As this report is being written on Monday morning (we go to press on Monday evening), the town is buzzing in anticipation of the 41st Annual White Marlin Open. This year, 288 boats will be competing for over \$2,600,000 in prize money, which is 26 boats and \$125,000 more than last year. The final day of weigh-ins is Friday, and it usually is an exciting one, so you may want to head on out to Harbour Island and check it out.

Make sure you pick up next weeks Coastal Fisherman for full coverage and pictures of the tournament.

## Marlin Club Ladies Tournament

The 6th Annual Ocean City Marlin Club Ladies Tournament was held on Friday and Saturday. The weather over the weekend wasn't that great, especially on Saturday when many boats turned around due to rough sea conditions.

Of the 29 boats, a tournament high, 18 fished on Friday. The "Grande Pez" ventured down to the Rockpile where Tamara Sears boated a pair of yellowfins weighing 57.2 and 63.8 lbs. and held on to win 1st and 3rd place in the Tuna Division.

Bernadette Mumford on the "Knot Again" arrived at the scale with an impressive 49.6 lb. dolphin from the Baltimore Canyon and won 1st place in the



Matt Long of PT's Marine joined Paul Turner for a trip to the Fingers where he released his first sailfish. They also caught 2 dolphin before heading to the Great Eastern Reef and landed a couple of keeper flounder and 4 jumbo sea bass. A great day!

Dolphin Division. Fellow angler, Maria Baiocco caught an 18.4 lb. mahi to win 2nd place in the Division.

Monica Freese and Brenda Goodhart on the "Brenda Lou" was next up at the scale with 3 white marlin releases and a blue marlin release. Unfortunately, the mandatory photo or video of the blue marlin was inconclusive, resulting in the blue marlin being recognized as a white marlin and putting the "Brenda Lou" in 2nd place. They ended up losing a tiebreaker to the "Jenny Poo" who also had 4 white marlin releases.

Corky Mock on the "Slaughterhouse" caught a 62.8

lb. yellowfin at the Rockpile to win 2nd place in the Tuna Division.

Finally, on day 1, the always dangerous lady anglers on the "Sea Slammer" arrived at Sunset Marina with 5 white marlin releases to take the top prize in the tournament. The whites were caught and released in the Norfolk Canyon.

On Saturday, only 2 boats came to the scale with anything to weigh. The "Last Call", who after turning around due to rough seas decided to hit the Twin Wrecks where Jen Ott boated a 17 lb. dolphin to move into 3rd place in the tournament. The "Marli" also came to the scale with a 56.4 lb. yellowfin caught at in the Washington Canyon that barely missed 3rd place in the Tuna Division.

Overall, it was another great tournament with some excellent catches in several divisions and more importantly, a lot of smiling **www.coastalfisherman.net** faces at the scale.

## Ocean Pines Chamber of Commerce Flounder Tournament

On Saturday, we also had the Annual Ocean Pines Chamber of Commerce Flounder Tournament with 231 anglers competing for \$2,600 in prize money. This tournament is the only one that goes by length of fish and not weight. Baron Daiker's 21 7/8-inch flounder weighed 5.09 lbs. and broke a 1st place tie with Greg Donahue's fish of the same length, but Greg's only weighed 4.07 lbs. Both fish were caught in the West Channel. Third place went to Shane McCormick with a 21incher caught behind Harbour Island.

A bad weather forecast prevented this fast growing tournament from having even more anglers, so mark it on your schedule for next year. It really is a lot of fun!

### **Billfish**

We saw numerous white marlin releases up and down the line last week from boats trolling in 60 to 100 fathoms from the Norfolk Canyon up to the Wilmington Canyon. We even saw a few caught around the Hot Dog. On Tuesday, the "Let It Ride" had 7 white marlin releases in the Washington Canyon.

Some blue marlin were also hooked throughout the week. Tuesday, the "White Lighting" was trolling in the Washington Canyon where they released an estimated 500 lb. blue marlin. On Wednesday, the "Nontypical" released estimated at 700 lbs. outside the Washington Canyon. Also on the "Offshore Wednesday, Outlaw" brought a 514 pounder back at the dock after it died during the fight in the Poor Man's Canyon.

