



#### **Tournament Roundup**

Last weekend saw three tournaments in the area covering a broad spectrum of anglers from kids to kayaks to small boat warriors! We have coverage of all three in this edition but here are some highlights;

The Ocean Marlin Club 42nd Annual Small Boat Tournament was held last weekend with weigh ins at Sunset Marina. In a sign of pent up demand and with a good weather forecast, over 60 boats participated, most on Saturday. The anglers reported having to work for their catches both inshore and offshore. The "Tellum" found a 74 lb. tuna to take the prize in that category of \$9,292 followed closely by "Four Eights" with a 71.5 pounder taking 2nd Place for \$2,011. The Mahi Division was interesting since only two qualifying fish were weighed. The "Fishizzle" weighed a 15 lb. peanut that topped the leader board holding onto 1st and a prize payout of \$9,963. The second place fish at 13 lbs. on the "Oppor-Tuna-Ty Too" secured \$2,682! Inshore saw lots of changes over the tournament as well as lots of ties. With just over \$30,000 in prize money and lots of anglers, a good time was had by all.

The Indian River Marina held it's 6th Annual Kids Catch-All Tournament last weekend to benefit the Lyme Disease Association of Delmarva, Inc. Over 100 kids from across the region participated and had a great time. If you have not checked out this yearly event and have kids interested in fishing, I highly recommend it. It is an event as much as it is a tournament and it is for a good cause.

Some may have seen a rather large increase in the number of kayaks fishing in the area last weekend. Well, we have the 3rd Annual Fish N Paddle Saltwater Slam to thank. This globally recognized tournament brings kayak anglers and enthusiasts from all over to compete for award money and prizes. This year had 70 anglers participate in the inshore and bay tournament over 3 days with weigh ins and entertainment at Atlantic Tackle.

Three great events, check out the details in our tournament section towards the back of the paper.


#### The Latest Offshore

Despite some windy 'windows' the weather the past week allowed for a lot of boats to get offshore. While the bite for some species have slowed a bit like tuna, we are seeing others pick up like mahi and wahoo. Also the first couple blue marlin releases were reported last week. Here is what we have heard over the past week!

#### Tuna

The good news is that the yellowfin tuna bite is steady but has cooled a bit from the double digit and limit catches of a week ago. Many boats are reporting mid to high single digit catches mainly from the southern Poor Man's and Washington Canyons. Picking them one by one or getting a double here and there is a common refrain. However, they seem to be hitting everything for bait with Sterling Tackle Wide Tracker and Spreader Bars often in the mix. Skirted ballyhoo seems more common than naked compared to last year. Look to the Rockpile and south for the best action now.

We had a bit of a race for heaviest

bigeve tuna this week. Last week's number to beat was 212 lbs. set by Tom Collins on the "Fishizzle". Last Saturday angler Mark Perez on the "Whiskey Kilo" with Capt. Jojo Joachimowski brought in a 233 lb. eveball from the Washington Canyon only to have Greg Eckard on the "Ro Sham Bo" weigh a 235 pounder the next day, also from the Washington. Several other 125 pound plus were also reported, all in the southern canyons. Only a few days look at risk for the upcoming holiday weekend so we expect a lot of action and maybe the first longfin of the season? Maybe a little early, but we will see!

#### Mahi

Peanut and small bull mahis have been hitting the docks. Wrav Bassett from Dillsburg, PA took 1st place in The Dolphin Division during the Frederick Saltwater Anglers Offshore Challenge. The fish weighed in at 17.1 lbs. and was caught on a green machine between the Washington and Norfolk Canyons in 76° water. Angler Chad Starner landed a 45" and 18 lb. citation fish in the Poor Man's Canyon using a pink skirted ballyhoo and two dolphin in the mid teens were weighed at the Ocean City Marlin Club Small Boat Tournament. All of the fish so far are reported being caught on the troll while tuna fishing and not under flotsam or floating debris.

