Marlin

If you walked down the docks last week, especially "C" dock at Sunset Marina, you saw a lot of white marlin flags flying. There were also a few blue marlin releases last week as well.

The charter boat, "Billfisher" continues to stack up the white marlin releases, with 15 on both Monday and Tuesday. All of the fish were hooked in the Washington Canyon where, on Tuesday, they also released a blue marlin.

The seas were rough over the weekend, so only a couple of boats ventured out on Sunday, but quite a few fished on Saturday. As with most of the week, the best action seemed to take place between the Rockpile and the Washington Canyon where water temperatures reached upwards of 80-degrees. There were also a few whites released in the Wilmington Canyon as well.

As mentioned earlier, we saw a few blue marlin releases recorded last week. addition to the "Billfisher" releases Tuesday, on Osprey" "Rhonda's also released a blue marlin near the Rockpile on the same day. On Thursday, the "Marli" released one near the Rockpile and the "D.A. Sea" let one go in the Washington Canyon. On



During an overnight trip to the Wilmington Canyon last week, anglers on the charter boat, "Restless Lady" captured 6 bigeye tuna and 4 yellowfins. Of the 10 tunas caught, 5 were hooked on a greenstick, 2 on the troll, 1 while live baiting tinker mackerel and 2 yellowfins were caught jigging. The bigeyes weighed 110, 130, 136, 156, 167 and 181 lbs. and the largest yellowfin weighed 75 lbs. on the scale at the Talbot Street Pier. Fishing with Capt. Todd Kurtz and mates Will Hathaway and Doug Jacobs were John Lindbeck from Upperco, MD, Fred Van Blarcom from Columbus, OH, Bud Grantland and John Liberto from Baltimore, MD, Jon Gross from Suffern, NY and Shawn Little from Hydes, MD.

Friday, the "White Lightning" headed to the Washington Canyon where they released a blue marlin and 4 white marlin.

Tuna

Tuna fishing is extremely tough right now, especially for yellowfins. Not much is going on anywhere, except for in the Wilmington Canyon where unfortunately the bite dried up on Sunday.

Although most of the boats catching tuna Wilmington last week came out of New Jersey, "Restless Lady" did head up there on Wednesday for an overnight trip and boated an amazing 6 bigeyes and 4 yellowfins. The bigeyes weighed between 110 and 181 lbs. Their largest yellowfin tipped the scale at 75 lbs. Of the 6 bigeyes, 3 were caught on the greenstick, 2 on trolled ballyhoo and 1 while live baiting tinker mackerel.

On Friday, the "Foolish Pleasures" also took the trip to the Wilmington Canyon and returned on Saturday with 2 bigeyes, weighing 161 and 180 lbs., in addition to 4 dolphin and a white marlin release.

Dolphin

Last week was a bad one to be a dolphin with many fish boxes filled to the brim. Almost all of the mahi were caught in the Washington Canyon with a small percentage hooked from the Poor Man's up to the Wilmington. We also saw dolphin caught along weed lines in 400-500 fathoms behind the Poor Man's.

On Sunday, the charter boat "Moore Bills" headed to the Poor Man's in very sporty seas and returned with a large 42 lb. dolphin.


Cobia

The big news last week was the 3rd cobia caught this season that was heavy enough to beat the current Maryland state record.

On Friday, Jack Latimer captured a 79 pounder after he spotted the fish swimming on the surface, 1 mile directly off the Ocean City Inlet. Jack tossed the cobia a bucktail and fought the fish for 20 minutes before the fish put a few unwanted bends in the gaff. Ironically, Jack was fishing with Steve Magassy, who was also on the boat when Jon Henry caught 2 cobia earlier in the summer that beat the current state record.

Red Drum

It was this time last year that we began to see fantastic

red drum action in the Ocean City Inlet and it looks like this bite is quietly getting better each week. Look for the area around the North and South Jetties for your best bites.