A sailfish was released by Matt Long on Wednesday during

a trip to just outside the Fingers and a spearfish was caught and released in the Baltimore Canyon on the "Knot Again" during the Ladies Tournament.

### Tuna

Bigeyes continue to be boated in the Washington and Wilmington Canyons, which should make it interesting for those in the White Marlin Open.

The big catch of the week came on the "Fish Whistle" when, during an overnight trip to the Wilmington's East Notch on Tuesday and Wednesday, anglers boated 5 bigeyes weighing between 137 and 194 lbs.

On Wednesday, the crew on the "Marli" also had a memorable trip with 4 bigeyes hooked in the Washington.

Most of the other bigeyes we saw during the week came from the Washington Canyon, except for a few caught in the Wilmington.

Yellowfins and longfins were also caught in the Wilmington Canyon but the better bite was in the Washington where a couple of boats had double digit days on the troll and the chunk.

The bluefin bite around the Hot Dog and the Hambone looks

to have petered out.

### Dolphin

We are seeing dolphin all over the ocean and one angler even caught a baby dolphin in the bay.

As mentioned earlier, the 49.6 pounder caught in the Ladies Tournament in the Baltimore Canyon is the largest one caught in Ocean City so far this year. We also saw nice size dolphin caught in all the canyons in addition to around the Jackspot, the Bass Grounds, the Hot Dog and the Twin Wrecks. The Jackspot, in particular, has produced some really nice size dolphin over the last couple of weeks.

### **Sharks**

We don't have much to report on shark catches, but the news that had everyone stirring in Ocean City was the 1,000 lb. tiger shark cruising the bay waters behind Ocean City. The tiger shark, named Septima, was tagged by a non-profit organization called OCEARCH back in May 2014 off the coast of Hilton Head, South Carolina. After heading up the Atlantic Coast and spending some time off Virginia, Septima entered the Ocean City Inlet on Friday,

August 1st and sent a satellite transmission at 2:29 in the afternoon from behind 44th Street. It doesn't look like it didn't stay very long with it's last transmission coming on Monday at 6:14 AM off the coast of Atlantic City.

I haven't heard many reports of actual sightings of the fish, but I'm sure many will develop over the next few weeks.

### Flounder

In the bay behind Ocean City, flounder fishing was not bad last week. We are in our typical summer mode with a good number of fish being caught but dominated by fish too small to keep. Some keepers were found in the West Channel and in the Middle Channel, north of the Rt. 50 Bridge. A hot spot continues to be along the west side of the bay, just on the south side of the Rt. 50 Bridge. Now is the time to fish the deeper holes in the bay where larger flatties are lurking.

I'm hearing that minnows are producing more keeper flounder than Gulp! artificial baits which had been a strong performer so far this season.

Anglers venturing outside the inlet and hitting ocean

structure are really tearing up big flounder. Capt. Monty on the headboat, "Morning Star" reported "ferocious" fishing on some days and Capt. Chris on the headboat, "Angler" and Capt. Kane on the charter boat, "Fish Bound" also had some great days as well.

### Croaker

Croaker fishing is still strong all over the bay behind Ocean City and Assateague Island. Baiting up with Fishbites is the best way to bend a rod, especially for kids who love the non-stop action croaker fishing can provide.

With the White Marlin Open ending on Friday, we actually have an open weekend for tournaments. The next one on the schedule is the world famous, Capt. Steve Harman's Poor Girls Open at Bahia Marina. This is the largest ladies only billfish tournament in the world and is a blast to watch at the scales. Weigh-ins will be held on Thursday, Friday and Saturday from 4:00 PM to 7:30 PM. Proceeds from the tournament go to benefit breast cancer research.

## DOISTIN BAC

I've been getting a lot of questions about using Fishbite bloodworm alternative lately. How much do I use? Are they as good as real bloodworms? Come on now, do they really work? What fish bite on them?



