

The surf before and after lifeguard hours is a great time to just fun fish. Bryson Brown of Paeonian Springs, VA got out on 79th St. in Ocean City and caught this kingfish on a high/low rig using fresh cut spot he also caught in the suds.



The Fenwick Island State Park must have some ray mojo going on! We have had several reports of big rays being caught there including this one from Nazz Rapone from West Grove, PA. He caught this ~5 foot roughtail stingray estimated at 170 lbs. using cut bunker on a Diawa Saltiga spinning reel.



Offshore Report by Larry Budd ...

This Week Last Year

- The "Wrecker" caught a 276 lb. bigeye in the Washington Canyon. That one was the heaviest for 2022. Two others over 200 lbs. were also caught there.
- Chunking was in full swing with the Hambone being the hot spot followed by the Hot Dog and Fingers.
- The crew of the "C- Team" caught an 89.2 lb. yellowfin in the Massey's Canyon using a 8000 class spinning rod.
- Bill fishing continued to be some of the worst in recent memory, however the "Billfisher" ran 90 miles out to east of the Washington Canyon to find blue water and did manage to release 4 white marlin.

We all enjoyed some beautiful weather this past week on Delmarva with our normal high heat and humidity though! This pattern did lead to a mix of conditions offshore that created some great fishing days, and of course some challenging ones, even on calm days. We had a nice range of fish reported to us last week with some record setting tuna catches in the mix as well as a pending Delaware State Record for king mackerel. Billfish remain elusive, but not absent, with a few white releases and several hits that did not come tight. A good sign as we head into the Big Fish Classic and the White Marlin Open.

Tuna

Key words for the week for this fish would be a combination of picky and consistent. Meaning they were consistently picky, but we still saw a consistent stream of yellowfins and some bigeyes hitting the cleaners! Our reports show most are still trolling, but more and more are switching to chunking butterfish as the fish move into the inshore lumps. Early last week we saw some good action at the 19 Fathom Lump. The "Finatic" brought back 5 yellowfin trolling as well as a couple tunnys from there. The "Bet-Sea" has a great story from their trip last week. They had a half day charter expecting to go for sea bass and flounder at some offshore wrecks and reefs. Instead Capt. Eric Mihaly headed to the Lump and got the boys onto 3 yellowfin tuna, 1 every hour, and then back to the dock by midday. An amazing trip for a half day charter for sure!

The "Spring Mix II" headed out Tuesday and found beautiful weather. Capt. Chris Watkowski trolled in the Washington Canyon where the crew hooked into a triple of bigeyes. Two of the three got off, but they got one, or most of one, to the boat. The 193 lb. eyeball had a big chunk out near the tail. We think it definitely would have been over 200 lbs. They also boated 2 yellowfin.

Things cooled a bit mid-week as the heat stirred up the atmosphere causing winds and some serious storms on Wednesday! The charter boat "Pumpin' Hard" did slip out Wednesday, and after dealing with the storms they set the troll in the northern end of the Baltimore Canyon. The crew humorously called the South


www.coastalfisherman.net Bethany Yacht Club got 4 yellows in the box. As the weather moved in, it seems the tuna moved inshore or out, offshore out.

Saturday saw an amazing catch by the charter boat "Restless Lady". Always known as a tuna slaying boat, Capt. Todd Kurtz did not disappoint. He headed to the 19 Fathom Lump and shortly after lines in they got a knockdown on 12 lines, all of them bigeyes! The crew made some fast choices and cut 4 lines. The anglers amazingly were able to get all 8 eyeballs in the box. They even had the presence of mind to pitch a bait to a mahi that came up with one of the big tuna! That will be a lifetime memory for those anglers.

The weekend saw Ocean City Marlin Club's 19th Annual Kid's Classic. While mostly a bay and inshore event, there were categories for tuna, wahoo, dolphin and billfish release. All the tuna reports from that event were from deep water, offshore of the Poor Man's Canyon in 800 to 1100 fathoms. Naked ballyhoo and spreader bars were most common.

As we were at the scales at Sunset Marina on Sunday, I got a tap on the shoulder and was told about a yellowfin 'I may want to take an interest in'! I could not leave the scales, so I texted my info to the gentleman and a few minutes later I got a report of a 156 lb. yellowfin tuna caught on the "Sea Hag". This huge allison tuna was caught by Elmer 'Junior' Bass, also in deep water offshore of the Poor Man's. This one hit on a ballyhoo skirted with a blue & white Ilander. It is now the Heaviest Yellowfin caught this season and will be a hard one to beat! The crew on the "Layin'

Saturday was an epic one for the "Restless Lady". Capt. Todd Kurtz headed to the Poor Man's Canyon with the idea to troll for mahi on their way further out for tuna. Mates Kevin Kurtz and Aiden Whiteley set the spread and all of the sudden 12 lines went down, all with bigeye tuna! They cleared 4 lines and got the other 8 in the boat as well as a single mahi that popped up along side a bigeye. Anglers Colt Sharp, Dan Sharp, Scott Wood, Ken Wood and Scott Biser were back in the slip at the Talbot Street Pier by 1PM, tired but with a great story to tell.