Flounder

Warm water temperatures and dirty water conditions put a damper on bay flounder fishing last week. Water temperatures were in the 75 to 76-degree range at the end of the incoming tide so anglers needed to look for the deeper holes for keeper flatties.

The best bite behind Ocean City was around Bird Island and in the Fish Bowl, north of the Rt. 50 Bridge. Gulp! artificial baits and cut bait, such as flounder and dolphin belly, outproduced live spot and mullet last week.

Flounder fishing on ocean structure continues to impress but word has it that boats are traveling a little further off the beach to find them. The Old Grounds, African Queen and Sites 10 & 11 off the coast of

Delaware have all been top producers.

On Sunday, the Bahia Marina Flounder Pounder was held and a 5 lb. 2 oz. flattie caught by B.J. Truitt took top honors. B.J. hooked the winning flounder in the bay behind Frontier Town on a Gulp! and minnow combination. The 2nd place fish was caught by Kathryn Hopkins who landed a 4 lb. 15 oz. flounder in the East Channel on a live mullet. The tournament had 86 anglers registered and we saw fish come in from spots as far south as the Assateague Bridge and as far north as the Thorofare.

Bluefish

Snapper bluefish are all over the bay and larger bluefish are being caught by anglers around the Rt. 50 Bridge.

In the Surf

Surfcasters continue to find the typical summer varieties of sharks, skates and rays but kingfish and snapper bluefish have also entered the mix.

Upcoming Tournament

The 13th Annual Ocean City Fishing Center Spot Tournament will be held on September 11th. This tournament is awesome, especially for kids, and it is also very inexpensive so you can enter an entire family for a night of fun. All the action takes place right at the docks at the Fishing Center.

This weekend is the Ocean City Marlin Club Challenge Cup which pits the Ocean City club against the Cape May Marlin & Tuna Club. After losing the cup in 2010 and 2011, the Cape May team was victorious in 2012 and 2013, so this year should be interesting given that the trophy is retired given to the club after 3 consecutive wins. I will go out on a limb and predict a big win this year for the Ocean City team!



It's that time of year when there are plenty of fish, but sometimes not many keepers! Flounder are biting, but so many of them are short. What's an angler to do!

We've always said that bigger baits will catch bigger fish. You might not catch as many small fish though. It's the time of year to invest in a cast net and an aerated bucket and catch whatever you can Little alewives are usually flipping around in the Commercial Harbor, lagoons around Ocean City and in shallow water creeks such as Herring Creek. Many people find bait at Northside Park. You'll find live bait is easiest to find early in the morning. Just keep a few dozen and release the rest so they will stay alive.

Finger mullet are harder to catch but they hang around the edges of sand bars. Get out of your boat at low tide and look for the swirling baitfish. You have to be fast. Keep the lid on your aerated bucket or they will hop out.

"I tried to catch some live spot by the Route 90 Bridge but they were too large!"

If the live bait you are trying to catch is too big, don't

toss it! Scale and fillet it! Then cut it into long strips and hang it on your favorite flounder rig. There's nothing like fresh cut strips of fish meat that will entice a big flounder this time of year. I like to strip larger fresh mullet, bunker, bluefish and croaker. Those ugly lizardfish really work great! Yes, flounder feed on those prehistoric looking lizardfish, so if you happen to catch one, keep it for flounder bait. It's one of the very best!

If you use a fish for bait that has a legal size limit, you are supposed to keep the carcass in your cooler in case you are checked. That would be bluefish, croaker or flounder.

When I fish offshore, bluefish fillets are one of my favorite flounder baits. I hang it on the flounder rig or on a 3 or 4 ounce Spro bucktail and jig it off the bottom. Anglers this year are having a tremendous time catching good-sized flounder offshore on the artificial reef sites. Drifting around structure will usually catch you some flounder this time of year. Just like in the bay, sometimes you have to wait for the current to start running. If there's no current,

flounder fishing can be slow. Jig, and maybe even try a slow troll and wait it out. We don't eat 24 hours a day and neither do the fish!