Well, nothing works as well as a real, live bloodworm, but Fishbite bloodworm alternative is the next best thing! Third in line would be a live night crawler.

"They look like bubblegum. How could such a thing work?"

Well, there is a story behind the package. Actually, there is a scientist behind the package. If you go to their website (www.fishbites.com) you will find this background story of how Fishbites were invented:

Fishbite Bloodworms look like bubblegum strips but act like bloodworm. The long lasting pack, in the blue package, has a white mesh that helps hold the bait on the hook. When the red bait is gone, only the white mesh is left behind and you need to cut it off the hook. The red package of Fishbite bloodworm does not have any mesh. It is called fast release, and does not last nearly as long. The blue package, with the mesh is the most popular, but there are a few anglers that do not like cutting off the mesh and prefer the red package. Yes, that's me!

"How big of a piece do you

Depends on what you are catching. If you are catching small bait fish like spot in the canals or up at Northside Park at 125th St, you only want a tiny piece. If you are targeting something like croaker while drifting in the bay, you can go to an inch long strip. For croaker in the bay, orange crab or clam Fishbites are also effective. They

are larger, thicker and last even longer on the hook than the Bloodworm. You can also combo your Fishbites with a little strip of box squid or piece of clam if you are targeting larger croaker in the bay while drifting in your boat.

If you are surf fishing for kingfish, larger spot or croaker, many anglers like to use a piece about an inch long and combo the Fishbites with a little strip of box squid or carefully cut a strip of finger mullet or fresh bunker. I like to wait and catch a legal bluefish or spot and fillet that up in small strips with a sharp knife and put that on the hook with the Fishbite strip. Hint: If you scale the fish, it's easier to put the strip on the hook. Use a premade kingfish rig with size #6 hooks.

If the bait is on your hook for a long time without a bite, cut it off and put on a fresh strip of Fishbites. This can make a big difference. This is true of all fishing and baits. You need to change them once in a while!

"Do they work as well as real bloodworms?"

You will get lots of answers to that question. For a fish like a croaker that eats about anything, the answer is usually YES! As for spot, I think there's nothing like a real bloodworm, but if they are biting fast and furious, it doesn't much matter. One thing is for sure, Fishbites will stay on the hook a lot longer than a real bloodworm, and you won't catch ANY fish if you don't have any bait on your hook! They are also half the price and you can keep them in tackle box almost your indefinitely, but be sure to zip-

lock them back up or they will dry out.

Anglers that are not familiar with bloodworms need to know one thing so they do not scare their kids. Bloodworms have suckers that can grab hold of you like a leech! You need to put them on a cutting board and cut them into pieces. Then they can't bite! You only need a small piece of bloodworm and you need to thread it on the curve of the hook. There is no need to put a whole bloodworm on the hook this time of year. (Maybe in the spring and fall for stripers!) small hooks Use for bloodworms or Fishbites this time of year. It's a waste of time to use them on a large hook! You will get nibbles but no fish!

Nightcrawlers are really freshwater bait and have no blood in them. They will work in the bay for croaker and spot as long as the fish are biting fast. Nightcrawlers will wash out quickly. Again, you just need a small piece to cover the hook. Nightcrawlers are half the price of Fishbites, so they are the least expensive bait to use. Not the

best, but the least expensive worm to buy.





Joe Morris at Lewes Harbour Marina said flounder fishing is still the most popular game in town. Delaware Bay reef sites vielded fluke, but the bite was limited to the time of tide changes. Flatties bit best at the end of slack water through the first half hour of moving current. Jigging Spro bucktails sweetened with a strip of fresh cut croaker was a hot combination. Elijah Brown boated a 5 pound flounder while fluking in the Bay aboard the "Lil' Angler II".

Sunday started out as a crappy weather day, but ended up as a good catching day. Captain Brent left the dock late and headed to Brown Shoal, but still managed to put together a batch of 32 keepers for flukers on the "Katydid".

