



Ocean City Fishing Report

What a fantastic week of fishing, both in the bay and in the Canyons. It's hard to say who had a better week. flounder fishermen or those chasing yellowfin and bigeye The scales tuna. were extremely busy and the fish cleaners looked like Edward Scissorhands.

Flounder

The flounder bite in the bay behind Assateague was on fire last week. It all started on Tuesday, when anglers on the charter boat, "Lucky Break" returned to the dock with an amazing 21 flounder in the box. The key was finding clean water, which is what Capt. Jason Mumford did behind Castaway's Campground and further south. The grass coming off the shallows in the middle of the bay behind drifted Assateague north during the outgoing tide, making the water south of the shallows nice and clean.

All throughout the week, we saw flounder charter boats routinely coming back with great catches of 8 or more flatties. However, the action wasn't limited to charter boats. On Saturday, Paul Bucha landed a 26 1/2-incher behind the OC Airport on a Gulp! Swimming Mullet. The fish weighed 6 lbs. 8 oz.

There was also a good bite in the Thorofare last weekend.



On Friday, the crew aboard the "Keep Er' Wet" had an incredible day when they headed out early to 150-300 fathoms in the Baltimore Canyon and caught 11 yellowfins (9 pictured) totaling 600 lbs, before heading back to the dock at 11:00 AM. Pictured at Sunset Marina are Brian Leader, Ronnie Hall, Sean Fisher and Capt. Dave Sumpter.

Several boats on Saturday had catches of 5 or more flounder with anglers on the "Oasis" ending up with 13 in the cooler after drifting squid and minnows. Earlier in the week, anglers on the "My Three Sons" were drifting live minnows on the west end of the Thorofare where Jack Walker caught himself a 25inch, 5 lb. 3 oz. flattie.

Good flounder action was also seen in the East Channel, north of the Rt. 50 Bridge. Jeff Schmidt of West Ocean City reported an excellent bite for flounder fishermen off the 2nd-4th Street Bulkhead on Saturday morning. The largest flounder so far this year was caught in the East Channel last Monday by Tina Poole on the charter boat, "Get Sum" when she boated an 8 lb. 13 oz. flattie.

White or chartreuse Gulp! Swimming Mullet is the top flounder bait right now, but live minnows and squid are also producing nice catches.

Striped Bass

The only striper action seems to be around the Rt. 50 Although anglers Bridge. continue to catch fish too small

www.coastalfisherman.net to keep, a few larger linesiders are being pulled out of the pilings as well.

Billfish

On Sunday, numerous reports of white marlin releases, and even more white marlin sightings came from boats fishing in the Baltimore Canyon.

We also saw the first blue marlin release of the year when, on Monday, an angler on the "Boss Hogg" released a blue, estimated at 500 lbs., in 300 fathoms in the Baltimore. Another blue marlin was released on Saturday by Mike Runk, Sr. who was also fishing on the "Boss Hogg". Mike's blue marlin was estimated at 450 lbs. and was hooked in the Baltimore Canyon.

The first swordfish of the season came in on Saturday morning after an overnight trip by the charter boat, "Jade II". The 62 1/2-inch swordie weighed 108 lbs. and was caught on a mackerel bait in 300 fathoms in the Baltimore.

Tuna

The star of the offshore show last week had to be yellowfin tuna, but large bigeyes also had folks at the scales very excited.

Big catches of yellowfin tuna started on Wednesday when the charter boat, "Moore Bills" returned with 17 in the box. Capt. Rob had his anglers slightly south of the Baltimore Canyon and caught the fish on the troll (no greensticking). Although a catch of 17 yellowfins would constitute a great day in anyone's book, the class of fish put it at the exceptional level. The 17 yellowfins totalled 914 lbs. which gives them an average

weight of 53.75 lbs. On Thursday, the charter boat, "Marli" took off for the

Baltimore Canyon and ended up with 16 yellowfins with the largest tipping the scale at 62 lbs. Nice quality fish!

