Turning to offshore fishing, the colder weather this spring has limited the offshore action to date. Only a few years ago we would be reporting some yellowfin and bluefin tuna, some mahi and even make caught by now. Changes to the mako regulations a couple of years ago have reduced that catch and we haven't had April tuna reports in a while. This year's high wind hasn't helped either. We did see warm waters a few days recently as close as 72 miles, so it is coming! The trend of early white marlin catches may continue as well. Last year's catch was May 23rd, so we are keeping our eyes and ears open. This year that marlin could be worth up to \$17,000! The Town of

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
Ocean City puts up \$5,000 to the lucky angler releasing the first white and the Ocean City Marlin Club offers the same to the first member to report. Additionally, Fisherman United Ocean City, a group of local business owners including the Coastal Fisherman will contribute \$7,000 this year. So that first white could add up to a nice payday.

The real fishing action right now is inshore and in the bays. It has been a good season for tautog nearshore and over the last 2 weeks there have been nice flounder catches in the bays when anglers have found warmer water. More details on what's 'catchin', where and with what can be found in our Ocean City and Delaware reports.

Also remember to check our Delaware, Maryland and Federal regulation listings. Not alot has changed, but



you will want to make sure you have the lastest. For example, Marlyand has now posted regulations for cobia, the creel limit for tog is reduced to 2 fish per day from July 1st to October 31st and the keeper size for speckled trout has gone up to 14". Delaware remains largely the same as 2020, however regulations for croaker are still 'TBD'. No big updates on the Federal Size & Creel limits, just remember however that there are new permit and



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reporting requirements for Likewise, some supplies tilefish that went into effect like bait and tackle are still last September. limited, so plan ahead if you


New for the Coastal Fisherman this year will be our inclusion of social

Lastly, there is optimism in the air that we may see a more normal summer season and I am sure we all are hoping for the same. I do want to share that there are still lingering restrictions for capacities at restaurants and other venues that vary by state. This is further complicated by an extreme lack of labor available or willing to work these seasonal jobs. This is affecting all aspects of services at the shore, so we do ask for everyone's patience.

limited, so plan ahead if you can. Some good news came for Maryland late last month, the Governor's latest update to Covid Executive Order removed the restriction on capacity for head boats and in a brief conversation I had with the Maryland DNR, the requirement for masks on commercial and recreational boats has been lifted. As of this edition, Delaware still requires masks for non family groups where social distancing of 6' cannot be maintained and it appears headboats may be limited to 50% of Coast Guard capacity rating. Most of these boats don't operate at to near capacity normally anyway, so reservations are always a good idea. I expect these regulations to change quickly and it is unclear what level of enforcement is taking place. As with supplies, planning early and calling ahead is highly recommended.



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

As the 2021 fishing season begins, many look to this new year with a renewed sense of hope. The past year has been a hard one with Covid shutdown, sickness, and uncertainty. As more people are vaccinated and begin to return to a sense of normal we look to the new fishing season with anticipation. Last year gave the fish a much needed break with fewer anglers on the water. For anglers living by the beach, fish seemed to be more plentiful and less wary to bite a hook than in past years. Many anglers look to see if this restock of the population will affect the bite as the summer crowds return to a normal size.

weeks on the 15th. I have received a few reports from tog fishermen that sea bass are starting to show up on the wrecks but most are on near shore wrecks where the water is warmer. On the deeper wrecks the tog bite is some of the best we have seen in years. Large fish can be found on the African Oueen site as well and most wrecks in the 60-120 ft. range. If you can find peeler crab that will be your best bait to try and catch one of these elusive fish. Tog or blackfish stay very close to the wrecks only coming a short way out of their holes to snatch a crab that got too close. Sand fleas usually work well this time of year, however most anglers are telling me

that this year the tog want very little to do with them. Sunset Marina as well as other tackle shops in the area have some green crab but supplies are low and slow to be restocked. So if you find some get them because the odds are when you return they won't be there. Bluefish and stripers are beginning to show up off our shores and even in our back bays. Ocean City Fishing Pier reports some nice keeper rockfish being caught off their dock on predominantly high tides. Cut bait such as bunker is producing the best bites. On the near shore humps small stripers can be trolled up on mojos as well as stretch 25/30's. Due to the temp of the water (about 55 degrees) www.coastalfisherman.net not many rockfish or bluefish have been reported. I expect after this past week of warm weather that number should rise dramatically. Targeting areas very near the coast or very close to the 3 mile line tend to produce the most amount of activity this time of year.

