





Ocean City Fishing Report by Larry Jock



The scales were hopping last week with quite a few nice catches from offshore boats.

Yellowfin Tuna

The vellowfin tuna bite last week was very good with fish caught primarily at the triangle formed by the Hot Dog, Sausages and Hambone. Anglers also picked up a few down in the Washington Canyon and in the Spencer Canyon over weekend. On most days, the best bite has been right at sunrise, when I know Capt. John Oughton on the charter boat, "That's Right" always likes to be on the water ready to go. The impressive thing about the yellowfin bite has been the consistency in which we have seen 50 lb. class fish throughout the week. The yellowfins have been cookie cutter size, all coming in between 45 and 52 lbs. The largest yellowfin we have seen so far this season was a 60.6 pounder that came in on Saturday aboard the "Absolut Pleasure". The big yellowfin was hooked while trolling around the 800/800 and took top honors in last weekends Canyon Kick-Off. Anglers on the "Stalker" boated a 59.6 pounder in the Spencer Canyon on Sunday where they found 71-degree blue/green water.

Bluefin Tuna

The bluefin bite slacked off throughout the week but picked up over the weekend with several nice size ones hitting the dock during the Canyon Kick-Off. A few were between 100 and 122 lbs., but most were in the upper double digits and came in from around the Hot Dog. Anglers on the "Primary Search" boated a 110 pounder on Saturday at the Hambone.

Marlin

Only a few white marlin were caught and released over the weekend by anglers fishing south in the Washington Canyon. We also saw the first blue marlin caught by a Marlin Club member on Sunday while trolling in the Spencer Canyon. They picked up \$2,500 from the Club for their catch.

Wahoo

The first wahoo of the season was caught on Sunday by Scott Raleigh while fishing near the Sausages on the charter boat, "That's Right". It wasn't huge, coming in at 26 lbs., but it was the first. Surprisingly, it was exactly 1 month later than the first one caught last year.

Flounder

Flounder fishing in the bay behind Ocean City continues to be rough with anglers having to weed through a lot of throwbacks to get their keepers. Anglers on the charter boat, "Get Sum" were able to pick-up a few keepers in the East Channel, but it was in the West Channel where they had their best luck. Capt. Nick loves to fish with white Gulp! Swimming Mullets, but his anglers have also been finding success with live minnows as well.

The good flounder action, like in previous seasons, is out on the ocean reefs and wrecks. I have always said that the best \$50 you could ever spend would be joining the Ocean City Reef Foundation where that amount will get you a book containing all of the numbers for every one of their reef sites. Trust me, you will kick yourself for not joining sooner. The best spot so far this season has been at the Old Grounds where Capt. Kane Bounds on the charter boat, "Fish Bound" has put his customers on some great catches of fish. Capt. Kane's anglers have returned to Bahia Marina with not only good

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numbers of flatties but big ones at that! It looks like Capt. Kane and mate Kevin Twilley are loving strips of squid dressed with gold skirts.

Sheepshead

We have seen a number of sheepshead caught around the South Jetty by anglers fishing with sand fleas. The best catch we have seen so far this year came in on the "Rippin' Lips" where the anglers caught 8 sheepshead last week weighing up to 12 lbs. 12 oz.

Anglers on the new charter boat, "On the Run" also got into some sheepshead, along with some black drum and stripers around the Jetty.

Tautog

In addition to catching sheepshead at the South Jetty, anglers have also caught a number of tautog. I would say 99% of them are under the 16-inch minimum size limit but a few keepers are there to be hooked. Anglers have also caught a few along the rocks off Martha's Landing.

Bluefish

Although the bite is nothing like we saw last month, anglers are still picking away at chopper bluefish in the Ocean City Inlet. Anglers fishing on the "Lucky Break" caught some nice ones on bucktails and Devin McCauley caught a 12 pounder on a Z-Man artificial around the Rt. 50 Bridge during a trip aboard the "Ocean City Guide Service".

Small, snapper bluefish can still be found roaming the waters around the Rt. 50 Bridge.

Make sure you log onto our online Fishing Report throughout the day since we update it as the reports come in, especially from Capt. John Oughton on the charter boat, "That's Right". Everyone is encouraged to call in updates during their trip so they can be included in the Fishing Report that is read by thousands of anglers.





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



Their 3 heaviest yellowfins weighed 45.0, 50.2 and 50.4 lbs. Fishing with Capt. Zip Zajdel and mate Myles Deppe were Dale Vetra, Joe Mildon, Don DiBlasi, Sissy Dalton and Ed Zajdel, Jr.

