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

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Ocean City Fishing Report by Larry Jock

The weekend fishing scene in Ocean City was dominated by the Marlin Club Kid's Classic. It was another successful tournament and it is hard to believe it celebrated it's 12 year this season. The action was fast and furious, with 343 anglers competing. I love the tournament and it is great to see all the smiling faces on the junior anglers, but if I don't see another 0.8 lb. stringer of spot, I won't mind at all. Seriously, hats off to the Marlin Club and the tournament volunteers for a wonderful event.

Flounder

The flounder bite in the bay seems to be scattered right now with fish coming in mainly from the East and Middle Channels. The key is to find the deeper holes, where water temperatures are cooler. received reports last week of water temperatures hovering around 90-degrees on the flats at the end of low tide. Now that's warm! We also saw flatties being hooked in the West Channel and down at the Duck Blinds behind Assateague Island.

Althought Capt. Bert Adams at Hook'em & Cook'em reported a tough inshore flounder bite for boats out of

Indian River, we saw some nice catches come in over the weekend, highlighted by a great haul by junior anglers aboard the charter boat, "Reel Chaos" on Sunday. The anglers boated 13 keepers, weighing up to 3.2 lbs., while fishing at the Old Grounds with Gulp!,

squid and cut bait. When it comes to cut bait, strips of sea robin are especially deadly this time of year!

Although Gulp! continues to dominate when it comes to artificial flounder baits, anglers on the charter boat, "Lucky Break" have had good success using Z-Man baits this season. They don't have the built-in scent dispersion, but they are much more durable than Gulp! Swimming Mullets.

Bluefish

Various size bluefish can be found while trolling spoons

www.coastalfisherman.net around Fenwick Shoal, but we also saw some larger fish, weighing close to 5 lbs., come in from around the Rt. 50

Striped Bass

Bridge.

A few short stripers are being caught around the South Jetty and the Rt. 50 Bridge. Nothing great, but there were a few pulls throughout the week.

Dolphin

Last weekend, we saw outstanding catches of dolphin come in on boats that were chasing tuna offshore in the Baltimore, Poor Man's, Washington and Norfolk Canyons in addition to some inshore lumps.

Tuna

Although the yellowfin and bite continued bluefin throughout the week for chunkers in Massey's Canyon, the big catch came in last Tuesday when anglers on the charter boat, "Moore Bills" ventured down to the Bigeve Hole and hooked a 250 lb. eyeball on a skirted ballyhoo. We definitely haven't seen as strong a bigeye bite as in recent years, making this catch more special, but maybe that will change in the coming weeks.

We also saw a 121.8 lb. bigeye caught during the Kid's Classic by the group on the "G-FORCE" on Saturday who were also fishing in the Washington Canyon.

As I mentioned earlier, the vast majority of boats headed to Massey's last week and Thursday morning saw an epic bite there with several boats getting in on the early morning chunking bite and returning with incredible numbers of yellowfins. "That's Right" had 20 yellowfins, "Restless Lady" and "C-Boys" each had 18 and





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"Rhonda's Osprey" boated 15 yellowfins in addition to a bluefin and a white marlin release. Several other boats had double-digit catches as well.

We also saw yellowfins come in from the Lumpy Bottom, the Poor Man's Canyon and out in the Baltimore Canyon as well.

Billfish

The best billfish trips of the week came in during the Kid's Classic when, on Saturday, the anglers on the "Billfisher" returned with releases of 5 white marlin and a sailfish from 600 fathoms below the Norfolk Canyon. Capt. Chris Hornung said that the water was moving to the south and would be over the 100-mile tournament limit by the next day, which it was. Chaser" also ventured south on Saturday to the Norfolk Canyon where they released 5 white marlin in 500 fathoms. On Sunday, junior anglers on the "Max Bet" were in 1,000 fathoms outside the Baltimore Canyon and released 3 white marlin and a sailfish in 79-degree water.

Also on Sunday, Aryton Pryor on the charter boat, "Spring Mix II" released a blue marlin between the Norfolk and Washington Canyons.

Triggerfish

I have received reports of good numbers of triggerfish at Winter Quarter Shoal right now. This isn't uncommon at all, with the Shoal being a favorite spot for anglers quietly seeking this tasty fish.

In the Surf

It sounds like surfcasters are mainly finding kingfish in the surf with sharks and skates showing up at night. Large pods of baitfish have been spotted close to shore, but nothing has been spotted feeding underneath. Most are speculating that there are bluefish rounding up the bait, but none have been caught.

Upcoming Tournament

It's hard to believe, but there are NO tournaments this weekend. I'm not sure what I am going to do with myself!

