The lady anglers on the "Absolut Pleasure", fishing with Capt. Willie Zimmerman and mate Justin Hart, were one of the teams who had an exceptional day, complimenting their 2 bigeye tunas with 4 billfish releases. Samantha Widgeon and Shannon Simpson each recorded a blue marlin release and Amanda Cropper and Audrey Windsor tacked on 2 white marlin releases to win 1st place in the Billfish Division and a check for \$32,000. Amanda boated a 133.7 lb. bigeye and Colleen Bromwell muscled in one that weighed in at 166.5 lbs. All of the fish were caught on trolled ballyhoo in 100 fathoms in the Washington Canyon. 

## Ocean City Fishing Report

A bunch of anglers were standing around the other day discussing what a strange fishing season it has been this year. Mother Nature has continually made things difficult, but when boats could get out and/or find clean water conditions, a good number of fish were caught.

The bigeye bite this year has nothing short been phenomenal and hopefully, we will see an uptick in billfish action with the Mid-Atlantic \$500,000 rolling into town this week.

Last week was no exception, with tough conditions and over Wednesday weekend.

### Poor Girls Open

This year's Poor Girls Open had 97 boats entered, and only 20 fished on opening day, but those who were there saw an incredibly busy and exciting day with 13 bigeye tuna weighed. The 1st boat to the scale was the "White Lightning", with 6 very happy anglers and 4 bigeyes ranging from 134.5 up to 155.9 lbs. Right behind them was "Rhonda's Osprey", with a pair of eyeballs that weighed 172.3 and 210.4 lbs. The next boat in line was the "Absolut Pleasure", who not only had 2 bigeyes (133.7 & 166.5 lbs.), but also 2 blue marlin and 2 white marlin releases. Right after the "Absolut

Pleasure" was the "Playmate", with another pair of bigeyes weighing 118.1 and 192.6 lbs. Things mellowed out a bit until the "Jade II" arrived at Bahia Marina with 2 bigeyes, the largest caught by angler Stacy Thomas, weighing 261.1 lbs. This tuna took the lead in the Tuna Division and never looked back.

Bigeves weren't the only attention getter at the scales on the first day. As mentioned earlier, the "Absolut Pleasure" had a banner day and several other anglers showed up with billfish release flags as well. Katie Tyler on the "M.R. Ducks" recorded a blue marlin release, north of the Poor Man's Canyon.

On the second day of the tournament, billfish releases dominated the action. Anglers on the "Fin-Ness" had a great day, releasing 2 blue marlin and a white marlin in the Poor Man's ended Canyon and tournament in 3rd place. A short "Absolut the later. Pleasure" arrived at the scale with 2 white marlin releases. One of the last boats to hit the scales on Day 2 was the "Tighten Up" with Lee Ann Spindler's blue marlin release and Lynn Runk's white marlin release, both in the Norfolk Canyon.

The Dolphin Division ended

up being won by the team on the "Absolut Pleasure" when Christina Wells boated a 20.1 lb. mahi on the second day of the tournament.

Saturday saw very rough conditions, but there was one big leaderboard change. The "Knot Tellin'" headed down to the Washington Canyon, where Michelle Melson released a blue marlin and Donna Haffer, Abby Hastings and Michelle Ott each released a white marlin to vault the team into 2nd place in the Billfish Release Division.

Overall, it was another great Poor Girls Open capped off by a \$67,500 donation made to the American Cancer Society for Breast Cancer Research. Another remarkable thing about this tournament that some people aren't aware of is that it follows I.G.F.A rules where anglers are not allowed to pass the rod off after a fish has been hooked. You will see from the pictures throughout the Coastal Fisherman this week that there were some VERY LARGE bigeyes caught that were comparable to ones that I have seen bring many guys to their knees. Hats off to all of lady anglers participated in this year's tournament.

### **Billfish**

Most of the billfish releases recorded last week came from the Washington and Norfolk Canyons, but a few also came in from the southern end of the Wilmington Canyon and in the Poor Man's Canyon as well.

On Friday, the "Espadon" caused some excitement at the Sunset Marina scale when they returned with a 725 lb. blue marlin that was caught in the Washington Canyon. The fish was barely breathing after the hour-long fight so the anglers decided to bring it back and get the meat smoked.