Someone asked the other day how long flounder will bite in the bay. I've always noted that they bite pretty well into the first or second week of October and then they can slow up. Generally you can still catch some up through Thanksgiving. It usually has to do with weather and the first really big coldfront that happens in October make the flounder want to move out of the bay. During the first and second week of October, most of the good fishing is right around the Route 50 Bridge and in the Ocean City Inlet, as the fish stack up near the bridge on the change of tide and make their way towards the ocean.

I've counted over 50 boats hanging near the draw of the bridge during the last of the incoming high tide waiting for that bite. And yes, that's when the larger flounder bite. High tide and when it first starts to go out is when the whoppers are caught. You can fish the east channel all day and catch dozens of throwbacks, but when that tide gets to that "one hour each side of the high tide" your chances of catching keepers are best.

"What about Gulp!?"
Anglers that are good at

using Gulp! like to use a 5-inch Gulp! on a big hook OR on a 2 to 3-ounce Spro bucktail in the bay. You can also combo that Gulp! with a strip of bait or a live minnow or shiner. You need to use a 2/0 or 3/0 wide gap hook to accommodate the larger size of the 5-inch Gulp! The 5-inch Gulp! baits get expensive when the blues and little sea bass are nipping at


expensive when the blues and little sea bass are nipping at their tails. You only get a few in a pack, compared to the popular 4-inch Gulp! Mullets that folks use in the summertime. Save them for the prime tide!

If you are using the 4-inch Gulp!, combo them with the

Gulp!, combo them with the usual shiner, minnow or squid strip to give your baits the illusion of a larger bait. Anyone that has ever fished with me knows that I like to put 3 different baits on a single hook, and yes, I catch my share of big flounder!

But, if you are fishing an attractive live finger mullet or live bunker, it's best to let it swim alone without hanging any extra Gulp! or strips of bait on the hook. If you are fishing live minnows save the biggest ones for that perfect tide. Sometimes, especially if the water is clear, flounder like a plain live minnow with nothing else on the hook.

Someone asked the other day what rigs work best offshore for flounder. I like the Aqua Clear Rigs because they are less likely to tangle in

deeper water. You will need to use heavier sinkers than in the bay. Take 3 to 5-ounce bank sinkers offshore, and sometimes, you may even need a 6-ounce sinker. Spro bucktails in the 3 to 6-ounce range are always good to take offshore and jig off the bottom with bait strips or Gulp! (or both).

Flounder that you find offshore will hang near structure, but not necessarily on top of it like sea bass. Go up to the structure and drift off, bouncing your rig along the bottom. As long as you are feeling rough bottom, you know you are on some structure and in flounder territory. Changes in bottom depth, just like in the bay, attract flounder. Where there's one, there's more. Mark that spot and go back!

Joe Morris at Lewes Harbour Marina said this summer's flounder action was the best in recent memory, and it has carried through right into September. Providing there are no severe weather fronts to push them out prematurely, anglers should enjoy a few more weeks of good fishing as flatties stage on structure during their movement offshore.

Fluke continued to be found on Reef Sites 9, 10 and 11, the Old Grounds and on bottom features surrounding "DB" and "DA" Buoys. Captain Brent worked over the flounder pretty good during the week with groups aboard the "Katydid". He returned early Tuesday with a 32 fluke limit that included Charlie Jammer's 6.65 pounder. buddies took advantage of good conditions during the week, and limited out on flounder three trips in a row while working Site 11 and the Old Grounds. Jim Meyers was dialed in on big fish at Site 10. Tuesday, he scored a pair of fluke scaling 6.83 and 8.01 pounds. He topped them Friday with an 8.36 pound citation earner. Wayne Brady boated a 5.3 pound flounder from the Old Grounds aboard Miss Kirstin. Jon Bixler drifted

In the Delaware Bay, some flounder and assorted panfish were available at the Star Site. That mix included jumbo spot, hardheads, kingfish, puffers, triggers, sea bass, spike trout and snapper blues. Clams, bloodworms, squid, shrimp and Fishbites got bit.

