



Unfortunately, bad weather plagued us for a couple of prime fishing days last week, but besides that we continue to see good action in the bay, on ocean structure and further offshore.

We survived another year of the Kid's Classic, and when I say "survived" I mean that in a good way. Imagine a tournament with 334 junior anglers, weighing in everything from spot, silver perch, flounder, ovster crackers, blowfish and yellowfin tuna. You can imagine the scene at the scales. It's pretty amazing what this tournament has developed into over the last 8 years. Hats off to Amanda Schick and others at the Ocean City Marlin Club for all the hard work they do to make this tournament a success!

#### Tuna

When weather permitted, anglers chunking with butterfish and sardines at the Hot Dog got into good numbers of yellowfin tuna.

Early in the week, boats crushed the yellowfins with several boats returning with incredible catches. On Monday, the "Marli" boated 24, followed by the "Iade II" with 22, Rhonda's Osprey with 17 and the "Grasshopper" with 15. Tuesday and Wednesday saw the bite mellow a bit, with most boats still having an excellent day with 4 to 9 yellowfins in the box. A few were even caught further south in the Washington Canyon. On Thursday, we were back to double-digit catches, led by the

with "Restless Lady" yellowfins. "That's Right" and the "Dawg Haus" each returned with 14 yellowfins and "White Lightning" and "Reelentless" both had 13 in the box.

The rough seas on Friday and Saturday prevented boats from hitting the tuna grounds, although the "Heavy Metal" amazingly ventured out to outside the Hot Dog on Saturday and returned with a couple of 40+ lb. yellowfins.

The bite on Sunday was pretty slow with most boats only catching a couple yellowfins during their trip to the Hot Dog.

### Marlin

With the majority of boats spending their time on the incredible tuna bite at the Hot Dog, we didn't see much in the way of marlin catches last week until in the Kid's Classic on Sunday when 4 white marlin and 3 blue marlin releases were registered from the Washington and Baltimore Canyons. "Heavy addition, released a sailfish during the tournament.

#### Wahoo

A wahoo was caught last week on the "Reel Joy" during a trip to the Washington Canyon on Wednesday and one was caught on the "Espadon" on

#### Tilefish / Groupers

The "Wound Up" has been into deep dropping lately and had 7 tilefish and 3 groupers during a trip to the Norfolk Canyon on Tuesday.

Unfortunately, we received news that the 50 lb. snowy grouper caught by Gregory Benn on July 1st will not be recognized as a state record because a Maryland DNR representative was not present to verify the This is really a species. ridiculous rule that the state implemented a few years ago when a fish on the Western shore was misidentified and thought to be a new state record, only to be disqualified. Since it is pretty easy to identify most species, plus there are always plenty of pictures taken of the catch, in my opinion, to drag a MD DNR representative to the scale to verify an easily identifiable fish is a complete waste of time and can cost a well deserving angler the recognition they deserve.

#### Flounder

This year will definitely go down as one of the best flounder fishing years in recent memory. What we saw last week were anglers continuing to catch good numbers of fish in the bay, but throwback ratio was definitely higher than it has been in recent weeks.

Those venturing out to ocean structure are really getting into good numbers of large flatties. This inshore flounder fishery is one that will definitely grow in popularity as more anglers discover the prime locations to catch bigger flounder with less boat traffic. A good example of this was the group on the "Catfish" who hit some offshore structure and came back with 12 beauties, caught on flounder belly. All the fish were nice, and

The local charter and head boats continue to return with happy customers, so if you want to catch some flat fish but don't have a boat, give one of

them a call.

Not much to talk about when it comes to linesiders last week. Bite was very minimal. Those drifting live eels or spot at night picked up a few, but definitely nothing to write home about. I think the water is just too darn warm.

#### **Sea Bass**

Anglers have had some great days fishing for sea bass on ocean wrecks and reefs. The "Angler" returned with some beautiful fish over 3 lbs. last week and the "Morning Star" reported having their best sea bass trip this year.

Capt. Monty said that the sea bass have been mixed in with flounder. One day the sea bass will be chewing and the next day it will be flounder on your hook. Just hard to predict.