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Jen and Tim McDowell were drifting in the Fish Bowl, north of the Rt. 50 Bridge with their uncle, John Folk when they captured 4 keeper flounder and 3 throwbacks during the incoming tide. Their largest fish measured 20-inches.







Austin, Matt, Brian, Keith and Mike Coyle joined Mike Little for an overnight trip aboard the charter boat, "Capt. Ike II" with Capt. Dave Collins and teamed up to catch this 396 lb. mako shark. 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
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Pish by Capt. Franky Pettolina Stories

My "Man Cave" has one overwhelming theme when it comes to decor. Fishing! There are several fish mounts, ranging from my first fish (that little sand shark that I told y'all about last year) on up to my wife's first mako that she caught on my buddy Eric's boat a few years ago. There are framed Coastal Fisherman covers and trophies from the tournaments I have been lucky enough to win. I have prints and originals from marine artists I like and scattered about are pictures from my fishing adventures all over the world. And lastly, I have trophies and plaques from the Ocean City Marlin Club Seasonal Awards.

The Seasonal Awards are what I am going to talk about this week. Well, sort of. I am going to talk about the one Seasonal Award that I have which I do not display. More

specifically, I am going to relay to you the events which led to me being presented this award, which at the time was called a "Special Recognition of Achievement".

You may ask why I choose not to display an award for "Special Recognition Achievement". This sounds like some amazing feat. Something to be proud of. A story for the ages. Well I guess I am proud of, or at least happy about, the outcome of the event that led to this award. It was pretty amazing. And it is a valuable story and one which I have told many times, and one that I am getting ready to tell again right now. After you hear it you can make up your own mind about whether I should hang the plaque or not.

On August 6, 2001, I was fishing in the Baltimore Canyon. Fishing the White Marlin Open

to be exact. I had a group of experienced anglers and the marlin bite was decent. Dad was running the boat. I was working the cockpit. Our friend Capt. Lee Fickinger was riding along to lend a hand when needed. The weather was good. Almost flat calm. I felt good about our chances.

Around 11:00 AM, I watched a boat called "The Biddy" hook a tripleheader of white marlin right next to us. I told the boys to get ready.


Probably 15 minutes later, I saw a fish cut in behind the skirted ballyhoo on the 30 lb. outfit on the right long-rigger. I picked up the rod, dumped the bait and a few seconds later I came tight. Normally this is a good thing. The problem with this particular time is that the fish was not another white marlin. It was about a 200 lb. class blue marlin. Other than for point value, a 200 lb. blue marlin is undesirable in the White Marlin Open. It almost hurts to type the words "blue marlin" and "undesirable" in the same sentence, but in this case it is fitting. You see, a 200 lb. blue marlin on a 30 lb. outfit can be a


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real battle if you don't get the release quickly, and in a tournament like the Open, time is money. A bunch of money. The way I figure it, it was costing my guys a little over a thousand dollars per hour of fishing time with what they had invested for the week. This is the type of fish that could turn out to be a real nightmare. And this one did.

But not because it went deep and we ate up valuable fishing Actually quite the opposite. The fish stayed on top and we were backing down quickly. My angler, a burly fellow by the name of Jimmy Jernigan, was doing a great job on the rod. He was standing in the port side corner of the cockpit and gaining line as fast as we could chase down the fish. The fish was jumping about fifty yards behind the boat and I was standing next to Jimmy, ready to touch the leader for the tournament legal release when the fish was close enough. We had all done this before. I was joking with Jimmy that he better hurry up and catch this "rat" so we could get back to finding a "money fish".

Right about then I saw







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Jimmy's feet straight up in the air. It took me a second to comprehend what was happening. He had lost his footing and was going overboard. I tried to grab him but missed. In hindsight this was probably a good thing. I don't know if I would have been able to keep him in the boat and changing his fall into the water might have changed the outcome. He pretty much went in head first right behind the boat. And we were in reverse. It happened so fast.

I would like to tell you that I yelled "Man Overboard!" and then expertly performed a text book man overboard drill, but that isn't what happened. I yelled alright. And what I yelled isn't fit to print in this family friendly publication, but it definitely alerted the crew and Dad pulled the boat out of gear.

At this point a couple of things happened. I stood at the transom hollering "Where is he?" Over and over again. The boat was coasting backwards into the calm seas. Capt. Lee grabbed our Type IV throw ring and joined me at the transom.

