



Capt. Ronnie Fields on the "Big Stick" was out to defend their title after taking 1st Place in the Tuna-Single Division of the 2021 Ocean City Tuna Tournament. This year however the Suwanee, GA crew of Jacob Prather, Anderson Bowen, Reese VanBeber, Logan Moss, Paul Harp and owner David Bowen with mates Jace Conrad & Bradley Wilson found their fortune in the Stringer Division. After putting up a 193 lb. stringer on Saturday, they rocked the Stringer Division late day on Sunday bringing a batch of bigeyes in the 80-99 lb. range to the scales that they raised in the Norfolk Canyon. To add to the story, they had 9 fish on at the same time and despite a large multiple hook up they had to deal with sharks as well. The 4 they got into the box however did the trick with a Sunday stringer weight of 455 lbs. taking their 2 day total to 638 lbs. More than enough to secure top honors in the Stringer Division and taking home the largest prize for the event of \$305,880 in award money.



Early last week saw a good tuna bite that was mainly yellowfin. The boys on the "Cookie Monster" however had a different agenda! Angler Benjamin Halle was in the Baltimore Canyon when this 74" and 225 lb. bigeye hit on a red teaser with a ballyhoo. Rounding out the crew were Jon and Cookie Halle with Capt. Brian Denton and mate Gaven Engelman.



Monday last week saw a lot of offshore action including this trip on the "Under Taker" out of the Indian River Marina. Capt. Bill Doherty had anglers Ray Nabb, Sean McDevitt, Wes Dickerson and Chris Whitfield with mate Wil Kennington trolling in between the Washington and Norfolk Canyons. They finished the day releasing 2 blue marlin estimated at 300 and 500 lbs., 2 white marlin releases and boated a mahi.





This Week Last Year

- Tropical Storm Fay dominated the news this week last year and put the 33rd Annual Ocean City Tuna in question. The storm did move through quickly so the tourney was changed to a 'fish 1 of 2 days' format. The "Big Stick" took 1st place in the Heaviest Fish Division with a 195 lb. bigeye tuna and the "Espadon" won the Heaviest Stringer Division at 443 lbs.
- Bigeyes were in between the Poor Man's and Baltimore Canyons where captains found slightly cooler waters in the mid to low 70 degrees
- The crew of the "Lights Out" headed out to the Baltimore and Poor Man's Canyons and came back to the dock with 15 release flags flying.

Coming off of the July 4th weekend, the weather was hot and the bite slowed down quite a bit. The number of boats heading offshore also went down as is more normal mid week, however many were in their slips prepping for the 34th Ocean City Tuna Tournament. Friday turned into a blowout as the remnants of Tropical Storm Elsa moved through the area, so most of the action from last week came from the tourney, so let's do a roundup!

Tournament Roundup

The Ocean City Tuna Tournament set another record this year with the Total Tournament Payout exceeding one million dollars for the first time! Despite 'Elsa' moving through the area late last week, 106 boats registered for this year's event showing strong interest and probably


attracting a lot of pandemic boat buyers as more small boats entered this year. No boats went out on the first day due to weather, so the event became a 2 day/fish 2 day contest with all 106 boats heading out on both Saturday and Sunday. This made for busy days at the scales!

The "Hydrosphere" was first to the dock and was waiting for the scales to open on Saturday. When someone is waiting like that, it is a sure sign they have something special and we were not disappointed. The crew put 2 bigeye tunas on the dock followed by 7 yellowfin. They caught the bigeyes early in the morning in the Washington Canyon, having both on the hook at the same time. After selecting the largest from the catch, they set the bar high at 233 lb. for a single tuna and 488 lbs. for a stringer of up to 5 fish. These weights remained unchallenged on Saturday and the single tuna at 233 lbs. held on to take 1st Place in the Tuna-Single Division. Their stringer ended the weekend in 3rd Place in the Tuna-Stringer Division earning the "Hydrosphere" a combined \$93, 787 in award money.