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



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VHF Anyone with a marine radio has undoubtedly heard at one time or another a distress call or some sort of safety notice on Channel 16. Such broadcasts could be as simple as a notice to mariners about a log floating in the inlet or as critical as a boat on fire miles from shore. No matter where they are or what they doing, all reliable information about what's happening on the water is important to boaters because it can help to keep them safe, as well as allow them to provide assistance others who might be in grave danger. The three primary safety calls broadcast on the radio are Pan-Pan, Security, Mayday. Each one denotes a different level of distress or urgency, but all are important for mariners to tune-in and listen to.

The "Security" call (properly pronounced "say-cure-it-tay") usually involves some sort of warning to mariners about a possible hazard to navigation. The Coast Guard will often broadcast Security calls on Channel 16 and inform listeners to tune to Channel 22

for more details. Such a broadcast might sound like: "Say-cure-it-tay, say-cure-ittay, say-cure-it-tay, this is US Coast Guard Station Hampton Roads Virginia Group, for an unscheduled safety marine forecast concerning a log floating in the Ocean City Inlet switch and listen to Channel 22-Alpha." Hearing that, anyone boating through that area would do well to switch to Channel-22 and get the scoop about the log so they don't run over it. Security calls can be about bad weather, floating debris, buoys that have moved or have a light out, an area restricted to navigation (like when we had the air show) or anything deemed important for mariners to know. Last week, the Coast Guard did a Security call about a dead whale floating ten-miles offshore of Ocean City.

Security calls are not reserved for Coast Guard broadcasts only. Anyone who wishes to notify other boaters of some sort of hazard can make a security call. On foggy days, it's not uncommon for skippers to broadcast that they are traveling in or out of

the inlet, or other high traffic areas, so other boaters will know to watch out for them. "Say-cure-it-tay, say-cure-ittay, say-cure-it-tay, this is fishing vessel Pork Chop outbound of Ocean City Inlet, standing by on Channel-16 for any concerned traffic." A quick broadcast like that not only alerts other boats of their presence and direction, but also lets them know how they can be contacted if needed. Simple precautions like that can prevent a disaster on the water. Security calls are often made by assistance towboats when they are towing an object or disabled vessel through the inlet or any other busy area if they need other vessels to steer clear and minimize their wake.

Pan-Pan call (pronounced "pon-pon") is like a Coast Guard "Amber Alert" and is their way of letting all boaters know of someone who is in need of immediate assistance. A Pan-Pan broadcast would occur on Channel-16 and is a way of saying "hey everyone shut-up and listen for a moment because something is going on out there and people are in need of immediate assistance!" A Pan-Pan would not likely be broadcast for a boat that's just broken down and needs a tow back to port. Instead it would be used for

such emergencies as a vessel on fire, one that's taking on water, a medical emergency or a person in the water. Such a broadcast might sound like; "Pon-pon, pon-pon, pon-pon, this is US Coast Guard Station Hampton Roads Virginia Group relaying an urgent safety marine broadcast for the fishing vessel Pork Chop, a 32-foot fishing vessel with four passengers onboard that is taking on water at coordinates 37-degrees 59.4 North, and 074-degrees 44.9 West, or approximately 27miles southeast of Ocean City Maryland. All vessels in the area are requested to keep a sharp lookout, assist if possible and report all sightings to the US Coast

Because of its high priority, a Pan-Pan broadcast would be delivered in its entirety on Channel-16 so everyone in the listening area will hear it without having to switch to another channel, as is done with security broadcasts. As soon as they hear "Pan-Pan", skippers should immediately grab something to write with and be ready to record the coordinates of the vessel in trouble so that they can then quickly determine if they are close enough to render aid. If so, they should advise the Coast Guard of their ability to assist.

Everyone knows what a "Mayday" call is all about. It's a distress call that signifies that a vessel and/or anyone aboard are in grave danger. You would certainly call a Mayday if your boat was sinking or on fire, or if someone was so severely sick or injured that professional first aid is needed. When you call "Mayday" on the radio it is a way of telling everyone else on the channel to "shut-

up and listen" because you need help right away. Such distress calls should always include the name of the vessel, location, how many people are aboard and nature of distress. As long as they can hear the transmission, the Coast Guard will always respond to Mayday calls, and it's usually best to give them a chance to do so first, before calling back to the stricken vessel yourself. However, if

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the distress call is not being answered, then it would be right to call them back and do what you can - which could be as simple as relaying info to and from the Coast Guard, or as involved as running to the other boat and recovering passengers from the water. Either properly way, monitoring the radio, particularly Channel-16, and paying attention to Mayday (and Pan-Pan) calls could result in saving the lives of fellow boaters.