Snapper blues have been active in the lower Bay and could usually be found beneath working birds. The rip on the shoal just off the Outer Wall's north end attracted numerous snappers. They could be hooked there with cut baits on bottom rigs, or cast bucktails and metal jigs.

Bluefish also roamed the ocean surf, especially since more mullet have shown up. Surfcasters caught small blues using fresh mullet from inside



Korean Style Grilled Tuna

1/2 cup soy sauce

2 TBSP. toasted sesame seed oil

1 tsp. minced fresh ginger

3 TBSP. sugar

1 TBSP. sesame seeds

3 garlic cloves, minced

1/4 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. black pepper

4 tuna steaks

In a plastic bag, combine all ingredients except the tuna.

Mix the marinade in the bag until combined; add the tuna, coating it completely.

Seal the bag, refrigerate, and let the tuna marinate for 1 to 2 hours, turning it occasionally.

Preheat the grill or broiler with rack in the top position.

Brush the grill with vegetable oil.

Discard the marinade and grill the tuna (or broil it on a rack

Grilled Tuna with Caramelized Onions

2 TBSP. extra-virgin olive oil

CHUM LINES BY CAPT. MARK SAMPSON

Over the years, I've been contacted by a lot of folks looking for information on how to get into the charter fishing business. From young men looking for a first mate position, to seasoned captains inquiring about where to rent a boat slip in Ocean City, the questions are often as diverse as the individuals asking them. A while back, I was called by a fellow who explained that he'd been fishing out of Ocean City for a number of years and was contemplating getting a captains license, a bigger boat and making a career in the charter business. Like so many others, his biggest concern was how many charters I thought he would get during a typical summer season. The number of charters, of course, translates into gross income, so any projection someone can get on how many trips they might run will help with their financial planning. So, the bottom line is this fellow wanted to know how

much money he was going to make.

The answer I gave was probably not the one he expected, and certainly not what he wanted to hear. I told him that if it's money he wanted to make, he had better look for some other job because he's not likely going to make much (if any) from buying a boat and going into the charter business. My comments were met with the question, "If there's no money to be made, then how come there's so many charter boats in Ocean City, and why is it that so many of them have been in business for so long?"

I realized that here was yet another fisherman who had been fooled by the great "charter boat illusion" that promises a life of fun times, sleek new boats, big fish and lots of money. Oh, if it could only be so! Unfortunately the charter business is not all that it appears. It's certainly

some of the larger marinas in town and see row after row of big, elaborate charter boats, many of which might have come at a cost of a million (or more) dollars. But as impressive as they are, such boats are not likely to be providing much return on investment to their owners. In fact many of them run in the "red" year after year and have little, if any, chance of actually "making money", something that's often OK with the owners who aren't necessarily trying to turn a profit anyway. Owners of boats costing many hundreds of thousands of dollars are likely to be financially strong enough that they can own the boat whether they charter it out or not. It's just that by putting it into charter

number-crunching before he bites the bullet and buys a charter boat. Even if the vessel's sticker price doesn't hit six digits, the ever-present cash drain of maintenance and repair, slip fees, insurance, fuel, bait, tackle, ice, mate fees and equipment, can wipe away any hope of making a decent income owning a charter fishing boat.

The charter fishing illusion is perpetuated by the exciting, almost carnival-like show that unfolds daily during the summer at any of Ocean City's busy marinas. Mornings start early as captains and mates prep their boats with bait, ice and other supplies before loading up their clients. Diesel engines fire up, lines are cast off and boats head out to sea, hopefully pointed toward big fish and lots of action. Late that afternoon they return, unload their catch, swap stories with other fishermen, wipe down their shiny gold reels, clean the boat, and get ready to do it all over again the next day. Every day offshore is interesting, exciting and filled with surprises. What fishing enthusiast wouldn't want to be a part of it? The fun, the glamour, the fame, the glory -

To really see what charter fishing is all about, one should spend some off-season time in the boatyard and watch the guys spending months getting their rigs ready for the upcoming season. Sanding, scraping, painting, fiberglassing, crawling around engine rooms and mucking through bilges. There's not much glamour and excitement in all that. Oh yeah, and during all that there's NO money coming in - it's all going out!