Big Bird Cropper reports small rockfish and a few bluefish have been caught in the inlet. Casting bucktails or soft swim jigs such as the Roy rig are best when targeting these fish. The flounder have begun showing up in the back bays. Ocean City Guide Service reports several nice catches of keeper flounder on green Otter Tails in the channels behind Assateague Island. With this past week of 80 degree weather the bite should really pick up. Squid and minnow combinations are always good this time of year with gulp being a close second. Areas around the

www.coastalfisherman.net Verrazano Bridge are a usual hot spot during late spring. Several black drum have been reported off the beach of Assateague Island. Most of these fish are being caught on surf clams or sand fleas. The closer to the Virginia line the better your chances are. If you are looking to catch a big fish and don't have access to an offshore boat black drum beach fishing can produce fish 60 lbs. and over. In the surf, small rockfish and blues are starting to show up. I have not received any reports of keeper stripers, although small fish are being caught on a regular basis. Cut bait, clams and sand fleas being used by drum fisherman are accounting for most of the catches. Bucktails and plugs have also been catching a few. Reports are that these fish are very close to the shore line so don't cast out real far or you will be outside of their strike zone. A reminder when targeting rockfish with cut or live bait, a non offset circle hook is required.

I have not received any clam reports so far this year. With the water still in the 50's I'm sure the clams will be deep and difficult to find. Crabs in the upper bay behind north Ocean City are beginning to turn on, however, catches are very low. I spoke to a commercial crabber who reported for 130 pots set he only caught 13 dozen crabs. Cold water is the blame for the slow start. So if planning on buying crabs when you get to Ocean City just be aware that prices are definitely high.

So as we wait to see what opens and what the state regulations will be for our town, I wish you all Tight Lines and Fins Up!



#### <u>Spring Forward</u>

Welcome to the 2021 Coastal Fisherman! I am honored to continue the Ship-to-Shore column and working with the Coastal Fisherman crew!

Coastal Thank you to Fisherman Editor and Publisher, Larry Budd who re-started the Coastal Fisherman during a time of economic uncertainty and succeeded with flying colors in his first year and the helm and continues to provide a fantastic publication free-ofcharge to the local and beyond fishing community.

Last spring, our industry was off to a slow start with many unknowns, so much has changed for the good this year. We are off to a fast start this season, with lots of activity in the fishing and boating industry.

Just a few weeks ago I toured the Lindgren-Pitman manufacturing facility in Pompano Florida. Lindgren-Pitman (often referred to as L&P) is the premier deep sea fishing equipment manufacturer. They are busier than ever, working as fast as possible to fill orders; parts and people speeding throughout the factory. Shelves of electric reels

waiting for final testing, Long Line fishing reels being packed up for air freight shipping to overseas destinations, miles of monofilament spooling up from the extruder.



This bustling scene is repeated at other marine manufacturers, whether boat builders, boat yards, marinas and service companies demonstrate both a surge in demand and shortage of materials and often the workforce. Boaters around the country have embraced patience, or at least settled for long delays when getting work done on their boat or buying parts and supplies. Luckily, most of the major marine manufacturers have been accurate in projecting delays, allowing boaters to schedule appropriately. Many informed boaters and anglers

saw this industry backorder landscape this winter and put their orders and service calls in earlier than ever. Just recently a customer ordered a new Garmin radar in March (knowing there was a backorder situation) was given a delivery date about a month later in April and to their credit, Garmin shipped the radar on the scheduled day!

#### What's new and trending for Spring 2021

While the annual Miami boat show was canceled this winter along with other winter shows, there was a Fall Ft. Lauderdale boat show and most recently the Palm beach boat show in March. The exhibitors indicated that the Palm beach boat show was one of the best attended shows of all times. I was able to visit the show and found by midmorning there were crowds of people at almost every exhibit in the tents and walkways.

Marine manufacturers often introduce new products during the winter boat shows and this year the announcements were spread out through the winter, but new and updated products still hit the market and often instantly created backorders!