Speaking of quality fish, a great catch came in on Friday when anglers on the "Keep Er' Wet" caught 11 yellowfins totaling just over 600 lbs, giving them an average of almost 55 pounds.

The yellowfin bite slowed on Saturday and really took a nosedive on Sunday. There were a ton of boats in the Baltimore Canyon on both days and a few of those boats had better luck moving just south of the fleet.

The largest yellowfin came in on Friday when Howard Todd on the "Fintimidator" boated an 83.3 pounder in 100 fathoms in the Baltimore.

We also saw some nice bigeye tuna arrive at the scale throughout the week. Monday, the "Game Over" had a 64-inch, 178.5 lb. eyeball from 650 fathoms in the Baltimore

Canyon. That same day, the "Skattebol" weighed a 185 lb. eyeball and the "Magic Moment" boated a 67-inch, 202 pounder around the 800/800.

In the M.S.S.A. Tunament several bigeyes arrived at the scale. On Friday, the "Lady Luck" showed up with a pair caught in the Washington Canyon. The tunas weighed 151.8 and 172.7 lbs. Also on Friday, the "Skint Back" weighed a 168.4 pounder. These fish were in the top three until Sunday when the "Top Dog" decked a pair of bigeyes weighing 211.7 and 222.1 lbs., caught in 200 fathoms in the Washington Canyon. Right behind them was the "Wet Dreams" with a 180.6 lb. eyeball caught in 265 fathoms in the Washington Canyon.

Overall, it tremendous week of tuna fishing!

Sharks

Although the water is warming up into the low 70's, we still saw a few makos hit the scales last week. Saturday, the "Jade II" killed a

153 pounder during their overnight trip in the Baltimore and the "Rippin Lip" caught a 134 pounder in 120 fathoms, also in the Baltimore.

Sea Bass

Sea bass fishing has been inconsistent on ocean structure. Some of the historical hot spots produced excellent catches of knotheads while other, normally reliable spots, produced goose eggs.

The charter boat, "Fish Bound" did have a fantastic day on Saturday when Mike Matha and his buddies caught 57 triggerfish, 23 sea bass, a spadefish and a flounder on Winter Quarter Shoal.

Upcoming Tournament

There isn't a local tournament this weekend in Ocean City, so the next event is the 32nd Annual Ocean City Marlin Club Canyon Kick-off on July 4th, 5th and 6th. Weigh-ins are at Sunset Marina. For more information, call the Marlin Club at 410-213-1613.





Driftin' Easy

- by Sue Foster



"I want to go surf fishing, but I don't know what to fish for?"

It's that time of year where you still have the chance to catch a nice striper if you get up early and put in some time. But it's also the time of year, you can get up at the break of bait up dawn, bloodworms and/or Fishbite Bloodworms on a smaller kingfish rig and catch tasty kingfish! Dusk and after dark may give you another chance at a striper or some shark action if you use larger hooks and a big chunk of bait. It's also the time of year you may get into some early season croaker or more of those tasty kingfish if you keep your rig and baits smaller!

To top it off, bluefish are periodically coming through the surf for anglers using finger mullet on whole finger mullet rigs! What to do? What to do?

First of all, if you are in a group, try two or three different rigs and baits! See what's biting the best, and if one thing is definitely happening, it's time to change up! Many anglers do the two surf rod trick. Cast one longer rod out as far as you can with a big chunk of bunker or other fish head and let it sit out there.

Secure your rod in a sand spike and be sure to set your drag! Next, take a shorter, lighter surf rod in the 7 to 9-foot range and tie on a pre-made kingfish surf rig and cast close to the breakers with little strips of squid or a combination bait of real bloodworm, Fishbite Bloodworm, Fishbite Orange Crab and/or a little strip of squid. I just love combination baits and rarely put just one bait on the hook. Even if it is a little hook, I like to use two baits! When surf fishing, I like to use the box Calamari squid over the thick, pre-cut stuff. It's more work, but I truly believe it has more real scent with the black ink in the package. Plus, it's American! The tube squid cut to make strips is from overseas and well processed I'm sure!

