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

Offshore Report

This Week Last Year

- Angler Kevin Gibbs caught the first white marlin for 2022 on June 6th. He was fishing on the "Wrecker" just north of the Baltimore Canyon.
- The yellowfin tuna had moved closer to shore with the Baltimore being the hot spot followed by the north Wilmington.
- The charter boat "Bill Slayer" brought in a 75 lb. yellowfin from the Baltimore and the "Hooked Up" had one at 80.6 lbs. from the Wilmington.
- The first bigeye tuna of the season was caught in the Baltimore. It weighed 242 lbs. even without a tail that was lost to a mako.

There was beautiful and funky weather around Delmarva over the last week. Early on saw sunny, warm days and then smoke from the Canadian wildfires were channeled our way creating a dystopian haze. The only upside were really pretty sunrises and sunsets! Fortunately for us, those pesky winds we have been dealing with most of the spring kicked in and shifted the smoke away by last weekend. The smoke did not keep anglers out of the canyons, and even the wind settled a bit, offering several windows to get offshore.

Tuna again dominated the offshore action last week; however, we did get our 2nd report of a white marlin release and the first wahoo of the season made its way to the scales at Sunset Marina!

Early last week again saw a huge vellowfin tuna run with waters in the mid 60° range from the Norfolk to just north of the Poor Man's Canyon. Even so, almost all of the action was in the Poor Man's southern waters in 50 to 100 fathoms. Capts. Brian Porter and Alex Beane on the charter boat "Boss Hogg" lead the way with 3 limit trips back to back bringing 54 yellows to the cleaners at Sunset Marina! The "Spring Mix II" and "Pumpin' Hard" had success trips there as well, finding consistent water in the 68° range. The charter boat "Marli" made a rare, private trip when owner Mike Bostic and crew wanted in on the action. They filled the box with their limit of 18 yellowfins using Capt. Mark Hoos preferred Sterling Tackle spreader bars and Crazy 8 chains. Most captains reported spreader bars, wide trackers and chains with naked or skirted ballyhoo as their tools of choice. Some like the "Full Service" and "Absolut Pleasure" reported success with a good ol' cedar plug.

Outside the Poor Man's we had reports as far north as the Baltimore Canyon where the "Bill Slayer" got their limit and the "Reel Blessed" got 9 on their wide trackers. The "Grande Pez" headed a little further south with members of the OC Light Tackle Club. They worked the Rock Pile in 55 fathoms and boxed 16 yellows. On that trip light tackle was not on board!


After that strong start however,

www.coastalfisherman.net the bite slowed. Perhaps from a combination of all angler pressure and a weaker Solunar forecast. This opened up an opportunity for some deep dropping for Rod Taylor and his tilefish. with wife Pam put their boat "Playmaker" in 600 feet in the Poor Man's for some tile fishing and perhaps some scouting for Pam's Tuna & Tiara Ladies Tuna Tournament next weekend! Rod reeled up a beautiful golden tilefish using tuna belly.

Another angler was \$5,000 richer last week! Keith Garner was fishing with Capt. Chris Ragni last Wednesday on the "Bill Slaver" out of the Indian River Marina when he connected with a white marlin early in the morning on a Habanero Lures skirted ballyhoo. While this was not the first for the season, it was the first from a member of the Ocean City Marlin Club, earning them the club's \$5,000 prize. It was the first white from a Delaware boat and only the 2nd we have heard this season. The private boat "Reel-Lee" reported they released a blue marlin in the Poor Man's Canyon that hit on a purple and black Ilander lure.

There were also some interesting shark reports last week too. Our Chum Lines author Capt. Mark Sampson reported a couple interesting encounters. First was a pair of great white sharks on the same trip. The first was estimated at 13' and about 2,000 pounds. The 2nd one appeared to be about 10' and ~500 lbs. On another trip his angler caught and released an ~7' smooth hammer head shark while fly fishing! Rich Daiker on the "Delicious" was trolling the Chicken Bone hoping to raise a thresher shark. No luck there, but the crew did release an estimated 150 lb. mako. Our last





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shark encounter was reported by Derrick William. He and his family were fishing the suds on Assateague Island and caught and released a 6'-8' sand tiger shark using a tuna head for bait. It was the only bite for the day.