Day two started slower with the first boat arriving at just before 5PM, then a steady stream until well past the scheduled close of 7PM as we worked through the backlog of boats waiting in the Inlet to get to the scales. First to make a move was the "Bar South". They found a couple bigeyes below the Norfolk in 100 fathoms and set a new 3rd Place at the time for a single at 119 lbs. as well as raising their 2 day stringer total to 562 lbs. Their

www.coastalfisherman.net single fish would not hold onto the top 3 slots, but their stringer earned them 2nd Place in that Division with a \$63,540 payout. It was the "Instigator" that bumped them in the single category, putting a 170 lb. bigeye on the scale that they pulled from the Wilmington Canyon. That fish ended up in 3rd Place in the Tuna-Single Division putting \$59,865 in the pockets of the crew. 2nd Place in the single tuna category changed hands a few more times throughout the day, but it was the "Tara Jessica" as the second to last boat at the scales that locked in with a 199 lb. bigeye from the Baltimore on the 100 fathoms line. This was a catch that almost wasn't as they did not get the fish into the boat until 3:58PM after fighting the fish for over an hour. Not being the fastest boat either, Capt. Greg Wendell did not spare the diesels getting to the tournament boat with just 1 minute to spare with engines smoking and alarms sounding! Last year's winner for heaviest single tuna, "Big Stick" rocked the Stringer Division this year, bringing a batch of bigeyes in the 80-99 lb. range to the scales late day. This 445 lb. stringer, combined with Saturdays catch took their 2 day total to 638 lbs. More than enough to secure top honors in the Stringer Division and taking home the largest prize for the event of \$305,880.

Other notable catches occurred in the Dolphin Division as well as the Ladies Division. Only a handful of mahi were brought to the scales and it was Sunset Grille's Buddy Trala on the "Christine Marie" that had the only one that qualified at the tournament minimum of 20 lbs. That solo dolphin earned the boat a cool \$27,070 in prize money. Angler Kristin Quinn on the "Husuevo" aka "Reel Naughty" locked the top spot in the Ladies Division with a 150 lb. bigeye she caught late day in the Wilmington Canyon. This one kept diving and it took Kristin 1:15 hours to get to the boat, not a fight she will soon forget.

Most crews had to work to find tunas over the past week, with catches in the single digits. This did improve over the weekend with several tournament boats like the "Marli" reporting catches in the high teens. They were running from the Washington Canyon to the Norfolk



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Canyon with larger catches in the Norfolk. Many captains reported losing a number of yellowfins to sharks mainly to the south, worse they have ever seen most commented.

Bigeye tuna came from the northern and southern canyons. The big boys came from the Wilmington with the Norfolk producing fish in the 100 pound range and having shark issues.

The mahi bite remains light with a few gaffers showing up, again from the south.

Billfish

Billfishing has been very slow, probably due to a drop in anglers as described above and a focus on tuna. The "Under Taker" did report

2 blue marlin releases between the Washington & Norfolk estimated at 500 & 300 lbs. as well as 2 whites. Several boats in the tourney reported single and double releases of white marlin and singles of blue marlin, mainly in the southern.

Upcoming Tournaments; • This weekend is the 17th Annual Ocean City Marlin Club Kid's Classic. This event is open to all anglers 19 years old or younger with scales open from 3:00 - 6:30 pm on Saturday and 3:00 - 6:00 pm on Sunday. Details are on the Marlin Club's website, ocmarlinclub.com.

- Next week sees the 2021 HUK Big Fish Classic held at the Talbot Street Pier running from July 23rd 25th. Always a lively event with big fish coming to the dock and the Big Fish Village! Sales are open at Talbot Street from 4 9 pm on Friday and Saturday with Sundays hours from 4 8 pm. Details at BigFishClassic.com.



Summer is here, heating up and catching fish is in full swing! We had 95 degree days every day last week along with steep humidity levels. Unfortunately we also experienced gusty winds for several days due to the remnants of Hurricane Fishing when you could get out though has gotten really good.