#### Billfish

The blue marlin are officially here. Angler Chelsea Trimper was recognized by the Marlin Club for catching and releasing the first blue marlin of the 2021 season. She was fishing on the "Blood Money" during the Inaugural Tuna & Tiara's Tournament in the Norfolk Canyon looking for tuna when she connected with a blue marlin marking not only the first of the season, but her first blue marlin release ever. While it only took 20 minutes to get the blue to the boat the first time, the crew could not get a good enough video to certify the catch, so she let it run out and

www.coastalfisherman.net fought it for another 40 minutes so the proper documentation could be obtained. Way to go Chelsea! For the catch she will receive a \$2,500 prize from the OC Marlin Club. The "Spring Mix II" also released a blue marlin last week, however, per the rules of the club their video was not conclusive enough to verify the fish as a blue for the award. Still two great catches!

Single white marlin catches are trickling in, still mainly from those hunting for tuna. Capt. Howard Lynch on the "Kilo Charlie" did set the bar on Sunday coming back to the docks with 5 release flags flying!

This week was the start of our busy season and we saw a lot more boats both offshore and inshore as well as the back bays. Wind conditions made travel and setting up on spots rough for many anglers.

#### Flounder

Flounder in the back bays of Ocean City were a little lower than last week probably due to higher boat traffic and more anglers targeting the fish. The areas above the Rt. 50 bridge were the best areas for getting a nice flattie for dinner. Pete Renzi was on the "Fish Frenzi" and got some nice flounder along with a few sea bass. Jack Cael was on the MD/ DE line and caught two nice fish, one at 18.5" and the other at 19". He said it poured on Saturday but fishing was still good. Dylan Patrick states he finally broke the 2 fish mark and got himself 3, from 16 to 19 inches along with a weakfish. The wrecks at the Bass Grounds are giving up some flounder with anglers targeting the smaller low lying wrecks and barges. The African Queen site is a little slower but still producing some nice fish. I have heard from anglers that the northern coral is making its way down below the Delaware line along the shipping channel. It is reported if you can

find the hard coral patches the flounder are there. Search for these patches along the edge of the shipping channel and look for the bright red or hard bottom. You should feel like you're bouncing the weight on concrete when it taps the bottom on a bounce. This may be a fairly long run, 30 miles, however, up in Delaware they target flounder almost solely on the coral beds. I'll try to get out this week and look for myself.

#### Sea bass, Weakfish & Croaker

Small croaker have started showing up on the nearshore wrecks as well as the back bay areas. Although not strong in numbers yet they are a great fish to catch and not very picky as to what they will bite. If you have young kids these fish are a fantastic way to keep them stimulated and excited while fishing. Cut squid is the simplest choice on a top and bottom rig. The best areas in the past have been the curve in the channel and the area above the Rt. 50 bridge and the area just south of the commercial harbor. When on the ocean look for the big school on your depth finder and drop down to the depth of the fish. Most headboats will start targeting these fish in mid July or

early August. If you don't have a boat and want the kids to catch some fish this is a great option. Speaking of headboats, Victor on the Ocean Princess reports decent catches of sea bass on his trips with some flounder thrown in for good measure. The Angler also reported some good catches of sea bass on the African Queen as well as other nearshore wrecks. All of the headboats report its good to see anglers returning after our long season last year with Covid and social distancing. Most boats are still running a modified limit of anglers but are back to fuller boats allowing more opportunity to get a spot. Several of the headboats run full day trips or 12 hour special trips, so check out their sites for more info. The longer trips allow for a longer run to deeper water and usually produce better quality of fish. Weakfish are also making a surprise appearance this year. They were a main staple for both bay and ocean fishermen, but have not been seen in the past few years. Hopefully they are on their way to a comeback! Areas in the bay that have produced in the past are the west side below the Rt. 50 bridge ( the channel by the old Shanty Town) and the main Thorofare along the docks by the commercial harbor. Small

www.coastalfisherman.net swimbaits, bucktails and shrimp are the top baits. Also starting to show up are sheepshead. Target these fish in the deep hole right at the inlet mouth. During the summer many boats will be seen anchored or drifting along the south rock wall. Small pieces of shrimp on very small hooks work best for these fish. Sand fleas also are a productive bait and easy to find. These fish are very wary of a hook and line so use the lightest flourocarbon you can to better fool them.