KVH, the global leader in mobile connectivity announced two important items for the VSAT, voice and internet market. First, they announced that the data network for their oldest

www.coastalfisherman.net TracPhone<sup>®</sup> V/VIP series antenna systems will be discontinued on January 1, 2022 BUT they also announced they are offering major (up to 50% hardware discount plus labor) incentives to existing customers to upgrade to the newest VSAT systems. KVH also announced a new offering in the VSAT market with the TracPhone V30. This new antenna system is an ultracompact, fast, and affordable digital VSAT system with new metered and unlimited worldwide use plans, coverage, and faster speeds that ever before -as fast as 6 Mbps/2 Mbps (down/up). Importantly for boaters who only need satellite internet and phone for a portion of the year, KVH now offers affordable month-to-month service plans, allowing you to sign up for service only when you need it and not paying when you don't. This new V30 has a few additional features that make it great for smaller boats that once could not utilize a stabilized VSAT system - a single cable connection from dome to below deck equipment (previously a bundle of large cables interconnected these components) and the new below deck equipment is much smaller that the traditional 19" rack mounted hardware and is powered by 12v or 24V. These features make the V30 a perfect fit for larger center consoles and traditional sportfish that did not have space for wiring or



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#### equipment.

While software almost tops the list for spring tune-ups, this year is no different. This winter, both Furuno and released software Simrad that enables the SiriusXM fish mapping features on their modern multi-function. Many Furuno and Simrad customers already had the necessary hardware and were patiently waiting for this software. While there were many new features and fixes by both Simrad and Furuno, the SiriusXM fish mapping was the most desired feature customers were anticipating.

Garmin also released lots of new features in their

winter software updates: Jack-plate position message currently utilized in Bob's Jack Plate products, the Reactor<sup>™</sup> 40 Steer-by-wire autopilot is now compatible with the Uflex Integra EPS System, heave PGN (127252) support on NMEA2000, added new fish species supported by the SiriusXM Fish Mapping service and many other features and fixes. Compatibility with the Mercury Marine Smart Craft engines is expected in the second quarter of 2021.

I could not start this Coastal Fisherman season without recognizing the passing of Franky Pettolina. Welcome back to a new year of the Coastal Fisherman. What a year it has been, between Covid shutdowns and new restrictions,lack of supplies, and social distancing..As we start to return to a more normal lifestyle much is still different. At this time most businesses are still operating at a reduced capacity and a distancing mandate. When booking a charter or headboat please bear this in mind.

#### Sea Bass & Tog

Colder air than this time last year has slowed our start. Sea bass is set to open in two weeks. At this time last year the water was much warmer and several reports of nice size sea bass being caught by tog fisherman were coming in on a regular basis. This year very few sea bass reports are heard. As for tog, several reports have been received that tog are here and biting in big numbers. Mark Steelman on the Savanna Lynn out of Lewes Harbour tells me he has been catching several big tog on recent trips. Mark says when he can find crab that is the best bait. Mark reports that peeler crabs are very hard to find this year. Deep water in the 100-130 ft range is producing the best tog. A reminder as we start this year tog are notorious bait stealers. Pay close attention to small bites on your line because if you wait too long the tog and your bait will be gone. Tog rarely ventures far from the wrecks so paying attention to your line will also reduce wreck hang ups. Tog along the rock walls of the Indian River inlet have been producing some keeper tog, however most are under size. Sand fleas and cut blue crab have been producing the best on a flood tide. Austin Mendes weighed in a 10.21 pounder at Lewes Harbour caught on ocean structure.

#### Flounder

Flounder in the back bays are beginning to show up. I mentioned earlier the water temp is around 53 degrees. The end of this past week brought our first true warm spell. Temps in the mid to upper 80s have begun to warm our back bays. The deeper channels such as those near the inlet mouth tend to hold the bigger fish, however on warm days fish can be found on the flats and shallows where the sun warms the water. Minnows and squid combos are the best baits for this time of year. Slow moving current produces the best presentations and therefore the best chance for a bite. Other reported areas holding fish are the area near and in Massey ditch, the north side of the channel near the VFW, and the area by the power plant. Lewes canal has produced a few nice www.coastalfisherman.net flounder with Loghan Slaughter bringing in a nice 20" flounder to Lewes Harbour.

#### **Bluefish & Rockfish**

Bluefish are around, although not in the numbers as last year. Cut bait on a short wire leader is the best producer. Areas just outside of the inlet have seen small schools of these fish mostly on high tides. The near shore wrecks are also producing some decent fish although most are small. The bigger blues should be here in a week or two as more baitfish (mullet) make their move into the area. Trolling for bluefish at the Fenwick Shoal is always a good producer. Spoons, jigs, bucktails and stretch 25 plugs trolled slightly faster as compared to speeds for rockfish will take many of these fish. Around 3-5 mph seems to be the perfect speed when targeting bluefish.