Lines" came back Sunday from caught a sailfish at the Hot Dog an overnight trip in the Baltimore Canyon with an ~190 lb. bigeye.

Billfish

As mentioned above, reports on marlin releases were light, especially earlier in the week. Most at that time were second hand mentions of radio chatter of some white releases. Kid's Classic saw several release reports, all white marlin. Winning the Category for the event was the "Reel Chaos". They released 3 whiteys outside the Poor Man's in 800 fathoms. Second was the "Max Bet" who also released three that day, also outside the Poor Man's. Sunday saw the "Bet Sea" lose a white in 875 fathoms and the "Kilo Charlie" released 2 from first time anglers Tyson Stouffer and Zach Maniskas. Again outside of the Poor Man's.

We did not hear of any blue marlin releases, but the "Max Bet" reported a bite that did not come tight east of the Poor Man's. Interestingly the "Salty Reel"

while chunking! Realtor Kim Simpler Hook (no irony to the name...) and her crew brought in a swordfish to Bahia Marina.

Mahi and Everything Else!

A review of last week would not be complete without a mention of the uptick in dolphin action. While anglers have been finding them for a while now, there were huge hits this week. Friday saw the start of it when the charter boat "Reel Chaos" returned to Sunset Marina with over 30 dolphin and a wahoo. They were also outside the Poor Man's in 1000 fathoms finding lots of floating grasses. The "Bet Sea" was out on Sunday as part of the Kid's Classic, again in 875 fathoms where they found a floating log and some fishing gear holding fish. They caught a 23 lb. bull to take 1st Place in that category.

Tilefish were still plentiful, with more goldens making an appearance. Most were from the Rockpile. Lot's of king mackerel were also in the mix, including a pending Delaware state record for a 52.7 lb. king caught by Jeff McCoy. He was anchored at the Fenwick Shoals shark fishing when the big fish hit on a mackerel fillet. Some cannibalism there. The 56" fish beat a record set almost 30 years ago!

Lastly the "One More" brought in a nice 70" and 94 lb. spinner shark to the scales at Bahia Marina. They caught that one at the Great Gull Reef.

Last week in Ocean City, the weather painted a challenging landscape with scorching heat, frequent storms, and morning fog. Despite these adversities, fishing in both the nearshore reefs and back bays proved to be remarkably robust, with anglers returning to the docks with topquality fish. Leading the pack as the hotspot was the Great Eastern Reef, closely trailed by the Bass Grounds and First Hump. While spanish mackerel and fluke were the primary targets, many wrecks held an impressive array of sheepshead, triggers, and some of the largest redfish sightings in years.

The nearshore reefs have been a treasure trove of good-sized flounder, accompanied by a few keeper sea bass. The first hump near the bass grounds brimmed with spanish mackerel and small bluefish, while the wrecks sheepshead and triggerfish.

Among those enjoying fruitful days on the nearshore reefs were Blake Gunther and Derek Yobst, who reeled in several sizable flounder and a few sheepshead.

Onboard "Bad Wind Charters," a group of skilled Maryland and Virginia anglers experienced an unforgettable outing. Armed with clackers and jiggers, they skillfully pulled in large fluke during their trip, with Wednesday's three-man charter boasting a collection of flatties weighing up to six pounds. The anglers, wishing to remain anonymous, relished adventure, which also yielded the catch of a unique lookdown fish—a rarity in these waters, typically found in more southern territories.

"Double Trouble Charters" lived

provided a home to several up to its name, boasting an exceptional week of flounder fishing, consistently bringing home limits or coming close on every trip.

> Amidst the inclement weather, Capt. Victor Bunting of the "Ocean Princess" reported a decent fishing experience for sea bass, flounder, and triggerfish. Remarkably, the boat continued to encounter a good number of quality sea bass, a sight rarely seen during this time of year. Moreover, several flounder measuring over 22 inches added to the excitement.

> Noteworthy catches were not limited to seasoned anglers; young nine-year-old Allison Snyder and her mother Melissa, hailing from Shippensburg, PA enjoyed a delightful fishing adventure on Melissa's father's boat, the "Ocean Blue." During their outing, Melissa achieved a personal milestone, catching her first-ever limit of flounder in just over an hour, while Allison proudly contributed keepers to the day's impressive catch. Additionally, the group caught numerous throwbacks.

> Mike Day from Bel Air, MD displayed his fishing prowess at the African Oueen on "Somethin's Fishy." Utilizing Gulp tipped with squid, he expertly caught a few nice flounder, the largest of which measured an impressive 22 inches.