Ocean flounder seemed to cooperate during more of the tide than those in the Delaware Bay. Many flatfish came from reefs 9, 10 and 11. Word of the good fishing drew quite a crowd of boats at the sites on fair weather days, so sometimes maneuvering on the structure was tricky. Open bottom of the Old Grounds continued to be productive as well, with spots southeast of "DB" Buoy and northwest of "DA" Buoy giving up fluke. Rigs sporting hair teasers

baited with squid, shiners, smelt or strips of fresh cut croaker or sea robin were favored offerings. Bucktail jigs tipped with 5 or 6-inch Gulp! artificials proved deadly for flatties.

Captain Pete hosted the gang from Hidden Acres Sawmill on Monday aboard the "Top Fin", and they jigged up a limit of 28 quality keepers at Site 10. Seven of the fish were over 5 pounds. Anglers

Larry and Joe Coyle, along with Tyler Brown took their limit of flatfish on Wednesday at Site 10. Joe landed the heaviest, weighing 6.37 pounds. Bill Hughes fished again Wednesday on the "Miss Kirstin" and boated a 5.4 pound fluke. Wayne DeMarco, Joe Pergeorelis, Josh Wilkers and Doug Mickowski worked the Old Grounds on Wednesday for their limit of flounder. Dave Walker took Matt Shoup, Amy and Patrick Clara Conroy, and Hollingsworth to Site 10 on Wednesday to capture and bring back 20 flat ones. On Thursday, local flukers aboard the "Katydid" put 28 keepers in the box, including John Gudknecht's 5.4 pounder.

The "Katydid" was over ocean reef rubble again on Friday, and returned with a full limit of 36 fluke weighing up to over 4 pounds.

In addition to flounder, bottom bouncers connected with plenty of croakers in the Delaware Bay. Reef Sites 5 and 8, and the edge of the Anchorage near "G" Buoy held hardheads. Kingfish, spike trout, puffers and snapper blues were mixed in

Further south, Capt. Bert at Hook'em Adams Cook'em said that the waters in the back bay and in the Indian River Inlet loaded absolutely with croaker. He said that they are thick that flounder fisherman are having a tough time getting their bait to the bottom. Anglers fishing in the Inlet are also catching a few stripers during the day and at night along with some bluefish out towards the jetty.

Croakers can also be found in large numbers outside the Inlet to 3-miles off the beach on various ocean structure.

Flounder fishing in the ocean was fantastic right until the weekend's nasty weather that created dirty water conditions. Bert said the key to successful flounder fishing is getting the right drift, between .5 and 1.2 knots. If you could get the right drift, the bite was red hot around "DA" and "DB" Buoys, at the Old Grounds and around Site 10.

Anglers out of Indian River are also having a good time fishing for triggerfish and spade fish around Fenwick Shoal, where they are also hooking into bluefish as well.

Offshore, the charter boat, "Capt. Ike" returned from an overnight chunking trip in the Washington Canyon where they ended up with 20 yellowfins in the box.

Anglers are also returning with solid catches of blueline and golden tilefish after dropping squids in the Canyons.

# CHUM LINES BY CAPT. MARK SAMPSON

Menhaden, or "bunker" as most of us call them around here, are sort of the unsung heroes of our coastal waters. Packed with more oil and bones than the La Brea Tar Pits, it doesn't matter who you are or how hungry you are - no human eats bunker. And since they're filter feeders that just swim along straining phytoplankton from the water while trying not to get eaten by other fish or caught in a net, bunker are not even good for fishing catch-and-release because they're not going to bite a line, at least not until the day that someone finds a way to put microscopic plants on a hook!

Just the same, most fishermen are very aware that bunker make an excellent bait, I guess because we know that darn near everything that swims enjoys munching on the little swimming cans of WD-40, including whales, sharks, tuna, bluefish, striped bass, dolphin (the fish AND the mammal), flounder, seatrout and... well you probably get the point – everything!