Or watch a crew that just finished up from a long day of fishing trudge through the night making repairs, changing oil, rigging baits, cleaning up and basically doing whatever it takes to be ready to run their charter early the next morning. And as if fishing and maintaining the boat wasn't enough, a running charter fishing operation also involves all the things that go along with operating most small businesses, advertising including promotional work, evenings of following up on phone calls and emails, collecting deposits, scheduling, as well as good

banking and bookkeeping practices.

From the sidelines, it might seem like owning and operating a charter fishing business is a fun and easy way to make lots of money, but that would be like concluding that farming is easy because all they ever see are farmers driving around in big fancy tractors. Ask anyone who has been somewhat successful at charter fishing and I'm sure most will tell you that, while there are certainly elements of "fun" associated with the job, "easy" and "profitable" are not the first words they'd use to describe what they do. Certainly someone with the right mix of business sense, mechanical skills, fishing ability and good customer relations might have a chance to succeed earning a living at it, but success stories in this business are much fewer than those about failures. And even though that's not what my caller wanted to hear that day, that's just the way it is in the charter boat business.

The Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission (ASMFC) will hold a public hearing on a draft addendum to the Atlantic Striped Bass Interstate Fisheries Management Plan at 6 p.m., Thursday, Sept. 11 in the DNREC Auditorium, 89 Kings Highway, Dover. The hearing will give the public an overview of the draft addendum, which proposes new fishing mortality reference points as recommended by the 2013 stock assessment, along with three options in associated management measures to reduce fishing mortality to a level at or below the proposed target within one or three years.

The addendum is in response to results of the 2013 Atlantic striped bass benchmark assessment, which suggested fishing mortality in 2012 was above the proposed target, and female spawning stock has been steadily declining below the target since 2006. This means even though the stock is not overfished and overfishing is not occurring, striped bass spawning stock is approaching overfished threshold and stock projections show that spawning stock will likely fall below the threshold in the coming years. A has similar decline been observed in total harvest.

The addendum includes options to reduce recreational and commercial harvest along the coast and in the Chesapeake Bay under three reduction timeframes. The options are:

- Reducing fishing mortality to its target in one year with a 25 percent reduction from the 2013 harvest numbers starting in 2015;
- •Reducing fishing mortality to its target within three years with a 17 percent reduction from the 2013 harvest numbers starting in 2015; or
- •Reducing fishing mortality to its target within three years with a 7 percent reduction from the 2013 harvest for three consecutive years starting in 2015.

Specific options to be considered to achieve the necessary reductions include bag, size, slot and trophy size limits for the recreational fishery, and quota reductions for the commercial fishery.

What is NMEA2000?

This week, we will review a technical aspect of marine electronics - data communications between hardware on-board our boats. Just as we like to share information and talk to other people, our marine electronics have for years had the capability of doing the same thing.

The National Marine Electronics Association (NMEA), founded in 1957, is the trade organization that brought us popular standards such as NMEA0183 and NMEA2000.

The NMEA0183 standard was published in 1983 to allow marine electronics to talk and listen to each other using a standardized communication protocol. Updated many times since its inception, the

NMEA0183 standard is still in use today. NMEA0183 is a serial data interface that allows one talker and multiple listeners. For example, a GPS is the talker and the VHF radio is the listener and maybe the depth sounder or autopilot

between the devices is not standardized by color or connection. Generally a two wire conductor is used to connect the devices together and wires are identified by transmit and receive depending on the function.