" Mayday - Mayday -Mayday, this is the fishing vessel Pork Chop. We have struck an object and are taking on water fast. We have four passengers onboard and are located at 37-degrees 59.4 North, and 074-degrees 44.9 West. We cannot keep up with the incoming water and need immediate assistance!" When someone puts out such a call, the next transmission they will likely be from the Coast Guard responding to the plea for help. They will coordinate

July 20, 2016 Coastal Fisherman Page 13 the rescue and provide as many resources (vessels, aircraft, pumps, medical assistance, etc.) as necessary and/or available at the time. Anyone else monitoring the call should listen-in and stand ready to assist if they are able.

a perfect world everyone would always put to sea and return home safely, with nothing but fun tales to tell about their time on the water. But incidents occur and problems arise, and when they do, a working VHF radio can be a boater's best friend. To get the best use of that radio, every boater must understand and know how and when to use "Security, Pan-Pan, and Mayday" to stay safe, help others, and request assistance.

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

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THE SAFETY ALPHABET EPIRB, PLB, AIS-MOB

The world's first EPIRB was tested and approved in 1970. While Satcom and IP Based networking is the current trend for communications on the high Seas, the EPIRB remains a simple, proven device to alert rescue authorities around the clock and around the world.

Here's a brief summary of how an EPIRB works:

•the device is deployed either automatically or manually, and then activated automatically when floating in the water or with the flip of a switch.

•once activated, the EPIRB transmits a digitally coded signal on a frequency of 406 MHz, which is received by orbiting satellites. Most current EPIRB's on the market include a GPS sensor, allowing the EPIRB to transmit a position along with the digital data.

•the EPIRB is routinely mounted to a vessel and registered to that vessel.

• the cost of an EPIRB begins around \$400.

A PLB or Personal Locator Beacon is very similar to an EPIRB, though with some significant differences. One common feature is that the PLB contacts the same rescue authorities, using the same satellite communication network. The PLB is much smaller, designed to be carried

or worn by a person and is registered to a person. Not all PLB's float by themselves. They are manually activated and most do not transmit at the same power level and duration as a traditional EPIRB. The cost of a PLB begins around \$260.

MOB (Man overboard), that age old saying when a crewmember /passenger (man or woman) falls into the water is something you never want to happen aboard a boat. When this occurs, it is an urgent scenario and the person needs to be rescued as fast as possible. In addition to the traditional rescue tools, modern electronics allow the tracking of the person with modern ease. Most chartplotters have an easy to find button labeled MOB, or SOS, for the purpose of saving a position and allowing the vessel to return and search that exact area.

Some autopilots will automatically steer to activated MOB position, allowing the crew to focus on the search. While a PLB is great worn, the necessary equipment to receive a PLB signal is found only on search and rescue vessels, making a local search difficult.

The newest, wearable electronic safety device is an AIS MOB. When activated the device transmits an AIS MOB message containing position and ID via the AIS (Automatic Identification System). The AIS

transmission will be detected by all AIS equipped vessels within range, about 2 miles on open water. This AIS MOB transmission is received by an AIS receiver and displayed on a chartplotter, quickly indicating the precise location for the overboard person. As you might already know, the AIS system is a worldwide standard, an automatic tracking system, using the maritime VHF radio frequency. The rapid adoption of AIS receivers on pleasure boats and mandatory adoption on many commercial vessels allows for good coverage in popular boating waters. The cost of an AIS-MOB begins around \$299.

If you are going to carry a personal AIS device(s) you must always test it against the boats electronics to learn exactly what will be displayed on your chartplotter and if an audible alarm will be sounded by your chartplotter upon AIS activation.

While not in the same category of the dedicated safety devices, there are two popular devices that can help you communicate while out of cell phone range. Both products are small handheld, waterproof devices that are easy to use. While neither of these devices are a substitute for an EPIRB/PLB with its dedicated link to worldwide public rescue authorities (with no annual fee), the SPOT Gen3 and InReachSE both can send a message to friends and family along with your location - something you can't do with an EPIRB/PLB.

The Globlastar SPOT Gen3, is a handheld communicator that can send (not receive) a pre-

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programmed message to family and friends or it can also send a SOS to a private emergency center. The messages include your GPS position, allowing friends, family or rescue authorities know exactly where you are. The cost of the SPOT gen3 is \$149.

Another popular product is the Garmin Delorme InReachSE, a handheld satellite communicator. This device allows you to send and receive 160 character text messages to anyone, along with your GPS position. The device also has a SOS button that sends a message to a private rescue center. The cost of the InReachSE is \$299.