Rounding out the week were a couple notable catches. The report of the first wahoo caught for the season came to us from Josh Short of Smyrna, DE. He found the 53 lb. speedster in the Poor Man's Canyon. Our avid angler friends Tracey Heltzinger and Dean Miller dropped by the office to share a unique catch they had on the "Restless Lady". They were fishing for tilefish and sea bass when Tracey reeled up a bright orange swallowtail bass!

As of Monday when I write this report, the weather in the canyons looks good for the weekend. That should mean lots of action during the 3rd Annual Tuna & Tiaras Ladies Tuna Tournament. Weigh-ins will be at the Ocean City Fishing Center right by Mickey Fins.

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

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OCEAN CITY FISHING REPORT by Capt. BJ Pietryak

The winds have finally slowed down and made for pretty calm conditions on the ocean. The wild fires in Canada brought us smoky and foggy type days making anglers travel slower than usual to reach their destinations safely. Sea bass is still a little slow compared to past years, however, the flounder and blues are coming on strong.

Sea Bass & Flounder Near Shore

Near shore fishing has been pretty consistent with decent catches of sea bass and a few flounder thrown into the mix. Averages of 10 keeper fish to limits is common. Deeper water and jig fishing is producing the best results. Kevin Twilley, the Captain of "Fish Bound Charters" reported he was glad to see calmer seas after all the northeast wind we have had for the past several weeks. The anglers pulled in some nice

limits of sea bass as well as their first flounder of the year. Kevin stated that as the seas calm down they will start to target flounder, but for now they will stick with their limits on sea bass. They managed limits on both morning and afternoon trips.

The "Restless Lady" gave the tuna a break and stayed inshore for sea bass. The crew had limits of bass. The "Judith M" said the fishing has been great on their 8 hour trips. The "Ocean City Girl Charters" was out fishing for bass and enjoying the calmer days. They had a group from the Pittsburgh area and the bass were more than willing to cooperate. The group got their 7 man limit of 105 keepers. That is an impressive haul. Great job guys!

The "Ocean Princess" had its first triggerfish. The crew reported decent catches of bass during the week. Korale Filipaik


from Dayton, Ohio, caught the triggerfish for the boat. For any anglers that have never had this, the meat is very thick and firm, and has a taste much like halibut. The skin on a trigger is a cross between the toughness of leather and steel. Many anglers including myself have a special knife just to fillet this specie. After one fish the knife will usually need to be resharpened.


"Double Trouble Charters" took some time off from their tuna trips to catch a few sea bass and were rewarded with several nice fish. Pulling up two fish at a time was commonplace with at least one fish being a keeper. "Line Dancer" was out with captain Lance Beisecker, Karen Biesecker along with Faith & Josh Rosenberg, and managed a few keeper flounder. Their biggest fish was 17.5 inches. Pat DeGroodt decided to stay close to land, fishing structure

on Gull Reef. He pulled in a couple fluke and then realized he needed longer arms when he pulled in a few king sized sheepshead. He was fishing with sand fleas when the big fish decided it was time to eat. Many anglers don't realize the amount of sheepshead we have here on the near shore wrecks. Up in Delaware Bay on the breakwalls they are very common, but the wrecks of Ocean City hold many sheep as well as triggerfish for those looking for them. Small circle hooks and sand fleas are your best rigs, although using a sheepshead style jig is also very productive. Remember, these fish have small mouths and will not usually go after big baits on big hooks. Bigger is not always better.

Back Bay Areas

The back bays of Ocean City have been very productive and continue to get even better as the water warms. The 2 hour headboats are beginning to run their charters on a regular basis. The "Miss Ocean City" was out last week and had several good trips for the bay flounder.





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"Bottom Bouncer Fishing" was also out targeting the flat fish for their clients. These back bay trips are usually shorter than the ocean trips and a great way to see the bay areas of OC. Many boats fish behind Assateague Island, allowing you to catch a glimpse at the wild ponies on the island while at the same time catching a delicious dinner. Jeff and Adylynn Dunlap caught 2 fluke using the deadly double rigs. They fished on their boat named the "Reel-Lee". 9 years young John Lawrence from Hanover, PA caught a 19 inch fish in the East Channel on a Gulp minnow combo. He fished with his sons Greg and Dave and his grandson Dylan. John caught another keeper in the Thorofare. The area to the north near Ocean Pines has also been producing better fishing. The channels are warming up and more fish are being caught. As warmer temps are predicted for the upcoming week, this would be the spot I would try.

