

Yellowfin tuna fishing has been hot for a couple of weeks and it was never more evident than when the "Marli" arrived at the dock on Saturday afternoon with 23 yellowfins and 5 dolphin in the box. The fish were caught on trolled ballyhoo and spreader bars in 78-degree water in the Wilmington Canyon. Fishing with Capt. Brian Porter and mates Rick Tshudy and Anthony Pino were Tim Joseph from Washington, DC, Garrett Hart from Leesburg, VA, Jeff Lee from Charlotte, NC, Jason Hahn from Arlington, VA, Steve Pezzetti from Alexandria, VA and Gunnar Zorn from Berlin, MD. Yellowfin Tuna

Thunnus albacares

Key Distinguishing Markings:

 Black to dark blue in color with a yellow or silver belly. The dorsal fin, anal fins and finlets are bright yellow.

Size:

 The maximum reported length is 110 inches and the maximum reported weight is 880 lbs. The all-tackle record recognized by the IGFA is 388 lbs. 8 oz.

Distribution:

 The yellowfin tuna is a highly migratory fish. They can be found worldwide with the exception of the Mediterranean Sea.

Food Preference:

- · Primary prey includes fish, cephalopods and crustaceans.
- Fish species consumed by the yellowfin tuna include mahi mahi, pilchard, anchovy, flying fish, mackerel and other tunas, along with squid, octopus, shrimp, lobster, crabs, cuttlefish and more.
- Yellowfin are believed to be sight-oriented predators, as their feeding tends to occur in surface waters during daylight.

Spawning:

 The peak spawning period for yellowfin tuna occurs during summer months; however spawning also occurs throughout the year. Eggs are fertilized externally after mating when they are released into the water.

Fun Facts:

 Larger yellowfin frequently school in association with dolphins, particularly spotted dolphin, spinner dolphin and common dolphin.





Ocean City Fishing Report


It was a hot week in Ocean City, both weather-wise and for those chasing yellowfin tuna and flounder. We also saw increased billfish activity and a few sharks hitting the scales as well.

Yellowfin Tuna

Once again, yellowfin tuna stole the show this past week with several boats returning with double-digit catches.

Early in the week,

Steven Dengler from Middle River, MD, Mike Novak from Kingsville, MD, Michael Shannon from Fallston, MD, Mike Campanella from Glen Arm, MD, Travis Light from Owings Mills, MD and Tyler Potepan from Buxton, MD teamed up to land this 418 lb. thresher shark while fishing on the "Tighten Up" with Capt. Jason Genthner and mate D.J. Churchill. The big shark was caught on a mackerel near "DB" Buoy and weighed at the Ocean City Fishing Center.

yellowfins were caught in the Baltimore Canyon by several boats before the bite moved to the Wilmington Canyon and north on Thursday.

The "Marli" hit the jackpot on Saturday when they boated 23 yellowfins in the Wilmington Canyon. If that wasn't enough, they also released another 7 during the trip.

"That's Right" had a couple of good days, ending up with 13 yellowfins on Thursday and another 12 on Sunday. Thursday's catch was in the South Heyes Canyon and Sunday's was a little closer in the Wilmington.

Also in the Wilmington Canyon on Sunday, the "White Lightning" ended up with 11 yellowfins in the box and anglers captured 13 on the "Marli".

The fish are being caught in very warm water, reaching over 78-degrees in the Wilmington Canyon over the weekend.

Bluefin Tuna

With everyone going after yellowfins, bluefin tuna action has really slowed down. However, those not wanting to burn the fuel heading to the canyons are able to find bluefins around the Hambone, Hot Dog and Chicken Bone.

On Wednesday, the "Restless Lady" ventured out to the Hambone where they boated a bluefin and released 11 others.

On Saturday, Stevie Ramsey on the "Lady Luck V" released the first blue marlin out of Ocean City. The fish was hooked in the Baltimore Canyon at 10:30 am. An hour later, Merrill Dougherty on the "My Turn" released a blue marlin in 100 fathoms in the Baltimore Canyon. Surprisingly, the fish hit a green machine spreader bar.

