts to fishing forums - then there are the rest of them!

Which brings us to another down-side to online forums and that's the issue of "anonymity." Though some posters do indeed use their real name as their screen name, most seem to instead be recognized by something they made-up along the way. So if you read a post "Fishwacker22" or "Hawghooker" you really don't know if the fishing tip or

report is coming from the guy in the boat-slip next to yours or some 14-year-old girl in Iowa. Which of course is a problem that plagues the internet as a whole; anyone with just a little computer savvy can always find a way to get whatever message they're trying to convey published somewhere and not worry at all about neighbors, friends, or family knowing that it was actually they who started the buzz about the 44foot potato!

So I guess the moral of my story is that just like anything we find on the internet these days, even fishing forums need to be taken with a grain of salt and maybe even with a little skepticism. Particularly if some guy with a screen name like "Justafooln-U" posts that the great whites are hitting white bucktails on the incoming tide at the west side of the Bay Bridge.



Virginia Fishing Report

Dr. Julie Ball I.G.F.A Representative



As we reach the Independence Day Holiday, the fishing trend is transitioning into midsummer mode. Many species are available, so the holiday should provide some notable catches.

The flounder action rebounded again last week, with good catches coming from most of the usual flounder spots around the lower Bay. A nice class of flatfish, with many ranging to over 22-inches, and a few doormats pushing to over 7pounds, are keeping flounder anglers content. The bigger fish are falling for live bait presented near structure, and 2-ounce jig heads adorned with plastics or Gulps are working well for jigging around the rocks and pilings.

Chris Tilghman from Ocean City, MD took a trip down to Kiptopeake, VA and was rewarded with this 38.5-inch cobia. Chris hooked the "man in the brown suit" on a chunk of clam while fishing on the "Wedgie2" with Dan Oliver and Mike Tuel.

Keith Cole of Virginia Beach enticed a huge 12-pound doormat while working these areas with live bait last week. Strip baits are also producing some decent fish drifting on the outgoing tide, especially near the 1st Island of the CBBT. Good hauls came in from within Rudee Inlet last week, where anglers lined the rails to get in on the action.

Cobia action was still good last week, but lots of smaller fish are stealing the scene since the rain the previous week. Sight casters are still working hard for their fish, while chummers were having better luck last week with a few fish pushing to over 50pounds. Boats that offered chum slicks across the Inner Middle grounds and Latimer Shoal areas found the best results on cut bait. Those working the Nine-foot and Nautilus shoals also found a mix of red drum and sharks among the cobia.

Red drum are also spreading out into the lower Bay providing incidental by-catches for those bottom fishing around the Bay Bridge Tunnel, and even pier fishing at the 1st Island.

The Spanish mackerel scene is hot right now. Folks trolling the Virginia Beach shorelines are finding good limits of big Spanish mackerel and a smattering of Tailor bluefish. Small silver and gold spoons weighted with in-line sinkers or planers will do the trick while trolled in anywhere from 18 to 30 feet of water from Cape Henry to Sandbridge.

Black tip sharks ranging from 2 to 4-feet long are also providing some good action for anglers chumming around 2-miles off the oceanfront area.

Spadefish are pretty much everywhere right now. The Chesapeake Light Tower and Reef along with the CBBT are giving up good numbers of decent fish, with a few exceeding 7-pounds.

Sheepshead anglers are finding takers along the entire span of the CBBT using crab, fiddlers and clams. Lots of patience is the secret to a successful sheep trip. A good showing of nice triggerfish in the same areas and on many inshore wrecks is also keeping things interesting.

Spot are available in both the Rudee and Lynnhaven Inlets, and croaker are an easy target throughout the lower Bay. Some hardheads are pushing to 1.5-pounds near the Bay Bridge Tunnel and the Cell. Croaker also made their debut in the back waters of Oyster, where tarpon sightings also continue to taunt anglers.

Amberjack are a good bet at the southern towers and some offshore wrecks such as the Triangles and the Ricks and Hanks wrecks. Live bait is working well, while jigs are also a good alternative.

Deep droppers are still finding plenty of nice tilefish, wreckfish, and blackbelly rosefish in deeper water near the Norfolk Canyon. Some nice sea bass are available on many local wrecks as well as scattered among catches of blueline tilefish in deeper water.

The offshore season is offering great options right now with yellowfin tuna action at the top of the list. Plenty of yellowfin ranging up to 65-pounds, along with some tackle-busting bigeye tuna are making it a great season so far. Bluefin tuna are also adding to the menu. Some nice gaffer dolphin and wahoo are also around. A 122-pound wahoo caught last weekend is now pending as the new state record. The massive fish was boated aboard the "Teaser" out of Wachapreague by angler Susan Nelson of Whiteford, MD.