#### Sharks & Cobia

The cobia start has been slow, but some are being caught at Fenwick Shoals as well as nearshore humps south of OC. Sharks are everywhere and a great way to chum up a big hard fishing fish. Blues and rockfish are still at the bridge but keepers are hard to come by.

#### Surf Fishing

Surf fishing has become our normal staple of sharks, rays and small blues. Philip Lambrinas was using his Okiaya rod and reel and did manage a nice keeper striper in the bay.

#### Clams & Crabs

Clams remain good at Assateague bays, but crabs have slowed this week. The low oxygen levels may have something to do with this.



#### Keep in Touch

Some people go fishing to get away from it all, unplug for a while and enjoy the outdoors. Others need to stay connected so they can get away and fish and be available if needed.

Many coastal fishing and boating spots in our area are covered bycellular signals, providing voice and internet, up to about 10 miles offshore. Marine VHF also covers our inshore fishing areas very well, along with much of the coastal USA. Booster antenna are available to increase the near shore signal strength.

Once you venture farther offshore or into less populated waterways, the coverage of cellular voice and data drops off rather quickly, leaving the VHF as one of the primary methods of communications.

There was a time in the past that a "marine operator" could be hailed on a specially designated VHF channel, they could connect you, via public relay to a telephone call to someone on land, this service ended once cell phones become the preferred communications In today's world, there are a few different choices that allow a boater to communicate with others on land or on the Iridium satellite network to send and receive custom and preset text messages or emails with delivery confirmation. The InReach data plans are similar in pricing style to a cell phone plan, there is a monthly charge, and you choose a plan that covers the amount of messaging you think you need. Plans start at \$12/



water when you are out of cellular phone range. The most well-known device used by boaters and anglers is the Garmin inReach.

The Garmin inReach is one of a handful of satellite communicators.

The inReach family of devices are a text or email satellite powered handheld device about the size of a cell phone. Garmin products with inReach technology use the month.

The Garmin inReach also uses GPS to track your location and provide a map of the area (certain models only). This location information can be appended to your text messages, allowing the receiver to see your location and your speed and heading. This feature makes it easy to keep friends and family updated on your position when traveling or fishing away www.coastalfisherman.net from cellular coverage. These devices are not a substitute for an EPIRB or PLB but do have the ability to transmit an emergency message that is sent to a private rescue service.

While the Garmin inReach is popular, there are similar satellite messaging devices such Iridium as, GO! Globalstar SPOT X® 2-way satellite messenger and the new ACR Bivy Stick Two-Way Satellite Communicator Globalstar, recently discontinued a product called Sat-Fi2, they still offer service for their legacy product the original Sat-Fi. Only two of these products above can be used for voice calls too - the IridiumGo! And Globalstar Sat-fi. While the IridiumGo! and Sat-Fi could be also used for internet data, the speeds are so slow that most users find it useless for most tasks.

voice calls are more If important than texting, there are a few handheld and permanent mounted satellite phones for marine use, many of these are voice only, which may be all you need. Iridium, Inmarsat, KVH, Intellian and Globalstar offer traditional phones satellite starting around \$700 for the hardware. One note of caution if selecting a handheld satellite telephone; the handset needs a clear view



of the sky to receive a GPS and satellite signal from the service provider. Using a handheld phone under a hardtop or in the cabin or salon of a boat usually will not work since

makes a phone call using a special wired handset or Bluetooth headset to connect to the cradled satellite phone handset.

If you need more than simple



the signal is then too weak. Many of the handheld phones offer a marine accessory kit with an external antenna that is mounted on the boat's topside and a special cradle for the handheld phone inside the boat. The user then texting or voice calls, then you want to look at satellite broadband solutions offered by KVH and Intellain for the leisure market. There is a new entry in this marketplace, the KVH V30. What makes this satellite "dome" different than



others? Technology and price plans! The V30 offers one of the fastest internet download speeds as fast as 6 Mbps down/2 Mbps up, housed in a compact 14" antenna dome. KVH offers new lower cost price plans that have not been offered to pleasure boaters in the past, both unlimited and metered plans. The new price plans are now available month to month, unlimited plans have no overage costs, though speed slows down once you use more than your plans allotted data. The metered plans offer the highest speeds at the lowest costs. The internet signal is also used for

FRY: Add the olive oil to the pan and allow for it to heat through. When hot, fry the fish for 3-4 flipping minutes halfway. Depending on the thickness, you might need to cook the fish for longer until it's cooked through. Remove the fish to a plate and set aside.