If you have 3 or 4 guys fishing, someone should try finger mullet on a whole finger mullet rig for bluefish. These rigs are really nifty and you do not even have to cut your bait. Mullet rigs are made out of a wire shaft so you can detach a double hook, slide the mullet up on a wire rod, and then attach the double hook back on. The double hook hangs close to the butt of the mullet,

so when the bluefish comes along and takes a bite, it "hopefully" gets a mouthful of hook! Be sure to buy extra hooks at the tackle store as well! If you lose the hook, the rig is useless! There are a couple of different varieties of these, so get the clerks in the tackle store to show you how to use them.

I find that when the bluefish are running small, you can throw your rig back out if the bluefish eats ¾ or ½ of your mullet. But if the bluefish leaves only the head, take it off and start over. If the blues are

stealing your bait, keep the rod in your hand, and slowly, ever so slowly, bring your rig back towards shore. The blues will see the bait going away, get aggressive, and more likely you will get the hook in the fish. If you feel a tug, give the rod a tug! That's fishing! Set the hook!

"What else can you catch with a whole finger mullet on a mullet rig besides bluefish?"

Sometimes you will pick up a striper, shark, ray or even a flounder! Generally, you will not catch something small like

a croaker, spot or kingfish.

If you have a top and bottom type surf rig with medium-sized hooks, you can bait finger mullet a different way! Take the finger mullet and cut it into one-inch chunks. I throw away the head and the tail and just use the chunks. Hook them through the dark upper part of the mullet that is tougher than the belly. If you are REALLY good with a sharp fillet knife you can fillet the finger mullet and use a strip of bait. This really works well, but you need a sharp knife. Flounder in the surf love a strip of mullet fillet dangling off the hook!

Bunker is one of the most popular baits in the surf during the spring and early summer for stripers and sharks. You can use big chunks on big hooks or you can scale down and put smaller chunks on puppy drum rigs, high-low bluefish rigs or a variety of rigs to catch almost anything. Even kingfish like little strips of bunker fillets if you are good

with a sharp knife. Combo it with a piece of bloodworm or Fishbite Bloodworm to help hold it on the hook. Fish Bites have white mesh in them that help hold the other bait on!

Bloodworms in the summer for surf fishing always works during the day. After dark, it's not quite as effective. Some anglers are tickled to death to skip the real bloodworms and use Fishbite Bloodworms or even Fishbite Orange Crab or Clam! Regardless, if you use bloodworm or bloodworm alternative, you want to keep your hook size in the small realm or you could be wasting precious bloodworms! Premade kingfish rigs are the way to go, and if the store has them with sturdier hooks, you can pay a little more, but not lose a big fish on a small hook! Ask the clerks! If you use just the Fishbites, change them occasionally if they start to wash out. Again, I like to combo them with a little strip of squid, fresh spot caught in the surf, finger mullet fillet or cut bluefish fillet. Mix it up.

Even try a piece of shrimp or clam in the summer along with your Fishbites!

Be attentive. Hold your rod in your hand if you are using small baits, in close. Set the hook. And play around with

your rigs and bait! Good fishing....

Delaware Fishing Report

by Larry Jock



Joe Morris at Lewes Harbour Marina said offshore action was pretty good. The Poor Man's Canyon yielded tuna early in the week, but it seemed like the Baltimore Canyon was more productive later on. Trevor Paradyscz, Rich Owen and John Kenyon trolled in the Poor Man's on Tuesday for a pair of yellowfins weighing up to 48.4 pounds, then bailed 20 gaffer dolphin around floating gear. Keith Orendorf, Shawn Gallagher, Donnie Weitzel and John Goodwin trolled spreader bars at the tip of the Baltimore Canyon on Monday afternoon and got covered up with five yellowfins at once. Despite a tangled spiderweb of lures,, they landed them all. Geoff Klopp and Frank Stiles fished with Captain Chris Irelan aboard the "April First" on Friday. They pulled green spreader bars at the west wall of the Baltimore Canyon for 7 hefty yellowfins from 50 to 64.6 pounds. Geoff noted there were hammerheads in the area, and whenever the boat was near a shark on the surface, they got a tuna bite. Captain Ed Sigda, Mike Fritz and Bill Fintel overnighted at the east wall of Baltimore Canyon on Friday aboard the "Snow Goose", where they trolled up 3 yellowfins at dusk and into the darkness. At night, tinker mackerel were incredibly thick around the boat, and the guys tangled with hammerheads which they released, and a 108 pound make subdued by senior

