



Atlantic White Marlin Fetrapturus albidus

Key Distinguishing Markings:

- The body is dark blue above and silvery white below, with brown spots on the sides of the white portion.
- The first dorsal fin, which runs almost the length of the body, is dark blue with many black spots, although these may fade towards the back of the fin.
- · The second dorsal and pelvic fins are dark blue.
- · First anal, first dorsal, and pectoral fins are blunt or rounded at tips.
- The pectoral fins and caudal fin are blackish brown; the long pectoral fins may be tipped in white.

Size:

• The maximum length for the white marlin is 110 in and maximum weight is approximately 180 lbs. More commonly white marlin range from 51-83 inches in length.

Distribution:

• White marlin are found in the Atlantic Ocean from roughly $45^\circ N$ to $45^\circ S$ in the southwestern Atlantic and $35^\circ S$ in the southeastern Atlantic.

Food Preference:

· White marlin feed on fish and squids.

Spawning:

• Once a year, white marlin migrate into subtropical waters to spawn, with peak spawning occurring in early summer in deep oceanic waters.

Fun Facts:

- White marlin are generally not considered a schooling fish and most often occur solitarily or in pairs.
- · White marlin live to be 25-30 years of age.
- Tagged white marlin have been recaptured after being at liberty for al most 12 years.



Ocean City Fishing Report

by Larry Jock

It was another busy week of fishing out of Ocean City, especially for offshore anglers in search of yellowfin tuna.

Inshore, anglers continued to have good luck catching bluefins and we saw the largest shark of the year hit the scales.

In the bay, flounder fishing was slow, but the good news is that we did see the arrival of croakers late in the week.

Yellowfin Tuna

Nobody can complain about the lack of yellowfin tuna this year as boats continue to arrive at the dock with incredible catches. The bite that had been centered in 70 fathoms in the Baltimore Canyon worked its way south into the Poor Man's Canyon late in the week, but darted north again on Sunday.

On Wednesday, "That's Right" had 14 yellowfins in the Baltimore Canyon where the "Game On" (13) and "Playmate" (14) also recorded great days.

Thursday and Friday mellowed a bit for most boats, but the "Marli" did get on them good in the Baltimore Canyon returning with 17 yellowfins in the box on Thursday and an incredible 24 on Friday. Several other boats had nice, single digit catches of yellowfins in the Poor Man's.



Mike and Evan Moyer caught and released their first white marlin while fishing on the "G-Force" with Dan Zottarelli, Greg Strober, John Grimberg, Mike Davidson, Capt. Seth Obetz and mate Kevin Miller. While trolling ballyhoo and spreader bars in the Baltimore Canyon, the anglers also caught 7 yellowfin tuna, a mako shark and a dolphin.

We only saw one more double digit catch over the weekend but several boats weighed 8-9 yellowfins after their trip. On Sunday, the "Reel Chaos" had a great day, with 17 yellowfins in the box after fishing in the Poor Man's and Baltimore Canyons. The "No Quarter" also had a nice day, catching 8 yellowfins in Man's where the Poor captains reported water temperatures hovering around 72-degrees.

Bluefin Tuna

Although overshadowed by the hauls of yellowfin tuna, anglers fishing in 20-30 fathoms from the Lumpy Bottom and Parking Lot north to the Hambone found plenty of bluefins to keep them busy. Anglers also did well a little further inshore at the Jackspot. Most of the fish are between 40 and 50 lbs.

In the MSSA Tuna-Ment, the "Lady Luck V" caught two bluefin at the Lumpy Bottom, weighing 105.3 lbs. and 108.3 lbs. to win 2nd and 3rd place www.coastalfisherman.net in the tournament. Most of the tournament information wasn't available at press time, so we will have complete results and pictures in next week's Coastal Fisherman.

Sharks

A couple of make sharks hit the scales this week, but none were close to the 640 pounder caught on Wednesday aboard the "Fish Finder". The big make at a bonita at the south end of the Fingers.

Dolphin

With warming water temperatures, definitely seeing an increase in the average size of dolphin being weighed. Most of the fish are being caught in the Baltimore and Poor Man's Canyons on trolled ballyhoo. We also saw some hooked at the Hot Dog, Jackspot, Parking Lot, Lumpy Bottom and in the Washington Canyon, where the "Lady V" boated a 32.5 pounder on Sunday in the MSSA Tournament. The "Tide Up" also caught a nice pair on Sunday that weighed 17 lbs. and 17.6 lbs. on the scale at Sunset Marina.