#### In the Surf

We are in the summer doldrums for anglers fishing from the beaches. Kingfish, snapper bluefish, rays and some Norfolk spot are being caught by anglers using Fishbite bloodworms or small chunks of fresh bait.

At night, anglers are hooking into larger sharks, with sand tigers and duskys dominating the action.


#### **Upcoming Tournament**





Besides setting an alarm and getting to the boat on time, all the serious decisions are made by the captain. All you have to do is show up, and go along for the

Well, maybe just a few words of preparation.... If you are prone to motion sickness, take along a sea sick pill. Don't party hard the night before and get a good night's sleep. Be sure to have a good pair of sunglasses, a hat, some sunscreen and a pair of shoes that won't slide on the deck. If you are keeping your catch, carry a cooler with some ice along with some drinks and something to eat. Carry extra money so you can rent a rod, tip the mate and pay for your fish cleaning.

I went out with Capt. Monty on the "Morning Star" last week, and it was HOT! I was really glad I carried along a couple bottles of water and some Gatorade. It's really important to hydrate yourself and replenish your body with water and electrolytes when you are sweating and cranking in fish! I heard some guys saying that they drank a lot of water the night before when they heard it was going to be nearly 100 degrees.

I think one of the best parts of the day when going out on a party boat is the ride out (and also the ride back in.) You can bottlenose dolphins swimming by the boat and watch all the other boats heading offshore. You can see seagulls flying, baitfish jumping and sometimes even a whale! People meet new friends and chit-chat about past fishing experiences. It can be lots of fun. Even if you are a quiet type person, just listening

to all the conversations can be entertaining.

Being in the tackle business, I hear it all the time. Some people go out and get disappointed that they didn't catch many fish. Others don't care at all and just want to take their kids out for the experience and a boat ride. If you are after a serious fish dinner or two, it's usually always better to spend the extra money and time and fish on a full-day party boat. They can go out further and spend more time fishing. On a full-day party boat you can expect to spend at least an hour or more getting to the fishing grounds.

When I was out on the party boat, I heard some ladies saying that they didn't know anything much about fishing and probably wouldn't catch much. Well, I looked around and they were laughing and cranking up fish and having a good time. Why? They listened to the captain and mate and did what they were told! It's that simple sometimes...

When I went out, I spent some time making some special flounder rigs of my own. After I lost them to the bottom because I made the bottom hook too long and got snagged, the mate made me up a rig and guess what? I started catching more fish!

You can be the greatest fisherman in the world, but when you are in Ocean City on a

certain wreck and the captain and mate tell you to fish or baitup in a certain way, they know from experience what you should be doing. That experience may be from fishing the day before or from years and years of fishing. Look, watch, and listen....

So, when I went fishing on the "Morning Star" last week we were drifting along the bottom on an artificial reef site. There were sea bass and flounder biting at the same time. Which do you fish for? Well, both of course!

The captain and mate told us to put a strip of cut bait on the bottom hook. They had the bottom hook dressed up with bucktail teasers or plastic squids. They had strips of squid and other fish strips with the skin on so they stayed on the hook really good. We were told to make sure the strips did not ball up on the hook. They needed to dangle and stay straight so it would be attractive to the flounder that were lurking below. On the top hook, which was left bare, we were told to put on some fresh clam. I know all about clam! You pierce the hard part first and drape the yucky dark part of the clam over the tip of the hook. That's the part the sea bass really like. You need to keep the clam bait fresh and if it gets chewed off, add more to it. Bigger bait, bigger bass!

Drop the rig while using anywhere from 4 to 8 ounces of weight so it goes to the bottom. You need to stay on the bottom to catch fish. For flounder, you need to jig a bit. Bounce, bounce, bounce, stop... jerk, jerk, jerk, stop.... It takes a little more finesse to hook a flounder than a sea bass. You have to let the flounder eat it for a moment before setting the hook. You want to hook sea bass ASAP! After fishing for a while, you will notice the difference between a sea bass bite and a flounder bite.

If you get a nice sea bass on, you can pull it out of the water and over the rail. If you get a nice flounder to the surface, don't pull it out of the water. Yell for a net! If you know it's a flounder in advance before seeing it, let someone know as you are pulling it up so the mate will be ready with the net. Flounder have a distinct feel when you are reeling them in. The rod tip will be moving up and down much more so than with a sea bass. A much bigger fight!