Flounder, Bluefish, & Rockfish

Flounder season is in full swing this week with most anglers coming back to the docks with limits or near limits. The bay areas of Indian River have been producing some nice flounder with Ryan West catching a 19" and a 21" from the inlet area near the Coast Guard station. Bruce

Hambrick got a nice 23" and a 21" flounder from the Indian River Bay along the main channel. Luke Horney was entered in the Indian River Marina tournament and was the big winner. He took first with a 5 lb. 13 oz., Ben Macpherson took second with a 5 lb. 1/2 oz. flounder and Aaron Hurd captured third with a 4 lb. 9 oz. one. Congratulations to all the winners!

Iohn Pescatore got a nice flounder and a few weakfish on Monday just inside the bridge. Garcia got a 23" and 18" flounder from the back bays of Delaware Bay. On the near shore, flounder were even stronger. Rick Paskowski was on the Old Grounds and caught a limit up to 20". Sam Piascik hit several wrecks and reported a lot of throwbacks but did manage a few nice 20-24" flounder and several sea bass to go along with them. Deric Pry was out at B Buoy and managed a few nice flounder on large Gulp baits. Drifting the bottom with live spot, squid and Gulp baits seemed to work about the same whether you were in the inlet back bays or offshore. On the rockfish side, the ocean has been producing a few. however, most of them are not keepers. James Fletcher was fishing at the beach and did catch a nice striper but not big enough to keep. Still a great catch for as warm as it's been. Several small stripers were taken at the mouth of the inlet although I received no reports of any keepers.

www.coastalfisherman.net Several bluefish were taken off the surf and at the inlet at night mostly on cut bait and bucktails. Most of the blues are keepers but not the big slammers. Weakfish are strong in both the bays and along the rocks at Indian River. Michael Steffy got a huge 27" weakfish on Sunday. Great catch!

Sea Bass, Cobia, & Triggerfish

Sea bass remains pretty good despite the warmer water. Many of the fish caught are undersized but you can still manage a few nice keepers if you work hard at it. On Monday Rick Rothenberger got a nice limit of sea bass. He then came in and potted for crabs and that too was successful. That is one good dinner, sea bass and crabs! The lone wrecks seem to be producing the best chance for a few keepers of sea bass with clam being the go to bait and squid a close second. The coral around the shipping channel are producing some sea bass but the main fish here now are flounder. Many anglers fishing the wrecks are now finding them full of triggerfish. They are an excellent table fare and easy to catch. Put a piece of squid in front of them and they are ready to strike! Once you hook one, look for others to follow it to the surface. Hook 'em and Cook 'em at Indian River Marina offers fillet services for a very reasonable fee. If you have ever tried to fillet this species you will find that the skin is like thick leather and will quickly dull even the sharpest of knives. Bringing your triggerfish to a professional cutter will assure that you get the best fillets. Cobia is also starting to get real good.



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Many anglers are doing site fishing just outside of the Indian River Inlet or setting up with chum around the Fenwick Shoals. Live small eels on a 4/0 or 5/0 circle hook remains the best at hooking one of these fine tasting and hard fighting Artificial eels and crank baits also work well but will not be anywhere near as productive as live Early morning or eels. late afternoons will be the productive times when targeting these fish. This week also produced some nice spadefish and sheepshead. These fish can be found on nearshore wrecks as well as the rocks at the inlets. Sand fleas, cut crab, and shrimp are the best baits. Remember to use small hooks for these fish as their mouths are soft and small.

Surf Fishing & Crabbing

The surf remains a great place to catch some northern Small kingfish kingfish. with bloodworms rigs work best. At night small blues as well as rockfish can be caught in the surf using peeler crabs and cut bait. Jonathan Martinez was out with the family and reported the bite is on. They caught several nice sized kingfish along with a big ray. Crabbing is back to normal after last week's storms. Samantha and I averaged 10-12 keepers per pot with several big males showing up this week. Regarding bait, we have found that fresh bunker is superior over chicken in the pots.