Surf Fishing

Assateague Island beaches are still producing some quality

stripers early in the morning as well as just at and after sundown. Most of these fish will not fit in the new slot limit and will have to be released, but they're still a great fish on light tackle. I did not hear of many drum being caught on the island, but I'm sure a few black as well as red drum are still hanging around. Eric Field got one of the bigger rockfish that the island is known for, but being over the 31 inch limit the fish was returned to swim another day. If you are looking for a hard fighting fish, tossing a chunk of bunker or a big circle hook loaded with surf clam, it may be the ticket to a fish of a lifetime.

Ryan Mende was on the MD beaches, but stated that the skates and rays were too aggressive. He enjoyed catching numerous rays but did not manage to catch anything else. Dale Thomas was near 133rd Street and managed to catch a couple blues and a dogfish shark on a 10 lb. test line with small hooks. He was surprised the hook held on the shark.

The headboat "Tortuga" based at the Bahia Marina had a good day fishing the Ocean City Bays. This trip saw a nice mix of keeper flounder.





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Chum Lines by Capt. Mark Sampson

A while back I had a speaking engagement at an area fishing club and on a last minute whim, before we got into our discussion on "fishing," I asked the group if they had any questions or comments about chartering a fishing boat or hiring fishing guide. Knowing that many of the folks in the room did a lot of charter fishing I figured this might lead to an interesting discussion. And since I'm a captain and guide myself, I knew this would be an opportunity for the group to get the answers to questions they've wondered about but maybe felt awkward asking the captains or guides they usually fish with.

As it turned out the topic was a hit, lots of good questions, discussions, and afterwards a number of the club members approached me to say that they were glad to hear openly from someone in the industry. It was enlightening for me too. Usually I'm talking to my own clients who (understandably) temper their thoughts and opinions to keep from asking awkward questions or maybe from hurting my feelings. It was interesting to hear

uncensored comments from fishermen about both the good and bad trips they've been on.

When, and how much to tip the mate or guide was the biggest topic of discussion. When it was put to me, I responded that 15-20% of the trip price is an average tip on most boats. But those percentages don't necessarily apply to all boats in all places so I highly recommend that, when booking the trip anglers ask the captain how much they should tip the mate and then just figure that number in when calculating their total charter price for the day.

Tips should never be lower than what's recommended unless the anglers feel that service was lacking, and if that's the case the clients should tell the captain why they weren't happy so he can either defend the actions of his mate or take corrective measures for future charters.

On a charter boat, the mate is always expected to be tipped, but the captain is only sometimes tipped and certainly isn't going to feel insulted if he (or she) isn't. On guided trips, where there is only a captain and no mate, the captain should usually be tipped.

Someone asked how to tip if there aren't any (or very few) fish caught. I reminded the group that no matter how good a fisherman someone might be, or how hard they try, there will always be days when the fish simply won't bite. Crew members usually work their hardest on these days because they're constantly trying new baits or lures, moving from one place to another, contacting other boats for reports from locations, reviewing charts and logs, and enduring an extra measure of stress as they try to pull off a decent catch before the day is over. By all means, even if not a single fish is caught, as long as an honest effort was made to find and catch fish - standard tips should still be paid.

Someone else asked about where and how to choose a captain or guide. No matter where in the world someone plans to fish, finding a list of captains and guides for a particular area is as simple as doing an Internet search. These

days it's hard to find a charter service that doesn't have a their own website or who isn't at least listed on someone else's. Of course anglers must remember that while websites are wonderful sources of information, they are also advertising tools for businesses and almost always going to be choc-full of pictures of smiling fishermen holding up big fish and commentary slanted to make you think that "on our boat the sea is always calm and the fish are always biting!"

I've seen websites where the photos used were of fish caught from other boats, and text that makes even inexperienced captains sound as if they're the ones who invented fishing! Websites are great tools for finding out who and what boats are available in certain areas, but anglers should not make a decision based exclusively on what they see and read on their computer monitor. Once someone finds a captain, boat, or guide that peaks their interest, it's then time to start the "research" process.

I would suggest that anglers start by first calling the captain or guide. The initial conversation will alert the caller as to what the booking schedule looks like and if there's even a day available that might work. Talking to the one who is going to be running the



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show will also alert fishermen as to whether or not he (or she) is the type of person that they, and maybe their friends or family, actually want to spend a day on the water with. Face it, captains and guides are just "people," and within any group of people there's going to be a representative sample of jerks just as well as there will be a bunch of really good and pleasant people.