On Sunday, the crew on the "Out-Rea-Geous" boated a 450 lb. blue marlin that died during the fight. This fish was caught in 70 fathoms in the Wilmington Canyon. The crew donated the meat to the local shelter. Also on Sunday, the "Martin Gale" recorded a blue marlin release in the South Heyes Canyon. The big blue was estimated to weigh 400 lbs. and was caught in 100 fathoms.

A couple of other boats broke off blue marlin earlier in the week.

White Marlin

On Tuesday, the "Marli" released a white marlin while tuna fishing in the Wilmington Canyon and over the long weekend several others were released as well.

On Friday, a private boat released 3 whites in the Baltimore Canyon. The "Nontypical" also released a white marlin deep in the Baltimore Canyon. The "Blue Water Obsession" took a trip to the Wilmington Canyon where they released a white marlin in 50 fathoms.

On Sunday, white marlin were released in the Wilmington Canyon by the "White Lightning",

The fish were mainly hooked on trolled ballyhoo, both naked and skirted.

Dolphin

The largest dolphin of the week was a 26 pounder landed on the "Marli" during that incredible catch on Saturday. Angler Jason Hahn hooked the dolphin in 78-degree water in the Wilmington Canyon. The "Marli" ended up with 5 mahimahi that day.

Other dolphin were caught throughout the week in the Baltimore Canyon and even inshore as far as the Fingers.

Sharks

With warm water temperatures, shark fishing hasn't lived up to expectations so far this year, especially when it comes to thresher sharks. We did see a big 418 pounder caught by anglers on "Tighten Up" the Wednesday. The fish was caught between "DB" and "DA" Buoys, a known hotspot for thresher shark fishing.

Earlier in the week, small make sharks were caught around the Hambone and in the Baltimore Canyon. On Saturday, young Jimmy Murray boated a 155 pounder after hooking it on a mackerel bait at the Fingers.

In the Surf

Sue Foster at Oyster Bay Tackle reports, "Surf fishing has gone from big stripers to catches of kingfish. The only thing big in the surf now is sharks. The kings are biting FishBite Bloodworms, real bloodworms, cut bunker and little pieces of surf clam. Combination baits are great such as FishBites and a little strip of fresh bunker, frozen mullet or box squid. One man came into our Fenwick Tackle store to say he caught six kings one morning on FishBites."

Flounder

After a slow early week,

anglers fishing in the bays behind Ocean City were rewarded with some of the best fishing of the year on Saturday and Sunday. The bite centered on the waters behind Assategue Island, from the opening near the Inlet down to Snug Harbor.

On Saturday, the "Bay Bee" returned with 11 keepers and over 100 throwbacks. They followed that up on Sunday with a 12 keeper day and over 80 throwbacks. The charterboat, "Get Sum" had a 7 flounder day on Sunday, all caught on white and pink Gulp! Swimming Mullets.

The largest flounder we saw this week came in on Saturday when Steve Meadowcroft stopped by the office to get a picture taken. The fish, caught on live spot in the Inlet, measured 25.5-inches and tipped the scales at 7 lbs. 15 oz. Steve was fishing with Tom Hughes and the duo ended up with 6 keepers ranging in size from 18.5 to 25.5-inches.

The flounder catch that surprised me this week was Moe Cropper's 20-incher that he caught while tossing a topwater lure in the Inlet. It just shows you how aggressive these fish can be.

Anglers using live spot, minnows and Gulp! Swimming Mullet artificial baits are doing well. The Swimming Mullet is Gulp's version of the curly tail and has definitely proven itself to be a top producer.

Sea Bass

After waiting for the sea bass season to open in May, it hasn't exactly been a stellar performance so far. Headboats are returning with sporadic catches. Some days the tubs are full, other days not so much.

Most of the sea bass we have seen this year have been caught by anglers using clams for bait.

Cod

Headboats venturing a little further offshore continue

to arrive back at the dock with cod in the box. On Sunday, the "Angler" had a 6 lb. 4 oz. cod along with a 5 pounder in the box. Earlier in the week, Michael Chrzanowski on the "Morning Star" caught himself a 26-incher.