A full-day party boat trip is an adventure and well worth the money (as long as you don't get sea sick of course.) The captain makes all the major decisions and takes care of the bait, rigs and fishing location. He gets you to the fishing grounds and gets you home safely. All you have to do is go along, and have a good time!

### **Delaware Fishing Report**

by Larry Jock



The good fishing we have seen this season just keeps rolling along for both inshore and offshore anglers.

#### Dolphin

You probably think we would be talking about catching dolphin offshore, but the real "news" are the dolphin being caught in the Indian River Inlet. You heard it right, in the Indian River Inlet. We are actually up to 5 mahi caught this season in the inlet. Pretty remarkable!

By the way, you can also find them offshore.

#### Tuna

The only people happier than tuna fisherman at the Hot Dog are the tackle shop owners who are selling butterfish. The chunking bite remained hot last with several returning with double-digit catches. Fish are still averaging around 45 lbs. with the best bites happening right at daybreak. Capt. Joe Morris, inventor of the Lewes Harbour Stretch and owner of Lewes Harbour Marina reported that fish are often rising to the upper water column and could be seen cutting through the slick near the boat. Hand fed, weightless offerings got the most attention. Fluorocarbon leaders made a difference to keen sighted tuna with fishermen usually starting out with 50 to 60 lb. test, but dropping to a 40 or 30 lb. leader when fish could be seen but wouldn't take hook baits. The top catch out of Lewes was

aboard the "Quintessa" with 19 yellowfins weighing up to 55 pounds.

The first two bigeye tunas landed in Delaware came in from an overnight trip to the Spencer Canyon by anglers on the "Finominal" out of the Indian River Marina. The largest of the 2 bigeyes weighed 250 lbs. with the "smaller" tuna tipping the scales at 150 lbs. We still haven't seen a picture of this catch and hope that one will be coming to us soon.(hint, hint)

#### Flounder

Capt. Bert at Hook'em & Cook'em said that the flounder bite in the Indian River Inlet has been good for anglers fishing from the shoreline with the better bite coming off the north side. Those offering live spot and 6-inch Gulp Swimming Mullets or Grubs have been catching some nice fish. The fish continue to hang on the edge of the rocks, so be prepared to lose some tackle.

Not a lot have been caught in the back bays. Joe at Whitetail Taxidermy & Outdoor Supplies did report that flatties were found in deeper holes and sloughs for anglers fishing with pink Gulp! artificial baits coupled with a long piece of squid.

Further north, flounder continue to be caught on the Old Grounds, between "DA" and "DB" Buoys, and reef sites 10 and 11 according to Capt. Joe. Bucktailers and those using traditional bottom rigs tipped

with cut bluefish, squid, smelts or shiners had success with flatties. The "Katydid" continues to crush the flat fish, this week returning from one trip with 23 keepers, including a 7.87 pounder in the box on Thursday. Delaware Bay structure also yielded some flatties, like around Site 7 where Matt Baker, Chip Graves and John Drury used live spot to catch their limit of fish up to 6.33 lbs. Jake Wiles also decked a 6.5 pounder on a separate trip.

#### **Striped Bass**

Most of the stripers caught in the Indian River Inlet has been at night by anglers tossing poppers during the incoming tide. If they aren't catching stripers, anglers in the Inlet have a shot at triggerfish, puppy drum and tautog along the rocks if they are baiting up with sand fleas or green crabs.

Capt. Joe reported that slot size stripers have been available in the Lewes Canal. Anglers drifting eels around the Drawbridge, bottom fishing with clams or casting Gulp! Swimming Mullets and Storm shads has produced keeper linesiders in the 20 to 26-inch range.

#### **Tautog**

Since the reopening of Delaware's tautog season on July 17th, fishing has not exactly been on fire. Most feel that it is due to the warmer than usual water temperatures, which I would

agree with. The "Top Fin" did find some tautog in cooler water at an ocean wreck and put 25 keepers in the box.

#### Croaker

Capt. Bert mentioned that plenty of small croakers can be caught in the Indian River Inlet on Fishbites, clam and squid. Fish are in the 8 to 12-inch range.