Because boats can be run by both idiots and Einsteins, it's up to the "buyer to beware" and book with the type of person they want to spend their hard-earned money and welldeserved leisure time with. One of the best ways to choose a captain or guide is after a close friend or acquaintance that has been out with them before tells you of the great time they had. There are a lot of successful charter captains and guides who live by the referrals they get from their past and present customers. Talking to the captain, and to folks who have fished with him before, as well as those who work in local tackle shops and marinas should help give the angler a pretty good understanding of what kind of fishing operation he runs and what his personality is like.

It's also good to talk to the captain or guide ahead of time so that the two of you can agree on what the goals of the trip are going to be. If you have your heart set on catching a marlin and don't want to waste time messing with dolphin or tuna, let him know days ahead of time so that he can start working-up a game plan to accomplish your goal. Likewise, if the target species is sharks but you would also like to drop some lines down to a wreck to catch a couple sea bass for dinner, have that discussion with him when you're booking the trip, not part-way through your fishing day and then end up blaming him for not having the right sea bass bait aboard or not being within striking distance of a fishable wreck.

Also, when booking a trip be sure and give your captain or guide an idea of what your fishing party will be like. Are they all somewhat experienced - or not at all? Will there be women or children in the group? Fill him in as best as possible and then listen to him if he makes suggestions or tells you that the crew you're bringing may not be appropriate for the type of fishing you're requesting. For instance, a family with mom, dad and three kids are going to have a problem on offshore trips when the primary catch is 100-pound tuna, however, near shore trolling for king mackerel and bluefish might

be just perfect.

With fuel prices hitting alltime highs, charter prices have risen to levels where for most folks it's probably more important than ever to milk every bit of enjoyment possible from charter or guided fishing trips. A little research and a few phone calls can be the difference between fishing-fun and fishing-flop! §

Garlic Herb Tuna Steak Marinade

Ingredients:

2 - 4 tuna steaks

Marinade:

1/3 cup olive oil

1 tablespoon honey

1 tablespoon minced garlic

1 tablespoon finely chopped cilantro

1 tablespoon finely chopped parsley

1 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon cumin

1/2 teaspoon coarsely cracked black pepper - or ½ teaspoon ground pepper

½ teaspoon smoked paprika

Juice of 1/2 lemon - about 2 tablespoons

Directions:

Combine all of the marinade ingredients and whisk vigorously.



Place tuna steaks in a gallon ziploc bag. Add the marinade, toss to coat the tuna steaks, press out excess air and seal (if using ziploc bag).

Transfer to the fridge and chill for 30 minutes.

Grill 6-8 minutes on each side until easily flaked with a fork and

center of tuna steak is just barely pink. Internal temperature should read 90-95 degrees when done. Alternately, steaks can be seared in a skillet over medium-high heat, or broiled in the oven at 400 degrees.

Flounder with Lemon Butter Sauce

Ingredients:

Four (4- to 6-ounce) 1/2-inch-thick (not frozen) flounder fillets (or substitute sole, snapper, catfish, tilapia, or any thin white fish)

1/2 teaspoon kosher salt

1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper

1 teaspoon or so all-purpose flour* (optional)

2 tablespoons mild vegetable oil

3 tablespoons (1 1/2 oz) unsalted butter cut into 4 slices

Juice of 1 lemon (about 1/4 cup)

2 tablespoons finely chopped fresh herbs such as basil, chives, and/or flat-leaf parsley

Directions:

www.coastalfisherman.net towels and dusting them with just a tiny bit of flour.

Heat the oil in a large skillet (preferably cast-iron or stainless steel rather than nonstick) over medium-high heat until the oil shimmers but isn't smoking, 1 1/2 to 2 minutes. Add the fillets to the skillet and cook, without moving, for 2 minutes. Slide a thin metal spatula underneath the fillets (making sure to use a little pressure to scrape up any of the golden crust that may be sticking to the bottom) and carefully flip the fish. If it seems impossible to slip the spatula beneath the fillet and the skillet, wait 30 to 60 seconds or so and try again. The fish will release when it's readyand only when it's ready.

Note: You may be tempted to pull out your nonstick skillet, but to get that coveted crisp crust, you're better off with a heavy-bottomed stainless steel pan.

Place a slice of butter on top of each fish fillet and stand idly by as the butter melts and infuses the fish with flavor. Cook the fish until it springs back from light pressure, about 2 minutes. Use a spatula to transfer the fish to a platter or to 4 plates.