> Taking their angling endeavors to the next level, Bill Oass and nephew Tony Nicholas, both from Ocean Pines, embarked on a joint mission to boat a staggering 94-pound, 72-inch spinner shark at Great Gull Reef aboard "One More." The feat was accomplished using a strip of bonita hooked onto a 13/0 circle hook. Additionally, the crew hooked five brown sharks and a dusky shark, ensuring the safe release of all these magnificent creatures.

www.coastalfisherman.net for Dylan, Greg, and David Lawrence, along with Todd Herman from Hanover, PA, successfully who secured their boat limit of 16 flounder. Andy Meanwhile, Dripps, Richard Hoeness, and Austin Smith from Baltimore, MD ventured to the second lump offshore and caught 16 spanish mackerel using Clark Spoons behind small planers. Although most bites were singular, they managed to achieve a couple of double headers. Not to be outdone, Garrett Elder from Monkton, MD faced sporty fourfoot waves, refusing to let his broken arm dampen his spirits on his trip with Richard Holmes to the Second Lump. The pair reeled in 16 spanish mackerel, several ribbonfish, and released a dusky shark while on the troll. Moving to the back bays, Capt. Garrett Hoffman of "Fluke U 2" guided Desi Hoffman from Deep Creek, MD to a

remarkable catch. Fishing in the East Channel, Desi skillfully reeled in a remarkable 24.5-inch & 6¾ lb. flounder using live bunker as bait. Young anglers Delaney, Kieran,

and Abby McKelvey, aged 12 to 14, made their mark behind Assateague Island. Armed with a squid and minnow combination, they impressively caught keeper flounder ranging from 17 to 20 inches. However, Cindy Barnhart Gault encountered a tougher week of fishing in the same area, managing to land only one 21-inch keeper.

The "Miss Ocean City" bay headboat also made contribution to the excitement, securing a few nice fluke throughout the week, including a doormat near the Coast Guard station. Additionally, Pete Jett, the boat's mate, ventured onto another ocean boat and skillfully caught a 24-inch flounder.

In the inlet, Jolly Smith reported a great morning of fishing from 10 a.m. until noon. Safely releasing all 12 flounder ranging from 12 to 16 inches.

Joey, Jonathan, and Michael Hager, accompanied by Ryan Neufer, opted for a pontoon boat rented from Bahia Marina. Armed with live minnows



www.coastalfisherman.net and squid, they fished the Thorofare on the incoming tide, successfully landing several nice flounder.

Transitioning to surf, clams, and crabs, Carl Littleton's report indicated a bountiful yield of about 10-12 keepers per pot on a three-day soak in the upper Assawoman Bay. The pots boasted an abundance of jumbo crabs, with very few females to contend with.

Meanwhile, clams Assateague Island were in ample supply, nestled just below the sandy bottom, making them discoverable. the grounds were becoming increasingly picked over, a wealth of big soup clams remained, though the smaller ones proved more elusive. To savor the delectable cherry stone clams, searching deeper in the sand proved more success.

for surf fishing off Assateague Island, results were more unpredictable, with small kingfish and spot being the primary catch. Nonetheless, the late evening hours still offered a chance to reel in a few big red drum. The most successful approach involved employing cut bunker on a fish-finding rig, with the hour before high tide proving to be the most consistent for encountering larger predators. Notably, Forrest Bleinberger reported that flounder were still snapping off Assateague, with most measuring between 17 and 18 inches. His past week's catch fell victim to bucktail, tipped with a 4-inch Gulp swimming mullet and a 4-inch Gulp teaser. Furthermore, Bryson Brown Virginia experienced fruitful surf fishing off 79th Street, capturing several nice kingfish using pompano rigs baited with sand fleas.

Despite the less-than-ideal weather, the week proved to be an exhilarating one for fishing enthusiasts, with several rare catches adding to the excitement and anticipation of future adventures.

Feels like this one should be in a centerfold spread! Ryan Stetser reported this massive smooth butterfly ray he caught off a Delaware beach. It was 78 inches from wingtip to wingtip and probably weighed over 200 lbs. He caught it on a 12 foot Penn Carnage rod with a Penn Spinfisher spinning reel loaded with 410 yards of 40# line and a 80# mono shock leader. It took 45 minutes to get it to the beach before is was successfully released.

Chum Lines by Capt. Mark Sampson

Looking at my seawater temperature gauge I saw that it was reading 81.1 degrees. "Whoa!" I thought. "That seems awfully warm for this time of the season". Sure, it was late morning on a hot, calm day and we were only about 5-miles offshore, but temps in the 80's are more August stuff and we were only a week into July!

So to confirm my thoughts I pulled out my 2022 log book and saw that during the same week a year ago we were recording temperatures only around 72-74 degrees. I'm guessing that a lot of anglers would likely conclude that a temperature variation of 9 degrees would have created quite a difference in the fishing last year vs last week, and maybe they'd be right - maybe. But before we get into those differences perhaps we should consider some of what goes on above and below the waves that affect water temperatures and the fish we hope to catch.