All eyes were on the water. After what felt like a half hour, but in reality was probably less than 30 seconds, I heard what sounded like a turtle exhaling somewhere up the port side of the boat. I turned and looked and saw Jimmy swimming. I took the throw ring from Lee and hurled it at Jimmy. And missed him entirely. Thankfully we had a tether on the ring and I quickly pulled it back in and took my time and threw more accurately to Jimmy the second time. With him swimming and me helping pull we got him back to the boat and in our transom door. As he was coming into the boat he was apologizing for letting go of the rod! I told him that we got him back, that was what mattered. We could get another rod and reel. There are more Blue Marlin in the ocean.

I am not exactly sure how we didn't hit Jimmy with the props. Dad and I have hashed this over again and again over the years and the best we can come up with is that he went in head first and it helped that he was a big dude with a barrel chest. He went in at an angle that was

about as hydro dynamic as a human could get. Like I said earlier, I think it is good that I missed grabbing him. Had I caused him to belly flop instead of going in head first I might be telling this story very differently. But I think the way he went in allowed him to propel out of the prop wash even though we were in reverse.

The other key thing that happened in this chain of events was my buddy Lee grabbing the Type IV throw ring, the type that has a tether. Type IV throwable devices are REQUIRED to be IMMEDIATELY AVAILABLE by the United States Coast Guard. The tether is not required on recreational vessels, but I am a believer in it (our tether is 60-feet long). If it wasn't for the tether I would not have had the second throw at Jimmy, nor would I have been able to help guide him in. Most of the boats I look at during surveys do not have the Type IV immediately available and by "immediately available" I mean that it is unobstructed and within reach of the crew. Not in a locker. Not stowed with the other personal floatation

July 5, 2017 Coastal Fisherman Page 13 devices. These things should be at arms length of a crew member. Now I realize that you can't always be three feet from something on a boat, but I think you get my point.

Truth is, we got lucky that day. We even laughed about it after the fact, but we got lucky. And we had the proper safety equipment in the correct place.

That award from the Ocean City Marlin Club was "Special Recognition of Achievement for the Release and Catch of One Angler". There was some good natured ribbing and joking about it at the Seasonal Awards Ceremony and I still have the plaque as a reminder. Hopefully, as a result of somebody reading this they will move their Type IV to a better position on their boat. But I still don't think I will display the award in my man cave.







The category for Manufacturer of the Year-Support went to Garmin for the second consecutive year.

The Garmin Reactor Autopilot won 1st place in the Autopilot Category. With its solid-state, 9-axis Attitude Heading Reference System (AHRS), the GHP Reactor autopilot series holds your course even when your boat is pitching and rolling in rough water. The Reactor offers flexible installation options and requires a minimum amount of




commissioning calibration. The result is that everyone onboard enjoys a comfortable ride while heading error, course deviation, rudder movement and power consumption are minimized. This 9-axis Attitude Heading Reference replaces System traditional Garmin round compass ball the or traditional fluxgate heading sensors traditionally used on other autopilot systems. The AHRS sensor is a small electronic device, connected

to the autopilot system with two cables. Garmin developed this marine sensor by using the same technology Garmin uses in its aviation electronics found in airplane cockpits.

Garmin offers the Reactor autopilot in a few different versions. The Compact Reactor is designed to be used on smaller boats to provide basic cruising autopilot control. This model is not recommended for fishing or low speed operation like trolling. The Compact Reactor can be used in conjunction with one of Garmin's newer multifunction displays as the only user interface without the need for a dedicated autopilot control screen. The standard GHP Reactor autopilot is available in a few different configurations. The top of the line version is sold as a complete kit, including a smartpump, which is the hydraulic pump that does the work of steering the boat for you. This Smartpump is capable of self configuring itself to almost any boats steering system, allowing this one pump solution as compared to the careful selection and configuration of other autopilot pumps. This pump is a modern brushless DC motor that can automatically adjust output volume based on the needs of your vessel. There is also a version of the GHP Reactor autopilot that can be retrofitted into an existing

www.coastalfisherman.net autopilot system, allowing you to re-use your existing autopilot hydraulic pump.

In the Radar award category, Furuno won with the DRS4DNXT, a solid-state Doppler pulse compression radar in a 24-inch closed dome. This radar includes Target Analyzer and Fast Target Tracking utilizing Doppler technology. Combined with FURUNO exclusive RezBoost technology for beam sharpening, the DRS4DNXT packs the performance of an open array radar, in a compact 24-inch radome. This radar works with modern Furuno multifunction displays such as the TZT or TZT2.