Striped Bass

There is still a good bite going on around the South Jetty for anglers drifting live spot across the point or tossing bucktails into the rocks. From what I've been told, the fish have some beat-up tails, telling you that they are in tight to the rocks.


Anglers are also able to pull a few fish from around the pilings of the Rt. 50 Bridge.







Driftin' Easy

We always write about "what to do" when learning how to do something. But sometimes there are a lot of things "not to do" that are very important, especially when going surf fishing.

DO NOT surf cast on a flat beach. A beach with no holes, sloughs or drop offs can be unproductive. Walk the beach at low tide and look for deeper pools of water close to shore and fish there at high tide. Scan the beach from a higher level such as a condo balcony. Fish always seem to like an area of bottom change. That's where they feed! They eat bait fish and little crabs and clams on drop-offs, ledges and areas of more turbulent water that is slightly deeper than the surrounding waters. A 3-foot hole at low tide can be a 5-foot hole at high tide, deep enough for fish to swim around in.

Sometimes, there is an outer bar then a drop off. Look for a break in the bar, a riptide (an area of rough water) or a backwash (a funnel of dirty water out there amongst the clean dark water). Areas near rock jetties are usually deeper on one

Remember, white breaking water is shallow water. Rolling, cresting waves that have not broken yet is deeper water.

The beach itself can be a telltale sign of structure in the surf. A higher pile of sand cut sharply by the waves indicates a rip has come up to the beach and pulled the sand out to sea. Changes in the sand mean changes in the water close by. Look for sand crabs (mole crabs) digging frantically in the wet sand as the waves come in. That's a sign of natural food out there. The fish will come close to shore at high tide to eat the crabs.

Be careful not to CAST ON THE SAND BAR. Sometimes there is slough with an outer bar. The slough has the deeper water and then there is an outer bar where the water is shallow again. Sometimes the surfcaster thinks he is getting way out there, only be fishing in two feet of water on the bar!

If this is the case, I like to cast out there, then slowly retrieve back in so the rig falls off the bar and back into the deeper water. DO NOT cast too hard. Number one biggest problem with beginners is that they try too hard. I always tell novices to work on the quality of the cast, not the distance - that will come naturally. Put the line on the very end of the index finger, so the line will fall naturally off the finger without even thinking about it when casting. So many people tend to fling the rod but forget to let go of the line. The rod tip whips and the rig flies off! Follow through, just like any sport such as golf or tennis. Walk into it and follow through with the motion. Don't jerk back or stand totally still. Walk into it. Left foot forward, cast and then follow through with the right foot going forward and right arm pointing towards the ocean.

Some people try to wade too far into the ocean to cast. A big wave comes at them and suddenly they are running back to shore! Standing back a little will actually get you more distance because you are not fighting the waves.

DO NOT put too heavy of a line on your reel. The heavier the line, the more resistance you have to the wind and current. The lighter the line, the further you can cast. Use line too heavy and you will cut your casting distance down big time. I can't tell you how many anglers want to use 25 30-pound monofilament on their reels to go surf fishing. My rule of thumb is use anywhere from 14 to 20-pound test when surf fishing with monofilament. If your surf rod is shorter than 10-feet, don't go over 17pound test. If you want a heavier pound test, go to the Spectra Lines such as Power Pro. A 30-pound test Power Pro has an 8-pound test diameter and 50-pound test has a 12 pound test diameter. I use a 20-pound test line that has a 6-pound test diameter on my 9-footer in the summer time. I can cast further and also use less sinker weight. (Smaller diameter line equals

less resistance to the current and the wind).

DO NOT use round sinkers in the surf. Hey, they roll right back in with the waves! Always use some kind of pointy kind of sinkers that dig in. Pyramid or Storm sinkers are the most popular. Frog Tongue sinkers offer less resistance when casting. They are very aerodynamic and cast a further distance. I find I need a little more weight to get them to hold though. There are also Sputnik sinkers with the wires that hold when nothing else will work. Only use them when necessary, but always have them in your tackle box.