member Bill. Bill also boated a 50 pound yellowfin that grabbed a live tinker on a spinning rod. Matt Baker released his first white marlin in the Baltimore on

Saturday. Captain Bill Swords and his buddies on "Swords Fish" trolled in the Baltimore's Bight on Sunday afternoon, where a pack of yellowfins www.coastalfisherman.net

pounced on green machine spreader bars in the boat's wake. Bill, Chris Gastwirt, Tommy Fitzgerald and Douglas Miles ended up with 4 tuna in the 50 to 60 pound range and a pair of white marlin releases.

Canyon bottom bouncing was consistent this past week. Ronnie Baker, Brad Clark and Jim Clark drifted the edge of the Baltimore and put 18 golden tiles weighing up to 25 pounds in the box. Geoff McCloskey, Joey DelAversano, Bill Coates and Steve Matthews dropped in the Baltimore on Saturday for a nice catch of goldens up to 27 pounds. Captain Saturday group on "Katydid" bounced bottom in the Baltimore for a big load of blueline tiles, along with some of the Golden variety. Tom Birago boated an impressive pair of grey tile weighing 15.1 and 16 pounds on that trip.

Back inshore, flounder fishermen had mixed results on the Old Grounds. Days with good conditions served up some decent catches. Flukers aboard the "Katydid" got into flatties on Wednesday, returning with 17 keepers, including a brace of 5 pounders for Ron Mistretta. Wes Grove and John Santana worked jigs tipped with cut bait over the Old Grounds on Saturday for their limit of chunky flatfish. The "Katydid" returned to the ocean on Sunday, where Captain Brent's anglers put together a fine catch of 23 keepers. Michael Walker carried on in the tradition his Dad, consummate flounder sharpie Joe Walker, limiting out and landing heaviest fish of the day, a 4.47 pounder. Ricky Mills and friends fished the Old Grounds on Sunday and put 14 flat ones in the box. Ricky

also reeled in a monkfish, for a little bonus "poor man's lobster" to go with his flounder dinner.

Shallow water fluking seems better now than it's been in past weeks. Chris and Jim Donaldson tossed Jim's custom bucktails sweetened with Gulp! around the Inner Wall for their limit of nice flounder weighing up to 4.92 pounds. Pam Kuhn pulled a pretty 5.16 pounder from the Lewes Canal and Jeff Becker bested a beautiful 6.55 pound doormat in the Broadkill River. Dylan and Steve Sheffy used Gulp! from the Cape Shores Pier for their catch of 4 keepers, including Dylan's 3.3 pound specimen. Hunter Lied put minnows to work in the Roosevelt Inlet for a 1.67 pound flounder plus 5 others he released. He had another whopper hooked and said "You should have seen the one that got away!" Flounder pounders Mike Hoffman and Nick and Paige Psaroudakis drifted minnows in the Lewes Canal on Saturday for a limit of 12 quality flatties. Barb Sweikert celebrated her birthday on Sunday by catching 3 keeper flounder to 4.24 pounds in Baker's Channel.

Small stripers have been plentiful in the Lewes Canal. Casting Storm Shads, Chug Spooks Bugs, Zara RatLTraps along the marsh banks was an effective method that got the attention of rockfish feeding on shrimp and shiners. Eels drifted around the Drawbridge, or clams fished on the bottom there were responsible for some legal bass as well. Striper Slot Season goes into effect July 1st, allowing anglers to keep 2 striped bass between 20 and 26inches per day from the Delaware Bay and it's tributaries.