The DRS4DNXT is the first radar to use the new exclusive Furuno Target Analyzer function, where targets that are approaching your vessel automatically change color. Green targets targets that stationary or are moving away from you, while red targets are moving towards your vessel. The Target Analyzer works independent of vessel speed, both your own vessels and target vessels, with minor limitations. **Echoes** dynamically change colors as targets approach, or get

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farther away from your vessel. Target Analyzer can increase safety, as well as improve situational awareness.

This radar uses only 2.5 amps of 12 volt power to operate, and since it does not use a traditional magnetron, it can go into standby and transmit modes very quickly and does not emit dangerously high power microwaves. This is great for center consoles and as a second radar for larger boats.

This radar includes an allnew "Bird Mode" as another useful feature. With a single selection on the MFD, the radar automatically adjusts settings for echo enhancement to help you locate birds. For those fishing fanatics, finding the birds is an important step to zeroingin on the bite.

This radar includes an ARPA function, The ARPA signal processor will automatically acquire and track up to 40 targets in a

single sweep, without the need to set any kind of acquisition zone. "ARPA" stands for Automatic Radar Plotting Aid. This means that the radar can automatically lock onto targets determine their course and speed, as well as the Closest Point of Approach (CPA) and Time of CPA (TCPA) that you that vessel will experience as long as both maintain their course and speed. A similar version is MARPA or mini-ARPA, referred to as manual ARPA, because you have to select each radar target to acquire.

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
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For some reason they've been visiting Delmarva more than ever this early season, usually 2-4 days at a time, then they leave for a short while, only to return for another long weekend or sometimes pop in for a surprise visit during the week. Since mid-May they've been around so much that some folks are beginning to think of them as locals. But they aren't locals, they just breeze into down, disrupt things for a few days and move on. The worst of them usually come from the northeast but recently we've had some bad ones from the south, and there's no "wall" that will keep these "bad hombres" out. Even before they arrive, just the report that they're coming has many folks upset. And then they arrive, with all their gusto, rattling doors, tipping over trash cans, throwing sand on the beach and saltwater in boater's faces. Look-out Delmarva, strong-gusty winds have come-a-calling!

For three days last week

the wind absolutely howled out of the south. Besides that the weather was beautiful with warm days and clear skies. Real pretty unless you wanted to fish offshore, and then "forgetaboutit"! With 6-foot seas kicked-up by the little-breeze, most fishermen opted to stay at the dock (at least the sane ones did) where conditions were a lot healthier for both man and vessel.

On the days when so many folks were looking forward to going fishing, but our friend Mother Nature said, "Nope, not for a few days", you can bet that there are a lot of somber faces around the docks frustrated fishermen looking for something to do. So there I was, early one morning last week sitting in my truck watching the marina flags trying to rip themselves off their poles as sand blew across the parking lot and seagulls (that also should have been out fishing) huddled behind the lea of some tall buildings for any kind of relief from the breeze

they could get. Since I couldn't fish I was about to head home to initiate my "Plan-B", which involved me shoving a lawn mower around the weed patch I call a yard, when a couple walked past my truck. Along their way, I overheard the man comment. "This lousy wind! What's it good for besides messing-up everyone's plans?" As they hustled away I wanted to jump out of the truck and tell them what "I" thought the wind was good for, but about that time the lady's hat blew off sending the man running across the parking lot trying to catch it before it bounced into the water behind a couple of charter boats. Noting that, I didn't figure my comments would be very well received, so I left the couple to their own thoughts on the matter.

If things hadn't gone so would Ι have mentioned to the couple that hey - thanks to the wind they now have the chance to slip over to one of the diners and have a leisurely breakfast without fear of yacking it up 30-miles offshore. That's gotta be a plus! Then it occurred to me that if frustrated anglers would just slow down and think about it, they'd probably be able to

take these blow-days with a lot less aggravation by realizing that there's even more good that comes from windy days than just a chance to fill up on flapjacks and scrapple.

Maybe the biggest plus is the troublemaking waves that the wind produces in the first place. Besides keeping us off the water, those big, white-capping, rolling, rumbling, pound your boat and splash you in the face waves are actually good for the marine environment by aerating the upper water column, helping to produce up-wellings that bring nutrients to the surface and getting water moving in areas that might otherwise tend to become stagnant. And just as this is healthy for the water, it's obviously healthy for the critters that live in it, including the very fish we all wish we could be fishing for on the blustery days when we can't.

Windy days also give anglers the opportunity to get a lot of work done on their boats and tackle that might otherwise be left undone until there is a major malfunction at a critical time. Hey, with some big tournaments coming up you can't be too prepared for the competition! And of course, a

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windy day in the middle of the season creates a great opportunity for anglers to "give it a break" for once and spend a little quality time at home with the family.