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
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Tournament Ready

With the tournament season in full swing on the east coast, the fishing boats and crews are being pushed to their limits. Back-to-back fishing days and long offshore runs can wear on the crew and the equipment. Even with a full crew, it's easy to overlook a maintenance item or fail to realize a problem may be near. Here are a few tips to keep your fishing boat in top tournament shape.

Batteries

A fully charged engine or house battery should read 12.65 volts at rest or 25.3 volts for a 24v system. A battery charger or engine alternator needs to output a higher voltage, usually between 13v and 14v (and between 26v and 28v for 24v systems) to be able to recharge the battery or at least keep the battery fully charged. On larger boats, there are many places to monitor voltage,

such as the helm, the main panel, the charger and the battery itself. If you are ever in doubt with what is happening with your boat batteries, use a good test meter to check the battery voltage the battery during different scenarios: at rest, connected to a battery charger and when the engine is running (alternator). Since the captain at the helm is usually the one to monitor and spot irregularities, it is important to know what and where helm voltage display is really measuring. If the navigation electronics or VHF has low voltage, it can cause operational difficulties and in the case of a VHF radio, decreased power output. Modern marine engines are also not very tolerant of low voltage, their computers sensors will not operate properly in a low voltage situation.

Sometimes a good battery

electrical problem with the engine or generator alternator. It is a good idea to test your systems with the battery charger off, both with and without the engine running; this can help find a problem before it becomes an issue while fishing.

Air Conditioning & Refrigeration

many now, boats have been in use for a in warm months This water water. full of organisms that tend to grow in the sea water plumbing for the conditioning refrigeration systems. If the marine growth gets too bad, you may notice a reduction of water flow in the sea water discharge line or your systems will shut down due to high pressure. The best way to maintain the sea water cooling system is to descale the system with environmentally friendly cleaners available local boat supply stores. Do not use any type of acid, it can harm the system and damage your equipment. **Products**

charger will mask an like Barnacle Buster and Rydlyme are designed for marine cooling systems and if used as directed, are not detrimental to the equipment. These products are generally circulated through the cooling systems to descale the inside of hoses and pipes, killing the growth and leaving you with a clean surface for proper water flow and to allow the proper heat transfer from the machinery to the sea water.

> A common issue with air conditioning systems is the high head pressure alarm, which shuts down your system to prevent catastrophic damage. The two most common causes for high pressure are a lack of sea water cooling and a lack of air flow at the evaporator. The sea water issue should be addressed as discussed above. The evaporator is the part of the air conditioning system where the air blows across cold coils and sends that cool air into the cabin of the boat. These systems have inlet filters, sometimes more than one, usually a washable element that can



www.coastalfisherman.net be removed and cleaned. Sometimes the metal evaporator coils become clogged and need careful cleaning with a vacuum or chemical wash to restore the proper airflow and heat transfer to the evaporator.

While you are working on the evaporator, be sure to check and clean the condensate drain. The drain consists of a hose metal connected to a plastic pan under evaporator. The condensate drain hose goes to a main drain trunk line or to a sump or bilge. On hot and humid days an evaporator can remove gallons of water from the cabin air and needs a good path to drain that water.




Another maintenance point is the boat's steering system, long days, long runs and fighting fish puts stress on the best steering systems. Check your steering before you head out, looking for tell tale signs of oil leaks, metal wear or rubbing and loose or worn joints and connections. Be sure to check the steering oil level and pressure where needed. Use only the proper steering fluid, other types of oil may not be compatible and result in leaks or increased steering effort.

Most importantly, have fun and catch that winning fish!

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Pan Seared **Blackened Ahi Tuna**

Ingredients:

1 lb fresh ahi tuna

2 1/2 tsp Blackened Spice Rub (See below recipe)

1/4 cup melted butter

Blackened Seafood Spice Rub:

1 tsp paprika

1/2 tsp salt

1/2 tsp cayenne pepper

1/4 tsp ground ginger

1/4 tsp black pepper

1/4 tsp oregano

1/4 tsp fennel seeds

1/8 tsp ground clove

Directions:

Rinse the fish and pat dry with paper towels. Slice into 1/2 inch steaks.