Striper aficionados found a few keepers in Indian River Inlet. Carl Swinn scored a 36 incher while tossing a live eel from the jetty at night. Brandon Keller drifted live bait in front of the Coast Guard Station for a plump keeper linesider.

Further south at the Hook'em & Cook'em Tackle Shop in the Indian River Marine, Capt. Bert Adams reported mixed activity in the Indian River Inlet. Anglers looking for keeper striped bass are having to weed through A LOT of shorts. Bert said that if you drift spot all day, you may come up with a

keeper or two, but you will stay very busy with a lot of throwbacks.

There were some flounder caught in the Inlet, led by the 7 lb. 5 oz. flattie caught by Mike Baumgartner that tied for the heaviest flounder caught in Delaware this year. Mike hooked the big flounder along Bubble Gum Beach on a jig head tipped with a 6-inch Nuclear Chicken Gulp! artificial bait. Capt. Bert himself landed a 4 lb. 8 oz. flounder while fishing on the south side of the Inlet, also with a jig head tipped with a Nuclear Chicken Gulp! artificial bait.

Those choosing to leave the Inlet and flounder fish at the Old Grounds are finding it to be hitor-miss. Some boats are coming back with double-digit catches after powerdrifting natural baits, and others are finding it tough to catch a couple of flatties.

A few weakfish were caught at night last week by anglers tossing artificial lures in the Inlet, primarily Bass Assassins and jig heads tipped with rubber worms.

Fishbites and even minnows in the Inlet. Bert said the bite is good as long as the tide isn't running hard or slack.

Headboats have been returning from ocean structure with a mix of sea bass, flounder, croaker and snapper bluefish.

Offshore, leading into the weekend, the yellowfin bite was fantastic in the Wilmington and the Baltimore Canyons, but tapered off on Saturday, and really died off on Sunday. On Saturday, the Baltimore Canyon was flooded with boats, so some found better luck getting away from the fleet and headed a little further south.

Those looking for dolphin were able to find them in the Baltimore, Poor Man's and Washington Canyons in addition to the area around the Tea Cup.





Chum Lines

During the last half of May, we played a part in an ongoing research project conducted by the Guy Harvey Research Institute, Nova Southeast University and the University of Rhode Island that involves putting satellite SPOT tags on make sharks that will be tracked around the ocean for the next year or so. In nine days of fishing we managed to catch and tag eight makos, all of which are now transmitting signals that are received by satellites every time one of the sharks comes to the surface. From those signals the exact location of each shark can be determined, and over time their travel routes can studied.

For me, the entire process of catching and installing the tags was not only challenging and fun, but also very interesting since each day we had a couple top-notch researchers aboard who were an absolute wealth of knowledge about sharks and

have traveled the world to study and work with just about every shark species one can imagine.

Last year we worked with the same group and put the satellite transmitters in five makes. We tagged the sharks about 30-miles off Ocean City and after being released, each one immediately headed east - well beyond the Continental Shelf before turning north and working their way up into the north Atlantic around the Grand Banks area where they ended up spending most of the summer. By the end of the summer, two of the sharks swimming days were over when they were caught by commercial long-line fishermen; one out of Nova Scotia and the other from Newfoundland. A third shark kept transmitting until it's battery went dead on February 3rd, and in that time it traveled from the Grand Banks all the way past Bermuda and almost to the islands of the Turks and Caicos

before turning north and swimming all the way up to North Carolina and then out to somewhere in the middle of the ocean. Another left the Grand Banks and made it south, almost to the equator before heading north again, and currently is still transmitting a few hundred miles off Nova Scotia.