In the middle 1990's NMEA members and other industries leaders (over 40 organizations) started to develop a more robust data protocol that would be able to expand with the

also. This standard allowed marine electronics from different manufacturers to share data, allowing helpful integration of the navigation electronics at the helm of the boat. The physical connection

capabilities of the current and future marine electronics. The first NMEA2000 standard was published in 2001. This standard is based on Controller Area Network (CAN) technology which shares some similarities with the auto industry's I1939 standard.

The NEMA2000 standard is a complete standard, with specifications for connectors, wires, power and data format. NMEA2000 is 50 times faster than NMEA 0183 and can have multiple talkers and multiple listeners at the same time. It also doesn't require a master

www.coastalfisherman.net controller or device on the network.

NMEA2000 is sometimes advertised as a plug and play system due to the fact that the NMEA2000 certification means the product has been tested by NMEA and is capable of being used in a properly configured network with no known issues. This means you should be able to go out and buy any manufacturers marine electronic device and it should talk and listen nicely with the other NEMA2000 hardware on vour network. Since the connectors are all the same, all one needs to do is plug in that new device to your existing network and it should work.

This may be a good place to break from the technical aspect and talk about the benefits.

Here is a real world example - You have a 5-year old 4212 Garmin chartplotter on your boat with an existing NMEA2000 network connecting your GPS antenna to the chartplotter. At the boat show you see the new ICOM M506 VHF radio that has built-AIS (Automatic Identification System). You buy and install the new ICOM VHF radio and using a standard NMEA drop cable and tee, connect the ICOM to the Garmin through the NMEA This allows the backbone. Garmin to tell the ICOM your latitude and longitude for DSC while at the same time the ICOM can tell the Garmin





chartplotter about the AIS vessels in your area and draw them on the Garmin display. This is a practical example of different brands and ages of hardware all sharing data back and forth.

be done when the network is powered on, it is not necessary to shut down the network to add or remove devices. Remember you can only have one device per drop You CANNOT daisy-chain devices.



So how do you get started with NMEA2000? The good news is that you might already have it! Manufacturers such as Garmin, Furuno, Simrad, Lowrance and Raymarine have all used NMEA 2000 standards in their hardware or brand specific connectors, such as Simnet, (that can be adapted to NMEA2000). If you do not already have a NMEA2000 network, it can be set up rather easily with the numerous technical publications and instructions from major manufacturers.

The NMEA200 network is comprised of a backbone cable (think of it as a tree trunk) and drop cables to each device (think of it as a tree branch). The backbone transports the data from end to end, sharing it with each network drop along the way. A backbone, using standard NMEA2000 cable, can be no longer that 100 meters (328 feet) and each network drop can be no longer than 6 meters or about 20 feet. So now that we have a backbone and drops, we need a few more pieces of hardware to complete this network. We need electrical power, 9-15 volts DC, properly fused and connected to the backbone using a tee. We also need network terminators (120 ohm resistors), one on each end of the network. Now that a proper backbone is set-up, all you will need to do is install tees and drop cables to connect each NMEA2000 certified device to the network. This can

Once your hardware is connected, there may be some minor configuration needed, but for the most part, the devices will automatically begin to transmit and receive data instantly.

There are some private communications that move across the NMEA2000 network that is not available to all devices. A popular example is Garmin's Autoguidance, where chartplotter Garmin designs a route for you and only a Garmin autopilot can use that data on the network. A Simrad autopilot can not follow the Garmin Autoguidance data, but a Simrad autopilot can follow a regular waypoint course or route broadcast on NMEA2000.

There are many, many NMEA2000 devices being designed everyday for almost any application, such as engine data, multifunction screens, weather stations, stereo controls, electronic switching, tank level gauges and flow meters.


The NMEA2000 standard will allow you to easily expand and compliment your marine electronics system when and how you like with the ease of plug-and-play technology.



The Labor Day weekend marks the unofficial end of summer for many, but the summer fishing trend is still going strong. We are also seeing fall species becoming more active, so it is the best of both worlds right now.