First we have to remember that our temperature gauges most of us have on our boats pretty much only read the surface layer of the water, which can be dramatically different from the temperature just a few feet down and where the fish we're On a hot calm day the sun will warm the surface making an even greater difference between what's up top and what's down below. On a choppy day the surface water will mix a bit with what's underneath it and our readings will be a little more true to form for the upper levels of the water column. But unless they're a diver, and swim down or have a temperature probe they can drop many feet below the surface, few know what it's really like at any given time 10 or more feet below their boat. I've done both and can attest that there can be a dramatic difference in the temperature our boats are floating in and that where we have our baited hooks. But that's not to suggest that surface temperatures aren't important in directing us to where the fish might be, they certainly are. It's just that we have to keep what they're telling us in proper perspective and use that "best available science" as a guide where the fish might or might not be, not a rule.

Water temperatures are affected by many factors including west wind turnover, Gulf Stream, wind speed and direction, upwellings (from shoals), rain (inshore), currents, tides and of course, the air temperatures. West wind turnover is when a prolonged wind from a westerly direction pushes the ocean's warm surface layer to the east and away from the beach. As the warm water moves offshore it is replaced right at the beach (the surfline) with the cooler water that has been below it. As long as the wind remains out of the west, the cooler water continues to be pushed farther and farther offshore until the entire area off our coast is nothing but cold water with temperatures that might drop from the upper 70's to the lower 60's in a very short amount of time. This phenomenon is obvious not only to boaters with temperature gauges but also to anyone inclined to take a swim from the beach and find that even though it's the hottest day of the summer the ocean suddenly feels like ice! The cool water will also cool the air over the ocean enough that boaters might find themselves donning sweatshirts in the middle of a heatwave.

So what does all this mean to the fisherman? First we have to remember that what we're seeing is not necessarily the best representation of what we have beneath our hulls, at least when it comes to warm water. The temperature our gauges tell

www.coastalfisherman.net us is always going to be a little, or sometimes a lot, higher than the water down deep because warm water rises and cold water sinks. And since most of the fish anglers are typically trying to catch might spend more time down below the warm surface layer than right at it, it can be tough sometimes to accurately conclude that you're fishing in the best temperature of water for a certain species even if you know what temperature range that type of fish prefers. However, since sea surface temperature gauges are typically all we've got to go by, they're still the best tool we have to help figure out if we're at least fishing close to the right ballpark.

Something else to consider about water temperatures and how they affect the fact that even if temps are just right for XYZ fish, they might be way out of line for whatever those fish want to feed on. If the little critters leave or avoid the area because it's too hot or cold then the larger predators might just move out with them. I don't know if it's a water temperature thing or not but did you notice that the last couple years we haven't had the huge schools of bunker (menhaden) off our coast? Apparently they've been showing way up north in places they've never been before and it hasn't exactly been a banner couple of years for the cobia, sharks, stripers, bluefish and so many other fish known to feed on the important bait fish. Have



www.coastalfisherman.net they traveled north following the bunker? Is all the temperature related?

One great advantage to offshore anglers is the ability to use their gauges to see temperature differences or "breaks" when trying to catch pelagic species such as tuna and billfish as these fish will often either hang out along the break or just stay primarily on the warm or cold side of it. While these breaks can be 5-10 degrees different, 2-3 degrees is more common and enough to show that the water is, for some reason, different. Maybe it's the west edge of the Gulf Stream, or an eddy that spun off of it. Maybe the difference is from some current that pushed into the area, or possibly from an upwelling of water produced when a current flows across an underwater hump, or the edge of the Continental Shelf, or maybe it's from water flowing out of an inlet. Whatever the reason for being, temperature breaks can very often produce fish because they can effectively create a wall that predator fish or the bait they want to feed on aren't inclined to

cross

So anyway, how important is that seawater temperature gauge on a fishing boat? Not at all, maybe a little, possibly a lot. It all depends upon where, when, and what you're pursuing. Overall they're a great tool for any fishermen to have, and since just about every depth finder these days has a temperature gauge built into it, there's almost no excuse not to have one on your boat. The coastal waters are a dynamic and complicated ecosystem, and knowing the surface seawater temperature in any given place won't always tell you where you will or will not find fish, but add that information to whatever else you might know about what's going on under and around your hull, and you might just be able to figure it out.

Getting back to a couple weeks ago when we encountered 81 degree water compared to the 74 we had exactly one year earlier - my log showed the fishing activity was almost identical. Go figure! §





DELAMARE FISHING REPORT by Capt. BJ Pietryak

Despite the challenging weather in Delaware last week, marked by thunderstorms and intense heat, the fishing scene remained undeterred and lively! Flounder, in particular, have been abundant, and anglers have been treated to some other remarkable catches as well.