Overall, the meanderings of the five 2013 sharks took us all by surprise. Granted, the first month all five generally worked their way offshore and then up to the Grand Banks area, but after that they just pretty much did their own thing without following any similar travel routs. But before anyone concludes that's proof that makos generally make a beeline north in the spring and early summer consider this - all eight of the makos we tagged this May left our boat and headed south to the waters off Virginia and North Carolina. After hanging out in those lower latitudes for a while, they eventually started to work their way north along the edge of the Continental Shelf. As of this writing, they're scattered off the mid-Atlantic coast from Virginia to Long Island, but all are hugging close to the shelf, not hundreds of miles offshore like the sharks did last year.

That's a short synopsis of where the sharks have been. I'm not going to speculate why they went where they did or what they were doing when they got there - that's for the smart guys with the PhD's to figure out as they follow the tracks of this new batch of makos over the upcoming months and years. I do know that it's going to be really interesting to follow those fish around the map on the computer over the next year or so. I also know that the researchers are hoping to tag even more makos next year in an effort to get an ongoing data set from these sharks so that they can really get an accurate handle on their annual movements. already in the planning stages for those trips and once again the public will be invited to join us as helpers/anglers in the process. Information about the 2015 make tagging trips eventually be posted on our BigSharks.com website and Fish Finder Adventures Facebook page. A number of videos from this year's trips can be seen on the Facebook site

Anyone who wishes to follow the daily tracks of our makes can find a link to the tracking site on my BigSharks.com website. From the right side of my homepage click on the "Shark Tracking" tab then click "Go to the tracking site >> here" which will take you to the "Choose a Project Page" where you should select option #3, "W.North Atlantic." Then select any of the sharks on the right side of the screen to follow. Their sponsor name or number is listed below along with a few details about each shark. You will also see the map in issues of the Coastal Fisherman.

While on that site you can also follow the tracks of other mako sharks tagged by the Guy Harvey team off Mexico and New Zealand, sand tiger sharks from the Delaware Bay, as well as tigers, oceanic whitetips and even blue marlin from the Cayman Islands.







Bounty of Baked Seafood Au Gratin

1 medium onion, chopped 1 green bell pepper, chopped

1 cup butter, divided

1 cup all-purpose flour

1 lb. crabmeat

4 cups water

1 lb. medium shrimp, peeled and deveined

½ lb. bay scallops

½ lb. flounder fillets

3 cups milk

1 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese

1 TBSP. white vinegar

1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce

½ tsp. salt

Black pepper to taste Hot red pepper sauce to taste

Lightly grease a 13x9x2 inch

baking dish; set aside.

In a large saucepan, saute the onion and the pepper in a ½ cup butter until tender.

Stir in ½ cup of the flour and cook over medium for 5 minutes, stirring frequently.

Add the crabmeat; mix well.

Press this mixture into the bottom of the prepared baking dish and set aside.

In a large dutch oven, bring the water to a boil.



8 basil leaves

6 flounder fillets

3 TBSP. Dijon mustard

1 cup sliced almonds, finely chopped

Linguine with Seafood and Sundried Tomatoes

1 lb. linguine pasta

1 lb. frozen medium shrimp

1 (14.5 oz.) can diced tomatoes and green chiles

2 cups mozzarella cheese, shredded

Pepper to taste

Boil noodles 6 to 8 minutes, drain.

Heat olive oil in a large skillet over medium heat.

Mix in the shark, shrimp and tomatoes with green chiles.

Cover and cook 15 minutes. Serve the shark mixture over the cooked noodles.

Sprinkle with the cheese and season with the pepper.

TV Time

Now that it is finally shipping, I want to review a new product, the KVH TracVision TV-Series satellite TV antenna system. While some feel fishing is a way to get away, others want to stay connected while away from land.



This new KVH product line is a powerful family of fully stabilized marine satellite television antenna systems and is designed to provide superior performance, including HDTV for worldwide satellite TV entertainment at sea.

TracVision TV1, TV3, TV5, and TV6 – are the four systems that make up the TracVision TV-series. These systems represent the latest technology in marine satellite television antenna systems, a market where KVH has had awardwinning TracVision products for more than 16 years.