As mentioned above, having an AIS receiver (or transceiver) is a good idea in these modern times. Not just for locating other vessels for navigational purposes (or see where they are fishing), an AIS can be used to locate a vessel or persons in distress and there is even some use of AIS for navigation using a "virtual buoy" as a temporary aid to navigation. The cost of a basic AIS receiver begins at \$250.

With so many different safety devices on the market, finding the equipment that meets your boats needs and budget is an easy task. Additionally the small size and low cost makes it easy to provide personal safety devices to all crewmembers and guests.

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

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Delaware-Pishing Report by Larry Jock

It turned out to be a beautiful weekend on Delmarva, allowing anglers to spend the day chasing their favorite species in the bay, inshore lumps and out in the canyons.

At Lewes Harbour Marina, Matt reported that they are starting to see more croaker show up in the Lewes Canal, although most are too small to keep. Hardheads are really thick around the Cape Henlopen Pier.

Flounder fishing in the Lewes Canal continues to be steady, but not on fire by any Matt said a 7.6 means. pounder was caught on Saturday by an angler drifting and minnows squid. Flounder are also being caught on Delaware Bay structure, but you really need to be zeroed in on them because they are not spread out at all. Capt. Brent on the charter boat, "Katydid" put his anglers on the meat last week while fishing in the Bay and ended up with 15 keepers in the box. Site 8 has been a good spot for flatties.

A few stripers are being caught each day in the Lewes Canal by anglers fishing either in the early morning or right before dark. Eels, clams and bucktails tipped with curly tails are doing the trick.

The tautog season opened

back up in Delaware on Sunday and Matt said that they saw 1 keeper come into the shop. There was a 14.6 lb. sheepshead caught at the Outer Wall by Joseph Crowley while using sand fleas for bait.

Weakfish, just over the legal size limit, are being hooked around the Walls, Site 5 and at Brown Shoal.

Kingfish and croaker have been found at Brown Shoal and at Sites 5 and 8.

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Boats venturing outside the inlet found a much better flounder bite on ocean structure. The Old Grounds continue to be a prime location for ocean flatties. Moving current has been the key for anglers fishing squid, Gulp!, cut bait, mahi belly and flounder belly.

Those looking for sea bass have really had to weed through small fish to get their keeper. Matt didn't see anything come in from Sites 10 or 11, but those fishing smaller, less used wrecks seem to be having better luck.

After that MD state record cobia was caught a couple of weeks ago, more boats are heading just off the coastline looking for the "man in the brown suit" cruising the surface. Anglers on the charter boat, "Grizzly" boated a pair last Friday.

The vast majority of offshore boats headed to Massey's Canyon over the weekend to get in on the great chunking bite. The bite definitely slowed over the weekend, but that isn't uncommon given the fact that there were in neighborhood of 150 boats there each day. The tuna being caught at Massey's have bellies full of sand fleas, so anglers who are getting to the bottom with jigs are also having good results.

In the surf, from Cape Henlopen down to Fenwick Island are finding kingfish and small sharks, especially for those with kayaks who are able to get baits dropped



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outside the breakers. Matt said that he hasn't seen any croakers come in from the surf.

Hook'em At the Cook'em Tackle Shop in the Indian River Marina, Capt. Bert Adams said that they are starting to see some croakers show up in the back bay by Holt's Landing for anglers fishing with Fishbites clams and squid.

In the Indian River Inlet, a few flounder are being caught, mostly on Gulp! and minnows along with rocks on the north and south side, with most fish in the 16 to 18-inch range. When the current is running good, anglers are having to weed through a lot of short fish to get their keeper.

Stripers and bluefish are also being caught in the Inlet, mostly at night during the incoming tide by anglers tossing lures.

Inshore, headboats struggled to find keeper flounder and sea bass last week. Heavy winds created tough drift conditions. When the conditions were right, anglers got into some good catches at the Old Grounds.

Fenwick Shoal continues to produce bluefin and Spanish mackerel for boats trolling spoons and anglers also found triggerfish and weakfish, in the 15 to 16-inch range, on the wreck.

From the beach, surfcasters got into kingfish during early morning and late evening trips while soaking Fishbite sand fleas. At night, anglers fishing with cut bait at night are mainly dealing with sharks and skates.

Offshore, boats continued to pound the area around Massey's Landing, chunking butterfish for both bluefin tuna and yellowfin tuna. Those that didn't want to deal with the 200 boats in Massey's headed to the Baltimore Canyon for yellowfins and dolphin.

Interestingly, Capt. Roger on the "Capt. Bob II" headboat reported seeing bluefins

busting the surface around the Washingtonian wreck on Sunday. Capt. Roger said that the bluefins looked to be 40 to 60 lb. class fish.

Deepdroppers headed to the Baltimore Canyon over the weekend to look for hook-ups of tilefish while dropping squid. Bert said that one group, during an overnight trip, caught a snowy grouper in the Baltimore.