In a small bowl mix together the spices and set aside.



Place a frying pan or cast iron skillet over high heat until it starts to smoke. Keep kitchen area well ventilated.

Toss the ahi tuna in melted butter and then coat with spice mixture on both sides. Press spice mixture to adhere. Immediately sear on high heat each side for 10 seconds for pink in the middle, or for no more then 30 seconds per

Grilled Whole Mackerel with Lemon, Oregano, & Olives

Ingredients:

1/2 teaspoon finely grated fresh lemon zest

1 1/2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice

1/3 cup extra-virgin olive oil 1/4 cup pitted Kalamata olives (1 1/4 oz), cut into slivers

3 tablespoons finely chopped fresh oregano plus 6 large

1 (3 1/4- to 3 1/2-lb) cleaned whole spanish mackerel or bluefish (with head & tail)

2 tablespoons vegetable oil

(1/4-inch-thick) lemon slices

Whisk together zest, lemon juice, and salt and pepper to taste, then add olive oil

1-inch-long Make slits at 2-inch intervals down middle of fish on both sides with a sharp paring knife, then brush fish all over with vegetable oil and season with salt and pepper. side to cook through well. string at 2-inch intervals, securing lemon slices and oregano sprigs to fish.

> Prepare grill for cooking. If using a charcoal grill, open vents on bottom of grill, then light charcoal. Charcoal fire is medium-hot when you can hold your hand 5 inches above rack for 3 to 4 seconds. If using a gas grill, preheat burners on high, covered, 10 minutes, then reduce heat to moderate.

> Grill fish on lightly oiled grill rack, covered only if using gas grill, 15 minutes. Turn fish over using a metal spatula and tongs, then grill until just cooked through, about 15 minutes more.

> Transfer fish to a large platter using 2 metal spatulas, then cut and discard string. Serve fish with sauce.

Grilled Triggerfish with Strawberry-Blueberry Relish

Ingredients for relish:

½ cup white wine vinegar

½ cup firmly packed light brown sugar

2 tablespoons minced fresh ginger

1 teaspoon lime zest

½ teaspoon kosher salt

1 jalapeño pepper, seeded and minced

Ingredients:

1 pound mako shark , fresh 1/2 cup orange juice

2 tablespoons light soy sauce

1 tablespoon lemon juice

1 clove garlic, minced

1/4 teaspoon pepper

1 tablespoon olive oil

Paprika

Directions:

Combine all the marinade ingredients together in a medium size glass bowl and stir to mix evenly.

Place the make shark steaks in the marinade so that they are completely covered.

Place the bowl of fish and marinade in the refrigerator and allow to marinate for 15 minutes. Remove and turn the steaks. Place bake in the refrigerator to marinate for another 15 minutes.

Remove the shark steaks from the marinade and place in an oiled baking pan. Sprinkle with paprika as desired.

Place in an oven preheated to 400 degrees F. Cook for 10 minutes per inch of thickness or until the fish flakes easily.

To grill: Remove steaks from the marinade, spray with cooking oil, and place on a hot grill. Grill for 5 or 6 minutes and then turn. Grill for an additional 5 or 6 minutes or until shark steaks are flaky.


In a large bowl stir together first five ingredients through ginger until combined. Remove half of the marinade and set aside.

Toss tuna pieces into half of the marinade to coat. Marinade about 20 minutes covered in the fridge.

Evenly spread sesame seeds onto a plate or flat surface. Coat each piece of tuna with seeds. For best presentation, coat 4 adjacent sides, but leave the two opposite ends uncoated to keep meat exposed.

Heat olive oil in a large non-stick pan to mediumhigh heat. Add prepared tuna pieces and cook each sesame-coated side until lightly browned, about 15-20 seconds per side. Centers should be pink and rare.