Another notable catch came

in on Monday aboard the "Wound Up", who ventured south to the Norfolk Canyon on an overnight trip and had releases of 14 white marlin and 2 blue marlin in addition to boating a swordfish.

The water in the Norfolk Canyon looks to be pushing to the south and the water in the Wilmington is moving towards the Baltimore Canyon, so it will be interesting to see what strategies captains employ in this week's Mid-Atlantic \$500,000. Another question is will the OC boats take over 90% of the winnings again this year?

### Tuna

Catches of bigeye tuna have been incredible this year and last week was no exception. Early in the week, the "Reel Chaos" returned from an overnight trip to the Washington Canyon with 4 bigeyes and a dozen yellowfins in the box. On Tuesday, "White Lightning" pulled 3 from the bigeye hole in 200 fathoms in the Washington.

Mother Nature gave the tuna a break on Wednesday with rough seas keeping boats closer to home or at the dock, but on Thursday all hell broke loose. In addition to the 13 weighed at the Poor Girls Open, the "Marli" captured 3 between 181 and 219 lbs. in the Washington Canyon and several other single fish catches were made as well.

Bad weather on Saturday and Sunday put a kabosh on those searching for bigeyes and I did hear a rumor that the commercial squid boats hit the Washington Canyon very hard on Thursday night or Friday, so it should be interesting to see what affect it has on the bigeye action.

Yellowfin tuna were caught up and down the line last week with anglers hooking them on the troll and by chunking. The "Pumpin' Hard 58" did manage to get a longfin on Friday, a rare catch this year.

### Flounder

It wasn't a banner week for flounder fishing in the bay. A few nice fish were caught, but short fish dominated the action.

If you were really serious about catching a nice size flattie, then your best bet was to venture out of the OC Inlet and head to some ocean structure. notable catches came in on the "Moppet" and the "Jezebel". Anglers on the "Moppet" went to the Old Grounds on Friday and had 7 keepers measuring up to 23-inches. Anglers on the "Jezebel" went out on Friday, but they decided to go to Fenwick Shoal where they ended their day with 15 flounder and 14 triggerfish in the box.

If you do have to stay in the bay, look for the deeper holes in the East Channel, both north and south of the Rt. 50 Bridge.

### In the Surf


It looks like panfish are still dominating action in the suds. Spot, kingfish, small croakers, trout, snapper blues and redfish are keeping surfcasters somewhat busy during the day. If you are fishing from the shore at night, be prepared to catch sand sharks and spinner sharks with the occasional skate and ray thrown in to tire you out.


Fall surf fishing tournaments are right around the corner, so give the A.M.S.A. a call and check the local fishing tournament calendar for details.





## Driftin' Easy

"The kids just want to catch anything!"

We hear that all the time in the tackle store. Vacationers just want to give their children the experience of catching and releasing a saltwater fish of some kind.

If the children are really young, in the four to six-year old range, it's best to take them fishing in the bay. Northside Park has given many a child their first fishing experience. Go to your tide table and calculate when the tide will be high and buy some bloodworms, night crawlers, artificial Fishbite bloodworms. Buy or make a rig with size #6 or #8 hooks, a 1 oz. bass cast sinker and walk out on the Pier. Northside Park is a free fishing zone as well, so adults can fish with their kids without worrying about getting a ticket!

If the kids are older and want to catch something bigger than a spot, take them to the 9th Street Pier, the Bulkhead from 2nd to 4th Street, the Oceanic Pier, the Ocean Pier or the Route 50 Bridge. You can catch little fish OR you can catch bigger fish from these areas.

I had a family in last week that rented two rods and reels and went to 9th Street for a couple of hours. They were just elated to catch a couple of skates. The kids had a ball. Now if you and I went fishing, and caught two skates, we might be disappointed, but if you are from some inland state and your kids have caught nothing but a little sunny in a small pond, a hardpulling, running skate could be exciting!

So if the kids want to catch anything, even if it's small, stick to the size #6 hooks baited with the worms. If you're after slightly bigger fare, go to size #4 hooks and bait up with shiners or squid strips. I like to use the box squid and cut it up into little strips. Then you can catch little sea bass, bluefish or flounder. If you want the kids to catch a flounder, get some high/low flounder rigs with size #2 hooks and use live minnows, shiners and squid strips. The hook will be small enough to still catch something else.

