Fish Facts



Wahoo Acanthocybium solanderi

Key Distinguishing Markings:

- The wahoo is slim, streamlined and sharp-toothed, with beaklike jaws and a tapered body ending in a slender tail base and a crescent-shaped tail.
- It is gray-blue above and paler below, and is marked with a series of vertical bars.
- The wahoo has a row of small finlets behind the dorsal and anal fins.

Size:

- At its largest, the wahoo attains a length of 6 feet and a weight of 120 lbs. or more.
- Growth can be rapid, and specimens have been recorded at up to 8' 2" in length and weighing 180 lbs.

Distribution:

 The wahoo is found worldwide, especially in the tropics and sub-tropical waters.

Food Preference:

· Their diet is made up of other fish and squid.

Spawning:

• Spawning appears to occur over an extended period of time, at sites in the Caribbean Sea and near Florida. In the western central Atlantic, wahoo spawn from May though August with peaks in activity during June and July.

Fun Facts:

- · Wahoo are extremely fast, and can swim up to 50 mph.
- It can be distinguished from the related Atlantic king mackerel by a fold of skin which covers the mandible when its mouth is closed.

It was a good week to be an angler with air temperatures on the water being much cooler than those experienced by us on land. The heat index for most of the weekend was over 100-degrees and the humidity unbearable.

The Ocean City Marlin Club Kid's Classic was another success. This was the 7th year of the tournament and even a little rain on Sunday couldn't dampen spirits. Over 320 anglers participated and a lot of fish hit the scales. Kudos go out to all the volunteers who donated their time towards this tournament. Let me tell you, the action at the scale can be downright crazy and it takes special people to keep everything running smoothly.

Tuna

Yellowfin tuna action was on the slow side for most of the week, although the "Marli" did throw 17 on the dock when they returned from the Hot Dog on Sunday. Most of the fish were on the smaller side, in the 30-35 inch range. "Pumpin' Hard" also caught 9 yellowfins at the same location. Most of the boats fishing in the Washington and Baltimore Canyons and around the Hot Dog during the week ended up with 2 to 3 yellowfins in the box.

A couple of large bluefin tuna were caught by anglers fishing around the Hambone on Friday, when "The Zipper" released a 61inch bluefin and the "Foolish Pleasures" caught a 51-incher.

On Sunday, lady anglers on the "Moore Bills" had an exciting

day, hooking up with 4 bigeye tuna at one time in the Washington Canyon. Graver did manage to get her 193 lb. tuna into the boat after a 2 hour fight.

Billfish

Billfishermen had a pretty good week of action with both white marlin and blue marlin flags seen flying at the dock. "Rhonda's Osprey" had a terrific week starting on Wednesday when they released 2 whites in the Poor Man's Canyon. On Friday, they returned to the Poor Man's and released a white and a blue marlin. Then, on Saturday they recorded 3 white marlin releases and another blue marlin release at the same location. They finished off the week with 1 release on Sunday.

Outside of the "Rhonda's Osprey" release mentioned above, several other blue marlin were released last week, starting on Tuesday when the "No Quarter" let one go while fishing in the Washington Canyon. The "Marli" released one Thursday in the Baltimore Canyon and on Saturday, "Give It Away" released 2 blue marlin in the Washington Canyon in addition to a white marlin as well. Finally, on Sunday, anglers on the "Crush Em" released a blue marlin in 500 fathoms south of the Baltimore Canyon.

The white marlin bite was

Wahoo

A couple of wahoo were caught last week and the largest was Greg Calvert's 78 pounder caught while fishing on the "Fair Lady" out of Sunset Marina on Saturday. The speedster was caught in 81-degree water at the 1st Sausage.

On Friday, anglers on "Island Time" boated a 48 lb. wahoo at the Hambone.


Dolphin

Dolphin continue to be caught in good numbers. Most of the ones we have seen have been the smaller, bailor dolphin but a few larger ones were hooked last week as well. They were hooked primarily on trolled ballyhoo and spreader bars right up the line from the Washington Canyon to Massey's Canyon in 20 to 70 fathoms.

Sea Bass

The sea bass bite is typical for this time of year. Some good days and some not so good. Outside of the local headboats, we haven't seen many sea bass arriving at the dock. Capt. Monty on the "Morning Star" came back to the Ocean City Fishing Center with good catches

fishing with clams.

Striped Bass

The striper bite around the South Jetty cooled when compared to weeks past, but some nice fish are still being caught. Anglers on the "Lucky Break" boated a 35-incher on Thursday and 2 more on Saturday with the largest measuring 36.5-inches. All were caught on live spot around the Rt. 50 Bridge.