And bunker seem to be everywhere, from way up in the marshes of the back bays to the canals that run through Ocean City, to 10-15 miles offshore. This time of the season it's hard to find a place where there aren't schools of bunker flashing, spinning, and rippling the surface of water as they carry on with their daily antics of chasing down a bellyful of teeny-tiny plant matter while trying to avoid being eaten. Of course, the bunker we all see in the bay are just little guys, and if you pay close enough attention you can just about watch them sprout up over the weeks from June, when one-inch youngsters will go right through the mesh of an average cast net, to fourinch adolescents that will just about swim off with a net if you pitch it over too many at one time.

Ocean waters hold a different class of bunker altogether. Running eight, to maybe twelve-inches, these are adult fish that sometimes show in schools that cover many acres of the ocean's surface. The thousands and thousands of fish in a single school will often darken the water like shadows from summer clouds, but what's seen from above is just the tip of the proverbial "iceberg" as the schools can sometimes be more than 30feet deep. It's incomprehensible my to simple brain how many fish can be in these schools, let alone off our coast at any give moment of the summer.

Now, back to the subject of fishing. As I've already mentioned, anglers know darn well that, for some reason, a lot of sea critters like to eat bunker, therefore, they often make for a good bait. The problem can be catching the darn things and then keeping them alive, or at least in a fresh enough condition that they will still be good bait when we're ready to use them. Bunker are stinky, slimy,

www.coastalfisherman.net slippery things that don't freeze well, turn soft and mushy soon after their death, and even if properly chilled, won't stay fresh more than a couple days. The best advice is to catch and keep just what you can use today and tomorrow and figure on getting re-supplied every couple of days.

Catching the little bay bunker requires a cast net and the ability to throw it. Then, with net in hand it's just a matter of walking the docks and bulkheads until a bunch of swirling fish are found close to the surface and then making a cast accurate enough to cover the school. Sometimes the early mornings and late evenings will prove to be the best time to find schooling bunker, but it usually depends upon the location and state of the tide.

Forget about housing them in a little minnow bucket. Bunker need clean water and a lot of room to swim, so keeping them alive requires a decent size bait tank with a healthy exchange of saltwater. Smaller bunker can be used alive or dead, both inshore and offshore, to catch anything that will eat a small fish, from flounder and stripers in the back bays to tuna and dolphin in the canyons. At times they've also proven to be a great bait for sea bass over the ocean wrecks.

Though big ocean bunker won't bite a hook, they can be snagged with treble-hooks rigged above a bank sinker. Cast over the school, let it sink 20 or more feet down and then rip the hooks through the school. Big bunker can be kept for a little while in a live well, but not for long, so if the intention is to use them as live bait, it's really best to use them right away, otherwise they should be buried in ice and used in the next day or so. Big bunker can be cut up and used in the surf, or anywhere else a chunk-type bait is needed. They can also be fished alive under a float or slow trolled behind a boat.

No one has ever, or will ever, be seen on the cover of a fishing magazine or the *Coastal Fisherman* holding up a "trophy bunker." But certainly many of the catches of game fish that have adorned such publications were possible only because of the existence of these "lowly", but important fish.

We are midway through 2014 White Marlin Open week and I hope everyone is having a good time fishing, watching or even working.

When you leave the dock for a day on the water, it is important you know the weather for that day or a few days before and after your trip. While many boaters watch and monitor the weather in advance of their outing, many would also like be kept up-to-date when they are out on the water.

If all you need is basic information, then the audio marine weather broadcasts on the Marine VHF radio may be very helpful. This is a free weather service, broadcast by the United States government's local NOAA office in the area where you can receive their signal. These weather

broadcasts are not always specific to boating and there are usually a few different broadcasts found on the 7 active VHF marine weather channels. Refer to your VHF instructions on how to operate the tuner to listen to the marine weather broadcasts. Other radios such as the Fusion 700 series stereo has the marine weather band receiver built-in as well as specialty weather radios.

If you are close to shore and have internet access on-board, there are many weather services available through the internet that can provide you with the current and forecasted weather. Websites and apps such as Weather Underground, The Weather Channel and NOAA provide comprehensive weather information for nocharge.