DO NOT go surf fishing without a sand spike. No matter how you think you will hold the rod and reel and not get it in the sand it will happen! And of course that is the biggest DO NOT! DO NOT get your reel in the sand and DO NOT wash your reel off in the ocean. If your reel accidently gets totally submerged, put it in a bucket freshwater immediately get it to a fishing reel service center.

DO NOT fish without bait! Little crabs eat your bait all the time when surf fishing. Even if you have surf floats, they still will get to it. Check your baits and check your bait often. When fishing for little fish like kingfish, spot, croaker and snapper blues, try combo baits rather than just one bait. Lots of people do well with Fish Bite bloodworms. But, if you use a piece of Fish Bites and combo it with a little triangle of squid or bunker, you'll catch even more!

DO NOT get in a rut of fishing the same street with the same bait. Holes move and fish can change their tastes. Ask advice at the local tackle stores and they'll steer you in the right direction to the rigs and baits of choice.

A few other DO NOTS? DO NOT fish with your rod and reel in the sand spike without checking your drag. A big fish, ray or shark can pull

it into the ocean! (Happened twice last week that I heard of)! DO NOT leave your bait on the beach. Seagulls will steal it in a heart beat. Keep it in a bucket or a cooler.

The biggest DO NOT? DO NOT put your fingers in the mouth of a saltwater fish like you do in freshwater! Lots of our fish have teeth!!!!

Mahi-Mahi topped with Garlic Shrimp

8 TBSP. butter
2 cloves garlic, minced
4 mahi-mahi fillets
Salt and pepper
1 cup peeled small shrimp
1 cup sliced mushrooms
1 cup Alfredo sauce,
homemade or store
bought
1/2 tsp. fresh dill, minced

Melt the butter in a small saucepan and add the minced garlic.

Simmer over low heat for 10 minutes. The butter should not be browned.

Let cool; cover and refrigerate.

Heat grill or preheat the broiler.

Season the fish with salt and pepper and cook, turning once, 3 to 5 minutes per side.

Set aside and keep warm.

Melt the garlic butter in a small skillet; saute the shrimp and mushrooms. The shrimp will cook quickly and the mushrooms should be soft and absorb the melted butter.

Whisk in the Alfredo sauce and heat through to blend the flavors; add the dill. Plate the fillets and top with the shrimp and mushrooms.
Serves 4.

Corn and Crab Chowder

5 slices bacon 1 TBSP. butter 3/4 cup onion, chopped 1/4 green pepper, chopped 1/2 cup celery, chopped 11/2 tsp. minced garlic 1/4 cup dry white wine 1 tsp. brandy 11/2 tsp. dried basil 1 tsp. pepper 1/4 tsp. cayenne pepper 1/2 tsp. dried thyme leaves 2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce 3 cups corn kernels 4 large potatoes, peeled and diced 1 1/2 quarts chicken stock 1/2 cup butter 1/2 cup flour 3 cups heavy cream 1 cup half and half 1 pound small shrimp, peeled and deveined 1 TBSP. creole seasoning 1 pound fresh crabmeat

Fry bacon until crisp. Drain oil; set aside.

Crumble bacon; set aside. Heat 1 TBSP. of butter in a large pot.

Stir in onion, green pepper, celery and garlic; cook 10 minutes.

Pour in wine and brandy; bring to a simmer.

Season with the basil, pepper, cayenne, thyme and Worcestershire sauce.

Add the corn and potatoes and pour in chicken stock.

Bring to a boil, reduce heat, cover and simmer 10 minutes.

Melt 1/2 cup butter in a small saucepan.

Stir in the flour; cook, stirring constantly until the flour turns slightly brown, about 10 minutes.

Stir the flour mixture into the soup; pour in the heavy cream, half and half, reserved bacon, grease and shrimp.

Cook until the shrimp are no longer translucent, the potatoes are tender and the soup has thickened.

Season with the creole seasoning.

Stir in the crabmeat. Makes 10 cups.