Three other linesiders, up to 32-inches, were caught by anglers on the "Happy Hooker" while in the Inlet earlier in the week.

Flounder

This was one week when your success nabbing a flounder was almost solely dependent on the time of day you were fishing. The extremely hot weather really boiled our bay waters, so the outgoing tide produced very few keepers. Amazingly, on one trip to the bay behind Assateague Island, Capt. Bob Gowar on the "Bay Bee" reported water temperatures at 87-degrees.

Those fishing the incoming tide, when cooler ocean water funneled into the bay, had much better luck although anglers still had to wade through a load of throwbacks to get their keeper. To give you a feel on the throwback ratio, last Wednesday the "Bay Bee" had 120 throwbacks during their morning trip and another 157 in the afternoon.

the prime baits for landing keepers, but a white or chartreuse Gulp! Swimming Mullet has been holding it's own.

The nicest catch of the week came in on Monday right after last week's issue went to press when Frank Zeccola arrived with 2 flatties caught in the East Channel near Harbour Island. Frank hooked 2 keepers measuring 24 and 25.5-inches. The largest tipped the scale at 6 lbs. 1 oz.

Flounder are starting to be caught on a fairly consistent basis by those venturing off the beach to reefs and wrecks. Capt. Monty on the "Morning Star" brought back several nice size flounder last week. On Friday, Cross Ferrara boated three 19 3/4-inch fish at an artificial reef.


Sheepshead

A couple of sheepshead were landed last week, led by the 11 lb. 8 oz. fish caught by Kevin Javins while fishing off the tip of the South Jetty on Sunday. Kevin fooled the sheepshead with a peeler crab. A 6.5 lb. sheepshead was also caught by an angler on the "Happy Hooker" while fishing in the Inlet.

Bluefish

Chopper bluefish have been scarce this season but smaller, snapper bluefish are all over the shoals off the beach and around the Rt. 50 Bridge. Those being caught in the bay have been hooked by anglers tossing live spot in search of stripers. Snappers on the shoals were caught on live bait as well as spoons and other artificial lures.







Driftin' Easy

"Let's go clamming!"

You're drifting around on your boat. It's getting to be low tide. It's hot and the fish quit biting. It's a good time to go clamming! Yes, low tide is when you want to go clamming and if you look around, you can see how many sandbars and shoals are exposed at low tide. All you have to do is bring your boat close to one of the bars, anchor it in the shallow water, jump out of the boat and look for clams.

Ocean City, MD In vacationers are allowed to keep 250 clams each as long as they are 1-inch in size. No license is required to go clamming in Ocean City, MD.

I have just one small word of warning if you wade in warm water on the bars in the summer time. Spray your feet and legs with bug spray and/or suntan lotion. There's some kind of microscopic mite that can break you out, similar to chiggers, in the warm pools of water. Not fun! Also, if you are walking in the water where it is too deep to see the bottom, wear water shoes or old tennis shoes. In the back bays, watch out for sea nettles.


"I didn't bring a clam rake!"

I've caught many a clam in my life with my index finger! A dull fillet knife works wonders too, creating a makeshift clamming prong. Walk on the wet sand of a sand bar or in the shallow water where you can see the bottom. Look for little holes that look like "key holes" in the sand. Slip the knife, finger, stick, ice pick or real clam rake next to the hole and see if you feel something hard. If so, dig down, and hopefully it's a clam. Where there's one clam there are usually more. Clam holes can look like key holes, worm holes and sometimes just indents. On an outgoing tide, clams holes can look like a spot of darker mud sitting on top of white sand. On an incoming tide, clams can be seen actually siphoning the water. Look for water squirting out of the underwater ground. It's likely a clam.

"Don't be fooled by razor clams!"

Razor clams have real big holes, squirt streams of water, and go down very deep. It's impossible to catch them most of the time. Regular clams are usually just an inch or so down

into the sand or mud. Like fish, you can find them on ledges of inclines. Just think about the water at high tide. The clam is moving along in the current, then when the tide falls, the clams fall over a little sand bar lip and plunk! It stops, and then it digs in.

If you have a rake, so much the better! Look for the holes and dig. Or you can blind rake. Blind raking is more like work, but can be very productive as long as you are in a "clam happy" area. I like to drag the rake behind me until I hear a "clink" and then stop and dig some more, pulling the clams up in the basket of the rake. Remember, where there's one clam, there are more. I have one of those floating livewells with a Styro-ring that holds up a mesh bag. I tie the rope around my waist and drag it along behind me in the water.