Carefully squeeze the lemon juice into the skillet and, with the skillet still over medium-high heat, use



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Pat the fish dry with paper towels and season with salt and pepper. Pat the fillets dry a second time just to be sure to remove all the moisture. If desired, sprinkle a little flour over both sides of the fillets and use your fingers to evenly coat both sides.

Note: The key to crisp perfection is to make sure the fillets are extra dry by patting them with paper a wooden spoon to scrape up any browned bits stuck to the bottom of the skillet. Stir in the fresh herbs and spoon the sauce over the fish.

Speckled Trout in Capers and White Wine

Ingredients:

1 pound fresh speckled trout 2 tablespoons butter

- 1 teaspoon capers
- 1 pinch paprika, or to taste ¼ cup white cooking wine
- 1 teaspoon minced fresh parsley, or to taste



Directions:

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Line a baking dish with aluminum foil.

Place trout in the middle of the aluminum foil; top with butter, lemon pepper, capers, and paprika. Pour cooking wine over trout. Close foil around the trout.

Bake in the preheated oven until

fish flakes easily with a fork, about 30 minutes. Garnish trout with parsley.

Cheesy Hot Crab Dip

Ingredients:

8 ounces cream cheese softened

1/3 cup sour cream

1/4 cup mayonnaise

1 teaspoon Old Bay Seasoning

1/2 teaspoon garlic powder

1/2 teaspoon seasoned salt or to taste

2 green onions thinly sliced

8 ounces lump crab meat

1 cup cheddar cheese shredded, divided

Baguette for serving

Directions:

Preheat oven to 375°F.

Combine cream cheese, sour cream, mayonnaise, old bay, seasoned salt, and garlic powder in a bowl. Mix on medium speed until fluffy.

Add green onions, crab meat and half of the cheddar cheese. Gently fold until incorporated.

Spread into a 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ QT dish (8x8").



Top with remaining cheese and bake 15-20 minutes or until melted and bubbly.

Serve with toasted baguette.

Whole Sea Bass Roasted with Potatoes & Thyme

Ingredients:

2 pounds baby Yukon Gold potatoes, halved

18 small cipollini onions or large shallots, peeled and quartered

3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil

12 sprigs of thyme

Kosher salt

Freshly ground black pepper

- 2 (2-pound) cleaned whole sea bass
- 1 lemon, thinly sliced, plus a lemon half, for squeezing
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped parsley


Directions:

Preheat the oven to 425°F and line a large, rimmed baking sheet with parchment paper.

In a bowl, toss the potatoes and onions with 1 1/2 tablespoons of the olive oil and 4 thyme sprigs, and season with salt and pepper. Spread on a large rimmed baking sheet and roast for 20 minutes, until the potatoes are blistered in spots and barely tender.

Rub both fish all over with the remaining 1 1/2 tablespoons of oil; season generously with salt. Stuff the cavities with the lemon slices and the remaining 8 thyme sprigs. Stir the potatoes, pushing them toward the sides, and set the fish on the baking sheet. Roast for 30 minutes, until the fish are just cooked through and the potatoes and onions are tender.

Transfer the potatoes and onions to a platter. Using two forks, pull the skin off the top of the fish







and discard. Remove the fillets from the bones and transfer to the platter. Squeeze the lemon juice over the fish, potatoes and onions, sprinkle with the parsley and serve.

Tuna Tartare

Ingredients:

- 1 lb fresh tuna sushi grade
- 1 teaspoon fresh ginger
- 1 1/2 tablespoons soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons lime juice freshly squeezed
- 1 1/2 tablespoons sesame oil
- 1 tablespoon sesame seeds to serve

1 large green onion finely sliced, to serve

Directions:

Slice your tuna into ¼-inch cubes and place them in a mixing bowl.

In a small bowl, whisk together the ginger, soy sauce, lime juice and sesame oil until combined.

Pour the sauce over the tuna and gently mix until incorporated.

Transfer into serving bowls and sprinkle with the chopped chives and toasted sesame seeds.

To Store: Keep it in an air-tight container, refrigerated, for up to two days. Do not consume raw fish if kept longer than three days.

To Freeze: Do not freeze tuna tartare or raw tuna, as it will become rubbery and yield a foul smell once thawed.



What Time Is It?