SAUCE: There should only be about a tablespoon of oil remaining. If there is more, drain all but a tablespoon from the pan. Add the garlic into the skillet and fry in the oil for just 15 seconds. Add in a pinch of red pepper flakes, chicken stock, and lemon. Kick the heat to the highest setting, allow the sauce to reach simmer then reduce the sauce for 2 minutes. Lower the heat to the lowest setting, then add in two small cubes of butter and allow it to

www.coastalfisherman.net you stir or swirl the pan with the handle. Continue adding two small cubes of butter at a time until all the butter is used up. Take your time here, don't rush this. Add in chopped basil and stir to combine. Plate the fish with cooked rice or roasted vegetables and top with basil lemon butter sauce!

#### **Tuscan Grilled Trout**

**Ingredients:** 

1/4 cup olive oil

1 clove garlic, cut into thin slices

1/2 teaspoon dried sage

1/2 teaspoon dried rosemary, crumbled

2 tablespoons wine vinegar


1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon fresh-ground black pepper

8 trout fillets (about 2 lbs.)

Directions:

Light the grill or heat the broiler. In a small stainlesssteel saucepan, combine the oil, garlic, sage, and rosemary. Cook

www.coastalfisherman.net over moderately low heat until the garlic just starts to brown, about 2 minutes. Remove from the heat and immediately stir in the vinegar, 1/4 teaspoon of the salt, and the pepper.

Put the trout fillets in a medium



glass dish or stainless-steel pan. Sprinkle the fish with the remaining 1/4 teaspoon salt. Add half of the oil-and-vinegar mixture and turn to coat. Grill or broil the fish skin-side down for 2 minutes. Turn and cook until just done, about 2 minutes longer for 1/4-inch-thick fillets. To serve, whisk the remaining oil-and-vinegar mixture and pour it over the hot fish.

#### Spicy Fish Marinade

Ingredients:

1/4 cup soy sauce

1/4 cup olive oil

3 tablespoons brown mustard I use spicy brown mustard

2 tablespoons honey or use brown sugar

2 tablespoons lemon juice or juice from 1/2 lemon

- 1 serrano pepper diced
- 4 cloves garlic minced
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano

Red pepper flakes - 1/4 to 1 tsp. to taste

#### Directions:

Whisk together the soy sauce, olive oil, honey or brown sugar, mustard, lemon juice, garlic, oregano, salt and red pepper flakes in a mixing bowl until well combined.

Place the fish in a large zip-lock bag and pour the marinade over them. Seal the bag and refrigerate at least 15 to 20 minutes, or for 1 hour before cooking.



I had a power saw quit working while I was using it to cut a piece of lumber. There was no apparent reason for the tool to quit. For once I was even using it for a job it was designed for! But there I was in the middle of a cut when it suddenly shut-off as quickly as if had been unplugged. Aside from the hassle of having to grab another saw to finish the job, the malfunction didn't upset me too much because having purchased the broken tool just eight months ago I knew that all I had to do was take it back to where I got it from and I'd be given a new one on the spot. Guarantees are good!

Particularly in tough economic times, consumers pretty much expect guarantees before they'll shuck out their hard earned cash, and those vying for business are usually very willing to offer assurances of 100% satisfaction. Such claims can be very realistic when applied to products and many services; either the toaster



works or it doesn't, the car was fixed or it wasn't, if not we visit "customer service" to get a refund or have someone make things right. In this man-made environment, by waving a few dollars we have the power to insist things go our way.