While there are other companies, such as Intellian and SeaTel, which both offer pleasure boat satellite TV

systems, KVH holds a majority of the US market



share for pleasure boats.

This new TV-series is similar to the existing antenna systems in size, but the hardware and software is completely different. newest innovation is the TV-Hub, which is the control unit for the antenna and user interface. This TV-Hub is accessed wirelessly, using a web-based interface from a computer, tablet or cell phone. While it is not often that you would need to access the system, it makes the initial configuration and future adjustments very easy, using technology you already own. This is in contrast to the way the older systems were programmed where electronics technician would bring aboard a Windows laptop and a computer cable to connect to the KVH antenna to access the diagnostics or programming functions. This was not an easy system for the captain or crew to adjust or troubleshoot.

The TV series consists of

the TV-1 (12.5"), TV-3 (14.5"), TV-5 (18") and TV-6 (") antennas. The dimensions are the diameter of the antenna under the dome. These antennas are very light, weighting 8, 17, 25 and 53 pounds respectively. List price starts at \$2,995.

While KVH's product information at first may seem confusing, the only Wi-Fi feature of this TV system is the connectivity to the TV-Hub control system, NOT the TV broadcast. The system cannot send TV programming across the Wi-Fi to your tablet or TV.

In my opinion, one of the most important features of the new TV-Series is the ability to receive DISH high definition (HDTV) programming using the DISH Pro technology. This is in contrast to Direct TV HDTV, where a larger, more complex antenna system is needed to receive HDTV programming available on the KVH Tracvision HD series systems. If you want to watch HDTV programming aboard your boat, the new TV-Series will offer you an affordable solution.

Another important feature of this system is that is uses one single coax cable to connect the antenna to the TV-Hub below deck. This single coax cable carries power, data and RF signals to and from the antenna, making the installation and servicing much easier than in the past with multiple wires. Often, significant time is spent during the installation just

www.coastalfisherman.net running the wires, so with only one cable, installation is much less complicated.

The TV-Hub is where all the connections are made, from the antenna out to the receivers. The TV-Hub uses the ships DC power system, either 12 or 24 volts. An optional converter is available if you want to plug this hub into the 120v outlet. This TV-Hub is where the unit connects, using Wi-Fi or an Ethernet cable, to your ships wireless network or directly to your tablet for programming. The TV-Hub can also be connected to your navigation equipment, allowing the KVH system to use your ships location to optimize the antenna positioning to receive and maintain the best satellite signal. The TV-5 and larger, TV-6 have a built-in GPS antenna to optimize tuning.

On the front of this TV-Hub is a set of three lights that makes it easy for a novice to quickly see the status of the KVH system. These lights are: TV-Hub, antenna and power. The lights change colors and/or flash to indicate the unit's operational status.

This KVH TV-series system is an antenna system, not a receiver. The receiver is the device from the satellite provider, such as Direct TV or Dish networks. These receivers are usually obtained from the service provider. With one receiver you can watch one channel at time, so if you want the ability to watch two different satellite

channels on two different TV's you will need two receivers.

Where should I mount the antenna? KVH recommends that you do NOT mount the antenna the same level as the radar, and a minimum of 3feet away from the radar. Take a quick look around the marina and you will see that it is not always possible or aesthetically pleasing to meet these guidelines. For those of you with a tower, and want to mount a small and light TVseries antenna on the buggy top, it is not recommended because the TV-1 and TV-3 can not withstand the forces of movement on the top of a tower. The TV-5 and larger antennas are recommended for this type of mounting location.

While these new TV series systems can provide worldwide satellite TV reception, different geographic areas often require different KVH hardware configurations. This is best specified at the time of

purchase. As an example, if you do not plan to travel out of North America, then the Direct TV/Dish/Bell system would be best. If you plan to travel towards South America, then a TRI-Americas system may be best, allowing the reception of Direct TV US and Direct TV Latin America. There is also a Linear/Sky Mexico configuration available that covers Europe and the rest of the world where service is available. While there may be some compromise in available programming, purchasing a system that will accommodate your travel plans will save you cost of additional the hardware later.