Getting back to what's "good for the fish". Ever think about how nice it would be if they could stock the ocean with farm-raised fish in the same way they do with freshwater ponds, streams, lakes and rivers? Imagine if a couple times a year a BIG truck pulled up on the beach and released thousands of tuna, dolphin, sharks, bluefish, sea bass, flounder and every other popular gamefish right out into the ocean. If you think about it, minus the big truck, isn't that kinda-sorta what happens when nobody can get out and fish? I mean, on a given good-weather weekend, if "X" amount of fish would normally meet their fate in the bottom of anglers coolers, couldn't one

say that if no one gets out to fish for 2 to 3 days, that it's the same as if the ocean was suddenly re-stocked with that same amount of fish? Therefore, when the weather moderates and folks finally get back out on the water, there's going to be that many more fish out there that wouldn't have been if the wind never blew.

OK, I know such rationalization teeters on the kind of philosophical mumbo-jumbo that I for one absolutely hate to engage in, but hey, if it helps to make someone feel a little bit better about missing a couple days of fishing – what the heck. I know it worked for me last week as I followed my favorite lawnmower around the yard!



NOAA Fisheries has released a new video to help anglers identify dusky and other prohibited shark species. Focused on safe handling and release of sharks and current fishing regulations, the video accompanies a suite of educational materials. All of these materials are available for download.

Beginning January 1, 2018, recreational fishermen, including charter/headboat fishermen that fish for, retain, posses, or land sharks in federal waters of the Atlantic Ocean, Gulf of Mexico and Caribbean must have a valid "shark endorsement" added to their HMS permit. Atlantic tunas General category and Swordfish General Commercial permit holders must also have a shark endorsement for registered

tournaments. The video is required viewing for permit holders requesting the shark endorsement, and will be followed by brief, a educational quiz.

Ocean City opens new boat ramp

The Town of Ocean City opened a new boat ramp on 64th Street and the Bay adjacent to the town's Public Works complex.

The ramp is operational 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and 365 days a year. Launching and retrieving of boats is free and pay-to-park rates are \$2.00 per hour from April 1st through October 31st. Parking is free during the off-season. Vehicles can be left in the lot overnight.

Parking spaces are 50-feet in length and able to accomodate a vehicle and trailer.

The channel has been dredged and has approximately 3-feet of draw at low tide.

The Town also offers a public boat ramp at 87th Street and Bering Road. Annual passes for this ramp cost \$50 and can be purchased at City Hall. There is no on-site parking for the 87th Street Ramp.

NOAA Seeks Comments on Adding Blueline Tilefish to Golden Tilefish Management Plan

NOAA Fisheries is asking for comments on a proposed rule to add blueline tilefish to the Mid-Atlantic Fishery Management Council's Golden Tilefish Fishery Management Plan.

Blueline tilefish have been managed for many years under the South Atlantic Council's Snapper Grouper Fishery Management Plan,

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whose measures only apply south of the Virginia/North Carolina border. The fishery in Mid-Atlantic considered very small and remained unregulated until recently.

Recreational and commercial blueline tilefish catch has been increasing steadily in the Greater Atlantic Region (Virginia to Maine) 2011. since In 2014, commercial landings increased more than 20-fold from the previous several years' average. This rapid unregulated increase in harvest represented a risk to the long-term sustainability of the stock, and triggered the Council Mid-Atlantic emergency request management measures in 2015. Interim management measures took effect in June 2016, while the Council developed this proposed amendment.

Amendment 6 to the Tilefish Fishery Management Plan would manage the

federal waters blueline tilefish fishery north of the Virginia/North Carolina border. NOAA is proposing these management measures for blueline tilefish as part of the Tilefish Fishery Management Plan.

Through this action, NOAA is proposing a commercial possession limit of 300 pounds per trip.

NOAA is also proposing a recreational season from May 1st to October 31st and limits of:

- 7 fish per person on Coast Guard inspected forhire vessels (party/headboats)
- 5 fish per person on uninspected for-hire vessels (charter boats), and
- 3 fish per person on private recreational vessels.

The proposed rule would require fishermen to hold a valid Greater Atlantic Region open access tilefish commercial or charter/party permit to ensure adequate reporting and monitoring of blueline tilefish fishing

activity. NOAA is also recommending requirements for new permits and catch reporting for private recreational fishermen.

More information is available in the proposed rule and Notice of Availability, along with the draft Environmental Assessment and preliminary Regulatory Impact Review.