Billfish

All of the billfish releases we heard about last week came from the Baltimore Canyon. Early in the week, the "M'm M'm Good" recorded 5 white marlin releases and the "White Lightning" rang up three. The "Marli" released a blue marlin on Thursday and a white marlin on Friday. We didn't

hear of any other releases until boats arrived back on Sunday, when the "Reel Chaos" and the "Blackjack" each reported one white marlin release.

Bluefish

We continue to see most of the bluefish catches coming from anglers tossing lures around the Rt. 50 Bridge. We haven't seen many coming in from those trolling the ocean, which shouldn't surprise anyone with water temperatures as warm as they have been.

Croaker

There should be plenty of action in the bays over the next few weeks with the arrival of croaker to our local waters. The area around Harbour Island and at the mouth of the Commercial Harbor are usually great locations to catch some hardheads. This is a fantastic fishery to get kids involved in since the action is usually fast and furious.

In the Surf

Sue Foster at Oyster Bay Tackle said, "We're getting lots of reports of Norfolk spot in the surf. Anglers are using bloodworms, Fishbite Bloodworms and little pieces of squid or fresh bunker when available. Small croaker are mixed in with the spot, along with some small sea trout and a few kingfish. We had two good reports from 142nd and 94th Streets last week. There are still some big, big rays, sand sharks and bigger sharks for anglers fishing for them. Combination baits are great for the small fish. FishBites and a little strip of fresh bunker, frozen mullet or box squid.

Sea Bass

Sea bass fishing continued its inconsistent run with anglers recording numerous doubleheaders one day and not so much the next.

Over the weekend, sea bass were caught at the Great

Eastern Reef and at Winter Quarter Shoal by anglers fishing in the MSSA and Marlin Club tournaments. Several days last week, the "Morning Star" returned with buckets of sea bass caught by happy customers using squid or clams for bait.

Striped Bass

Anglers continue to catch stripers at the tip of the South Jetty and around the Rt. 50 Bridge when drifting spot and perch. On Wednesday, both the "Get Sum" and "Skip's Charter & Guide Service" kept their anglers busy with good catches of linesiders. The "Get Sum" hooked 13 on live spot around the Rt. 50 Bridge, while "Skip's" anglers caught their limit of keepers plus 50 throwbacks from the South Jetty.

Flounder

It wasn't a great week for flounder fishing with most anglers feeling frustrated with the number of "shorts" they are catching.

The bite has moved from the bay behind Assateague Island up to the East Channel and Thorofare. The East Channel was the hottest location last week, especially around the Cement Plant and north behind Harbour Island.

Anglers drifting live spot are definitely having the best results, but those using white and pink Gulp! Swimming Mullets are also holding their own

The largest flattie of the week was caught by the "Flounder King of Chester, NJ", Carl Reichel, who landed a 26.5-incher on live spot in the East Channel.





Driftin' Easy

"Do anglers still use Fishbites?"

Fads in fishing, like styles of clothing, come and go all the time. But one fishing product that has continued to be popular year after year is Fishbites. When I go to a buying show in the winter, I might buy six of this and a dozen of that, but when I buy Fishbites, I buy over a thousand!

"What is this stuff?"

In a nut shell, Fishbites are "fake bait." The company explains their product as such: "Fishbites products infused with a concentrated flavor/scent that replicates natural feeding stimulants and creates a powerful scent trail, so you'll catch more fish." Several companies have tried to copy Fishbites, but none have succeeded. process is a well kept secret.

Fishbites were invented by Dr. William Carr from St Augustine, FL in 2001. He is a marine researcher and angler. The family business continues to make this product in St. Augustine.

Although many of their products are not as popular in our area as they used to be, the one product that continues to be extremely popular is the Fishbites Bag O' Worms. These "fake bloodworms" are actually little strips of "bubble gum" looking material that are infused on a piece of white mesh. They need refrigeration and they retain their scent for over a year. If you keep them over the winter, take them out of the tackle box and store them in the house in a dark place like a dresser drawer. You can also put them in the refrigerator. Extreme heat and extreme light can take away their color after a long period of time. Keep the package closed and sealed.

"How do you use them?"

Fishbites are simple to use and great for kids (and parents) that are scared to touch real bloodworms. They are less expensive than real bloodworms and are an available bait when the tackle stores are temporarily out of bloodworms. They are nontoxic and environmentally friendly. The product will slowly melt in the water, attracting the fish.