Keep your clams clean. While on the boat, fill a 5gallon bucket or cooler with water and let the clams purge themselves. The little clams are especially tasty if they do not have sand or grit in them. The small clams you can steam and eat. The larger clams you need to open and make chowder, fried clam strips or stuffed clams.

"Where's the best place to clam out of a boat?"

In Ocean City, the big bar just north of the Route 50

Bridge has plenty of clams on the north and northwest side of it. Lots of people call this Bird Island because it is also a bird sanctuary. There are signs around the perimeter of the island that warn you to stay away from the nesting birds, so you need to anchor your boat away from the island and wade in the water for the clams.

The best way to get to the island is to travel north in the East Channel and turn left at the northernmost end of the island and u-turn around the west side of the island. It's deep right next to the land there. It's like a small channel. Then carefully ease towards the sandy beach until you are in shallow enough water to jump out and anchor the boat.

Some vacationers like to clam on the island just offshore of Sneaky Pete's and Hooper's Restaurant. There's also a pretty good clam bed just offshore of Bahia Marina at 22nd Street.

Behind Assateague, on the southwestern side of the Verrazano Bridge, is good for digging clams. The water clarity here is not much for signing! There are clams on most of the bars from Buoy #10 to beyond the Verrazano Bridge. All of the dry sandbars behind Assateague are "bird sanctuaries" so you will have to anchor your boat in shallow water and clam.

"Where can I clam from the shore in Ocean City, MD?"

When it gets to be low tide you can walk out to the bar behind Convention Hall at 41st Street.

The National Park on Assateague Island has two clamming areas. Travel down Route 611 to Assateague. Make a right and go into the National Park. You have to pay to get inside the park. You will see the signs for the parking areas that have little clams drawn on them.

The State Park on Assateague Island also has clamming, but it involves a walk. You have to park in the parking lot on the west side of the bridge going into Assateague and walk over to clam on the east side. There's no parking on the east side and clamming is not allowed on the west side. On a west wind, take bug spray!!!

The Isle of Wight has some clams too. Go to the public area off Rt. 90. Walk east back towards Ocean City to the corner of the bridge span and the rocks. Go there at low tide and wear long pants, as there's sea nettles in the back water areas.

Clamming is fun and something different to do!





White Clam Pizza submitted by Cindy Schmus

3 cloves garlic, chopped 1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil, plus more for drizzling

1 pizza dough round - can be found in refrigerated section of supermarket

Cornmeal, for dusting Salt 1/2 cup thinly sliced mozzarella cheese

12 oz. fresh chopped clams, juice reserved 1/4 tsp. dried oregano 2 TBSP. parmesan cheese

1 bag baby spinach Juice of 1 lemon

Red pepper flakes, for topping (optional)

Preheat oven to 500 degrees. Saute spinach in skillet with 2 tsp. olive oil for 2 minutes; set aside.

Mix the garlic and 1/4 cup olive oil in a small bowl.

Prepare an inverted cookie sheet dusted with corn meal.

Stretch the pizza dough into a rectangle; shape to fit the sheet.

Brush half of the garlic oil over the dough; season with salt.

Scatter the mozzarella and

clams over the garlic oil; drizzle with any reserved clam juice and the remaining garlic oil.

Sprinkle with the oregano, parmesan and salt to taste.

Bake until crust is light brown, 13 to 15 minutes.

Just before pizza is done add the sauteed spinach; season with the red pepper flakes, if desired.

Flounder with Shrimp Sauce submitted by Cindy Schmus

4 flounder fillets 2 tsp. lemon juice 1/2 tsp. salt, divided

1/8 tsp. pepper

1/4 lb. medium shrimp, peeled and deveined

4 tsp. butter

4 tsp. flour

1 cup milk

2 tsp. Dijon mustard

1/8 tsp. white pepper

Sprinkle fillets with lemon juice, 1/4 tsp. salt and pepper.

Roll each fillet around a shrimp and secure it with a toothpick.

Chop remaining shrimp; set aside.

Arrange the rolled fillets, seam side down in a glass baking dish sprayed with

cooking spray.

Cover and bake at 425 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes.

In a saucepan melt the butter.

Stir in flour and gradually stir in the milk, mustard, salt and pepper until blended.

Add remaining shrimp; bring to a boil, cook and stir 2 minutes or until the shrimp turn pink.