But sportsmen know that it doesn't work that way in the natural world. Regardless of how much money or desire they have, there's no way "anyone" can guarantee that a fish will bite a hook, a flock of ducks will come to decoys, or a trophy buck will walk under a tree stand. Certainly, resources and skill can combine to enhance the chance for a successful outcome, but it's impossible to truthfully assure anyone that they will make a catch or kill. Regardless of how good the fishing or hunting has been, every day is a new one, fish and game can move-on, stop feeding, or whatever and that's the end of it. Experienced hunters and anglers know and accept this uncertainty and welcome it as a part of the mystery and challenge of our pursuits, and it's what defines us as "sportsmen" and separates us from those who go out on the water or into the field with only the goal of harvesting a meal.

As much as sportsmen would like to achieve their goal of catching or killing whatever it is they have their sights set on, most really don't want a guarantee of the outcome as that might insinuate that there's a deer tied to a tree waiting for a point-blank shot, or a fish with a hook already in its mouth just needing to be reeled-in. We want the uncertainty and we need some sort of challenge to legitimize the difference between our sport and a trip to Food Lion for groceries.

For these reasons I'm always both suspect and ashamed when I hear of captains or guides soliciting fishing or hunting clients by baiting them with any kind of a guarantee of what they will catch or kill. I've been fishing and hunting a long time and no matter how good the conditions are or the action has been there has never been and never will be a day when I depart with 100% certainty of what the day will bring. As a

www.coastalfisherman.net charter fishing captain, potential clients sometimes ask me if we guarantee fish. My answer is always the same, "Even if I had a school of starving fish in a barrel I couldn't guarantee they'd Granted, bite." sometimes the fishing is so good that I'll happily report that there's a very very good chance they'll have an exceptional catch, but the only guarantee I'll give is that we'll give our best effort, after that I guess it's up to God. But as the lure of sport fishing draws to it both those who might be duped by such absurd claims and those who know better, there has always been a few in our industry willing to prey upon the unknowing. Such tactics typically surface in areas where competition for clients is stiff. South Florida is a good example. In an area where it would seem that every other vessel afloat is for hire, and there's an endless stream of tourists looking for something to do, some captains have stooped to the level of telling folks whatever is necessary to get them on the boat, and in this age when folks are so accustomed to having everything they pay for to have some kind of assurance that comes along with it, a guaranteed catch can be an effective draw.

Those who book a "guaranteed" trip would do well to first read the fine print before embarking on such a trip. That is, if there is any "print" of any size regarding the guarantee. Usually the only written evidence of such a claim will be in the boat's promotional material or maybe from the lips of the captain or mate as they try to talk someone into booking with them. One guy I knew down in the Keys used to advertise "Guaranteed Tarpon or Your Money Back!" The claim would draw some pigeons, but not all were happy as they left the boat having discovered that the guarantee was that they would "hook" a tarpon, and by the captain's standards "hooking" a tarpon could mean no more than something whacked the bait and pulled the line tight for a second or two. Even though the bite could have been from a shark, snapper, barracuda, or even a snag, the captain


was always sure it was from a tarpon and no one could hold him to blame if the customer couldn't keep it on the line! That fellow came home skunked just as many times as anyone else did, but I don't think he ever refunded a dime.

Another way to work the scam is for a captain to offers a free trip to those who don't catch fish. Here again, with nothing in writing the captain has a lot of wiggle room and that "free trip" might only be available at a very inconvenient time for the customer. If you're on vacation for a week but the captain can't fit your next trip in for a couple months the offer of a free trip doesn't do you much good - and he knows it!

I had some guys fishing with me once who had been duped a few years before by a captain who advertised "No Fish - No Pay." They went offshore targeting tuna, billfish and sharks but caught nothing. On the way home the boat suddenly slowed to a stop and the mate handed one of the fellows a light rod and instructed him to drop the


line to the bottom. Before he knew it he had hooked a small seabass and the captain was announcing, "Well, at least we didn't get skunked!" Of course what he meant was that now they would have to pay him in full because they did indeed catch a fish.

I bring all this up for two reasons: First, because a lot of folks travel to go fishing or hunting these days and now that online booking services are so much the rage sportsmen are not always aware of the reputation of someone they might choose to book a trip with, just what they see in the captain or guides online profile. Second, while Delmarva sportsmen have been mostly spared the insult of such deceptive promotional schemes, I've recently heard rumors of the "G" word being used by a (very) few to drum up more business. Let the buyer beware reputable fishermen and guides don't need to offer guarantees. And let the captains and guides beware - experienced sportsmen don't want one!