Cut a small piece of the material off, and put it on the hook. The white mesh helps keep it on the hook. If you are fishing for small fish like spot, just use a small little square of the FishBites. If you are surf fishing for kingfish, spot and croaker, use a little longer piece.

When surf fishing, I like to use about a 1/2-inch piece of the bloodworm Fishbites and combo it with a little triangle of box squid (I think surf fish like the dirty squid over the cleaned stuff). Another great bait to combo with the Fishbites bloodworms is fresh or frozen bunker. Bunker is a natural bait in the surf, is oily and gives out a nice fresh scent of its own. Putting on a little strip of this natural bait with a ½-inch strip of FishBites bloodworm on a kingfish rig with size #6 hooks will give you a bait that is hard to resist. If you don't like using bunker, fillet the side of a finger mullet with a sharp bait knife and cut it in about three pieces. Combo this with your Fishbites on the kingfish rig. Another option is to just start fishing with the Fishbites Bloodworm till you catch a Norfolk spot or snapper bluefish. Fillet the fish into small strips and use it in combination with FishBites Bloodworm.

I believe in combo baits.

I noticed this spring that the Fishbites Crab flavored strips became quite popular in the surf on Assateague and on the Delaware beaches for black drum. Most of the anglers dug up sand fleas (mole crabs) on the beach and combined the Fishbites Crab Strips (chartreuse color was most popular) with a couple of sand crabs on the hook and had great success.

In the fall, FishBites Clam Strips become popular for red and black drum. Orange is a good color for this bait. Again, anglers usually combo these strips with sand fleas and/or real clam or bunker.

Change your baits! Whether using real bait or fake bait, pulling off the bait that has been on there for over a half hour is a good idea. Put on a fresh piece rather than continuing to use a piece that is half melted away.

Fishbites also has bloodworm product out in a red package that is a faster release product. I like to use this because, since there isn't any mesh, you don't have to pull out the scissors to get the white mesh off the hook.

I also had a customer come in the other day to say he added the **Fishbites** Bloodworm Fishy Sauce to his Fishbites Bloodworm strips and thought it made a big difference. I haven't tried that yet. You can also drip some of the Fin-Essence Shedder Crab Oil on your Fishbites. More scent is never enough as far as I am concerned. Don't try to soak the Fishbites first, or you will have a mass of red jelly! Put it on dry, and then dribble any essences on it. Speaking of, when you cut a piece of fishbites off, never put a wet piece in the dry ziplock bag.

Fishbites Bag O' Worms is also good for flounder fishing! I know a lot of anglers that take a 1-inch piece of the red material and hang it next to the minnow or shiner bait instead of a squid strip. It's attractive, red, gives off scent and cleaner than using squid.

People fishing in the bay use Fishbites combination with a squid strip on a size #4 hook for croaker, blowfish, little sea bass, small sea trout or any other panfish caught in the bay off the bulkhead, piers or around the Route 90 Bridge. When croakers arrive in mass, the Fishbites Shrimp flavored Fish Strips are also popular. I like the pink color in that one.

Fishbites also comes in squid flavored strips. I've never especially been impressed with it, but maybe I didn't give it enough time. I imagine it would work fine offshore for sea bass combined with a piece a clam or shiner. Since flounder are site feeders, it would look nice on the hook next to a minnow or shiner. Personally though, I'd stick to the bloodworm flavor! It's the



Delaware Fishing Report

Hi folks. Flounder, croaker, bluefish, blowfish, stripers and sharks can all be caught in the back bays. Flounder fishing has picked up and the stripers are still providing action in the Indian River Inlet. Spot are also available around #19 and #20 buoys and are a good way to get yourself some fine bait for catching flounder and striper. If the spot you catch are too large to use for bait, try some in the pan or on the grill. They do make for some tasty table fare. Croakers are just starting to show up and hopefully be in full swing for the July 4th weekend. They sure provide a bunch of fun on light tackle, and not bad on the plate

The big flounder catch of the week was Sheri Harvey-Miller's 9 lb. 3 oz. flounder caught on live spot on the south side of the Indian River Inlet.

Offshore fishing remains hot

with great catches of yellowfin tuna going to those trolling the canyons. Bluefin and a few vellowfin can be found around the Hot Dog and Sausages. Capt. Barry Brittingham and crew went between the Wilmington and Baltimore Canyons for a great score, bringing home 8 nice vellowfins.