Nearshore Structure & Reefs

McCoy, hailing from Birdsboro, PA had a memorable experience at the Fenwick Shoals. He was anchored and originally targeting sharks with a mackerel filet, when he unexpectedly hooked and brought aboard a massive king mackerel. This magnificent fish measured an impressive 56 inches in length with a girth of 24 inches, weighing in at 52.7 pounds. Incredibly, this catch is now pending as a new state record beating the last one of 48 lbs. 9 ozs. set in 1992!

Capt. Richard Harpel, aboard the "Flip N Fins," had a successful outing at the Fenwick Shoals as well, catching several spadefish and sea bass. Employing free-lined clams with a 15-foot, 12lb leader and a red 1/0 hook while anchored over a wreck, the team managed to make some exceptional catches.

Additionally, Eric and his crew had a fruitful day, live lining stripers at the mouth of the Delaware Bay.

Capt. Keith Beebe of "Surface Tension" reported exceptional flounder fishing, boasting a five-man limit on one outing and a four-man limit on another, with Gigi Law and her crew capturing the boat's first citation of the year with a 7.76 lb. flattie. All the flounder were expertly caught over ocean structures using Gulp bait, and their catches were weighed at Lewes Harbour Marina.

Spanish Garlic Shrimp

Ingredients:

1 lb. large shrimp peeled and deveined

Kosher salt

½ cup extra virgin olive oil

10 garlic cloves, chopped

1 teaspoon red pepper flakes (start with less if you don't want it too spicy)

1 teaspoon paprika

2 tablespoons dry sherry or dry white wine

Juice of ½ lemon

½ cup chopped fresh parsley Directions:

Pat the shrimp dry and season with kosher salt. Set aside for now.

Heat the extra virgin olive oil over medium heat until



shimmering but not smoking. Add the garlic and red pepper flakes. Cook over medium heat up to 60 seconds or until the garlic gains some color (be careful not to burn it).

Add the shrimp and paprika. Cook briefly, tossing regularly, and watching that the flesh turns opaque with a pearly pink color (about 3 minutes or

so. It will depend on the size of the shrimp). Remove the pan from the heat.

Stir in sherry, lemon juice and parsley.

Transfer the shrimp and sauce to a serving bowl. Serve with your favorite crusty bread.

Notes:

This recipe will serve 4 to 6 people as a tapas or appetizer with a side of crusty bread to dip in the sauce.

Cook's tip for the sauce. Use quality extra virgin olive oil as the flavor is important to the sauce. Do not cook the oil too much and be careful not to burn the garlic or it will make the sauce bitter.

Cook's tip for the shrimp. Even the largest of shrimp will cook fast, so watch the shrimp carefully. The flesh should turn opaque and pearly pink in color. And remember, even when you take the pan off the heat, the warm sauce will continue to cook the shrimp.

Baked Fish Tacos with Peach & Jalapeño Salsa

Ingredients:

For the fish:

1.5 tablespoons butter, melted Juice of 1 lime

2 garlic cloves, finely grated 1 teaspoon smoked paprika

1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper

1/2 teaspoon kosher salt

2 (5-6 ounces each) mahi fillets or other white fish, thawed

For the peach and jalapeno salsa:

1 ear of corn, husked2 medium peaches, peeled, pitted, and diced small1 small jalapeño, minced1/4 cup minced red onionJuice of one large lime

1/8 teaspoon kosher salt

To serve:

4 corn or flour tortillas Simple Mexican crema*

Lime wedges

Directions:

Preheat the oven to 400°F

Marinate the fish:

In a small bowl, combine the melted butter, lime juice, garlic, paprika, salt and cayenne pepper. Pat the mahi fillets dry and place the fish in a small rectangular baking dish. Pour the marinade over the fish. Place an air-tight lid or aluminum foil on the baking dish and let the fish marinate in the refrigerator for 30 minutes.



Char the corn:

Meanwhile, preheat a heavy skillet over medium-high heat. While the skillet is preheating, hold the corn by the stem and place it upright on a cutting board. Using a sharp knife, starting from the top, and getting as close to the cob as possible, cut the kernels off of the cob. Rotate the cob clockwise on the cutting board as you cut strips of corn off of the cob from a top to bottom motion. Add the corn to the preheated skillet and saute, stirring occasionally, until the kernels are lightly charred, about 5 minutes. Once the corn is charred, remove the skillet from the heat and place the corn in a medium bowl to cool. Wipe the skillet out to warm tortillas in Step 6.

Peach & Jalapeno Salsa:

Add the peaches, jalapeños, red onion, lime juice and kosher salt to the bowl containing the corn. Toss to coat. Cover and refrigerate until ready to use.

Bake the fish:

Uncover the baking dish and place it in the oven. Bake the fish until it is firm to the



www.coastalfisherman.net touch and flakes easily, about 15 minutes. Once the fish is cooked, flake the fish with a fork in the baking dish.