If you take the kids to the Bulkhead at 2nd through 4th streets, tell them to fish straight down, because they will get hung up if they cast way out. It's just the way it is down there!

Kids just LOVE to catch sand sharks! You can catch them from the Ocean Pier or you can always catch them casting from the beach. Surf fishing is fun for the family because there are no snags, there's plenty room for the kids to run around if they get bored with fishing and it's easy to do

as long as the ocean is not too rough! (If the waves are too big, go to the bayside.)

Get yourself an 8 to 10-foot rod and reel combo, a mediumsized, high/low bluefish rig and a box of squid and the kids are ready to catch a sand shark! You don't need to get some huge hook and a chunk of raw fish to catch these smaller sand sharks! Put on a three to fourounce pyramid sinker and cast out just beyond the crest of the wave. Go early in the morning, or better yet for sharks, go to the beach at 5:30 PM when the lifeguards go off duty and fish until dark or even after dark. Sand sharks, also called dogfish, do not have sharp teeth. Their skin is like sand paper and they are very strong for their size. Little kids love to pet them before you release them. Be sure to check out the sharks and make sure they are sand sharks and not

another variety with teeth that are usually larger and you want to treat with respect!

Be sure to use a sand spike on the beach. At our tackle shop, we see so many vacationers come back in with their reels not working because they get full of sand. The sand doesn't come from just falling in the dry sand, it also comes from submerging the reel in the wash where there's a lot of sand being churned up by the waves. Whenever you get a fish, put the rod in the sand spike, and then deal with the fish. Vacationers get excited, the reel goes into the ocean, and problems arise!

## "We don't care about catching a sand shark!"

Then get yourself some bloodworms or artificial Fishbite bloodworms and buy a pre-made kingfish rig made with size #6 or #8 hooks and a 2 to 3 oz. pyramid sinker and

cast in close. Anglers can even use a bay rod on a calm day. An eight or nine foot rod is perfect. Fish in close and you will catch spot, kingfish and croaker. Small, young children are just tickled to death to catch spot in the surf and fishing for them keeps them very active. The parents may have to cast out for the young kids. Tell them to hold the rod or simply put it in the sand spike and wait for the bite. Some people put a set of rod bells on the end of the rod and wait for the bell to ring! Sounds silly but it works!

"My older boy wants to catch a bigger shark!"

Well, get a longer surf rod, a single-leadered bluefish or shark rig made with a Styrofoam surf float to keep the bait off the bottom and cast out as far as you can with a chunk of mackerel, bunker or whole calamari squid. You can also use a chunk of fresh spot you caught on one of the smaller rods. You may also catch a big ray and these get HUGE! Be very careful if you get a bigger shark close to the beach. Bigger sharks have teeth! Be sure to carry pliers with you, and not a little short

## Delaware Fishing Report

- by Larry Jock



Mother nature threw a wrench into the fishing scene over the weekend. Anglers who were able to get out on Thursday found fish inshore and offshore from the Wilmington Canyon down to the Norfolk Canyon. Friday was decent until the afternoon, when things got chunky, and Saturday and Sunday were too gnarly to get anything accomplished.

Joe Morris at Lewes Harbour Marina said flounder catching remained pretty good for fishermen who figured out how to properly work Delaware Bay artificial reefs. Sites 6 and 7 at Brown Shoal were productive, as was Reef 8, the Star Site.

Flounder aficionado Joe Walker and his crew pulled 9 keeper flatties off Site 8 on Tuesday. Joe concentrated on Site 7 on Thursday for 8 more nice fluke. Captain Brent's flukers aboard the "Katydid" captured 19 quality flatfish at Site 7 on Thursday. Brent set a good example for his patrons by boating a 7.1 pound doormat "Katydid" himself. The returned to Sites 6 and 7 on Saturday where the group on board put 26 fine fluke in the box.

Ocean bottom yielded flatfish last week too. Scott Ayars fished the Old Grounds with Captain Ricky Yakimowicz on Wednesday and said that despite strong winds and lumpy seas, the flounder were chompin'. Scott ended up with

three keepers weighing up to 3.61 pounds. Wayne Demarco and fishing pals Paul, Joe and Doug beat up the bottom between "DB" Buoy and Site 11 on Friday. Their efforts resulted

in a boat limit of 16 flatties. Wayne noted that a bucktail and smelt combo was the downfall of most of their fish.