Capt. Bill at Bill's Sport Shop informed us that the winner of their flounder tournament was Bob Scharmer from Baltimore, MD who received a \$500 check for his 23.5-inch, 5.25 pound flounder from Bill's Sport Shop.



At Rattle & Reel Sports Center, Pat reported that Scott Swarter took his sons Kyle and Josh to the Indian River Inlet to drown some spot when Kyle scored two 30-inch stripers and Josh took home a 34 incher.

Deanna at Hook'em and Cook'em Bait and Tackle said that the west side of the Indian River Inlet is producing a lot of nice keeper flounder. These fish are generally being caught on live spot, squid and minnows and jig heads tipped with Gulp! baits.

Rockfish are also being caught, although anglers are finding mostly throwbacks during the day with more keeper-sized fish showing up at night to early morning. Some are throwing out flies, some are using live spot and some are now using poppers. You will find these fish up by the bridge pilings down to the Coast Guard Station wall.

There have also been many medium-sized bluefish running through the Inlet. These fish are being caught on bucktails, Hopkins lures or Kastmasters. They are running anywhere from 2 lbs. to 6 lbs. in size.

Offshore, tuna are still out to the Canyons, mostly from the Baltimore to the Wilmington. Yellowfin are being caught by boats trolling ballyhoo and some are having luck with green machines on a spreader bar.

The inshore bite is still pretty much the same as last week. There are good days and then there are some not so good days. Throwbacks are plentiful for black sea bass with some keepers in the mix and occasionally you will see a flounder or two come on board. These fish are still on the wrecks but sometimes if you

get the right conditions you can see them on open bottom. We even saw our first triggerfish come in on Friday.

The surf report remains the same with small kingfish, small spot and some blowfish being caught. These fish are all getting hooked on live bloodworms or Fish Bites.

Joe Morris at Lewes Harbour Marina said tuna fishing remained hot. Yellowfins were spread from 70 to 100 fathoms and popped up at several locations between the Baltimore and Wilmington Canyons. The "Grizzly" had a great overnight trip offshore. During darkness, the guys released 7 large dusky sharks, then, when daylight broke, it was full on with tunas. They trolled up 19 keeper yellowfins and headed for home. The "Katy Did" headed out to 70 fathoms along the 380 line on Wednesday and found schools of vellowfins. While pulling ballyhoo and spreader bars, they landed 16 keeper yellowfins weighing up to 45 lbs. and released many more. The crew had some added excitement when 10-foot a long hammerhead ate two of the tuna right behind the boat.

Billfish have been mixed in with tuna and several whites and some big blue marlin were reported.

Inshore trollers had success with bluefins on traditional The structure. Hambone, Chicken Bone, Hot Dog, 19 Fathom Lump, Fingers and Jackspot all yielded bluefins to boaters pulling cedar plugs, green machines, spreader bars and skirted ballyhoo. It was common to capture a keeper bluefin within the 27 to 59-inch slot limit.

Ocean bottom bouncers found flounder on the Old Grounds between "DB" and "DA" Buoys. Reef Sites 9 and 10 started to produce flatties too. Flukers fooled fish by employing a 3 oz. bucktail tipped with squid and a hair teaser on a dropper about 18-inches ahead of the jig. Captain Brent on the "Katy Did" worked several piles of rubble on Saturday and managed to cull a limit of keeper flounder up to 5.6 pounds for his anglers. Reef sites in the Delaware Bay produced flounder also when drift and water

conditions were favorable. Will Burdette wound in a 6.49 pound flounder, and Don Moss took a 2.74 pound triggerfish over a reef on the "Lil' Angler II". Flounder continue to come from the Lewes Canal. John Northeimer nailed a 5.26 pounder in the Canal using Gulp!. Some big flounder were landed from the jetties at Indian River Inlet. Ryan Wieber was tossing a Gulp! along the rocks when an 8 lb. 11 oz. doormat grabbed his lure. David Wyszinski was casting a Storm Shad for stripers and connected with a 6 lb. 4 oz. flatfish.

Fishermen at the Cape Henlopen Pier caught plenty of small spot, along with a few croakers.

Ron Smith told of good action with stripers in the 20 to 26 inch range, while throwing 4 inch Storm Shads along the rocks of the Outer Wall.