#### **Sea Bass**

The sea bass bite for Indian River head boats has been decent with the keeper ratio varying day-by-day. When you can catch a drift, the flounder bite is good. When you can't get a good drift going, the sea bass bite improves. The good news is that the average size of fish being caught has continued to increase.

#### **Bluefish**

Anglers tossing anything metal and shiny are hooking bluefish during the incoming tide in the Indian River Inlet. Gotcha plugs, Hopkins lures, diamond jigs and sting silvers are all being gobbled up by snapper blues.

#### In the Surf

The bite from the shoreline is in it's normal, summer mode. Kingfish, bluefish and even some Norfolk spot are being hooked during the daytime hours. Paul at Rick's Bait & Tackle said that those using bloodworms or small pieces of finger mullet are finding good success with these small fish.

Night surfcasters continue to get into good size sand tiger and dusky sharks. Those dropping tuna belly strips from kayaks are having excellent results with larger species. One angler had 5 the other night, 4 sand tigers and 1 dusky.

Until next week, tight lines!





### Ship To Shore

#### WI-FI AND THE MARINE **INDUSTRY**

I frequently write that the computer industry and the marine industry are merging more and more over recent years. This is evident in many ways, but most particularly over the last two years in the area of Wi-Fi. So maybe it's time to take a closer look at this technology and what it means for you on your boat.

Wi-Fi is short for the words 'Wireless Fidelity'. It is a used word common describe a network computers that are connected wirelessly. It can also describe a network that can be accessed by using a wireless card.

Most often used connection with your home and office computer or your

cell phone/smart phone, the term Wi-Fi refers to various means and methods of connecting to the Internet to get emails, search the web, etc. If you have wireless technology in your home or office, you have a modem from your Internet Service Provider (Comcast, Verizon, etc.) and a router that is connected first via wire from your provider and then wirelessly via its antenna to any wireless ready computer within vicinity. It is usually password protected so that your neighbors cannot access your Internet connection. If you look at your available wireless networks, you may see others listed, but you cannot access them without knowing their password.

In 1993 at a conference in

public access local area networks (LAN) was first introduced and was the beginning of what we know today as Wi-Fi Hotspots. A "hotspot" is a site that offers Internet access over a wireless LAN through the use of a router connected to Internet link, just like you would have in your home or office. Hotspots can be found in many public places around the world and in your town. They are typically located in hotels, public libraries, coffee Internet shops, restaurants, hospitals and other locations. Some are free and some are not. Originally conceived as a sort of pay-asyou-go broadband service, public demand for the product has resulted in more free access points being provided as a service to customers. The biggest advance recently has been in the number of free municipal broadband wireless networks that cover entire cities. These are more likely to be found in large metropolitan

San Francisco, the concept of

Your cell phone or "smart phone" also has wireless access to the Internet but, in this case, you access the Internet via your cell phone provider which is connected to the LAN. You pay for the access in your monthly cell phone bill.

There are lists of places that offer Wi-Fi in your area and you can look up those locations via the Internet. Ocean City offers it at Somerset St. or Northside Park. Your computer will automatically recognize the wireless network. In case there are others in the area besides the free Ocean City one, you will need to select the "OCMDFreePublic" Wi-Fi network to connect to the appropriate access point. Only the "OCMDFreePublic" Wi-Fi name will work for Public Wi-Fi access, and no password is required.

Now how does all this relate to the marine industry? There are items of electronics

that now advertise wireless capability. In most cases they are referring to the ability of one item to "talk" to another item on your boat. That is a simple procedure and is controlled by manufacturer the of equipment.

In some cases, however, the equipment is offering you the ability to access the Internet to accomplish some features. For that, you need access in some way to the Internet. If you have a cell phone, you may be able to access the Internet if you are not too far offshore. If you can make a phone call, you can access the Internet. The problem with that is the limited range of on-board equipment. Some of you may have satellite phones, either fixed or portable, that give you greater range since their signal goes straight up to satellites and forwards back to land based stations. However, fees for usage are charged and it can become expensive.

For free access, you must have an available free public "hotspot" and be able to reach it. With that in mind, several companies have emerged with equipment they manufacture that claims to boost your ability to transmit and receive signals. If I was going to invest in one of those, I would first research to see if any free "hotspots" are in my area and where they are located. Then I would read the guarantee of the signal booster carefully to see what additional range it claims to offer you and whether or not they back up that claim.