For those who want or need more detailed and comprehensive information, a few websites and apps offer detailed and specific marine weather and usually charge a fee. subscription These websites include buoyweather.com, sailflow.com fishweather.com.

For those who travel afar, or plan to go on an extended voyage, there are weather routing services that act as a consultant to help plan your voyage based on the actual and forecasted weather. One such company is WRI (Weather Routing Inc. Their website is wriwx.com. They individually prepare forecasts that are customized specifically for each vessel's needs and **WRI** location, and meteorologists are available for consultation 24 hours a day, 365 days a year for subscribers.

While not exactly the same as the weather forecasts services above, there are ones that customize their weather reports for fishing, such as



www.coastalfisherman.net Roffer's Ocean Fishing Forecasting Service (often referred to simply as Roffer's). This service is a fishing forecasting analysis that is both a graphical report and written analysis with suggested "hot spots" of where to catch the fish. They receive and use the infrared (temperature) and (water visible chlorophyll, and turbidity) data from all functioning U.S. (NOAA and NASA), as well as, other international European and others as launched) earth observing satellites. In addition, they use a variety of public and private high frequency radar, ship, gliders and buoy data that have proven to provide reliable information. There are other similar services such Hilton's SSTOL.com and realtime-navigator.com that focus on the fishing aspect of

If your boat is equipped with modern navigation electronics, you probably have the capability to add your own satellite weather receiver to

your multifunction display. This hardware allows you to view up-to-date and future weather information for most areas of the US and Caribbean out to 100 miles or more offshore. This information is broadcast in real time, directly to the antenna on your boat from orbiting satellites. Both Sirius and XM offer weather services along with the compatible hardware for most major brands of chart plotters such as Furuno, Simrad, Garmin, Raymarine and Lowrance. These services allow you to see weather such as high-resolution radar, lightning, satellite imagery, buoy data, sea surface temperatures and more, right on your display(s) in real time.

There are two major sources that provide this satellite weather, XM and Sirius – who have recently merged their audio music operation but still offer two weather services. The weather data services may be combined into one offering soon.

Sirius Marine Weather comes from WSI, an industry leading, professional weather service supplier. WSI serves federal, state and local governments along with marine, aviation, agriculture, media and energy industries with expertise in analyzing, forecasting and presenting weather information. WSI combines NOAA data with information from other research, government, commercial and proprietary sources to create timely, accurate weather information using the most reliable, sophisticated analysis methods and processes in practice today.

weather SiriusXM available Raymarine, on Simrad, Garmin, Furuno, Lowrance and other products. The cost for a weather module is about \$700, depending on the manufacturer, and the monthly subscription package can cost up to about \$50 a month. The hardware consists of a "black box" receiver and an external satellite antenna.

The XM satellite weather is a product of Baron Services,

through its WxWorx division. Baron collects weather data from a variety of sources, including the Department of Defense, National Weather Service and various It commercial providers interprets, verifies and packages the data for instantaneous distribution over the XM satellite network.

The WxWorx company also offers their weather service to other marine hardware manufacturers, but is computer based.

XM weather is available on Garmin systems (primary older hardware) and some computer based platforms such as, Big Bay, Nobletech and others. XM marine weather subscriptions can cost up to \$50 per month.

One of the best bargains for weather is Furuno. They offer a great free weather service called Navcenter Weather, for owners of the NavNet TZT GPS chartplotters. The weather data file is downloaded through an internet connection directly to the chartplotter. This free service has detailed data for water conditions such as plankton, chlorophyl satellite altimetry along with the traditional weather forecast. Although it is not live data once you leave internet coverage, you can download the weather right before you depart the dock with the most up-to-date weather for the day. If you have a TZT system and need more information on how to use this feature, check the Furuno website for instructional video.

As we all know, weather can change rapidly and unexpected weather can turn a good time on the water into a miserable trip, so please be sure to check the weather before you go boating and stay up-to-date during your trip.