Let's review a popular during fishing topic tournaments - Time of day. While many crew many not wear a watch while fishing, keeping track of the correct time is even more critical during a tournament. With so many electronic gadgets supplying the time, we expect the time we see to be correct and synchronized between all devices. marine Chartplotter GPS, as with most modern devices, time keeping it needs to be properly programmed to your location for the proper time zone and day light savings time. Many of us on a boat have come to rely on the time on the chartplotter or related device for the proper time.

How does a GPS Chartplotter know the correct time?

These chartplotters receive the time-of-day from the GPS satellites. In addition

longitude, latitude, and altitude, the Global Positioning System (GPS) provides a critical fourth dimension - time. Each **GPS** satellite contains multiple clocks atomic that contribute very precise time data to the GPS signals. GPS receivers decode these signals, to the UTC standard and effectively synchronizing each GPS receiver to the world's atomic clocks. This enables users to determine the exact time-of-day to within 100 billionths of a second, without the cost of owning and operating atomic clocks.

The manufacturers of these GPS receivers' generally automate the device's time settings, allowing the time to be automatically adjusted based on your boat's GPS location, just like a smart phone. Seems like a good idea, right? Well many of the devices may be too smart; they know when your boat moves into a

different time zone or time of year and even when it has exceeded the coastal 12 mile territorial waters of the USA. Once beyond the 12 mile coastal limit, Chartplotter the often automatically eliminates the daylight savings time (subtracting one hour in the summer) on the way to the distant fishing grounds and then adding back the one hour on the return trip to port, at that same 12 mile territorial water limit.

The best way to deal with this issue and synchronize the vessels time to the same time zone at port is to manually configure the time zone (or offset) of your GPS display systems. Often, the time of day menu on the chartplotter has a setting for display format and offset adjustment from UTC. Keeping the same time at sea and at port will also allow your calculated ETA to be correct. Here in Maryland during the summer, the time zone is -4

www.coastalfisherman.net (minus 4 hours) from UTC.

The Garmin chartplotter devices seem to need manual time zone configuration more than other brands since they default to the automatic time zone settings for simplicity. The steps below are for the most popular current Garmin devices, other brands may be similar.

Start from the Home screen
Select Configure/Settings
Select Preferences
Select Units
Select Time
Select Time Zone

GMT or UTC?

Select Custom

Many of us once referenced time based on Greenwich Mean Time (GMT).

GMT is actually a time zone in England that also happens to be the same as UTC. The Universal Time Coordinated (UTC) is an international standard referenced around the world. UTC is an atomic timescale; it usually has 86,400 seconds per day but is kept within 0.9 seconds of the mean solar time as by the introduction of




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occasional leap seconds. If you are curious, there are currently 37 worldwide time zones, with some zones 30 or 45 minute intervals as compared to the traditional one hour differentials based 1 hour per 15 degrees longitude.

If you are using a digital video camera or still camera (especially in tournaments) be sure you check and set the devices time so the images timestamp is correct with the time zone and season.

Setting your ships clocks and devices to the correct time will allow you to be sure you start and stop fishing at the correct time, fill out the catch reports properly and have the correct estimated time of arrival (ETA) for your trip.§

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DELANARE FISHING REPORT by Capt. BJ Pietryak

This past week in Delaware we finally saw a slowing to the winds and many anglers went out to fish the ocean. Sea bass remains spotty with an average of 6-10 keepers per person, per trip. Flounder has really come alive in the ocean, although a lot of small fish are still on the wrecks. The surf is holding some nice sized blues with a few rockfish and drum in the surf.

Sea Bass, Flounder & Near Shore Wrecks

Sea bass has started to pick up from past weeks, with lots of fish both on the reefs as well as the coral grounds. Many of these fish are undersized and must be returned. The average angler is coming home with around 10 keepers for a full day. Mark McCormick of Bethany

They will be finishing out their sea bass and flounder trips soon and changing over to tuna for the rest of the summer. "Get The Gaff Charters" also had a couple of good days on the Bass Grounds. They had to weed though a lot of short fish but managed a nice full cooler to bring home to Lewes Harbour Marina.

"Bad Wind Charters" returned to the docks after enjoying the calmer seas with a boat load of sea bass for their anglers. They said they will be searching for more of the flat fish as the season continues.