Remove from pan and insert one toothpick into each. Serve with remaining sauce for dipping.

plans for a lot of fishermen. anglers For some the couple days of wet, windy, conditions provided little more than an inconvenience when they stepped outside and concluded "Oh well, if and go tomorrow or the charters next". But for many other fishermen it would have been a major letdown because, for one reason or the other, they didn't have the option of going later and they really-really

Those of us in the charter fishing business know too

Last week tropical storm well the hassles of bad Elsa passed through and weather. Not only can we really messed up the fishing expect no paycheck for the period, we'll also have the joy of spending a lot of extra effort trying to make sense of the ever-changing forecast so we can keep abreast of the coming and goings of the nasty weather enabling us to make the I can't go today I'll wait right calls as we juggle canceling, by postponing, rescheduling, and doing what we can to make the best of the messy situation. We know that we're going to have a lot of disappointed clients. Fortunately, most will understand that a good day of fishing and boating is always dependent upon

the right conditions.

Unfortunately some won't quite "get it" and that's why captains sometimes have conversations like the one I had with a client the other day who was bound and determined to go fishing regardless of how rough the ocean was. His booking was made months ago and he and his family were looking very forward to fishing that day. When I informed him that, due to the tropical storm, it was going to be way too rough to go he told me, "But we've been planning this for months and are really excited about going fishing. We don't care about the weather". When I explained that it was simply not wise or even safe to go out on the ocean he asked if he could pay me more money to take them out? When I said that there wasn't enough money in the world he asked if I could recommend another captain and boat that would take them out that

I'm sorry, but even though I've experienced it before, I still don't know how to deal with logic like that! Obviously the fellow simply didn't have enough experience on the water to fully understand what bad weather can do to boats on big bodies of water. Fortunately, even mildly experienced sportsman know that weather plays a factor in all of outdoor pursuits, at times it won't matter if the fish are fivefeet or five hundred miles from shore, if the weather forbids it there's nothing an angler can do but suckdisappointment Apparently and accept the fact that there will be days, weeks,

www.coastalfisherman.net conditions won't allow them to get in on the action that awaits them just of our coast. It's just what fishermen learn to accept.

Patience and the ability to handle disappointment are two of the greatest attributes sportsmen so often acquire, because no matter if they're hunting or fishing, adverse conditions will always be a major threat to their outdoor plans. Depending upon what's being pursued and where, it can be too hot, cold, windy, wet, dry, sunny, cloudy, rough, calm, too late in the day or too early in the morning. When planning out our adventures we try to maximize our chances for success by watching weather forecasts, studying tide and moon tables, and researching anything else we can about what we'll be getting into. But Mother Nature is the great equalizer who doesn't care if someone is rich or poor, a crack shot, the most skilled angler, traveled thousands of miles to a destination, or been planning out a particular adventure for years, without prejudice she can pull the plug on our plans in a heartbeat and there's no sense in crying about it because the weather will always be just as unpredictable as the fish or game we're trying to catch or kill.

I was sitting in an airport terminal when I overheard a couple folks yapping about their flight that had been delayed because the weather at the place they were headed had the airport shut down. thev going there for vacation and if they didn't arrive even entire months when on time they'd miss out on



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www.coastalfisherman.net some kind of side-trip that they were really looking forward to. To say that the two were "furious" would an understatement, feelings that they surly didn't try to hide from the airline personnel or anyone else within earshot. The fellow seemed to think that if he made enough of a fuss that he'd get his way. When that didn't work he took the "high-roller" approach and asked the person at the counter, "OK, what's it going to cost me to get there on time?" As if paying some extra money could change the weather at his destination. It was pretty obvious that the couple throwing the hissy-fit at the terminal weren't sportsmen, and I was left hoping that if they ever decided to try fishing in Ocean City that they wouldn't call me!



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OCEAN CITY FISHING REPORT by Capt. BJ Pietryak

Here we go as the summer fishing season is officially in full swing! The hurricane seems to have churned up the waters and revitalized the fish. Several limits returned to the docks along with some really nice size fish.