> Serve over fish. Serves 4.

Scallops with Dijon Lemon Vinaigrette Marinade

Marinade:

2/3 cup oil

1/3 cup lemon juice

1/4 cup Dijon mustard



Delaware Fishing Report



Hi folks! If the fishing would have heated up as much as the weather has, we would all be in our glory. I'm not sure if the fish shut down as much as the anglers did. There is still a fair amount of fish being caught, but as mid-summer always is, most fish are short of the legal size. I think our fisheries council and the chief flattie are conspirators in the setting of size limits each year. It just always seems to be that most fish are ½ to ½ inch short. Somethin's up! That is why I always say you need to be fishing for the enjoyment and not for the meat.

Back bay fishing has been providing plenty of flounder with just a few keeper-sized fish mixed in. Croaker action has been spotty, but should improve very soon. Lots of spot

are to be had by both hook and line or the use of a spot trap. Blowfish are being caught in Rehoboth Bay and small bluefish are everywhere. Crabbing continues to be very good. Larger blues are being taken in the Indian River Inlet on the incoming tide. Some keeper stripers are showing up at the end of a late night or early morning incoming tide.

Capt. Aaron Hurd of "Gale Force Charters" hosted the annual Bullinger family fishing competition, where a guys vs. gals tournament was held with each team fishing a half-day in the Indian River Inlet area. This year, the guys won after a one-hour storm delay chased all the boat traffic away from their spot, allowing them to make a strong finish in their last 50 minutes of fishing. Spot and shiners were the bait of the day.

Inshore fishermen are finding some bigger flounder at Site #10 and the DB Buoy areas. Jacob Klinger of Millsboro, DE fished Site #10 using a minnow/squid combo to score a 23-½", 4.6 lb. flattie.

Capt. Chuck Cook of "First Light Charters" fished Site #10 with Gil Waddington and caught flounder up to 5.8 lbs. Darrel Hawk and his wife Sandy fished the DB Buoy to trick flatties of 6.4 lbs. and 5.0 lbs

Offshore action has slowed a bit, with chunkers scoring at first light and then switching to the troll mid-morning. Cary Aughbaugh on the "Empty Hook" trolled the Hambone with angler Tom Little, scoring a 50 lb. wahoo. Capt. Bill Burkhardt of "Toss Em Back" Charters took his crew on an overnighter to score 8 tuna.

Pat of Rattle & Reel Sporting Center said the heat kept many people from fishing. Those who could venture to the ocean did so mainly to cool off. Anglers fishing the back bays found croakers and short flounder.

Capt. Bill Baker at Bill's Sport Shop said that at least 3 schools of blues have been seen just out of casting distance from the beach. There are reports of some blues being taken in the 19" range from the

Steven Warren and Jonathan Davis of Georgetown, DE limited out on flounder to 20" at Roosevelt Inlet, caught on nuclear chicken and white Gulp!. Dylan Barbour, age 11, of Rehoboth Beach caught his first three mahi mahi to 44" at Massey's Canyon on trolled ballyhoo aboard the "This Is It" with Capt. Skip Mojie and Rick Mahala. Austin Smith of Virginia landed a 4.10 lb., 22 ½" flounder taken with a black salty from the Indian River Inlet. Dan and Matt Langdon on the "Ofishal" went to the Poor Man's this past weekend and went 1 for 2 on white marlin along with a gaffer dolphin using ballyhoo and artificials.

Kevin and Joseph Schultze of Milton, DE, caught an estimated 8 foot, 260 lb. sand tiger shark off the surf near Herring Point at Cape Henlopen State Park. They kayaked whole spot for bait 200 yards offshore using a 14/0 hook and braided 50# line. We received an email from Capt. Oak Thompson: "Hey Capt. Bill, we had another great day of fishing in the Indian River Bay, caught 25 flounder with 3 keepers, 20-inches, 4.5 lbs. for Mike Lynch, 18.5-inches, 2.75 lbs. for Mike Thompson and a 18.5-inch, 2.6 lb. fish on live spot and minnows. They also caught and released two 25inch rockfish and lots of spot and blowfish on fish bite bloodworms. Lots of rod bending action."

Deanna at Hook'em & Cook'em Bait & Tackle hopes you all are trying to keep cool during these sweltering temperatures. One way to stay cooler is to go out on the water and get fishing! The offshore bite continues to be the best we have seen in years. Charter boats, as well as private boats, continue to go out to the Poor Man's Canyon, Hot Dog and Hambone to get either bluefin yellowfin tuna. numbers may not be as many as when the season first started, but they are still impressive. The biggest bluefin

tuna of the year was brought in by the "Boy's Toy". This fish weighed in at 108 lbs. and was caught out at the Poor Man's Canyon.