The marlin bite was strong in the Norfolk Canyon, but Bert said that not many Indian River boats headed that far last weekend.

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

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Flounder Stuffed with Shrimp and Crabmeat

Stuffing

1 TBSP. olive oil

2 TBSP. butter

1 small onion, chopped fine

3 garlic cloves, minced

2 stalks celery, chopped fine

1/2 red bell pepper, chopped fine

4 oz. shrimp, chopped fine about a 1/2 cup

1/2 tsp. salt

1 tsp. Old Bay Seasoning, or 1/2 tsp. cayenne

6 oz. lump crabmeat

4 TBSP. Panco breadcrumbs

Fish 4 flounder fillets 4 TBSP. butter, melted 3 TBSP. lemon juice Kosher salt, to taste Black pepper, to taste 2 tsp. paprika 1 lemon, cut into wedges for garnish

Preheat the oven to 400-degrees.

In a sauté pan, heat the olive oil and butter.

Add the onions, garlic, celery, and peppers.

Sauté for 2 minutes, or until the vegetables are wilted.

Add the shrimp and season with salt and Old Bay.

Sauté for 2 minutes.

Remove from the heat and place mixture into a bowl.

Gently stir in the crabmeat, then the bread crumbs a little at a time, adding more as needed to gently bind.

Set aside to cool.

Place equal amounts of filling onto each fillet and roll up. (alternatively, you can place one fillet on the baking sheet, place filling atop the fillet, then place another on top, off to the side, to resemble a pocket of stuffing).

Place the fish on a baking dish, seam side down.

Drizzle the fish with the butter and sprinkle with lemon juice.

Sprinkle top of fish with salt, black pepper and paprika.

Place the pan in the oven and bake for 20-25 minutes until fish is cooked thru.

Remove the fish from the oven and serve with lemon wedges.

Flounder and Summer Vegetables in Foil

1 cup quartered cherry or grape tomatoes

1 cup diced summer squash

1 cup thinly sliced red onion

-⊗-

12 green beans, trimmed,

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cut into 1-inch pieces

1/4 cup pitted and coarsely chopped black olives

2 TBSP. lemon juice

1 TBSP. chopped fresh oregano

1 TBSP. extra-virgin olive oil

1 tsp. capers, rinsed

1/2 tsp. salt, divided 1/2 tsp. pepper, divided

1 lb. flounder fillets, cut into 4 equal portions

Preheat grill to medium.

Combine tomatoes, squash, onion, green beans, olives, lemon juice, oregano, oil, capers, 1/4 tsp. salt and 1/4 tsp. pepper in a large bowl.

To make a packet, lay two 20-inch sheets of foil on top of each other; generously coat the top piece with cooking spray.

Place one portion of flounder in the center of the foil.

Sprinkle with some of the remaining 1/4 tsp. salt and pepper, then top with about 3/4 cup of the vegetable mixture.







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Bring the short ends of the foil together, leaving enough room in the packet for steam to gather and cook the food.

Fold the foil over and pinch to seal.

Pinch seams together along the sides.

Make sure all the seams are tightly sealed to keep steam from escaping.

Repeat procedure with more foil, salt, pepper and remaining fish and veggies.

Grill the bundles until the fish is cooked through and the vegetables are just tender, about 15 minutes.

Serves 4.

Italian Seasoned Butter Shrimp

1 lb. shrimp
1 1/2 tsp. Italian seasoning
2 tsp. oil
Half of a lemon
Salt, pepper and garlic powder
1 stick butter

Pat shrimp dry.
Place shrimp in a bowl or
Ziplock bag.

Coat shrimp with olive oil. Season with the Italian seasoning, add a dash of garlic powder, salt and pepper.

Mix well.

Add shrimp to pan and add the butter, once butter melts, stir well.

Cook 5-6 minutes on medium-high heat, stirring a few times.

Once shrimp is removed from heat, add the juice from the lemon (to taste) and mix.

Serve with cocktail sauce.



- 2 limes (1 for juicing, 1 for garnish)

- 1/4 tsp. cumin
- 1/8 tsp. black pepper
- 1 lb. jumbo shrimp, peeled and deveined

3/4 cup Panko breadcrumbs 3/4 cup Parmesan cheese finely grated 3 TBSP. unsalted butter room temperature 3 TBSP. mayonnaise 3 green onions, green tops only thinly sliced 1 tsp. Worchester sauce 1/2 tsp. Tabasco 1 1/2 TBSP. lemon juice (1/2 lemon)

Salt and pepper to taste

4 flounder fillets

Lightly butter a baking dish or individual gratin dishes for the fillets.