Flounder, Bluefish & Rockfish

Flounder fishing has been some of the best we have seen in years. In the back bays the head boats are reporting that their clients are being rewarded with some really nice fish. The "Fish Frenzi" reported some nice flounder 18-21" along with some sea bass thrown in. Blake Gunther and Derek Yobst reported fantastic fishing early this week several nice flounder being brought in. Josh Metzgar and crew fished the Rt. 50 Bridge on Monday and caught some nice flounder as well as a few undersized rockfish. Danny Rodriguez caught a limit of flounder

on Sunday and left them chewing. That's a lot of fillets for dinner! The main areas of the bay to target the flatties are basically anywhere. Fish are in most of the main channels both north and south of the bridge. Squid and shiner combos remain the star of the show bait with Gulp as an alternative. Target the outside edges of the channel where the water depth changes as the fish will stage on these dropoffs. On the nearshore side of the ocean, the African Oueen wreck area is producing the best flounder with the Bass Grounds as a close second. Using the large Gulp baits are working the best. Target the down current side of these wrecks as the fish will set up there waiting to ambush bait fish being swept out of the wreck by the current. At night the Ocean City fishing piers are producing small bluefish on cut bait. Most of these fish are

coming at night, however, some can be caught during the day. Stripers are also coming from these piers, but unfortunately most of the them are undersized. The Rt. 50 Bridge is also producing some blues as well as rockfish. Shawn and Big Bird Cropper were at it again catching a nice keeper at bridge measuring 34" and weighing in at 17.5 lbs. As usual, they credited the Roy Rig for this exceptional catch. This was in connection with an inshore slam consisting of a bluefish, striper and flounder.

Sea Bass, Cobia & Triggerfish

Sea bass remains very strong late in the season. Last year we saw sea bass well into July which in previous times were not seen. Many attributed this to a lower number of anglers. I believe that the lack of pressure last year definitely helped the

www.coastalfisherman.net spawn, but this may just be a changing cycle as we see every few years. "Ocean Princess" The reported that their longer trips have been producing quite a few nice keeper sea bass along with a few big The "Angler" flounder. reports that their full day trips are also producing some very nice hauls of keeper sea bass. Most of the head boats targeting sea bass stated that the full day trip where they can run further offshore is producing much better. Deep water in the 100 ft. zone is producing the best and biggest catches. The half day trips are giving up a few nice keeper sea bass but the throwback ratio is about 7 throwbacks to 1 keeper. Fresh salted clams are the best choice, but squid appears to be working just as well.

Cobia is also in full swing. I had an opportunity to fish out of Cape Charles this past week and caught a beautiful 43" and 45" cobia. Several huge cobia have been taken by the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel. Looking to Ocean City, several cobia have been spotted on the near



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www.coastalfisherman.net shore lumps. Isle of Wright and Little Gull Bank are great places to set up and chum for these fish. Early morning is the best time with live eels being the best baits to use. The "man in the brown suit" can also be found on many of the wrecks nearshore, so when you are out sea bass or flounder fishing be sure to keep a bucktail with a trailing worm or Gulp bait ready just in case one of

Triggerfish are all over the nearshore wrecks and many anglers are very happy to see these tasty creatures return to the wrecks. This species have a very firm and tasty white meat. An old trick taught to me years ago by a charter captain is to cut the fillets into chunks about 2", boil a pot of water with about

them swim by checking

out your boat.

a half of a box of brown sugar, and drop the chunks into the boiling water and when the cut fish floats to the surface it is done. This may sound like it will make the fish way too sweet but in fact makes it taste just like lobster. Try it next time you catch one... you won't be disappointed!

Crabs & Clams

Carl from Bob's Marine reports crab catches in the upper bay to be around 10-14keepers per pot. Martin's Fish Market has fresh and frozen bunker by the flat for crabbing. Clamming on Assateague Island is also very productive with clams either right at the surface or just below the sand. Rakes can be found at most tackle shops as well as many hardware stores.