Straight from the Delaware Division of Fish & Wildlife

As we move into July, the big striped bass of spring are a memory and most anglers are targeting other fish species. Striped bass may be around, but it is not that common to catch striped bass bigger than the 28-inch minimum size in Delaware waters during the heat of the summer. But all is not lost for the dedicated striped bass angler wanting to catch some keepers as Delaware has a special summer striped bass season during July and August that can provide both striped bass fishing excitement along with some fillets for great grilling.

Delaware's summer slot striped bass season begins on July 1 and ends on August 31. This summers slot season is only open in the Delaware River, Delaware Bay and the tidal tributaries of the bay and river. During this season, the daily limit is two striped bass between 20 and 26 inches long. The striped bass size limit remains at 28 inches year round in Delaware waters other than in these locations.

Delaware's push for a summer slot season began several years ago as more and anglers told Delaware Division of Fish and Wildlife (DDFW) that they were catching plenty of undersized striped bass in the Delaware River, Delaware Bay and their tidal tributaries during July and August, and were wondering if there was any way the size limit could be reduced during the heat of the summer.

DDFW began to investigate the possibility of

creating a summer fishery for smaller striped bass. DDFW had demonstrated to the Atlantic States Marine **Fisheries** Commission (ASMFC) back in 1998 that the Delaware River was a striped bass production area. addition to proving that the Delaware was one of the major striped bass spawning areas, responsible for producing 5 to 10 percent of the Atlantic migratory population, DDFW found that there was a significant resident striped population in bass Delaware. An interesting aspect of these resident striped bass was their sex; they were almost all males. **DDFW** proposed opening a summer slot season to ASMFC that would target these resident, mature male striped bass.


Mature male striped bass are usually smaller than mature female striped bass and mature resident male striped bass are usually smaller than migratory male striped bass. The slot size limit would help ensure that only resident male striped bass were taken during this season. The evidence that DDFW presented to ASMFC convincingly demonstrated that this resident population of male striped bass could support a limited summer recreational fishery with no negative effects to the overall striped bass population. Delaware's summer season was approved by ASMFC in 2008 and the summer slot season began in 2009.

The summer slot season has not been as big an attraction as DDFW thought it would be when it was introduced in 2009. The stock of resident striped bass had apparently peaked in the years prior to the opening of the summer slot season and

the action during the summer slot seasons during the past three years has been spotty. However, many anglers have reported good catches of slotsized striped bass at a wide range of locations. Some of the hot spots reported are up in Delaware River around Reedy Island, tidal tributaries in Kent County such as the area around Woodland Beach, and the Outer Wall in lower Delaware Bay. While fresh chunk bunker was the bait of choice in the Delaware River and tidal tributary spots, live spot was the preferred bait for catching slot stripers in lower Delaware Bay.

The presence of population of resident male striped bass in the Delaware River, Delaware Bay and their tidal tributaries is yet another example of how the more we learn about striped bass, the harder time we have generalizing striped bass life history. Although most striped bass join the great migratory schools that move up the Atlantic coast during the summer, back down the coast in the fall and winter, and then up into the spawning areas in the spring, there are entire populations of striped bass that do not migrate very far, if at all.

The Chesapeake Bay is the source of more than half of the Atlantic coastal migratory striped bass population, but the Chesapeake is also home to a large resident striped bass population that rarely leaves the bay. Striped bass have also self-sustaining formed populations in large lakes and reservoirs across the country. Thus, finding a resident population of striped bass in the Delaware is not unusual, the overwhelming predominance of male striped in this resident bass population is unusual. The resident male striped bass that DDFW has sampled over the past three seasons have been small for their age compared to migratory male striped bass. Oddly enough, many of

the resident male striped bass caught during the summer slot season have been underweight for their length.

The Delaware River, Delaware Bay and their tidal tributaries are at their most productive during the summer and there seems to be plentiful forage for the resident male striped bass, yet these striped bass are not eating enough. Perhaps the high temperatures and low



dissolved oxygen levels during summer stress the striped bass and reduce their feeding rates.

DDFW put tracking tags in ten resident male striped bass in the spring of 2010. These tags emit a signal that is picked up by recorders that DDFW and other agencies have placed throughout the Delaware River, Delaware Bay and the Atlantic Ocean. Several of the tagged striped were tracked for months. Two of the tracked males never went further downstream than the C&D Canal. These two did move upstream of Philadelphia for a period, but mostly remained between Pea

One of them went as far down the bay as Cross Ledge Lighthouse, while the other was picked up by recorders off of Cape Henlopen during the fall. Both of them were back up in the river by the This following spring. tracking project showed that there was much variation in movements even among these resident male striped bass.

Enjoy the summer slot striped bass season and hope to see your catch in the *Coastal Fisherman*.