The "American Ambition" and "Capt. Ike II" continue to be top charter tuna boats to date with numbers ranging from 5-7 fish per trip. They weigh anywhere from 30-40 lbs. They were being caught on the troll, but now we are starting to hear more reports that they are being caught on the chunk with butterfish and sardines overnight and trolling during the day.

Along with the tuna, we are seeing some wahoo hit the docks well. Again, "American Ambition" brings in a top weight of 41 lbs. Mahi are still coming in; some are nice large ones, as well as a few peanuts here and there. We have had one swordfish brought in by Sandy Panik of Frederick, MD. This 49.8 lb. sword was caught out at the Poor Man's on an overnight trip.

The rockfish are showing up in the Inlet with live spot and mostly in the evening to nighttime hours. However, there are occasional stripers still brought in during the day. The weights range from 9 to 15 lbs. Not huge, but nice keeper and eating size. The flounder are still coming to the dock, and most are being brought in with live spot, but minnows work also. A nice size 12 lb. flounder was brought in by Randy Colona, of Rehoboth, DE. He caught it using a fly in the Inlet.

Some inshore fishing has picked up with more keeper sea bass coming from the head boat "Judy V." and other charter boats in the marina. The "#1 Hooker" has brought in trigger fish, the "Capt. Ike II" has brought in nice catches of spadefish, triggerfish, tautog and flounder.

The "Miss Ene II" has had a couple of nice trips with, believe it or not, Atlantic cod in the mix.

The beach fishing remains ZZZZZZZZZZZZZZZZZ We

have heard that there are small spot and kingfish to be had. The best fishing on the beach is at night when the sharks come out. Anglers are hooking up sharks with some fresh tuna belly on an 8/0 hook and bringing in some nice size toothy critters measuring 6-8 feet. Be careful, and remember you are no longer allowed to beach and release a shark. This is supposed to be done in the water. Good way to lose a foot, don't ya think?!

Joe Morris at Lewes Harbour Marina said catching over the weekend wasn't quite as hot as the weather, but earlier in the week, bottom bouncers enjoyed decent action. Patrons on the "Angler" and the "Pirate King" had a good mix of flounder and ling northwest of the DB Buoy in the ocean. In the Delaware Bay, working the artificial reefs was productive for flounder. On Thursday, flukers aboard the "Katy Did" connected with 12 keepers while pile hopping at Sites 5, 6, 7 and 8. Dave Walker used a bucktail to fool his 5.5 lb. flatfish on that trip. In addition to flounder, blowfish, kingfish, snapper blues and a few croakers were found on bay reefs. Despite rising water temperatures, fluke still hung out in the Lewes Canal. Nick Psaroudakis and his buddies put 7 keepers in the box on an excursion to the Canal this past week. Slot size stripers were also pulled from the Canal, primarily at night, when heat and light levels dropped. Drifting eels around the drawbridge yielded linesiders, as did casting small artificials to the shadow line of the Roosevelt Coast Guard Station lights. Rockfish also responded to topwater plugs tossed at the Outer Wall in the evenings. At the Roosevelt Inlet, increasing numbers of croakers and spot were hooked by casters using pieces of bloodworms, clam and FishBites on rigs with small hooks. Tautog catches cooled off some with the hot weather, but crews that put in their time managed a few

keepers for the table. Captain

Pete's toggers on the "Top Fin" took home 17 blackfish and a big trigger on Thursday.


The offshore bite was slower, but the Hambone produced bluefins, yellowfins, wahoo, dolphin and white marlin for trollers working that area Friday. Chunking with butters and bunker resulted in tuna for boats at the Hot Dog on Friday. Lex Robertson reported that he fished 77degree water at the Dog aboard the "Spectacle" with Captain Doc Peoples, and his group boated six nice yellowfins weighing up to 53 lbs. Boats that beat up the bight of the Washington Canyon found a few yellowfins, the occasional

Closer to the beach, Captain Jeff Hoepfl on the "Joint Venture" trolled the 12 Fathom Lump southeast of Delaware Light for 3 gaffer dolphin, including an 18.6 pounder landed by Lewis Means, plus a 51.6 lb. bluefin decked by Donna Means. John Woodson weighed in a 19.3 lb. mahi that he caught on the "Skipjack".