The "Angler" had several good trips this past week with their clients pulling in the best size fish they have seen all of this early season. A few flounder also found their way onto the boat, however, the amount of flatties haven't reached the true summer time normal numbers. Hook'Em and Cook'em Bait & Tackle reports that "Horizon Charters" came in with a boat load limit of flounder. They had 16 flatties, one sea bass, and one bluefish. Tim Yerkes had the big fish at 23.5 inches and 4.9 pounds. Great job guys. "Surface Tension Charters" returned to the docks in Lewes with a load of sea bass. Ethan, April, Scott and Brittany pulled in a full cooler of fish. That's a lot of tasty meals.

Ryan West was out slaying fish again this week and returned home with a limit of sea bass. Ryan also got a big spadefish as a reward for his hard work.

Back Bays & Lewes Canal

The back bays remain consistent

with quality fish brought back to the docks. The hot spots are Lewes Canal approaching the high tide and the Indian River Inlet area. Tim Goodman was fishing the inlet around a slack tide and managed a 19 ³/₄ inch fluke weighing in at 2.86 lbs. while his mother got a 17.5 inch, 1.91 lb. fish. Both fish were caught on the top hook teaser with a minnow.

"Flip N Fins" hooked a flounder and a few bluefish near the inlet last week. Anthony Puglisi was out and got himself two nice fluke in the back bays.

Tom Passwater and crew managed an impressive 6 pack of keepers in the Lewes Canal. This year the canal has been very productive.

Buddy Brewer of Dagsboro caught himself a fat 25 inch, 5.6 pounder near the inlet. Minnow and squid strip combos are accounting for many of the keeper fish in the bays.

Jake Wilkins was fishing the Lewes Canal and was surprised when he landed a trophy 26 inch, 8 pound 10 ounce flattie. Great job on a spectacular fish!

Leon Zimmerman and friends headed out and got their limit of big fluke. Strips of squid and big bucktails were the ticket in getting these fish to bite. Brady Mills got his first keeper of the year using LHM squid, shiner and a bucktail. The fish measured 18 inches. All the more reason to take a kid fishing... they always seem to catch the biggest ones.

Ralph had bragging rights when he caught a nice 26.5 inch, 6.5 lb. fish while fishing near Steamboat Landing in the bay.

Aidan Hudson used the famous Nik Rigs and got two nice keepers from the canal. FISHING REPORT by Capt. Matt Abell

We on the Eastern Shore are truly blessed. A week with light winds and calm seas have redeemed us from the plague of northeasterly gusts which kept our boats moored, reels silent, and hopes subdued, like water in a blow out ebb tide.

With the return of clean, clear water comes the smiles and bent rods of the seaside flounder fisherman. The last of the flood and the first of the ebb have provided the most productive setting for extreme Eastern Shore floundering. Silversides coupled with Gulp on Sea Hawk flounder rigs have been the ticket as a good number of fantastic flounder fillets were served

on the dinner tables of those who cherish the pursuit of these spoils of the seaside shallows. The standard colors of white, chartreuse, and pink remain the reining champs. However, the Gulp Salmon Red (blaze orange) has also added to the boat side excitement.

We at Sea Hawk Sport other Fishing among steadfast anglers, continue our quest for tenacious trophies of the Tangier. This week we were lucky enough to take several groups out to enjoy the treasures of the Chesapeake while casting a mix of Rapala, mirrolure and the shores own paddle from the quality manufactures of Old Skool,

and RumbleFish. specs have been limited in numbers, the quality has been world class. The spotted shallow water scrappers have been secluded to grassv creek mouths where baitfish and shedding crabs are prevalent. Elsewhere on submerged structure, a mix of rock and blues have provided screaming drags and big smiles. We have had blues 18"-25" come over the gunwale and rock to nearly 30" fill the net. A rap-10 burned over the top of nearly any rock pile in the central Chesapeake is subject to be attacked by one of these predacious predators that will make a rod bend and a grown man www.coastalfisherman.net forget about the trials and tribulations of life.

The lower bay has seen a good number of reds and sheepshead take the bait as anglers get ready for the opening of cobia next week. A chunk of bunker on a fish finder rig is all that's needed to dance with the man in the brown suit. This years regs include a minimum size limit of 40" total length and 1 fish per person, with no more than 2 fish per vessel. Only one of the 2 fish may exceed 50".

The deep blue of the Atlantic off Chincoteague have yielded a pretty good yellowfin bite on the troll in the canyons. Ballyhoo trolled on teasers like islander trackers have lured some of these pelagic prey to the dinner table. It won't be long before we can consistently add mahi and billfish to the targeted tally