The final consideration to complete the process is to determine if your access to the Internet needs to physically connect to your item of marine equipment and, if so, how or does your equipment have its Internal wireless capability.

### **Chum Lines**

We pulled up on the edge of the shoal and dropped anchor. Unfortunately miscalculated the current and before I knew it the anchor line slipped under the hull and got hung on the rudder. It was only midmorning but already it was in the mid 80's and expected to get even hotter. Looking for a way to cool-off, my mate said he'd be happy to go under the boat and clear the line. I gave him the "OK" and in a flash he was over the side and in just a few seconds I could see the line coming out from under the boat. He had accomplished his mission, but when he came out from under the boat he was like a penguin launching up onto an ice flow. He came out of the water so fast that his shorts were half way down to his knees and I swear it was like he just suddenly materialized on deck!

Wide-eved and visibly shaken all he could say was "sharks everywhere!" Which had us all looking over the side "where?" Then wondering someone shouted "look there!" And we all looked over to see a group of about ten 4-foot long brown fish swimming just a few yards off the starboard side. I took one look at the fish, then turned to my mate and barked, "Those aren't sharks they're cobia, so snap out of it and get some baits in the water - quick!"

We just happened to have a livewell full of live bunker and spot which were promptly fired out at the fish that were just milling about beside the boat. Normally cobia are reluctant to take any bait or offering you put in front of them, but that morning they where hungry and ate without hesitation. Over next 15-minutes managed to land six of the 20-35 pound bruisers. It's just as well that incident occurred before video cameras became so commonplace and YouTube gave us a way to broadcast to the world, because if anyone else had a chance to see the sheer mayhem that took place on deck during that 15-minutes, or the way the cockpit of my boat was transformed into something that looked like the bloodiest horror movie you could ever imagine, I'd be hard pressed to find anyone willing to step aboard my boat for a fishing trip ever again!

That little episode occurred about 20-years ago up on Fenwick Shoal, but it remains the most cobia we've ever caught on a single trip. Cobia just don't come that easy, they usually just make an appearance and stay only long enough for those aboard to figure out that they "aren't sharks" and then just fade away! However, if the crew is up on their cobia tactics and have baits, lures and rigs all made-up, on the rods, and ready for action, they "might" have a chance at hooking and landing one of these frustratingly finicky

I guess that since we've had our share of (limited) success with cobia off Ocean City, I'm often asked by other local fishermen what they need to do to catch one for themselves. I've even had clients try to book my boat to go "cobia fishing." However, as much as I'd like to say that I know secret tactics that have allowed us to hook and land so many cobia over the years, the bottom-line is that around here, these fish just don't show up consistently enough that you can really go out and target them with any measure of success, such as can be done in more southern latitudes. The key to getting cobia off Ocean City is to fish the nearshore waters inside of the 20-fathom line a lot, and always be prepared to quickly put a decent bait or lure in front of a cobia when one or more decides to pay you a visit.

Since we're sharking the nearshore waters almost every fishable day from July 1st until the end of September, we're lucky to have the "fish a lot" part of the equation covered. But even those who can only fish once or twice a month, and choose to wreck or flounder fish, could be at the right place at the right time and get a shot, so it always pays to be ready. Sometimes cobia will arrive at a boat and stay for hours, but often they appear and are gone in less than a minute, so anglers need to act quickly or the opportunity will be lost. "Being ready" means having something rigged that can be tossed to the face of a cobia literally within 30-seconds of first seeing it, so that pretty much means having a dedicated rod (or rods) always set up for cobia that "probably" will not show up anyway. Then, you just go ahead and do whatever other kind of fishing you planned on doing and if old Mr. Coby shows up you drop what you've doing and have at

So what should you have on your line? Good question, because they'll eat just about everything but often won't eat anything. Around the planet, cobia have been caught on crabs, shrimp, cut bait, live bait and every kind of artificial lure you can imagine. I can only tell you that off Delmarva we've caught

them on live spot, eels, bunker and herring, cut bluefish, mackerel and tuna. We've also hooked them on surface poppers, bucktails, Storm Lures and once I was lucky enough to catch one on a Clouser fly. From July through September we keep two 20-pound test spinning rods rigged for cobia at all times. One has a circle hook with 30# fluorocarbon leader for live bait and the other has some sort of jig, such as a bucktail or Storm lure on it. A third spinner is kept ready, but only has a snap swivel on the line so we can quickly put whatever we want on it as needed.