Back in the Delaware Bay, croakers continue to please

anglers of all skill levels. Hardheads were found just about anywhere in the Bay, in the Lewes Canal and Broadkill River, and along Broadkill and Lewes Beaches. Jack Thompson was winding in a small croaker he hooked from the Lewes Beach when it was inhaled by a 3.3 pound flounder. Saucer sized spot, puffers, spike trout and kingfish rounded out the panfish mix.

Sizeable kings continue to be recorded. Daryl Plotcher decked a 1.38 pounder aboard the "Angler", and Reilly Burnett boated a 1.2 pound citation earner on the "Indian".

A few black and red drum have also been caught. Jeff Drury got a 5.53 pound red using live killifish near the train bridge on the Lewes Canal.

After being absent most of the summer, schools of snapper bluefish showed up along the Outer Wall and Ice Breakers. Anglers encountered scrappy snappers tearing through groups of silversides under diving gulls and terns. Tossing a small bucktail, Kastmaster or Gator Spoon into the melee resulted in plenty of action. Many casters use ultra light rods and reels for extra fun. Triggerfish, sheepshead and spadefish also roamed the rocks of the Outer Wall and would eat sandfleas, shrimp or clams. Triggers hung out on artificial reef structure too.

On the offshore scene, boaters told of whales, porpoises and baitfish in 30 fathoms between the Hot Dog and Tea Cup, but hooked only an occasional yellowfin or wahoo. Plenty of whales were reported in the Baltimore Canyon too, and trollers took a

few tuna, billfish and mahi there pulling ballyhoo and plastics among the pods of finbacks, pilot whales and two tone porpoises. Whales were also abundant in the Washington Canyon, and that location seemed to hold the most yellowfins as well. Crews trolled among the feeding mammals, often in quite close proximity to other boats vying for a crack at tunas feeding below. The best tuna bite happened after dark when yellowfins fed actively on squid and tinker mackerel. Wes and Shane Olson ran to the Washington on Thursday night in their center console and set up on the east side near the tip. Within a couple hours they had chunked up their limit of 6 yellowfins and released a half dozen. Other crews also told of good overnighters, with limits of tuna caught on live squids and tinkers, butterfish, sardines and a variety of jigs. The majority of yellowfins have been in the 30 to 32 inch range, perfect for battling on spinning gear or lightweight jigging outfits. However, 50 pounders and some slob bigeyes mingled with BLTs to keep the mix interesting.

To the south, Capt. Bert Adams at Hook'em & Cook'em said that the report for the Indian River Inlet hasn't changed much from the past few weeks. A few flounder are being caught, along with some stripers and rays. There was an 8 pounder caught over the weekend by an angler fishing with live bait. Just like in the Ocean City Inlet, flounder fishermen are dealing with a lot of short fish right now and the best location continues to be in the area around the Coast Guard Station. The end of the incoming tide has been the most productive and Bert said the window is actually narrower than that, like 10 to 15 minutes. The fish start snapping and then the bite is over. Very frustrating.

Those flounder fishermen heading outside the Inlet are finding luck at the Old Grounds in 85 to 95-feet of water.

When it comes to the best flounder bait right now, live spot or mullet is at the top of the list. Most of the spot are too large to use whole, so don't be afraid to strip them up. Flounder love em! If you can find live mullet,

than stock up on whatever you can. Live mullet has been hot. After that, Gulp! artificial baits and live minnows round out the top flounder baits.

Bert said that a few weakfish (trout) were caught in the Inlet last week, with emphasis on "few". Artificials tossed at the end of the incoming tide snagged the few weakies. No speckled trout were caught last

Jetty jockies are kind of upset now, because right wonderful government has closed down the north side jetty due to dredging. Nobody knows when it will reopen, but I guess it didn't make any sense to just fence off the area around the jetty to let fishermen up on to the rocks during the popular summer months, because we all know the government is way smarter than us and always so considerate. Therefore, if you wanted to fish off the rocks, you had to go to the south side of the Inlet where anglers caught a few triggerfish, trout and stripers, although the vast majority of linesiders were too short to keep.

In the surf, the kingfish bite has slowed, with only a few being caught all week. Surfcasters are now limited to sand sharks, skates and rays.