Small stripers are around but I haven't heard of many keepers. Catching a 28-35" is not an easy fish to find in the ocean. Several small rockfish are being caught in the surf. Mike Brown caught several of them on surf bullets



www.coastalfisherman.net just north of the inlet. Remember, if using bait inline, circle hooks are required this year.

### Drum

Several black drum have come off the beaches. Sandra and Nick Roof of Dover caught a nice drum on Broadkill beach. They were fishing with sand fleas. Robert Willis caught a big drum on clams, also at Broadkill beach.

### Clams & Crabs

Due to the colder water, crabbing has been a little slow so far this year. Samantha and I are averaging about 6 keeper crabs per pot compared to last years 10-12 per pot. The key seems to be finding water around 6 ft. and seeing snails in the pots when you pull them up. An occasional oyster cracker fish also signals that crabs are in the area. I have received only one report of clams and that was from the area by Holts Landing. We are receiving reports that they are very deep and lots of effort must be used for a modest return.

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


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
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
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### BLACKFISH BEIGNETS with SPICY SAUCE

Ingredients:

Sauce

1/2 cup mayonnaise

 $1/4 \operatorname{cup} \operatorname{sour} \operatorname{cream}$ 

2 tablespoons ketchup

1 tablespoon Sriracha or other hot chili sauce

2 tablespoons chopped fresh chives

1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice

### Batter

3/4 cup all-purpose flour

1/2 teaspoon baking powder

1 large egg yolk

1 cup soda water

2 tablespoons minced fresh chives

2/3 cup canola oil

1 pound blackfish (tautog) or other firm white fish fillets, cut into 1/2inch slices (about 12)

#### Salt



For the Sauce:

Mix all the ingredients thoroughly in a bowl. Cover and refrigerate until needed.

For the Batter:

Put the flour, baking powder, egg yolk, and half the soda water in a bowl and mix until smooth with a whisk. Add the rest of the soda water and the chives and mix well. (The batter can be made up to a few hours ahead and refrigerated.)

### For the Beignets:

Preheat the oven to 175 degrees. Heat half the oil in a large skillet,



preferably nonstick, until hot. Dip 4 pieces of the fish into the batter until coated on all sides and place in the hot oil. Cook for 2 1/2 to 3 minutes on each side Transfer to a wire rack set over a baking sheet, sprinkle with salt, and keep warm in the oven. Repeat with the remaining fish, adding more oil to the skillet as needed. Serve with the sauce.

Note: If making the beignets ahead, reheat them under a hot broiler for a couple of minutes on each side before serving.

#### SIMPLE OVEN BAKED SEA BASS

Ingredients:

1 lb. sea bass (cleaned & scaled)

3 garlic cloves, minced or crushed

1 Tbsp. extra virgin olive oil

1 tsp. Italian seasoning or 1 tablespoon fresh parsley leaves

2 tsp. fresh coarse ground black pepper

1 tsp. salt

2 lemon wedges

1/3 cup white wine vinegar



(optional) or 1/3 cup white wine (optional)

Directions:

Preheat oven to 450F°.

In a cup, mix garlic, olive oil, salt, and black pepper.

Place fish in a shallow glass or ceramic baking dish.

Rub fish with oil mixture.

(Optional) Pour wine over fish.

Bake fish, uncovered, for 15 minutes; then sprinkle with parsley or Italian seasoning and continue to bake for 5 more minutes (or until the thickest part of the fish flakes easily).

Drizzle remaining pan juices over fish and garnish with lemon wedges.

### 20-MINUTE BAKED FLOUNDER AU GRATIN

Ingredients:

4 - 6 oz. flounder fillets, or any

1/4 cup melted butter

1 cup panko crumbs

2/3 cups freshly grated Parmigiano Reggiano cheese

1/2 tsp. kosher salt

Cracked black pepper, to taste

melted butter.

Place the flounder fillets on a lightly oiled baking dish. Brush the tops of the fillets with 1 Tbsp.

Preheat the oven to 400° F.

In a small bowl, combine the panko bread crumbs, grated cheese, kosher salt, ground black pepper, and thyme. Add the rest of the melted butter to the crumb mixture and mix it until the crumb mixture becomes buttery, crumbly, and golden in color.

Sprinkle the crumb mixture over the fillets and lightly press the crumb mixture down into the fillets.

Bake the fish for 12-15 minutes, or until the fish is opaque, flakes easily with a fork, and reaches an internal temperature of 145° F.

This recipe goes great with a vegetable side, pasta, potatoes— pretty much anything!