Baked Striped Bass in White Wine

11/2 lbs. striped bass fillets Salt and pepper to taste 2 TBSP. lemon juice 3 TBSP. butter, room temperature 1/2 onion, chopped 1/2 cup white wine 1/4 cup water 1/2 cup mushrooms, chopped 1 TBSP. fresh parsley, chopped 1 tsp. garlic, minced 1/8 tsp. dried marjoram 1/8 tsp. dried thyme 1/8 tsp. cayenne pepper

Season fillets with salt, pepper and 2 tsp. lemon juice.

Lightly grease a baking dish with butter; add the onion and wine and place the fish on top.

Dot with small pats of remaining butter.

Bake at 425 degrees for 12 to 15 minutes, basting once or twice with pan juices.

While fish is baking, combine remaining lemon juice, water, mushrooms, parsley,









Delaware Fishing Report

by Rick Willman



Hi folks!!! Back bay fishing seems to be a bit slow right now and I am not sure what the reason is. It could be the huge difference in water temperature between incoming and outgoing tides. Maybe once the temperature stabilizes, the feeding habits will get back to normal.

A few folks are still having some success chasing the flatties. One angler stopped in the shop and said that he had two 20-inch flounder and three throwbacks near the Indian River Inlet Bridge. John Loudon scored a 3 lb. 2 oz. flattie and Gus Myers caught 2 flounder, weighing 3 lb. 5 oz. and 3 lb. 10 oz., on back-toback days. Taylor Madison Straub, of Robisonia, PA showed everyone how it's done when she scored a 6 lb. 10





C.C. Lee and Tony Burr, both from Newark, DE ended their day with yellowfin tuna, a 157.6 lb. bigeye tuna and a 23.1 lb. dolphin in the box. All of the fish were caught while trolling ballyhoo in the Wilmington Canyon with the heaviest yellowfin tipping the scales at 90.6 lbs. Weighed at Hook'em & Cook'em.

oz. flattie using a Gulp! minnow.

Striper fishing in the Indian River Inlet is still strong and a live eel or white bucktails with a white worm are working well. Debbie Hannum fished from the rails to land an 18 pounder that measured 38 inches and Donn Uhlhorn took a 19 lb. 9 oz. striper from the Outer Wall while spearfishing.

Offshore fishing is keeping a good pace and I sure hope it is a sign of the season. Bluefin, yellowfin and dolphin are all providing action to those taking the long ride.

Capt. Bill from Bill's Sport Shop told us that Colin McCann of West Bay Park caught a 23.5-inch, 4.17 lb. flounder at Massey's Ditch on a black bucktail with pink Gulp!. Bill Jr., Ellen White, Capt. Bill Baker and his grandson, Joey Neely went to Massey's Canyon and boated 8 bluefish and 2 false albacore. Cody Shirk of Grantville, PA fished the south side of the Indian River Inlet, using Calcutta Flash foils, and came away with 16.55 lb. 37-inch striper. Captain Michael

Davidson on the "G Force" went to the Washington Canyon and kept a 190 lb. mako and an 85 lb. bluefin tuna and also released a hammerhead shark.

From Hook'em & Cook'em at the Indian River Marina, Deanna reports that through the week the temperatures heated up and so did the tuna bite offshore in the Wilmington and Baltimore Canyons. Boats are coming back with good catches of yellowfin tuna. The "Reel Passion" went out to the Baltimore Canyon returned with 8 yellowfins and 2 dolphin caught on ballyhoo. Jim Semerteen of Dagsboro, DE caught a 17.3 lb. mahi while fishing out at the 40 Fathom Line.

Our first bigeye tuna were brought to us from the boys on the "Stress Reel-lief". Don Wingate, Brant Hart and Fred Winward, of Roxanna, DE caught their two eyeballs out in the Wilmington Canyon. One was hooked on a cedar plug and the other on a ballyhoo. They weighed in at 137 and 150 lbs.

On Friday, our heaviest yellowfin of the season was brought to us by Tony Burr on the Liquid Handler. Tony and C.C. Lee went to the Wilmington Canyon where they hooked a 90.6 lb. yellowfin, a 157.6 lb. bigeye tuna and a 23.1 lb. mahi.