A CLEVER GADGET WITH A REAL SAFETY BENEFIT

Every now and then a product comes along that makes you go "Hey, that's pretty clever. I haven't seen that before." And so it is with this next item called the "Autotether". Simply put, it is a man overboard wireless motor shut off.



If you can imagine the worst of all incidents, which happens all too often on a boat, especially when you are alone and you slip or reach over for something, a wave hits and you lose your balance falling overboard. There you are swimming and trying to get back to the boat but its engines are running and it's still moving so you can't catch up. What do you do? Well, the Autotether might just save the

Consisting of two pieces, the main unit and the remote that are both operated by AAA batteries, the Autotether is a wireless lanyard that connects directly to the engine kill switch. There are up to 3 extra remote "passenger" keys and one "operator" key available. You wear these on your person. If the operator falls overboard, the motor will

shut off and an alarm will sound. If a passenger falls overboard, just the alarm will sound.

This is a pretty simple system actually. Run by batteries, when turned on the two units "talk" to each other by radio frequency. If one of the keys (sensors) falls in the water, that radio signal is interrupted and that triggers the alarm and/or kill switch.

Installation couldn't be easier. Mount the main unit (receiver) to the boat near the ignition by simply peeling the adhesive strips and then attach the clip to the kill switch. Put the key (sensor) in your pocket and turn on the main unit. The batteries are estimated to last for 100 hours. This unit normally retails for around \$235.00

The manufacturer, aptly named Autotether, Inc., also makes a similar unit called "The Screamer". It is a wireless alarm system that is based on the same principle

as the Autotether. Consisting of a main unit and up to 4 sensors, when the system is turned on, an alarm squeals if any of the remote sensors goes under water or strays more than 100 feet from the main unit. This can certainly be used on your boat but I imagine all sorts of other uses. For moms and dads looking after small children at home where there is a pool or while stream, nearby shopping in the supermarket or some other store or even on your dog. What if someone tries to kidnap your child or pet? You will know within seconds that something is







Chum Lines

On the dash of my boat are two slightly used "fish tags." One came from the back of a mako shark that originally caught off New Jersey three years prior to us landing it; the other was recovered from a yellowfin tuna that was taken the year before off Massachusetts. Whether or not it's their original intention when they head out for a day of fishing, any angler might, at any time,





become involved in the tagging process. From flounder to blue marlin, there's a lot of fish swimming around out there that are sporting tags attached to their fins, back, tail or gill, and no one can know if their next cast is going to have them hooked up to one.

Tags are typically planted either by recreational or commercial fishermen, or in some cases, directly by researchers doing a particular study. Tags come in a variety of designs and can be as simple as a spaghetti-like strip of plastic to an expensive high tech electronic gizmo that automatically uploads its data to a satellite. Some tags are designed specifically for one type of fish such as sharks or billfish, while other tags can be used on multiple species such as flounder, sea bass or stripers. All are printed with a unique tag number and some sort of return address or instructions for fishermen to follow if they recapture the fish.

What a lot of anglers wish to know is, "do I have to release a fish that's been



tagged?" In almost all cases, the answer is "no" as long as the fish is of a legal size and species. The simple fact that it has been previously caught and tagged does not mandate that be released. it Considering that in most cases the reason fish are tagged is so that biologists can track the movements and growth rate of a particular species, it would stand to reason that if a tagged fish was recaptured and then, recording the after number, location, and measurements, the angler was to re-release the fish with the tag still in it, that particular fish could provide an extra measure of valuable data to doing the study, particularly if the fish was ever to be captured a third time. So it would be "better" to release a fish that has a tag in it, but not mandatory.

It's both fun and quite interesting to catch a tagged fish and learn where and by whom it was originally caught, and each tag recovery provides researchers with a little more knowledge about a particular species. But I think it's the one who first landed and actually tagged the fish that gets the most sense of accomplishment and really deserves the bragging rights for each tag recovery. When a fish is tagged, the angler's name and details of the catch will be recorded in the files of the tagging program. Whether it's a day, a year, or many decades later, if the fish is recaptured, the tagging program that issued the tags usually notifies the angler, congratulating them and providing details about the recapture and in some cases providing a certificate or and award of some sort.

Occasionally, when a fish has traveled a particularly long distance or has been at liberty for an extraordinary length of time between captures, a press release might even be sent out to notify the public that a

significant tag recovery has been made.