Virginia Fishing Report

- by Dr. Julie Ball I.G.F.A. Representative



With temperatures hitting 100-degress last week, it is no surprise that summer officially started, with the summer solstice occurring on 21st this month.



The biggest inshore draw is still cobia. Reports indicate that plenty of fish are around, but enticing strikes is a challenge. Cobia chummers continue to mostly fare well, with some boats returning from the shoals with keeper fish and a few trophies weighing to over 80 lbs.. The areas off Hampton, from the Rock Pile to off of Buckroe Beach are producing fish. Sightcasters are patrolling open Chesapeake Bay waters, oceanfront and the

Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel (CBBT), with mixed results each day. Most boats are hooking a few fish out of many seen, with most averaging below 30 lbs., with a few larger fish rewarding their efforts. Most experts feel the best is yet to come on the cobia front.

The Nine Foot Shoal and Latimer Shoal areas are still producing decent catches of red drum lately. Casters are also finding some good topwater action while throwing lures to big schools of reds meandering anywhere from the Nautilus Shoal area to off the Virginia Beach coastline. A few cobia are also cruising the surface in the same areas, making targets for sightcasters. Some black drum hook-ups are occurring around the artificial islands of

the Bay Bridge Tunnel, where the fish are lazily responding to bucktails and Storm Lures.

Spanish mackerel are officially hitting along the coast off Virginia Beach, where the bite is still a bit scattered. Many of the fish are small to medium-sized, but some mackerel are pushing to over 2 lbs. The best numbers are coming from the cleaner water and tide lines. This action will continue to evolve over the summer.



The flounder action continues to escalate, with improving reports last week. Anglers are finding some luck with nice keeper fish from www.coastalfisherman.net

Oyster, the Cell area, off Kiptopeke, Back River Reef and near the artificial islands of the Bay Bridge Tunnel. Working jigs and live bait around the pilings and the tubes of the CBBT is most productive lately, especially near the Fourth Island. Some flatties are pushing to well over 7 lbs. recently. Drifters are also finding some takers while presenting strip baits along lower Bay drop-offs and channels. Lower Bay inlets are also still giving up decent numbers of keeper flatfish, with some fish pushing to over 23-inches coming from the basin within Lynnhaven Inlet last week.

Nice sized croaker and plenty of bluefish pushing to nearly 3 lbs. are available at the Hampton Roads Bridge Tunnel, while hardheads are also hitting off Ocean View, and around the CBBT.

Some speckled trout are providing catch and release action along with some big puppy drum within most

lower Bay inlets and shallows.

Surf and pier anglers continue to find a widely mixed bag along the lower Bay and oceanfront shorelines, with nice sea mullet, Tailor bluefish, puppy drum, small flounder, spot and small croaker providing most of the turmoil. Bloodworms are always one of the top baits for these panfish.



Spadefish are schooling in the usual spots, with the Chesapeake Light Tower and nearshore wrecks holding some decent numbers of mostly smallish fish. Spades are also responding around the islands of the CBBT, along curious lots of with triggerfish. Some anglers are finding some luck with big sheepshead, with a few fish pushing to over 10-pounds

coming from various lower Bay structures and bridge pilings.

Deep droppers are still going strong with good catches of blueline tilefish, scattered big golden tilefish, some decent grouper, nice rose fish and side catches of jumbo sea bass. Amberjack have established residency on many offshore wrecks and at the Southern Towers.

The Virginia offshore scene still developing, with yellowfin tuna the main target. The tuna action slowed up off Virginia last week, with local boats now looking to run south for their catches. A few nice bigeye tuna are lurking about, with a few fish pushing over 100-pounds boated lately. Bailer and gaffer-sized mahi, mako sharks and occasional billfish are also adding some variety.