The inshore bite is picking up with more black sea bass and some flounder showing up. The head boat "Judy V." has been running 4 hour trips out to Site 10 and 11 as well as fishing open bottom and have had some luck with the flatties.

Some reports have been coming in about the Old Grounds producing some nice keeper flounder also.

The Indian River Inlet is still bringing us some nice keeper rockfish from anglers fishing with eels or spot. Some have been caught on bucktails, but live baits have produced most of the keeper sized fish.

Flounder are starting to come in from the Inlet as well. These fish are running anywhere from 18 to 23-inches. One angler caught a 7.8 lb flounder while drifting in the Inlet on Friday.

Bluefish are also being caught in the Inlet by anglers throwing almost anything.

The surf is still the best place to catch a tan and a nap, although you might get lucky enough to see some small kingfish and blowfish.

Ioe Morris at Lewes Harbour Marina said flounder action this past week showed promise for a fine summer of fluking. The Old Grounds between "DB" and "DA" Buoys yielded good numbers of keepers on days with favorable drift conditions. Anglers working 3 and 4 oz. bucktails tipped with strips of squid, shark, skate, bluefish, mackerel or bunker did well. On Thursday, flukers aboard the "Grizzly" put 9 keepers in the box, seven of which were over 22 inches, and released 32 more. The "Grizzly" group on Friday ended up with 6 keepers and 47 throwbacks.

Flounder catches are shaping up in the Delaware

Bay as well. Flatties were pulled from Reef Sites 5, 6, 7 and 8. Dennis McCoy checked in a 5.13 pounder he caught Thursday at Site 5 on the "Katy Did". Dennis and friends had 5 keepers out of 34 that trip.

Bay fishermen also reported decent numbers of kingfish and blowfish, along with the first few croakers from the Coral Beds and Broadkill Slough. Bits of bloodworm or clam on small hooks will result in hookups with these tasty panfish.

Flounder continued to come from Lewes Canal, although the amount of legal sized fish has dwindled. Brad Pecoraro weighed in a 4.93 lb. flattie he fooled with a white Gulp! in the Broadkill River.

A few black drum were caught during the week on the Coral Beds. Some boaters told of seeing large schools of drum spawning on the surface this week, and usually, after that happens, the boomers make their exit.

Stripers have been active in the evening and at night around the Ice Breakers and Outer Wall. Anglers casting bucktails, Storm Shads and Bomber plugs caught bass that ranged from 20 inches to 20 pounds. Evan Falgowski was surprised when he hooked and released two large drum while using Stretch plugs for rockfish at the Breakers. Many striper fishermen are looking forward the slot size season beginning July 1, which allows anglers to retain two striped bass from 20 to 26 inches per day from the Delaware Bay

and its tributaries.

Boats trolling the Five Fathom Bank got into small bluefish. Bob Wilson and his buddies on the "AJ" had their limit of 40 snappers there while pulling Clark spoons.

Tuna fishing is holding up offshore. Yellowfins were taken by trollers in the Baltimore and Wilmington Canyons. Alan Steele and the crew of "Big Herring" brought in four yellowfins in the 40 lb. class and 3 gaffer dolphin from a trolling excursion to 400 fathoms off South Heyes Canyon.


Some big blue marlin were released this week by boats in the Baltimore. Darryl Boyer and his crew had a great trip to the tip of the Baltimore on Saturday. They put a gaffer mahi in the box, released three white marlin, and got spooled after quite a show from a very large blue marlin. The fish were hooked on ballyhoo and Iland lures.

Bluefin tuna were found on the Hambone and Chicken Bone

Sharking is still going on. The boys on the "Tighten Up" boated a 418 lb. thresher between "DB" and "DA" Buoys. Captain Tom Smith put Herb Guest and the guys aboard "Port-A-Bella" on makos of 120 and 148 pounds during two days of drifting the Elephant Trunk.







WEATHER INFORMATION FOR YOUR BOATING AND FISHING PLEASURE

Ever since the VHF radio introduced us to weather information via their dedicated weather channels, boaters have been depending on up-to-date weather data to avoid storms and their accompanying high seas, rough winds and possible lightning. As good as the VHF reports are, we've hoped for more, especially sea surface temperature.