Pat the fish completely dry with paper towels and season generously with salt and pepper.

Arrange the fish in a lightly buttered baking dish or gratin dishes.

Spread about 3 TBSP. of the cheese mixture over each fillet.

Place in preheated oven; bake until bubbly and almost cooked through, about 8 to 10 minutes.

Move fillets to broiler for 2-3 minutes to brown and crisp the tops.

Fish should flake easily



1/4 tsp. black pepper

2 TBSP. extra-virgin olive oil

3 TBSP. red wine vinegar

1 tsp. Dijon mustard

2/3 cup grape tomatoes, halved

1/4 cup pitted and quartered nicoise olives

Place eggs in a large saucepan.

Add tuna to pan; cook 2 minutes on each side.

Cut thinly across the grain. Combine remaining salt, oil, vinegar and mustard in a small bowl, stir with a wisk.

Add tomatoes and olives; toss.

Divide eggs, potatoes, beans and tuna among 4 plates; top with tomato mixture.

Roasted Sea Bass

1 sea bass, scaled and gutted and preferably with heads on

2 TBSP. olive oil

2 TBSP. fresh lemon juice

1 bay leaf

1 tsp. dried thyme

1/2 cup minced fresh parsley

1 tsp. minced garlic Salt and pepper to taste

Score each side of the fish 2 or 3 times, from top to bottom, right down to the bone.

Mix together all the other ingredients and marinate the fish in it, refrigerated, for 30 to 60 minutes.

Preheat oven to 450 degrees.

Roast the fish, undisturbed, in a lightly greased baking dish until done, 20 to 30 minutes, depending on the size.

Serves 4.



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



Pish by Capt. Franky Pettolina Stories

I first met Gus in the mid-1980s. He and a group of his buddies had chartered the "Last Call" for a day of canyon I was barely a fishing. teenager, just starting my career of fish harassment working as a mate, with my Dad as the captain. Gus and his crew were high rollers. As a kid I didn't understand how they had made their money (looking back, I think it was in the stock market or something like that), but they were a example of the excitement and wealth of the 80s. The food and drink they brought for the trip was spectacular. Gourmet snacks and top shelf drinks. I can't remember if they lit their cigars with hundred dollar bills, but I am positive that they could have! As much as a 13-year-old and a grown man can hit it off, Gus and I did. If you ask him, Gus will say it was because I already had the start of a beard and the mouth of a sailor. He thought it was hysterical to have a kid shouting profanity at him while he was catching a tuna.

At the end of that first trip one of his buddies caught a white marlin. The fish was really energetic and put on quite a show for the party. It jumped all over the ocean and lit up like a neon sign. Gus got an excited look in his eye and

told me he had a son who was 6-years-old. He wanted to know how old I thought his boy needed to be able to catch one of those marlins. I told him 10-years-old. birthday is in July. Do you think you can catch him a marlin for his 10th birthday if I charter you that day?" Gus asked me. Being the smart mouthed, cocky kid that I was, I not only told him I thought I could, I guaranteed it!!! In the back of my mind I figured this promise would probably increase my tip for that day, and what are the odds of this guy showing back up in 4 years with his kid?

Well, you guessed it, Gus came back every year and he made sure to remind me of my promise too. When 1990 finally rolled around and his boy was about to turn 10, Gus booked the trip. It was time for me to step up and make good on my guaranteed marlin. I guess I should point out that marlin fishing has been pretty good over the past few years, but back in the late 80s and early 90s, this wasn't the case. If you caught 10 or more in a season back then, you were having a pretty good year. And there I was with my mouth writing checks that my baits might not be able to cash!

On the morning of the trip, Gus showed up with his boy,

Angelo. Ang was a quiet kid, on the small side for a 10-yearold. I remember thinking that I might have bitten off more than I could chew, but Gus was armed with a video camera and an optimistic outlook. I knew I had to give it my best. Thankfully, it was a flat calm day. When we got to the canyon, Dad pulled back the throttles and laid out the outriggers. I put out 6 baits from the cockpit. Ballyhoos with assorted skirts on the outriggers, swimming mullets on the flat lines. I took little

Ang over to the bait cooler and I told him that he could pick out the bait for the bridge pole that I was going to pass up to my Dad. He picked out a ballyhoo with a black and purple Sailure made by the Island Lure Company (the company that makes the famous Hawaiian Eye). I ran it out through the middle of our spread and handed it up to Dad and he ran it up the center rigger.