Assemble the tacos:

Warm tortillas in the skillet used for the corn over mediumhigh heat. Top each tortilla with fish, salsa and a simple mexican crema, if desired. Serve with extra lime wedges if you like.

Notes:

For simple Mexican crema:

Combine 2 Tbs. mayonnaise, 2 Tbs. sour cream or yogurt, zest of 1 lime, and 1 finely grated garlic clove in a small dish. Dollop on top of fish tacos.

Black Sea Bass Piccata over Lemon Rice

Ingredients:

Lemon Rice:

4 tablespoons butter

1 onion, chopped

½ lemon

1 ½ cups uncooked white rice

1 ½ teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon black pepper

2 cups chicken stock

1 cup water

1/3 cup fresh Italian parsley, chopped

Fish:

4 tablespoons butter

1/4 cup vegetable oil

2 eggs

3/4 cup panko breadcrumbs

3/4 cup Italian breadcrumbs

2 lbs. black sea bass fillets, skinned

Piccata Sauce:

1 cup chicken stock

1/3 cup fresh squeezed lemon juice

1/3 cup dry white wine

3 teaspoons corn starch

1/3 cup water

1/4 cup capers

4 tablespoons cold butter, cut into pats

Directions:

To make the rice, melt the butter in a large non-stick

sauce pan. Add the onion and the lemon, squeezing all of the juice out and leaving the rind (seeds removed) in the pot during cooking. Cook for 5 minutes until the onion begins to brown and add the rice and cook 2 minutes more stirring frequently. Add the

Reduce the heat to low, cover and let simmer until all of the liquid is absorbed, about 10 minutes. Remove the lemon rind from the rice. Stir parsley in just before serving.

To make the fish, melt the butter and add oil in a large frying pan. Beat the eggs in a small bowl and combine the panko and Italian breadcrumbs





in another shallow dish. Dip the fillets in egg and then press into the breadcrumb mixture. Cook in the butter until golden brown, about 2-3 minutes per side until a fork slides in and out of the center of the fillets easily. Remove the fillets to a baking sheet and keep warm in a 325° oven.

In the same pan add the chicken stock, lemon juice and white wine, stirring to scrape up an brown bits. Let boil over medium high heat until reduced by half, about 5-7 minutes. Whisk the corn starch into water and add to the pan, stirring to let sauce thicken, about 1 minute. Turn off the heat, add the capers, and whisk the cold butter into the sauce until melted and the sauce is silky.

Serve the fish over the rice and top with sauce. Garnish with lemon slices and chopped parsley.

Note: This dish can also be made with chicken breast. Just pound boneless breast to 1/2" thickness and follow the instructions above.

Shrimp Stuffed Flounder

Ingredients:

Stuffing:

6 tablespoons butter, cubed 1 small onion, finely chopped 1/4 cup finely chopped celery 1/4 cup finely chopped green pepper

- 1 pound uncooked shrimp, peeled, deveined & chopped 1/4 cup beef broth
- 1 teaspoon diced pimientos, drained
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon dill weed
- 1/2 teaspoon minced chives
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper 1½ cups soft bread crumbs

Fich:

6 flounder fillets (3 oz. each) 5 tablespoons butter, melted



2 tablespoons lemon juice 1 teaspoon minced fresh parsley 1/2 teaspoon paprika Salt and pepper to taste Directions:

Preheat oven to 375°. In a large skillet, melt butter. Add onion, celery and green pepper; saute until tender. Add shrimp; cook and stir until shrimp turn pink. Add broth, pimientos, Worcestershire sauce, dill, chives, salt and cayenne; heat through. Remove from heat; stir in bread crumbs.

Spoon about 1/2 cup stuffing onto each fillet; roll up. Place seam side down in a greased 13×9-in. baking dish. Drizzle with butter and lemon juice. Sprinkle with seasonings. Bake uncovered, 20-25 minutes or until fish flakes easily with a fork.

King Mackerel Islamorada Style

Ingredients:

- 1 1/2 cups Italian breadcrumbs
- 1/4 cup mayonnaise
- 1 lb. mackerel (about 3 fillets), pin bones removed
- 1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 2 garlic cloves, smashed and diced
- 1 shallot, thinly sliced
- 1/4 teaspoon dried Italian herb mix
- 1/4 cup sliced mushrooms

1 whole scallion, thinly sliced

2 tablespoons white wine

1 lime, halved

Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper

1 tablespoon butter

2 slices provolone

Directions:

Preheat the broiler.

Place the breadcrumbs and mayonnaise in separate shallow dishes. Coat the fish fillets first in the mayonnaise and then in the breadcrumbs, shaking off any excess. Heat 2 tablespoons of the oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat until hot. Place the fillets skin-side up in the pan and cook until golden brown, about 3 minutes per side, and then transfer to a broiler-safe plate.