We know that fish follow warm water pockets thermoclines. The difficulty has always been in locating them. For years, boaters have had access to that information in a variety of ways. We had the sea surface temperature gauge that was a separate unit you could purchase and install like your depth

sounder. More recently, the depth sounders have used tri-ducers that include depth, speed and sea surface temperature all in one sensor. The problem with both of these is that they only read the area right under your boat at the time you are there. They are not predictive and they cannot forecast where warm water will be over a few days nor direct you to the location of warm water.

For while, commercial vessels have employed the use of weather fax machines to get reports of storms, water temperature, wind speed, direction that were available on paper graph units. You had to be within range of one of the stations that offered this data and you could only get updates on a scheduled basis that was not too frequent. One of the biggest problems with them was size and their power consumption. They were

designed to be used indoors in a dry environment and they were pretty expensive.

Of course, you could sign up to receive one of the available fishing reports offered by subscription for the appropriate fee. That tended to get cost prohibitive for the average boater.

Today, the boater has a new method of getting weather data that is reasonably priced. It is the XM WX Satellite Weather module. From weather radar images and wind information to sea surface temperature and more, XM WX delivers accurate and timely meteorological and sea state data on a 24 hour basis.

The information is processed and provided by the WxWorx division of Baron Services. WxWorx collects data from several sources such as the Department of Defense, National Weather Service and various commercial providers. processes the data, verifies it and packages it for distribution over XM satellite receivers. XM's satellite network consists of satellites multiple geostationary orbit around the earth, continuously transmitting a unique S-Band signal that even very intense storms cannot impede.

In order to receive weather satellite data on your boat, you will need the following:

An XM WX-capable 1. receiver. Several marine manufacturers offer them such as Furuno, Raymarine, Simrad/Navico, Garmin, Lowrance, Humminbird and

others. 2. An XM-capable antenna

- (We talked about those in last week's article on satellite radio. You can use one antenna for both items).
- A compatible display device. The above manufacturers also offer those. If you have one of their video chart plotter units, all you have to do is add the weather receiver module and the antenna
- 4. A subscription to XM WX Satellite Weather Service.

Sirius/XM WX offers several packages but the most frequently selected package is \$29.99 a month. They will let you subscribe to seasonal packages and may offer a reduced rate if you already subscribe to XM radio. If you already have a plotter system and XM satellite radio, it is definitely worth checking into because you can add weather with relatively little

Here is a list of just some of the data you may receive: weather warnings, surface observations, radar coverage, radar summary, Nexrad radar and high resolution radar, precipitation type, surface analysis weather maps, marine zone forecasts, sea surface temperature, wave heights, buoy data, surface pressure, wave period and direction, surface wind speed and direction, etc.



Chum Lines

Now that the fishing season is cranked up there's certainly more than just a little fishing talk going on which means that everyone's yacking about what's biting, where, how their fishing day went, this and that about boats, tackle and baits and just about everything else one can imagine that's related to fishing.

Whether they're chatting on the dock, over the radio or from a barstool, eavesdropping on conversations between fishermen can be an interesting and sometimes comical way to learn a little about what's happening out on the water. But for those who aren't accustomed to hearing fishermen talk, a lot of the words and phrases used in their conversations probably sound so foreign that one might think they're listening to someone speak in some kind of secret code.

Coded conversations between fishermen are not unheard of, but confused listeners need only brush up on their "fish'n lingo" to understand what's actually being said. With that in mind, I submit the following definitions for a list of a few words and phrases that might confuse those lacking a formal education in "fishing vocabulary."

Slick – a patch of water that has been made smooth or glassy because of fish oil that has risen to the surface. Natural slicks are made when baitfish are chopped up by predator fish feeding on them. Anglers make slicks when they put oily chum in the water to attract fish to their baits. Slicks are also known to appear beside boats that have someone aboard who is seasick and had a greasy breakfast.