As we were trolling along the wall of the canyon, I spotted a pallet floating a little



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ways away from us. I ran up to the fly bridge and pointed it out to Dad. Knowing that dolphin fish hang out around any sort of debris, Dad and I both got excited. A few small dolphin would be the perfect warm-up fish for Angelo, so we trolled over in that direction. As my left side baits trolled past the pallet, I anxiously awaited the first of the green, eating machines to We got attacked alright, but not by dolphins. No sooner had we passed the pallet when a white marlin came charging out behind my left long rigger. It was a textbook white marlin bite. The fish came to the middle of the spread and turned on the skirted ballyhoo. It's pectoral fins lit up like a Christmas tree. After two slashes at the bait, it engulfed it. I was ready with the reel in free spool and I gave it my customary drop back. When I engaged the drag and cranked the slack out, I held my breath waiting for the line to come tight and

the fish to come up jumping.... NO DICE!!!! I MISSED HIM!!! guaranteed marlin showed up and I MISSED HIM!!! Immediately, panic set in. I pulled the reel back to free spool and prayed that he would come back. What seemed like hours later, but in reality was probably only a minute or two, I heard some satisfied laughter coming from the fly bridge. I looked up and there was Dad smiling with a bowed over fishing rod in his hand. About a hundred yards behind the boat, the marlin came up jumping. Dad handed me the rod and told Gus to come over and help Ang in the chair. I handed the rod to Ang and Gus helped his son start the battle while I cleared the other lines. After the other baits were safely out of the way, Gus had me take over supervising Ang so the videography could begin. The fish behaved well and Angelo cranked like a grown man. Everything went perfect. We slowly backed up to the fish. Ang kept the line tight and pumped the rod for all he was worth. Ten or fifteen minutes later I had a firm grasp of the fish's bill and Gus took the rod so Ang could come get a close look at his fish. We took some measurements for a release mount to be made.

The deal was closed. I somehow delivered promised white marlin to a boy on his tenth birthday. The fish ate the bait that the boy chose from the bait cooler. It couldn't get any better. I am not sure whose smile was the biggest on the boat that day. Gus was one proud papa and Ang was one excited little boy. I was one relieved mate! The rest of the trip was not quite as exciting, but we did catch a few dolphin. When we got back to the slip at Bahia Marina, Dale Timmons was waiting to take a picture for the Coastal Fisherman. To this day I still have the clipping in my scrapbook.


There are many pictures of kids in this issue. The Marlin

Some of that stuff might have happened, but I remember one thing very clearly. Gus looked at me and said, "My other son, Ari is 3. You have 7 years to get ready to do it again...." But that's a whole other fish story.







Size

Commonly 5.5 feet up to 7.5 feet. Weight ranges from 55 lbs. up to over 90 lbs.

Distinguishing Characteristics


- First anal, first dorsal and pectoral fins blunt or rounded at tips (first anal fin shape most consistent characteristic); most of first dorsal fin low.
- Pelvic fins short, extending no longer than length of pectoral fin.
- Lateral line single (not chainlike), arched over pectoral fins, then almost straight to caudal fin.
- First dorsal fin blue-black with small dark spots; other fins brown to black.

Habitat

Offshore, usually upper 65-100 feet, depending on water temperature; associated with water temperature greater than 68-degrees

Similar Species

Blue marlin - has first dorsal, pectoral and first anal fins with pointed tips; chainlike lateral line along body; lacks fin spots on first dorsal. **Longbill spearfish** - has anus well in front of anal fins.



Size

Commonly 8-9 feet up to 14.5 feet. Blue marlins over 350 lbs. are most likely female.

Distinguishing Characteristics

- First anal, first dorsal and pectoral fins generally pointed at tips; most of first dorsal fin low
- Pelvic fins short, extending no longer than length of pectoral fins.
- First dorsal fin blue-black, lacking fin spots; other fins brown to black.
- Lateral line chainlike over entire body surface (rather than single line) in juveniles, unclear in adult.

Habitat

Offshore; usually in surface water between 71 and 88-degrees.

Similar Species

White marlin - has first dorsal, pectoral and first anal fins with rounded tips; spotted first dorsal membranes. Longbill spearfish - has anus well in front of anal fins.

Size

Commonly 5.5 feet up to 7.5 feet. Weight ranges from 55 lbs. up to over 90 lbs.

Distinguishing Characteristics

- First anal, first dorsal and pectoral fins blunt or rounded at tips (first anal fin shape most consistent characteristic); most of first dorsal fin low.
- Pelvic fins short, extending no longer than length of pectoral fin.
- Lateral line single (not chainlike), arched over pectoral fins, then almost straight to caudal fin.
- First dorsal fin blue-black with small dark spots; other fins brown to black.

Habitat

Offshore, usually upper 65-100 feet, depending on water temperature; associated with water temperature greater than 68-degrees

Similar Species

Blue marlin - has first dorsal, pectoral and first anal fins with pointed tips; chainlike lateral line along body; lacks fin spots on first dorsal. **Longbill spearfish** - has anus well in front of anal fins.