One thing to keep in mind is that when cobia show up anglers are usually trying to hook them right under or beside the boat with less than 20-feet of line off the rod tip. That's why one of our rods is always rigged with a jig rather than some other sort of lure that needs to be cast and retrieved to properly work. If a cobia moves away from the boat, we can always cast the jig out to them, but you can't jig a crank type lure.

The final thing anglers need if they want to catch cobia is "persistence." Every summer we see FAR more cobia than we ever hook, but we keep our tackle ready just the same and never give up trying to get them to bite, even when it seems like all they are doing is teasing us. We've had fish swim around the boat for hours that just wouldn't touch anything we put in front of them, and then all of a sudden slurp down an offering that was refused when they first showed up. You've got to keep working them and working them if you're ever going to catch them! And if everything about cobia wasn't humbling enough, the killer is that every season, some kid fishing for spot off a dock or a guy on the beach trying for kingfish will show up in the paper after catching a beautiful cobia totally by accident. Challenging, humbling, frustrating, you've got to love those cobia!







### Virginia Fishing Report

Dr. Julie Ball I.G.F.A Representative



Plenty of cobia are around, but the majority of the fish are still small. The folks at Ocean's East 2 report that dozens of cobia pups are cruising in small pods, offering consistent action for sight casters, but few keepers. Chummers are finding better luck with larger fish pushing to over 50 lbs. recently. Boats are setting up successful chum slicks near Bluefish Rock, York Spit, the Nine Foot Shoals and the Inner Middle Grounds. Red drum are also providing topwater action as they school around the mouth of the Bay, especially near the Baltimore Channel. Sightcasters are also reporting schools of tarpon within the lower Bay, along with schools of Jack Crevelle in the same areas.

The flounder scene experienced an upswing in the abundance of fish last week. Many boats limited out with nice sized flatties, with many averaging around 4 lbs.

or more. The hot spots for drifting with strip baits are the edges of the Baltimore Channel, the eastern section of the Thimble Shoal Channel and the Cell and Buoy 36A areas. Those dropping live bait and jigs on lower Bay structures and inshore wrecks are also getting a good response, especially around the 1st, 3rd, and 4th Islands of the Bay Bridge Tunnel. Within Lynnhaven and Rudee Inlets, flounder enthusiasts experiencing good catches of fish ranging to 23-inches.

Sheepshead action is still very good, with fish ranging between 10 and 13 lbs. taking fiddler crabs presented along the Bridge Tunnel complex, with a few sheep coming from the Seagull Pier last week.

Plenty of greedy triggerfish are also available in these same areas, with some fish weighing over 3 lbs.

Spadefish are still schooling on nearshore wrecks and most of the span of the CBBT. Most of these fish are ranging between 3 and 5 lbs. Inshore wrecks are also harboring seabass, triggerfish, and flounder.

Spanish mackerel continue to hit very well off the oceanfront, from Cape Henry to Sand Bridge. Captain Steve Wray, skipper of the "Ocean Pearl" from Lynnhaven Inlet, reports the fish are holding in anywhere from 15 to 30-feet of water. Some of the Spanish are big, pushing to over 2lbs. Tailor bluefish are also mixed

in with the Spanish.

King mackerel are available in the same areas, with scattered rumors of catches, especially from the Little Island Fishing Pier. Captain Jake Hiles aboard the "Matador" out of Rudee Inlet reports that big sharks are not uncommon lately, with black tip sharks, bull sharks, and hammer heads taking fresh and live baits presented off the beach.

Croaker are everywhere from the HRBT to the CBBT. The best hauls are coming from the backwaters of Oyster and Area 262 in Magothy Bay, where the folks at Chris' Bait and Tackle claim hardheads are ranging now to around a pound. Good reports of puppy drum are coming from both Lynnhaven and Rudee

Inlets lately, and speckled trout are taking off again in the Elizabeth River.