MORE AND MORE WAYS TO BE FOUND

GPS technology advances and units become smaller and smaller, the public is benefiting by having a large variety of choices of safety equipment and means of being found if you are lost at sea or on land.

The EPIRB (Emergency Position Indicating Radio Beacon) was the first entry into the market but more recently the PLB (Personal Locator Beacon) has taken the industry lead. At first, it was their lower price, but competition has driven the market to develop more and more features in these smaller, less expensive units. Let's take a closer look at two of them

ACR, a leader in emergency location for land and sea has introduced their latest PLB, the ResQlink™. The 4.6 oz., 3.9-inch handheld unit sports three levels of signal technology - 66 channel GPS positioning, 406 MHz emergency signal and a 121.5 MHz emergency signal plus a built-in strobe light that is advertised to last approximately 30 hours. It retails for \$395 and is simple to operate. You just raise the antenna and press one button. It also has the ability to perform a self test and GPS live tests. The battery should be replaced every six years.

It is important to note that most of today's EPIRB and/or units have self-test capability, but some are limited. The test generally consists of pressing the test button momentarily and getting a short strobe light and/or audible tone that assures you the battery is okay and the unit appears to be

functioning properly. Units with a built-in GPS have additional test capabilities. They are programmed to be able to send a short live burst signal that ground stations are programmed to ignore but which test your unit to check its circuitry for assurance that the internal circuits are operating properly and that it "should" be able to reach the satellite and Coast Guard ground stations.

The ResQLink and some others have taken that one step further with a confirmation signal that you will receive. In other words, you can sign up to a service that allows you to transmit a live signal from your PLB (and/or other compatible EPIRB) that is the same signal the Coast Guard satellite would receive if you were in a real emergency. Normal Cospas-Sarsat Ground Stations ignore self-test messages, but network called SafeLife Systems has ground receiving stations that have been specially adapted to receive these messages. You, in turn, get confirmation of whether or not, vour beacon would be detected by the satellites used by the International Search and Rescue Network. In addition, you will be provided with the encoded beacon location information (15 HEX ID, Country Code, Beacon Type and Programmed Identity) for your verification / records.

By registering your PLB and signing up to the 406Link.com service provided by ACR for a





fee of \$39.95/year, you can instruct your PLB to send a text message to a cell phone and/or email address and giving you the details that your signal, including your GPS location was received, verify your correct information and signal that you are OK. That confirmation message can be sent to more than one recipient.

You are restricted in how many of these tests can be performed. That is a matter of reserving battery power for a real emergency. So you would typically test this unit before leaving the dock. On special occasions, you might use it to verify arrival at a final destination, but it is designed for emergency location and not as a tracking device.

There is, however, another unit that is designed for tracking. It is called "Spot" and we will talk about it more in next week's column. We will also compare the two so you can decide which, if any, is right for you.

Chum Lines

A few years ago my wife and I took a little side trip to Montauk, New York out on the tip of Long Island. Before leaving there we stopped in a local restaurant for dinner. One of the specials of the night was fresh striped bass covered with some kind of crushed pumpkin seed sauce over steamed spinach and mashed potatoes. "That's me," I said, "just the kind of local flavor I'm looking for."

But when I asked the waitress for the "rockfish special" she gave me a very puzzled look. "The what?" she asked.

"I'm sorry. I forgot where I was. I mean the striped bass." That she understood, and before long I was munching on a meal of some of the best rockfish (oops - I mean striped bass) I've ever had.

Here in Maryland we know darn well that besides the name, there's no difference between striped bass and rockfish. "Striped bass" is, of course, the proper name for these fish, but local folks more often call them "rockfish," or sometimes just "rock."

The nickname is used a little bit to our south, but anywhere north of the Delaware Bay nobody knows a thing about rockfish. Up there it's "striped bass, stripers" or just "bass." Writers intent on

romanticizing old days-goneby of linen lines, thumb drag reels and bamboo rods sometimes use term "linesider," but it's seldom heard in actual discussion. I've always thought it interesting, if not downright confusing, how the names for the same fish change so much depending upon the geographic location. Believe me, striped bass aren't the only scaly source of the confusion.

Take trout for instance. Of course I'm not talking about the freshwater trout that live in mountain streams. referring to what we locals call "seatrout." Our neighbors up above us have a different name for them too. Up north they're more likely to be called by their proper name of "weakfish," which in itself is often tweaked a little into the more endearing "weakie." nickname of Especially around the Delaware Bay area, big seatrout are often known as "tiderunners" and around here the little ones are referred to as "spikes." Sometimes anglers will use the term "gray trout" particularly if they are trying to distinguish them from the species close cousin - the "spotted seatrout."