The headboats running out of the Indian River Marina had good days on Thursday and Friday, before the bad weather moved in. Flounder fishing definitely improved several anglers catching their limit last week.

Offshore boats out of Indian River Marina had good days up to Saturday when rough conditions kept most either closer to shore than desired or stuck at the dock. The Washington Canyon yielded some nice catches of bigeyes, with an occasional yellowfin and the Chicken Bone produced a 72 lb. whoo and some dolphin. Billfish were found scattered up and down the line from south of the Wilmington Canyon down into the Norfolk Canyon. We haven't seen any concentration of billfish, but this week's Mid-Atlantic \$500,000 should get a good number of boats looking. Stay tuned!

## Ship to Shore

## WHAT IS YOUR LIFE WORTH?

I spend a lot of time in these articles talking about safety at sea and with good reason. Over the years, we have heard more stories than you can imagine about what mishap took place. It just makes good sense to plan for the unexpected and to know what you are prepared to do when it does. That's where your marine electronic equipment can make the difference in a bad day at sea that ends well or not.

There are items of electronics, if you have them, that you use almost every trip such as your radar, GPS/Plotter, VHF radio and autopilot. But there are others that you hope to never have to use and, yet, may be the very thing that saves your life on that bad day at sea. What if your boat catches on fire or starts to sink? What if you lose your engine power and you are drifting further offshore? That's just two possible scenarios.

In the case of fire and/or sinking, a life raft will provide you with somewhere to go. In either case, it is critical that you have some way of getting Hopefully, rescued. your communications equipment will enable you to call for help, but what if the fire or the engine failure with loss of power renders your communication equipment useless? The answer is to have some form of portable rescue communication device such as an EPIRB (Emergency Position Indicating Radio

Beacon) or PLB (Personal Locator Beacon). Both devices work on the same general principle. When activated, they send a signal to a satellite which, in turn, relays to the Coast Guard ground stations in your area to start the process of a search and rescue mission. This all happens very quickly and can mean the difference between life and death.

EPIRB's have come down in price considerably in recent years and PLB's are quite reasonably priced. What is fairly new is the introduction of a service by ACR, one of the most popular manufacturers of EPIRB's and PLB's. This service is named 406link, a satellite testing system used to receive and verify selftest notifications from your emergency position device. Under normal practice, the purchaser of an EPIRB/PLB will occasionally "test" their device according to the device's instructions. It is generally a switch or toggle that you press quickly which lights a strobe momentarily to tell you the unit is functioning. However, it is only testing the internal circuitry of the unit and the "test only" signal it sends. When it is received by a satellite and sent to the ground station, it is ignored as just a test. Beyond that, you just have to trust that, when you need it in a real emergency, it will operate properly.

What the 406link service does is allow you to actually send a signal just like your emergency one. The only difference is that it is specially encoded as a self-test

registered beacon signal that will go to special 406link ground stations and is decoded in the same way that a real emergency message is done. In seconds, these stations process the information and send you an email and/or a SMS text message confirming your device serial number, emergency contact information, etc. There is a cost involved with this but it is minimal.

The basic plan of \$39.95/year (11 cents a day) provides you with a thorough system test including an email/SMS text to one contact that you provide when you register and reminds you when it's time for a battery replacement. For an additional \$20, you can get the "Plus" plan that offers all of the above plus: five contacts for receiving confirmation messages, customizing of the message, trip planning and GPS location confirmation for certain models.

ACR offers a free trial and the use of the service for two days free of charge.

The purchase of this service is separate from the purchase of the EPIRB/PLB. It is accomplished easily by going online after you purchase your ACR device and entering the required information about your contact email address and/or cell phone number along with a credit card for payment of your subscription.

If you don't have an EPIRB or PLB yet, they are something that you really should consider. Starting at only \$315, they are affordable. If you already have a later model ACR unit, all you have to do is go online at www.406link.com and register it. What is your life worth?