Face it, most successful anglers like to bring home some kind of evidence of their conquest, particularly after all the time, effort, and resources that so often go into catching a fish in the first place. At times, just turning the fish loose as soon as it's brought to the boat or shoreline might seem akin to erasing all traces of the effort that was made to catch the fish. But add a tag to the process and suddenly there's a way for anglers to basically put their "mark" on a fish so that if it's ever caught again, the original tagger will get credit for being the first one to land it. It's just a way of saying "I was here", kind of like carving your name in a tree or adding graffiti to a wall - but in a good way.

Tagging gives fishermen a fun reason to practice careful catch-and-release tactics and a good argument that one of the greatest benefits to a fishery from a tagging program is not so much the science produced, as the conservation efforts made by the fishermen involved with it.

Virginia Fishing Report

Summer has officially started and it looks like the cobia finally got the word. Although the bite is still not great, it is improving each day. Those who are offering chum and cut bunker are still having the best luck. The bite off Hampton slowed, but several fish are coming from the Eastern Shore side of the Bay this week. According to Chris at Chris' Bait and Tackle, chummers sitting on Latimer Shoals and the Inner Middle Grounds have weighed in fish to over 70-pounds. Most of these boats are toting in two to three fish, mostly in the 25 to 45-pound range. Sightcasters seeing are also improvement in the top water cobia action, with several fish falling to eels and bucktails this week.

With the clearer water lately, flounder action is picking up. The biggest surge is coming from the Cell this week. At the Bay Bridge Tunnel, the 4th Island and the bend at the 3rd Island is producing for drifters, while those working structure with jigs and live bait are finding good numbers of nice keepers. Anglers fishing in the Rudee and Lynnhaven Inlet are still having good luck with the flatfish, but shorts defiantly dominating catches.

The Virginia Beach Fishing Center reports that the Spanish mackerel bite along the Virginia Beach oceanfront is still steady. Boats are filling their limits with nice fish ranging from 16 to 24-inches. Small Clark and Drone spoons trolled at 5 to 6 knots is enticing the best response, along with an abundance of tailor bluefish.

Spadefish are still skittish at the Chesapeake Light Tower and near shore wrecks, but folks are enticing a few takers. The best luck on spades is coming from Plantation Light, the Cell and around the islands of the CBBT where fish are averaging around 4-pounds.

Sheepshead action turned on over the past week, with several fish over 10-pounds boated from the CBBT complex. If you happen to catch a tautog while fishing these same areas, you are in luck since the season reopened last week. Triggerfish should also start biting in these same areas soon.

Black drum are schooled around the artificial islands of the Bridge Tunnel. Several blacks have been caught by anglers targeting spadefish. Remember that black drum require extra time while reviving them in order to increase their survival rate. A few red drum are still taking baits along the Eastern Shore shoals, especially the Nine Foot Shoals.

Larger croaker are lurking around the James River Bridge, the Hampton Roads Bridge Tunnel, the Monitor-Merrimac Bridge Tunnel and off Ocean View. The Oyster croaker run also started up this week. One boat caught 40 hardheads in the medium to

large range while fishing this area. Croaker are also up for grabs within Lynnhaven and Rudee Inlet, along with spot, scattered puppy drum, and speckled trout.

Amberjack are enticing a few anglers to make the long run to the Southern Towers lately where many pups are willing to take your bait along with a few big fish also testing a few backs.

Deep droppers are still doing well, but the escalating offshore trolling scene is shifting interest to more bluewater species. For those still dropping a line to the bottom, some tilefish, wreckfish, grouper, rosefish, and nice sea bass are good possibilities.

The offshore scene continues to heat up, with quite the mixed bag available. Some yellowfin tuna are around, with a few hogs pushing to over 100-pounds thrilling a few crews. The bluefin tuna action is good, with most fish ranging in the 50-pound school sized class. Most catches of bluefin tuna are coming from the Fingers area and 26-mile Hill, with scattered king mackerel, wahoo, and dolphin in the mix. A few gaffers are pushing to over 20-pounds. Billfish are also available, with several whites and a few blues checking out spreads this week. Scattered make sharks are also making it back to the docks lately. 