Spotted seatrout are not as common in these parts as weakfish are, but there are enough of them taken here and especially down south that they too have acquired their own share of names. "Speckled trout" or "spotted weakfish" are names often used for these wonderful fish, but their good friends usually just call them "specs."

Ok, I'll admit that northern anglers tend to use the more proper name when it comes to weakfish and striped bass than we do on this side of the Mason-Dixon Line, but not when it comes to tautog. Up there they call them "blackfish" or (get this) sometimes even rockfish!

Of course, flounder aren't immune to regional name discrepancies either. Here we catch flounder and sometimes winter flounder. But up north they catch fluke and flounder. Bear with me on this one because it's a little confusing. The fish our local anglers most often catch through the season and call "flounder" properly known as "summer flounder." The other flatfish we sometimes get around here is the "winter flounder" which, by golly, we actually call "winter flounder." Hey, we got one right! But when northern fishermen refer to "flounder" they usually mean "winter flounder" and to them a "summer flounder" is a "fluke." Just to confuse things even more, big summer flounder are often called "doormats," winter flounder are sometimes called "black backs" or "mud dabs", and either species might referred to as a "flattie."

Now let's consider the "northern kingfish", which is the fish local surf anglers catch and simply call "kingfish." Of course, these should not be confused with the kingfish taken offshore which are actually "king mackerel", a whole other critter altogether. In some places, northern kingfish are referred to as "sea mullet", "whiting" "northern whiting", even though they are not whiting or even close to being mullet.

I'm sure there's no need for me to go into the name games with dolphin, mahi-mahi, and dorado. Same fish, three names, no relation to flipper. Or that the "shiners" we use down here for bait are also known as "silversides", or up north as "spearing." It may surprise some that "porgies" are actually "scup" and that "false albacore" are actually "little tunny," or that what we call "blowfish" or "blowtoads" actually "northern How about red puffers." drum? They're also known as "redfish" or "channel bass" unless they're small, then they're usually called "puppy drum."


Bluefish are "snappers" if they're small, "choppers, slammers, or gorillas" if they're big, "tailors" if they're medium, and sometimes a "pain in the butt" if you're fishing for something else!

Even the good old minnow, that's so popular as bait for (summer) flounder is not immune to having conflicting names. We typically call them "bull minnows", and in some locations anglers will use names like "killfish, killie, chub, mummies, bullheads" or "marsh minnow." But the name actually "mummichog!" I wonder what would happen if you went into a local tackle shop and ask for a pint of live mummichogs?

I guess there's no need to make a big deal out of the different names of fish. If there's a problem we can always tell folks that we caught one of those flat things with eyes on one side, or a silvery fish with horizontal stripes. Or then again we could use the scientific Latin names. That would certainly clarify things. In fact, I think I'll give that a try. I need a break from this computer anyway. Maybe I'll just slip on down to the tackle shop, get a pint of fundulus heteroculitus, and see if I can catch a couple paralichthys dentatus for dinner.







Virginia Fishing Report




With the great weather last week, the mid-summer fishing is still going strong. Inshore, the main interest still centers around cobia and the old standby, flounder.



Cobia hunters finally found a significant upswing in the action last week. More sightings and more responsive

fish are translating into more cobia in the boat for sight casters. Several of these fish are pushing from 60 to 80-pounds lately. Captain Justin Wilson and his crew aboard the "Just Right" out of Lynnhaven spotted 15 cobia, and hooked 5 fish up to 45-pounds while sight casting last week. Latimer Shoal and the Nine Foot Shoal are still good places to dump chum and bottomfish, both cuts, where smaller fish were still the norm last week. Huge schools of red drum are still meandering about the lower Bay and along the oceanfront, providing great sight casting opportunities. Schools of jack crevelle are making their yearly stop in Lower Bay waters, briefly flashing anglers along lower Bay cuts before disappearing into the depths.

Flounder pounders reported good catches of quality fish last Although the number of trophy doormats is still down, decent fish ranging from 3 to 6pounds are making the trip worthwhile. The best results are coming from those offering live bait or jigging near bridge pilings and along the tubes of the CBBT, lower Bay wrecks, Back River Reef, and near the Cell in about 40-feet of water. The outgoing tide is providing the best action. Both Rudee and Lynnhaven Inlets are still

giving up good numbers of keeper flatfish for drifters.