# hum Lines

by Capt. Mark Sampson



I think that some folks are inclined to consider bottom fishing as a very simplistic form of fishing that requires no more skill than being able to put a piece of bait on a hook, send it down and wait for a bite. But such thinking would be akin to saying that marlin fishing involves nothing more than being able to drag rigged baits and lures behind a boat. In both cases, anyone who does it often will probably agree that there are indeed times when it might seem that easy, but most of the time there's so much more to it than that

Successful bottom fishing starts with getting the boat properly positioned over a productive location, and you can thank the captain and crew for that. But once they're on location it's all up to the anglers to do what needs to be done to get a fish to take their bait while avoiding the many of the following common mistakes so often made by novice bottom fishermen.

#### Don't neglect your bait!

Fishing with good bait is important, but so often anglers go way too long without changing old bait, or don't replace bait that has been nibbled down by crabs or small fish. It's also not uncommon to see anglers bring up a two-hook bottom rig that's missing a bait and send it back down with one hook still bare. Baits also have to be checked frequently to make sure that they haven't been

stolen off the hook. Anytime someone feels a few nibbles, and then "nothing", they should give it maybe one minute and then check their bait to make sure that there is still something left on the hook. Fish don't usually bite on bare hooks; so don't be lazy about checking your bait.

#### Don't cast!

If you're anchored up over a wreck or reef, the last thing you want to do is drag your hooks across the structure and risk getting snagged. Casting across the structure only increases the chances of getting hung up. Wreck fishing for sea bass and tautog almost always requires that anglers drop straight down and bring their line back straight up. Casting from a drifting boat makes no sense at all, because to properly feel a bite you want your rig to be as straight down below you as possible, not way out in front of you. When fishing around other anglers, the chances of tangling up with someone greatly increases when an angler decides they need to

#### Use the proper amount of weight.

To properly get a rig to the bottom and to be able to feel the bites and subtle nibbles of fish on their bait, anglers should strive to maintain a straight line from rod tip to sinker. To accomplish this, enough weight must be used so that the line can be tightened and kept straight against the current allowing the angler to feel their sinker bounce

on the bottom anytime they lift and drop their rod tip. The weight of the sinker is determined by; the depth of the water, the strength of the current and the thickness of the fishing line. Braided line requires less weight than monofilament because it's thinner. From an anchored boat, anglers should add weight anytime they note that the line leaves their rod tip at an angle rather than going straight down. Too much weight is better than not enough, but it can get costly when anglers find they're losing a lot of lead due to

#### You can't catch fish unless your line is on the bottom!

Particularly with children, a common problem is that they'll get a bite and immediately crank their line all the way to the surface thinking they might have a fish. Unfortunately, what they've done is pulled the bait away from whatever it was that was showing interest in their bait and also wasted fishing time by bringing it up and then sending it back down. When someone gets what they think is a good bite they should set the hook, keep their rod high and give their reel a couple of cranks, but then stop, or at least slow down the retrieve long enough so that they can verify that they have hooked a fish before cranking all the way to the surface. If a fish is not felt tugging at the other end, the rod tip should be quickly lowered and the bait allowed to settle back to the bottom to hopefully get a bite from the same or another fish. The flip side of that is getting a few bites, but not checking to see if the bait has been stolen, and end up fishing with no bait. Anglers just need to refrain from

cranking immediately after the first bite.

#### Don't rest the rod on the gunwale!

Successful bottom fishing requires that anglers stay in tune with what's happening at the end of their line, which means being able to feel and if necessary, respond to, every bump, twitch, nibble and bite. With the rod resting on the side of the boat, these messages from are going to be transmitted to the boat and not the anglers. The rod should touch nothing but the angler, and if he or she really wants to stay on top of their game they can keep a finger on the line coming off their reel just for a little "extra

#### Don't keep letting out line!

While fishing from an anchored boat, once the weight hits the sea floor, 3 to 4-feet of extra line can be let out if you want your baits to sag closer to the bottom - but that's all. Letting out more line than that only allows the current to put a huge bow in the line that will eventually prevent the angler from feeling any bites and probably tangle with others fishing close by. From a drifting boat letting out more and more line after hitting bottom only increases the odds of snagging bottom and will eventually have the fisherman out of line. Drift fishermen must also be ready to let out or bring in some line anytime they go over a change in depth. If the line coming off the rod tip is more horizontal than vertical - there's way too much line out.





### Striper Cocktail Appetizer

2 lbs. skinless, boneless striper fillets

2 bay leaves

1/4 cup plus 1 tsp. lemon juice

1 sliced lemon

1 tsp. salt

Pepper

1/2 cup chili sauce

1 1/2 tsp. steak sauce

Cube the striper fillets into chunks about 1-inch square.