The word on the tarpon scene on the Eastern Shore is that it is good. Plenty of silver kings are being sighted, with some hook-ups and jump-offs reported recently.

Amberjack are a nobrainer at the Southern "A" and "B" Towers, with some fish pushing to over 50-inches caught lately. Deep droppers are still pulling in good numbers of tilefish, rosefish, wreckfish and grouper along with a smattering of sea bass near the Canyon edges.

Offshore, billfish encounters are still on the rise. White marlin, with scattered sailfish and blue marlin, honored boats with several flags flying last week. Boats are also reporting lots of cutters in mostly 30 to 45 fathoms of water. Yellowfin tuna are around, with some fish pushing to around 60 lbs. hitting the docks lately. Wahoo and gaffer mahi are also possibilities.





# Straight from the Maryland DNR Fisheries Service

### Licensing Requirements for Coastal Sportfishermen

opportunities sportfishermen in and around Ocean City are almost endless. From the great fishing in the back bays for flounder, croaker, blues and sea trout to the offshore canyons and the chance to catch marlin, tuna and wahoo and many other opportunities in between, great fishing is available for all skill levels. Among the frequently asked questions of bait and tackle store employees, and for us here at DNR is....What type of license do I need to go fishing?

By now, most fishermen know that Maryland's saltwater fishing license was extended to include Maryland's coast in 2011. But they also know the requirements to fish offshore and inshore can differ. This week's article will focus on a variety of scenarios and what license you'll need to fish in each one.

#### **Surf Fishing**

After 5 PM, when the life guards have left the beaches in Ocean City, fishermen are allowed access to the surf. On Assateague Island, fishermen are allowed access to the surf in

Maryland's State Park portion (the northernmost part of the island) anytime, but must stay outside the lifeguarded areas. The policy is the same in the National Park section (from the lower boundary of the Maryland State Park to the Virginia State line), where fishermen are allowed access 24 hours per day, unless there is an area closure for nesting birds.

In all locations, fishermen 16 years of age or older will need a Maryland Chesapeake & Coastal Sportfishing license. An annual or short-term license (7 days) is available. Maryland honors Virginia's Saltwater Fishing License if the angler registers in Maryland, but does not honor Delaware's Saltwater Fishing License.

#### Fishing from Shore in the Back Bays and Inlet Jetties

There are many locations that are publically accessible for sport anglers without a boat., These include: the north jetty of the Ocean City Inlet, Rt. 50 bridge, Convention Center promenade, Chicago Avenue bulkhead, Northside Park and many others. Anglers 16 years of age or older will need a Maryland Chesapeake and Coastal Sportfishing License.

Maryland honors Virginia's Saltwater Fishing License if the angler registers in Maryland, but does not honor Delaware's Saltwater Fishing License.

### Fishing from a Boat in the Coastal Bays and Inlet Jetties

From the Delaware line at the Rt. 54 bridge south to the Virginia line in Chincoteague Bay, there is plenty of room and many possibilities for anglers who are fishing by boat. Again, for anglers 16 years of age or older, a Maryland Chesapeake and Coastal Sportfishing License is required. Maryland offers a \$50 Chesapeake Bay & Coastal Sportfishing Pleasure Boat decal that satisfies our State's license requirement for all registered passengers of the vessel on which the decal is placed. It is very popular, and allows individuals to fish for free from your decaled vessel if they have registered with the State. It is a great way to introduce others to the sport of fishing. The boat decal also comes with a complimentary individual license for the purchaser who may use the license to fish elsewhere in Maryland's tidal waters off the boat. If a boat has a pleasure boat decal, all passengers, 16 years old and

older, that are fishing on the boat but do not possess an individual Maryland Chesapeake Bay & Coastal Sportfishing license must register with the State of Maryland. Registration is free, and can be done online or over the phone at 1-855-855-3906 or online at: https://compass.dnr.maryland.gov/dnrcompassportal

Registered anglers are emailed a registration, which they print out and carry with them aboard vessels with a Chesapeake Bay & Coastal Sportfishing Pleasure boat decal.

If a vessel is fishing without a Chesapeake Bay & Coastal Sportfishing pleasure boat decal, then all passengers 16 years of age or older will need to have an individual sport fishing license.