Drain the oil and wipe out the skillet with a paper towel. Replace the pan and heat the remaining oil over mediumhigh heat until hot. Cook the garlic and shallots, stirring



frequently, 1 to 2 minutes. Stir in the dried herbs, mushrooms and scallions and cook 1 minute. Pour in the wine and half of the lime juice, season with salt and pepper and cook, stirring frequently, about 1 minute more. Melt in the butter until incorporated, and then remove the skillet from the heat.

Pour the mushroom mixture over the fish and top with the cheese. Place under the broiler until the cheese is melted, browned and bubbly, 3 to 5 minutes. Transfer to a serving plate and serve immediately, squeezing the remaining lime juice over the fish, if desired. §


Lightning

Chasing fish across the seas usually means your boat is docked in a warm weather climate with warm water temperatures. This good fishing climate is often the same weather that can create thunderstorms and associated lightning.

Traditionally it was the sailboat owners who were the most concerned about lightning strikes, and rightfully so, they do have a very tall mast, often made of metal or even conductive carbon fiber. Often you would see sportfish captains hoping there was a taller boat (possibly even a sailboat) near them in the marina that would be more attractive to lightning than their vessel. Many captains and owners quickly learned that is not just the tall boats that can be struck directly or indirectly by lightning, almost any vessel around a lightning strike can be affected. The NOAA weather service indicates that a typical lightning flash is about 300 million Volts and about 30,000 This electricity can travel through almost anything including air and water.

While we cannot control mother

nature, we can prepare for a possible lightning event. There are companies that sell lightning prevention systems that could reduce vessel damage and personal injury by providing a path for the lightning or even



deterring it to begin with. Some of these systems are engineered and tested systems based on industry guidelines, and some seem to be an attempt to push an unproven product.

What is a Lightning Protection System?

ABYC - The American Boat and Yacht Council offers Lightning Protection guidance as a technical report (TE-4) though it is not part of the standards that most boat builders adhere to when designing and building new boats. The National Fire Protection Association publishes Standard 780, "installation of Lightning Protection Systems" that is often also used as a guide to design lightning protection for watercraft. Most marine lightning protection system designsarebasedonengineering principles used in commercial residential structures. This generally consists of an attractive metal at the highest point of the boat and wiring to direct the lightning charge downward through the vessel's outer edges into the water. Installing a lightning protection system on a boat after it is built can be a time-consuming, labor-intensive task. When building a new boat, designing the lightning protection system alongside the other electrical and bonding system becomes an incremental cost during the construction process.

The basic components of a traditional lightning protection system include an air terminal at the highest point of the boat, connected to a primary conductor wire of #4 AWG or larger and secondary conductors #6 AWG or larger.


These conductors should be vertical and straight as they head down to the water from the air terminal. Large metal objects such as tanks, engines, electric winches, etc., within six feet of any lightning conductor should be connected to the lightning protection system by means of a secondary lightning conductor. Due to electromagnetic induction, these lightning conductors should not be run alongside of other electrical wires since high frequency electricity (from lightning or other sources) can transfer from wire to wire without a physical connection.

When lightning enters a boat and does not have an easy direct path to the water, a side flash often occurs where the electricity travels on multiple paths through the boat on its way to the water. These side flashes are often the most destructive element of a lightning strike since they can travel along most any metallic object, mainly the boats wiring, engines, tanks, underwater gear etc. The side flashes bounce around the boat using the grounding and bonding system until the electricity exits into the water. Unfortunately, there are a lot of expensive items along the path from topside to bottom!

Direct or Indirect

Lightning does not need to





make a direct strike on your boat to cause damage. A side flash, ground current, conduction, and streamers are an all components of indirect lightning that can cause damage to your boat. Boats in a marina share a common ground wire on the marina side of the shore power wiring effectively interconnecting the boats and can become a conduit for lightning related events. Additionally, the sensitive transducers and other devices

connected to the underwater bonding system can also act as a path for the nearby lightning, including propellers and rudders.

What can I do to help decrease the damage of a lightning strike?

While there are many products designed to manage and direct a lightning strike by routing the electricity away from sensitive components, there are a few marine products that are designed to deter lightning from hitting your boat. Dinnteco and CMCE both offer lightning suppression and prevention systems for use on boats. Dinnteco defines the operation of their product "as a passive collector system of electrostatic currents that takes them to ground. The operating principle is based on balancing or compensate the variable electric field on environment, avoiding the upward leader on the DDCE and on to the protected structure."

Certainly, a lightning protection system can help mitigate damage in the event of a strike. In a perfect world, you could electrically disconnect all the boat's vital electronics, navigation, entertainment, operational and propulsion hardware, though that is often impractical.