Size

Commonly 5-feet up to 6.5-feet total length and 90 lbs.

Distinguishing Characteristics

- Anus well in front of anal fins (unlike any other billfish)
- •1st dorsal fin slightly pointed and truncasted at tip, moderately high over entire body length; no fin spots.
- Pelvic fins slightly longer than pectoral fins
- Pectoral fins generally wide and long.
- •Upper jaw (bill) shorter than other billfish bills
- Body longer and thinner than other billfish
- •Single lateral line

Habitat

Offshore, usually in waters above thermocline. Rarest of all billfish.

Similar Species

Blue marlin and **white marlin** - have anus close to anal fins and relatively longer upper bills.



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Virginia Fishing Report by Dr. Julie-Ball 1.G.F.A Representative

Thunderstorms and blazing heat can make fishing efforts difficult, but in general the weather is good. So what's on everyone's mind right now? Mostly cobia and flounder.

Cobia action is still with anglers noteworthy, reporting a dozen or more hook-ups on outings. Plenty of rats ranging up to around 30pounds are responding well to offerings from sightcasters in lower Bay waters, and along the oceanfront lately. Some bigger fish are also available, with cobia pushing to over 50pounds boated last week. Chummers battling the heat continue to hold their own with some good action, but plenty of trash fish are also competing for their bait right now.

The hot summer flounder scene continues to draw attention, with nice doormats

hitting the scales lately. Anglers working structure with jigs adorned with artificial baits such as Gulp! Jerk Shads and live bait are scoring along the Bay Bridge Tunnel pilings and tubes. The 1st and 4th Island areas of the CBBT and Back River Reef were the best flattie hot spots last week. Several boats are also finding good hauls of nice fish on inshore and nearshore wrecks. A few keepers are also responding in Lynnhaven and Rudee Inlets, while the Eastern Shore seaside inlets continue to hold their own lately, with reports of limits of keepers last week.

Along the span of the Bay Bridge Tunnel, sheepshead anglers are faring well with some big fish using fiddler crabs or clams as bait. Aggressive triggerfish will also take your offerings in the same areas. Spadefish are having a good year, with a nicer class of fish pushing to around 8pounds available around the islands and pilings of the CBBT, at the Chesapeake Light Tower, the Tower Reef and several inshore wrecks. The inshore wrecks are also harboring some nice sea bass, triggerfish and flounder.

Spanish mackerel continue to dominate the trolling scene along the oceanfront, with some citation-sized fish boated lately. These bigger fish are coming from shallower water on small Drone or Clark spoons trolled at a quick clip.

King mackerel have been sighted skying along the Virginia Beach shorelines this week, with rumors of a few catches.

Red drum are still providing topwater action as they school around the mouth of the Bay and along the www.coastalfisherman.net

Virginia Beach coastline. Boats targeting sharks are having good luck with a variety of toothy species ranging to around 4-feet or more, especially off the oceanfront area.

Croaker are always a favorite this time of year, with good catches reported from most everywhere from the HRBT to Cape Henry. The hardhead bite out of Oyster is not strong yet, but plenty of folks are there trying their luck. Decent fish ranging to around a pound are biting near Buoy 42, and off of Kiptopeke State Park. Some nice fish are also coming from Rudee and Lynnhaven Inlets along with some spot. Puppy drum and speckled trout are also still possibilities in the shallows and inlets.

Virginia tarpon are drawing hard core tarpon hunters to the back waters of Oyster, with reports of sightings and hookups of silver kings trickling in. If you go, be prepared to also tangle with exhausting huge Southern rays and big mean bull sharks in the hot sun,



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while also battling Eastern Shore flies.

Deep dropping is still a good choice, with quality blueline tilefish, golden tilefish, blackbellied rosefish and nice grouper on the menu. Jumbo black sea bass are also available, mixed in with the tilefish. Amberjack are available near offshore wrecks and at the Southern Towers, but most boats are more interested in the good offshore action instead.

The offshore bite is still good, with the billfish scene improving daily. Boats are raising a decent number of white marlin in spreads recently, but those using livebaiting techniques are outperforming other methods. A smattering of blue marlin are also adding some excitement for bluewater trollers. Yellowfin tuna in the 50-pound range are still hitting in the Canyon, with school-sized Bluefin tuna ranging to around 100-pounds and some nice bigeye tuna rounding out catches. Mahi are a guarantee right now, with some big gaffer-sized fish thrilling anglers, with some fish tilting the scale to around 50pounds boated last week. Wahoo are also becoming more common.