Boil a pot of water with bay leaves, 1/4 cup lemon juice, onion, salt and pepper added.

Boil for 10 minutes.

Add fish chunks.

Cover and boil for another 10 minutes.

Drain fish and cool.

Serve as an appetizer with a sauce made of the chili sauce, 1 tsp. lemon juice and steak sauce.

In a buttered 13x9-inch baking dish, lay fillets in single layer.

Brush tops with juice.

In a bowl, combine cheese, butter, mayonnaise, onions and seasonings.

Mix well with fork.

Bake fish 10 to 20 minutes or until fish starts to flake.

Spread with cheese mixture and bake until golden brown. This will depend on fillets thickness.



# Virginia Fishing Report

by Dr. Julie Ball I.G.F.A. Representative



As summer begins to wind down, many favorite species are available along the Mid-Atlantic coast, and both the inshore and offshore fishing scenes noteworthy lately. As for the weather, now we watching more to our South for tropical developments as hurricane season takes hold.

There's some good news on the flounder front. With clearer water settling in over the past week, the summer's lethargic flounder finally turned around. Good numbers of flatfish are filling limits, with many ranging in the 20 to 23-inch range. The largest fish are coming from the 3rd and 4th Islands of the Bay Bridge Tunnel, with live bait and jigs donned with plastics and strip working well for anglers working structure. Drifters are also finding good luck with keepers scattered along lower Bay channels, deep water drop-offs, and near Buoys 36A, 42, and the Cell. Both the Lynnhaven and Inlet Rudee are providing good catches of keeper fish this past week.

Cobia action is good with the fish grouping up to form pods cruising on the surface. Many of these fish are pushing to well over 50pounds this week. The late summer trend of favoring buoys and bridge pilings is also gaining momentum. This pattern will improve over the next fall several weeks as approaches. Sightcasters are leading the way, with plenty of fish to pick from, but choose your bait carefully, as these fish have been finicky die-hard lately. A few chummers are also scoring with a some decent fish.

red drum Big are providing excellent summer, topwater action as huge schools of fish continue to roam near the entrance of the Bay. More catches of jack crevelle also came from these same areas last week. Black drum are still meandering around the islands of the CBBT, but won't be there for long.

Trollers finding accommodating Spanish mackerel off the oceanfront, Cape Henry

Sandbridge. Small gold and silver spoons are the best lures for these fish. Plenty of greedy sharks along Virginia's coastal waters continue to provide some interesting catches. Be sure to review the regulations before targeting sharks.

Sheepshead anglers found good catches last week on crabs, clams and fiddlers, with some fish ranging up to around 13-pounds. More sheepshead are beginning to move onto the tubes of the CBBT, along with lots of big triggerfish. Spadefish are still around, but they preparing to leave soon.

Croaker are providing good action lately in lower Bay waters and inlets. The bite out of Oyster is also hosting coolers full of nice hardheads from the deeper parts of the channel. Big spot moved into lower Bay waters last week, where anglers are intercepting yellow bellies near Ocean View and from Lynnhaven, Rudee and Little Creek Inlets.

The puppy drum action is still going on within most any skinny water location in Tidewater, with steady action Lynnhaven Rudee Inlets. These juvenile reds will hit a variety of baits, with fresh cut mullet and

Gulp! mullets the top choices lately. Good speckled trout encounters also occurred in these same locations last week, with the nicer specks responding on the Poquoson Flats, Back River and the Bayside and seaside creeks on the Eastern Shore.

Tarpon are still active in the backwaters of Oyster, but much longer. Amberjack are still available at the South Tower and some of the offshore wrecks, and jack crevelle will make a brief showing at the Chesapeake Light Tower soon. Deep droppers are still faring well off Virginia as boats continue to find a variety of nice tilefish, rosefish, barrelfish and grouper along the edges of the Canyon.

Bluewater anglers are elated with the offshore season so far this year. Hefty bigeye tuna are still around, along with solid yellowfin tuna. But as the billfish population builds into the area, boats are changing over to marlin spreads. Several white marlin, along with scattered sailfish, spearfish, blue marlin released last week. Nice gaffer dolphin and wahoo are also still adding some variety.