Founder have been a hit for most of the latter half of the summer, and now the bite is evolving into a more fall-like pattern. Fat flatties are gathering in the lower Bay area in preparation to leave for the season. Productive areas include the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel (CBBT), many lower Bay and inshore structures and deep channel edges and drop-offs. Good reports are coming from the 3rd and 4th Islands of the Bay Bridge Tunnel, Back River Reef and near Buoy 42, with good

numbers of fish ranging from 21 to 23-inches. Live bait, jigs and fresh strip baits are all working. Lower Bay inlets are also giving up some limits of keeper fish, with flatties ranging from 18 to 20-inches coming from both Lynnhaven and Rudee Inlets. Offshore wrecks are also becoming more productive. Nice keeper-sized sea bass are also providing action on many offshore structures and you can keep them for a while longer until the season closes near the end of the month.

Cobia action is right on track as these fish also transition into their fall trend. Look for good opportunities for casting to fish concentrated in schools and pods on the surface in open water near the mouth of the Bay and along

the oceanfront as they stage to migrate south. Many of these fish have exceeded 50-pounds lately. Nice fish are also pausing on bridge pilings and buoys, which is typical for this time of the year. Chummers are still having luck on lower Bay shoals.

Big red drum encounters are happening throughout the lower Bay. Schools of reds continue to delight sightcasters near the CBBT and off the Virginia Beach shorelines, while the surf action is still good on the Eastern Shore barrier islands. These fish will also begin showing in numbers in the surf along Sandbridge and at the wildlife refuge soon.


Big sheepshead are still taking late season offerings along the span of the Bay

Bridge Tunnel, with the action on the tubes escalating. Triggerfish are also in the same vicinity, as well as on several inshore wrecks. Spadefish ranging from 3 to 4-pounds are still hanging around the 3rd and 4th Islands, but the bite is about over. Anglers are finding bluefish, some grey and schoolie-sized trout striped bass while casting, jigging and drifting baits around the Hampton Roads Bridge Tunnel (HRBT) and the CBBT, especially at night.

Speckled trout are making a good showing in the Lynnhaven Inlet, Poquoson flats, the seaside of Oyster and the Elizabeth River. This bite will continue to improve over the coming months. Plenty of aggressive puppy drum are responding for anglers casting jigs or offering fresh bait within the Lynnhaven, Rudee and Little Creek Inlets.

Nice spot and croaker are infiltrating the lower Bay and local inlets. Pier anglers are

taking advantage of the abundant spot and croaker found from Buckroe to Sandbridge, toting away coolers of spot ranging to 3/4-pound and croaker pushing to over 14-inches last week. Croaker are still a mainstay out of Oyster, but this bite will wind down soon. Good numbers of spot are also coming from within the Rudee and Lynnhaven Inlets, with bloodworms the best choice.

King mackerel are a possibility along the shorelines from Rudee Inlet to False Cape and around coastal wrecks. These lightning-fast fish are responding to both trolled lures and live bait lately, but finding clean water is the key. Plenty of ribbonfish and some sharks and cobia will also compete for your offerings. Spanish mackerel are still hitting near the CBBT, the mouth of the Bay and along the oceanfront. False albacore are also a possibility, while bailer mahi may also present in cleaner inshore waters,

especially near the wrecks.

Deep droppers are still faring well off Virginia. Boats continue to bring home content anglers toting a variety of nice tilefish, rosefish, barrelfish, grouper and big sea bass. A few big amberjack are still available at the South Towers, and Jack cravelle could make a brief showing at the Chesapeake Light Tower over the next few weeks.

The offshore billfish bite is still very good, although the action is spread out. If you can find a concentration of fish, the white marlin bite can be amazing, with live-baiters releasing the most fish. A few blue marlin, sailfish and spearfish were also reported last week. Tuna are rare, but an increasing number of wahoo and plenty of nice dolphin are rounding out catches.