### Fishing Offshore out to Three Nautical Miles

Maryland has jurisdictional responsibility for the waters from its coastal shoreline out three nautical miles. Within 3 miles of the Maryland shore, boat fishermen can fish Russell's Reef for black sea bass and tautog, and Great Gull Shoal or Little Gull Shoal for croaker, flounder and sea trout along with other options close to the shore. The same requirements listed above for boat anglers in the coastal bays and inlet apply in these waters.

Fishing Offshore from Three Nautical Miles to 200 Nautical Miles

The waters off Maryland's and all other state's coastlines from 3-200 nautical miles the Exclusive (known as Economic Zone or EEZ) fall under jurisdiction of the Federal Government. A wide array of fishing opportunities exist in these waters. From bottom fishing on the near shore wrecks and reefs which are located anywhere from 6 to 26 miles offshore, to the Canyons and blue water 60 miles out, there are opportunities. numerous Anglers fishing in these waters for species such as sharks, tuna or billfish (marlin, swordfish & sailfish), the vessel will need to obtain a Highly Migratory Species (HMS) permit from NOAA Fisheries\*. In addition, each passenger apart from the HMS permit purchaser will need register with NOAA's National Saltwater Angler Registry for a fee unless already licensed in an exempt State. That can be done online or over the phone 1-888-MRIP-411 between the hours of 4 AM and Midnight online or https://www.countmyfish.noaa

Anglers, 16 years old or older, fishing in the EEZ either need a Highly Migratory Species Permit, be registered with NOAA or have a saltwater fishing license from an exempt State (all except Hawaii, Puerto Rico & the U.S. Virgin Islands).

.gov/register/

Anglers are responsible for reporting all Atlantic bluefin tuna (ABT) and billfish on board their vessel when they return to port. All recreationally landed ABT and billfish in Maryland must be tagged prior to landing and must be reported by vessel owners to the State-operated reporting station via catch card. Boats cannot be pulled from the water until the tag is in place. A tag is provided for each completed catch card and the angler is required to place this tag around the tail of the fish before removing it from the vessel.

Nine marinas in the Ocean City area qualify as a ABT/Billfish Recreational Reporting Station. Marinas distribute and collect catch cards, issue tags, and return leftover supplies to Maryland DNR at the conclusion of the fishing season. In addition

to the marinas, an after-hours is available at the Maryland DNR field office at 12917 Harbor Road in West Ocean City. Anglers that use the kiosk must complete the catch card and deposit it into the locked box at the kiosk. The receipt attached to the catch card replaces the tag. .

As of October 17, 2007, anglers who recreationally land swordfish and billfish outside of tournaments can report their catches to the NMFS using the Non-tournament Reporting website. The fish must be reported within one day of being landed. However, if these fish are landed in either Maryland or North Carolina, they must still be reported using a catch card. #### Are there places to Fish without Purchasing a Fishing License?

Yes. Passengers aboard party and charter boats are not to purchase individual license or register with the State. Passengers aboard a private vessel with a Chesapeake & Coastal Sportfishing license pleasure boat decal are not required to purchase an individual license (but must register - see above). Waterfront property owners and their non-paying guests are not required to purchase individual fishing license, but must register with Maryland (see registration section above).

There are three privately run fishing piers that have a commercial license which cover those that fish on the piers. An individual license or registration is not needed. All three piers charge admission. The piers are:

- Oceanic Pier at the Ocean City Inlet
- Ocean Pier on the Boardwalk
- Frontier Town pier on the Chincoteague Bay

#### Do Senior Citizens Get a **Discount?**

Residents of Maryland who are 65 or older can purchase a Senior Consolidated license that allows them to fish in tidal and non tidal waters of the State of

Maryland. Senior citizens that are residents of Virginia are exempt from a license in Virginia, but that exemption is not reciprocal in Maryland. They must buy a Nonresident Chesapeake & Coastal Sportfishing license or purchase a Virginia Resident Saltwater license and register in Maryland in order to fish in the tidal waters of Maryland.

#### **Recreational Crabbing &** Clamming in Maryland's **Coastal Bays**

There is no license required to recreationally crab or harvest hard clams in Maryland's coastal bays. Please reference the following link for regulations on minimum sizes, harvest limits gear restrictions: http://tinyurl.com/73dxwaw