Anglers are heading to Oyster to partake in the excellent croaker run, with the "chimney" and Buoy 7 areas providing good action. Within lower Bay waters, croaker are everywhere from the HRBT to Cape Henry. The area off Kiptopeke State Park is also a favorite location lately, while the folks at Long Bay Pointe Bait and Tackle report that nicer croaker are coming from the Inlets. Big spot are also still hitting within the Inlets, with Fish Bites working well last week.



Spadefish ranging to about seven pounds are available at the Chesapeake Light Tower and the Tower Reef, while smaller fish to around fivepounds are hovering near the **CBBT** and the Sheepshead are still going strong along the structure and triggerfish are also swiping baits in many of these same areas. Tog action is still down, and will likely not rekindle until the fall.

Spanish mackerel are still dominating the trolling scene along the oceanfront. The

bigger fish are coming from shallower water on small Drone or Clark spoons trolled at a quick clip. The Virginia Beach Fishing Center reports that most of the fish are ranging from 14 to 20-inches, with Tailor bluefish rounding out catches. King mackerel were sighted skying along the Virginia Beach shorelines last week, with only rumors of a few hook-ups.

Virgina tarpon are still drawing hardcore anglers to the backwaters of Oyster, with reports of sightings and hookups still trickling in. Be prepared to also tangle with big Southern rays and sharks in the hot sun in these same

Deep dropping is still a good choice, with quality tilefish, blueline golden tilefish, blackbellied rosefish and nice grouper on the menu. Black sea bass are available mixed in with the tilefish. Amberjack are still taking jigs and live bait offered on offshore wrecks and at the South Tower.

The offshore bite is still very good, with the billfish scene improving daily. Boats raised up to a dozen billfish in spreads last week, with white marlin, a smattering of blues



and a few sailfish exciting bluewater trollers. Last week, the best action occurred from the Triple 0's area to East of the Cigar in 50 to 100 fathoms. Nice yellowfin tuna are still hitting in the Canyon, along with big eyes and scattered school-sized bluefin tuna. Wahoo are becoming more common, with some big gaffer dolphin showing here and there, along with a surprise mako sharks. For more information go to www.drjball.com.



Clearance Levels Changing for Indian River Inlet Bridge

The Delaware Department of Transportation (DelDOT) wants boat owners and operators to be aware of changing navigation conditions beneath the new Indian River Inlet Bridge over the coming weeks and months in order to maintain safety. In response to concerns raised about the horizontal clearance beneath the bridge, DelDOT has worked with political representatives, the U.S. Coast Guard, Skanska USA Civil Southeast, Inc., government departments and local mariners to keep the inlet accessible throughout construction.

As the form travelers move closer together toward the midpoint of the inlet, the width of the navigational channel continues to decrease, causing concern for boat captains who traverse the inlet waterway. Because it is peak fishing season there is generally an increase in the number of boats in the area. In addition, there are fishing tournaments scheduled for the

next several weeks.

To address these conditions Skanska USA Civil Southeast, Inc. and DelDOT engineers are modifying the construction sequencing for this portion of the project. The sequence of the remaining form traveler advancements has been altered to allow for a navigable waterway to be maintained.

Currently, the distance between the northside and southside form travelers is approximately 88 feet. underclearance of the existing bridge over this portion of the channel is approximately 35 feet above the mean high water elevation. With the advancement of the northside traveler expected to occur on or about July 30, the remaining clear width of the main channel will be reduced to approximately 64 feet. This condition will exist for a period of approximately two weeks. The southside form traveler will not move during this time. This will provide acceptable clearance levels for most boaters during peak fishing season. During this time, other work will continue on various aspects of bridge construction,

thus permitting, the bridge project to progress towards the anticipated opening of two lanes on the new bridge to traffic late this year.

By mid-August, the northside form traveler work will be completed and the traveler will be lowered onto a barge and shipped off site. During this operation, the U.S. Coast Guard will assist by briefly closing the waterway approximately 2-5 hours, or as needed to complete the operation and move the barge. While a specific date has not been established for this operation, DelDOT and Skanska will continue to keep mariners informed of the construction schedule as the work progresses.

DelDOT will continue to work with Skanska to identify means of re-sequencing work in order to open the bridge to traffic towards the end of the year. Potential costs of the resequencing are being evaluated, but DelDOT believes these costs will be considerably less than the potential economic and safety impacts associated with a prolonged impact to mariners.

The work on the form traveler will have no impact on motorists.