### ROCKIN' OYSTERS ROCKEFELLER

Ingredients:

48 fresh, unopened oysters

 $1\frac{1}{2}$  cups beer

2 cloves garlic seasoned salt to taste

7 black peppercorns

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup butter

1 onion, chopped

1 clove garlic, crushed

1 (10 ounce) package frozen chopped spinach, thawed and drained

8 oz. Monterey Jack cheese, shredded



8 oz. fontina cheese, shredded 8 oz. mozzarella cheese, shredded

1/2 cup milk

2 teaspoons salt, or to taste

1 teaspoon ground black pepper

2 tablespoons fine bread crumbs

Directions:

Clean oysters, and place in a large stockpot. Pour in beer and enough water to cover oysters; add 2 cloves garlic, seasoned salt, and peppercorns. Bring to a boil. Remove from heat, drain, and cool.

Once oysters are cooled, break off and discard the top shell. Arrange the oysters on a baking sheet. Preheat oven to 425 degrees F (220 degrees C.)

Melt butter in a saucepan over medium heat. Cook onion and garlic in butter until soft. Reduce heat to low, and stir in spinach, Monterey Jack, fontina, and mozzarella. Cook until cheese melts, stirring frequently. Stir in the milk, and season with salt and pepper. Spoon sauce over each oyster, just filling the shell. Sprinkle with bread crumbs.

Bake until golden and bubbly, approximately 8 to 10 minutes.

### BLACK SEA BASS with SHRIMP in LEMON SCAMPI SAUCE

Ingredients:

12-14 ounces black sea bass fillets

6 - 16-20 count shrimp peeled & deveined

1 tablespoon capers

1 clove garlic – finely chopped

### **BLACKENED DRUM**

Ingredients:

Sweet Potatoes:

2 tablespoons grapeseed oil

2 1/2 pounds sweet potatoes, peeled and diced

- 1/4 cup molasses
- 1 teaspoon chili powder
- 1 pinch cayenne pepper

Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper

Green Beans:

Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper

2 1/2 pounds green beans, ends trimmed

2 tablespoons unsalted butter

Juice of 1 lemon

Blackened Drum:

- 1 cup Cajun blackening spice
- 1 tablespoon kosher salt, if needed
- 6 skinless black drum fillets

1/4 cup grapeseed oil

Herb Butter, recipe follows, for serving

Directions:

For the sweet potatoes: Heat a large skillet over high heat until smoking hot. Add the grapeseed oil and then the sweet potatoes. Allow the potatoes to sear for 2 to 3 minutes and then turn the heat down to medium. Toss the sweet

www.coastalfisherman.net potatoes and cook until tender, 15 to 20 minutes. Add the molasses, chili powder and cayenne and toss to coat. Cook for 2 to 3 minutes more. Season with salt and pepper and keep warm.

For the green beans: Bring a large pot of water (seasoned with 2 tablespoons salt per gallon of water) to a rolling boil. Prepare an ice bath to shock the beans. Add about one-quarter of the beans to the boiling water (you don't want to add so many beans that the water loses the boil) and cook until crisp-tender, 2 to 3 minutes. Remove the beans from the water with a skimmer and shock in the ice bath. Repeat until all of the beans are cooked. Remove the beans from the ice bath and dry with a towel.

Heat a large skillet over high heat. Melt the butter and then add the green beans. Sauté the green beans until tender and slightly browned,



2 to 3 minutes. Add the lemon juice, season with salt and pepper and keep warm.

For the blackened drum: Combine the blackening spice and salt, reducing or omitting the salt as needed (taste the spice mix first as some brands already have salt added). Spread the spice mixture on a plate and coat each side of the fish fillets.

Heat a large skillet over high heat. Add the grapeseed oil, gently lay the fish in the skillet and sear until the spices have blackened and formed a nice crust on the fish, 3 to 4 minutes. Gently flip the fish and sear on the second side for 3 to 4 minutes more. Remove from the pan and allow the fillets to rest for a few minutes before plating.

For serving: Mound some of the sweet potatoes in the centers of 6 plates. Place the green beans on top of the sweet potatoes and then top each plate with a fillet of fish. Top the fish with some herb butter and serve while the butter is melting over the hot fish.

Herb Butter:

Dale Lisi found the water temperature hovering around 72-degrees. The shark was hooked at 11:00 at night and took 90 minutes to get to the boat. Fishing with Capt. Dale and mate Eddie Braxton were Rob Reusch, Derek Fisher, Jason Kilby, Harvey A. Fisher, Nick Benjamin and Harvey E. Fisher.