What to look for after a direct or indirect lightning event

Safety first! Check and test for electrical safety before boarding

a boat after an event. Turn off the shore power and test the boat to be sure a compromised electrical system has not energized the grounding or bonding system which could cause a personal safety concern. A boat's fiberglass or wood structure can be damaged, especially at or below the water line. Check for water leaks as soon as practical. Once the boat is deemed electrical and structurally safe by a professional, detective work can begin. After a lightning event, each piece of electrical and electronic gear needs to be checked for proper operation. Sounds simple though it is often difficult to detect a malfunctioning system. Many systems seem to operate initially but degrade or fail in the days or months following a lightning event.

Lightning is here to stay and unfortunately, we cannot prevent it, but we prepare for a situation of a direct or indirect strike using the above preventative measures. §

FISHING REPORT by Capt. Matt Abell

Welcome to the doldrums of summer. Hot and humid conditions mixed with pop up thunderstorms make for challenging obstacles that will halt you on your way to your favorite fishing hole faster than a shallow oyster bar at low tide. But don't worry, the tide will flood and a this stagnant summer weather pattern will be subdued.

The near shore reefs of the Atlantic have provided the greatest therapy in regards to our feverish summertime woes. Flounder have been actively participating in the treatment that we seek. Folks have been jigging a variety of baits like spro bucktails over and around reef structures like the rail cars found on blackfish banks. Tipping the lures with Gulp, squid or other succulent strips of cut bait will definitely improve your chances for a gourmet flounder dinner fit for a king. The productive colors ranged from bright chartreuse and pink to more muted whites and browns like Berkley's New Penny. While you search the rubble for these hidden ambush predators, you may come across some bizarre looking, toothy ribbon fish. While these silver sea monsters are not your targeted prey, their silvery fillet strips will certainly add an advantage when fished behind your favorite flounder jig!

The inshore flounder also continues to be a lucrative endeavor. The areas around the inlets during the last part of the flood tide on teaser rigs tipped with Gulp silversides and minnows have produced good numbers of flatfish with a fair amount of keepers to invite to the dinner table.

The shallower wrecks and reefs have been the recipients of a seasonal population of spade and triggerfish. These tropical looking trophies eagerly take small bits of clam suspended over the structure, and right in the strike zone. I like to use a slip float and a bobber stop to keep baits in short grasp of the scrappy southern transplants.

The depths of the Atlantic have finally started to give reward as offshore bound anglers pursue prized pelagic prey. While rumors of inshore bite radiate from the north, with the exception of some mahi, our tuna and marlin action has been confined to the deeper depths of the Norfolk and Washington Canyons. Most of the excitement has come from the cockpit of a trolling vessel towing an array of lures including Squidnation Flippy Floppy rigs, Tormenter sidewinders and of course, skirted ballyhoo. There has been some recent encounters with sharks stealing hooked fish before they could be hoisted over the gunwale. After fishing all day for a tantalizing tuna, losing it to a sharp toothed marauder is really a www.coastalfisherman.net bite in the butt (or at least a tuna loin).

While the Chesapeake has been quiet we have had a pleasant surprise in the surf of the VA Barrier Islands. Along with the expected summer kingfish and spot action on bloodworms fished just on the deep side of the break, we also have had the opportunity for some sporty spotails. Some of these rough and ready reds are in the VA slot of 18"-26" while other's blow the maximum size limit out of the water, or I should say, maybe back into the water to be released to bend a rod another day!

So no matter if you are tugging a tuna out of the deep abyss, taking your shark crazy son out for a quick trip for sharp toothed seaside sport, or even taking your daughter that's head over heals for horses to the 98th Annual Chincoteague Pony Swim....get out there and do it! If there is one responsibility we as sporting shoreman have, it's to pass on the great legacy of enjoying the outdoors and the state of mind that comes with NOT taking for granted this wonderful place we call home! §


Local USGC Auxiliary & Marlin Club Crew of OC Sponsor Dock Safety Coloring Book

Our local Ocean City Maryland US Coast Guard Auxiliary has partnered to create a coloring book to raise dock safety awareness in children. Auxiliarist Dan Collins was contacted by Mr. David Thomas, a grandfather who had lost his young grandson Noah as the result of a dock incident in Norfolk, VA. As an artist, David created the initial publication and was funding printing and distribution locally. Once Dan heard the story and David's vision, he rallied behind him and coordinated with the local USCG Auxiliary to gain approval to print and distribute it broadly here. A couple samples pages are printed below.

Since the Auxiliary is a nonprofit and further restricted by its affiliation with the US Coast Guard, they need to secure grants, donations or other funding to finance the printing. Initially Dan reached out to Maryland State Senator Mary Beth Carozza for help securing

funds. She thought of the Ocean City Marlin Club Crew of OC as they are a 501(c)(3)public charity dedicated to the promotion of safe boating, fishing, conservation and the education of youth in those activities. Susan Seifert was the initial contact point and the Crew quickly came to support the idea, agreeing to fund \$1,350 which should allow for over 1,000 books to be produced. 