The Endless Summer Bite

It started before Memorial Day, it hasn't stopped yet, and it shows no sign of quitting. Offshore, the yellowfin tuna bite continues to be white hot at the Canyons, with the Baltimore the very hottest location of late. Bluefin tuna continue to turn up in outstanding numbers lumps from the 20 to 30 fathom line inside to the Jackspot. "Morningstar" Captain Monty Hawkins has even gotten in on the action, putting out spreads of cedar plugs resulting in multiple hookups of bluefin. DNR biologist Fisheries Steve Schneider was on board for one of the "bluefin blitzes". He professes it was an experience never forget! wrecks nearshore are producing nice catches of black sea bass and a few tautog. The Atlantic cod appear to be moving gradually north, but what a memory the last few weeks have been. Inshore, stripers have been on the south jetty

and caught near the Rt. 50 Bridge at night. Flounder catches continue to be solid. Speaking of flounder, DNR launches a brand new survey on July 1st. Read on for details.

Maryland DNR Summer Flounder Catch Rate Survey

Maryland DNR is teaming up with volunteers from the Maryland Saltwater Sportfishermen's Association and back bay sport fishermen to conduct a first ever of it's kind survey to put to the test concerns we have heard from local fishermen regarding the harvest estimates for summer flounder from the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS). If you are an avid summer flounder fishermen, and you have followed the vear-to-vear process develop regulations for flounder, you may know that the minimum size, daily creel limit and season length we put in place are in part a function of the estimated catch from the NMFS Marine Recreational

Fisheries Statistics Survey (MRFSS) as it relates to Maryland's annual quota for flounder. In simplest terms, the survey combines a telephone survey (which will now use the database from the National Saltwater Angler Registry) to address fishing effort (time spent fishing) coupled with a second component, a dockside angler which seeks survey, estimate angler catch rates. The two components are used in tandem by NMFS to develop estimates of harvest. The harvest estimates for a given year can significantly impact the next year's fishing season guidelines, particularly if they indicate the quota was exceeded. For Maryland's flounder fishermen, this has often meant highly variable seasons from one year to the next. In some years where the quota was exceeded, the minimum size has been raised, or the season was shortened or the daily creel limit was reduced. In some years a combination of these three occurred. Performance of the stock plays a role too, but fishermen have focused their ire on the survey estimates.

Ocean City recreational summer flounder fishing enthusiasts have voiced concerns that the estimates are not entirely accurate, because the dockside surveys are conducted at public fishing launches only, and that boats launching from private property or marinas have not been included. As I have pointed out in past columns, complaints without solutions seldom lead to productive but outcomes, minded thinkers exist in every group. Enter MSSA Atlantic

Coast Chapter member Frank Watkins. Frank suggested to DNR staff, and ultimately, DNR Fisheries Statistician, Dr. Linda Barker, an idea to test whether the sampling affects the outcome of the estimates. Based upon the creative collaboration of Frank and Dr. Barker, DNR proposes to test the assertion by developing separate "private access" and "public access" catch rates for summer flounder comparing our information against the federal survey estimate.

So, a unique survey has been developed that will run during the months of July and August of this summer, during a time period that coincides with "wave 4" of the federal survey. The survey, known officially as the "Summer Flounder Catch Rate Survey" will confine sampling to "Flounder Alley" in Isle of Wight Bay and Sinepuxent Bay.

MSSA volunteers will distribute simple, easy to fill out survey cards to anglers on the water during their fishing trips, capitalizing on the rapport between fellow anglers. Here is an example of the survey card that will be handed out to other boat fishermen on the water by the MSSA volunteers.



Participating anglers simply need to fill out their card upon completion of their trip, and drop it the closest mailbox when they return to shore. Postage is prepaid. DNR Fisheries personnel will provide the survey design, collect and analyze the data sent in by the anglers upon completion of their trips. Ultimately, DNR will share the results with the NMFS staff that are working on the redesign of the federal

recreational fishing survey (MRIP).

So if you are fishing on the water and a fellow fisherman approaches you with a card in hand, please consider taking a moment to listen to them, fill out the survey card at the end of your trip, and drop it in the mailbox. If having a role in a historic, never conducted survey isn't enough motivation, we'll be pulling one lucky name from the list of submitted catch rate cards each month (July and August) to win a special prize. The survey begins this Friday, July

Radford Update

Jeff's update for this week is a real teaser. He is

optimistic final testing of the vessel will soon be completed by the US Coast Guard and the EPA, clearing the way for potential mid-July deployment. If this holds true, look for next week's update to possibly have the definitive breaking news. We could be just two short weeks away from the largest ship ever sunk for an artificial reef on the Atlantic Coast, and the newest go-to fishing spot off the Delmarva.