This week brought some cooler weather, winds and lots of traffic on the water. As we enter into our 8 weeks of tourism the waters around Delaware are getting crowded. With more anglers on the water fishing will begin to get tougher.

#### Flounder

Flounder fishing remained pretty strong this week when anglers could get out. Strong winds dominated most of this week making drifting a little tougher.

Those anglers making it out were rewarded with some nice flounder. Brian Davis caught a nice 18" flounder at the Indian River Inlet on Wednesday at high tide. Sean Clever hooked into a 17.5" flounder Wednesday and a nice 22" flounder on Thursday. As for the bay side, flounder in the Indian River Bay and Rehoboth Bay have been fair, with a keeper ratio of about 3 throwbacks to 1 keeper. Prime areas are Massey's Ditch and the main channel at the inlet. In

Rehoboth Bay, the southern end and side channels are producing the best fish. High boat traffic and fishing pressure have made targeting spots tough. Look for the out of the way deeper holes not on the main channel. The mid bay areas near Pot Nets are a great place to look and have some really nice deep holes on the northern side of the channel. On the ocean side, Site 10 is starting to show some signs of good life. Reports of nice flounder and some sea bass are coming in. Jacob Gearheart caught a few nice flounder here on Nuclear Chicken Gulp. Site 10 is a short 6 miles outside of the inlet and great for those not wanting to run the 13 miles to the coral grounds. B buoy and A buoy both reported some decent fish this week. Site 11 and NJ/DE reef are the top producers for flounder this week. Pink Gulp is the bait of choice!

#### Sea bass, Sheepshead & Spot

Sea bass has really started to slow due to warming

water temps. Target deeper locations 100 ft or deeper with fresh clam for the best results. A few sea bass are on site 10 and 11 but most are now throwbacks. NJ/DE reef remains the hot location for keepers but even here in deeper water the ratio is about 10 throwbacks to 1 keeper. Finding wrecks that have not been hit hard by multiple anglers has paid off big time as a few die hard sea bass captains are returning to the docks with nice loads of keepers. Target the smaller wrecks that can't be fished by the bigger boats. Burt Campbell reported that he caught sheepshead on the north side jetty of the Indian River Inlet. A few other reports have come in that sheepshead are beginning to turn on at the inlet. Shrimp or sand fleas are taking the most fish. Remember small hooks and lighter drags so as not to rip the hooks from these fish softer mouths. The inlet and bays are full of big spot this year. They are a prime food source for all larger predators

www.coastalfisherman.net and this is a welcome sign. The past couple of years have not had the bay spot we were accustomed to seeing. Even crab pots have spot in them. Many anglers attest that they are also great table fare. Sabiki rigs are the method for targeting these fish. Most Sabiki rigs are 5-7 hooks, so try cutting off the bottom 2 hooks to avoid tangles when multiple fish are caught at the same time. Clams or bloodworms are the prime baits to use.

#### Sharks, Rays & Cobia

Sharks and rays are everywhere near the beach. Michael Deller reported getting spooled twice by a big cow nose ray while surf fishing the Delaware beaches. He was using a 30 lb. line and 60 lb. leader. They are notorious runners and will empty your spool in one long run or dig into the sand and lay there, daring you to pull harder. Sharks are also abundant near shore. Chumming with large chuck baits are your best way to target these hard pullers. Make sure that when fishing for sharks keep a live spot or eel rigged up because your chum will not only bring in the sharks but also the cobia. They've shown up on the



www.coastalfisherman.net Fenwick Shoals as well as the mouth of the inlet.

#### Surf Fishing

Tons of spot are in the surfs along with a decent amount of weakfish. Small floats tipped with squid or bloodworms are the best baits.

#### Crabs & Clams

Crabbing was a little slow this week with pots yielding about half the crabs they did a week ago. Looking at the area I crab in, I can't recall ever seeing so many pots in the water. Also as a side note, DNR is out tagging pots for both times attended (3 day max) as well as for pots not being all white with name addresses and readable. Clamming remains strong with Rehoboth Bay being the prime area this week.