Lit-Up – Many fish have the ability to change the intensity of their colors with their mood. When anglers describe a fish as being "lit-up" they are typically referring to a billfish that is so excited about chasing and catching a trolled bait that all of its colors intensify to the point where it looks as though it's actually glowing underwater. Anglers are also known to get lit-up, but that's usually after a few too many drinks at the bar.

Looker – A billfish that swims behind a boat and looks at, but does not eat any of the trolled baits. A looker is also known as a "window shopper." This should not be confused with a "real looker" which has nothing to do with whether she's window shopping or not.

Natural – A word used to describe a "real" rather than an artificial bait. Natural baits are almost always dead and rigged to troll behind the boat. Examples of natural trolling baits would be ballyhoo, mullet, squid, eels and mackerel.

Naked Bait – A natural bait rigged to troll without a skirt or any other artificial attractor.

Skirt - A flashy artificial attractor rigged over a naked trolling bait to make it more attractive to the fish. Also, a flashy, artificial rigged over an otherwise naked woman to make herself more attractive to

Hoo - Short for ballyhoo, a popular baitfish used for offshore trolling.

Spread – The entire array of baits and lures trolled behind a boat at one time.

Covered-Up – To be "covered-up" means that all the lines an angler has out (usually six or more) are hit by fish at the same time. This usually happens when anglers troll over an entire school of hungry fish.

Chinese Fire Drill – What happens when anglers get covered-up.

Bailing – When anglers encounter a school of dolphin (fish), usually under floating debris, and cast bait to them from a drifting boat. "Bailer" refers to a small dolphin caught while bailing.

WWB – Stands for "way-way-back" and refers to trolling baits that are let out much farther than normal. Apparently fish also use the same abbreviation but in their case it refers to "we-won't-bite."

LTH – Stands for "long troll home" and refers to a tactic often used close to the end of the day when anglers aren't quite ready to quit fishing, but know that they should start heading home. Here anglers will start trolling on a homeward course an hour or so before the end of the day so they can put a few extra miles behind them before they actually bring in their lines and start running hard. This action is also

called "CBT" for "charter boat troll."

Slob – No, no, no! This term does not describe the fishermen (most of us anyway), it's used in reference to an exceptionally large mako, blue marlin or bluefin tuna.

Across The Board – Means that a fishing team has paid not only the general tournament registration fee, but all the added entry levels as well. In most tournaments, in order for a team to qualify to win the "big bucks" they typically have to be "across the board."

Don't ever ask a seasoned angler how their day went and expect to get a "good, fair, or poor" type of answer. Instead, count on hearing something like: There was "not much to it" – Meaning "poor" or "we caught some fish but the action was slow." Or "We had a pick" – meaning, "fair to good" or "the action wasn't nonstop, but it was consistent throughout the day."

Finally, folks should know that if they hear someone say that they killed'em, crushed'em, mugged'em, slammed'em, womped'em, stomped'em, hammered'em or murdered'em, there's no need to to call 911 – it's just that they just had an excellent day of fishing.





Virginia Fishing Report

Dr. Julie Ball I.G.F.A Representative



The weather is warm and the fish are here, so it's time to bait up and hit the water. The flounder scene finally picked up last week, so many anglers are anxious to try their luck.

Drifters found consistent catches of flatfish last week around the islands of the Bay Bridge Tunnel, Buoy 36A, out of Oyster and along lower Bay channel edges. Strip baits paired with minnows or Berkley Gulps are the top bait choices. Captain Steve Wray, skipper of the "Ocean Pearl" out of Lynnhaven Inlet, put his crew on a mess of nice flounder, ranging up to around 8-pounds while drifting near the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th Islands last week. Anglers working lower Bay structures in deeper water with live bait or jigging are enticing the most doormats. Several flatfish weighing over 7pounds were fooled by anglers targeting these areas. Eugene Kessler of Virginia Beach found some exceptional takers using live spot along the pilings near the 4th Island. Lynnhaven and Rudee Inlets are also still giving up above average numbers of keeper flatfish, especially on an outgoing tide.

Cobia are showing a little more activity, but the best is still yet to come. Both chummers and sightcasters are picking up a few takers, with most weighing in the

40 to 50-pound range. Most boats using the chumming technique are sitting near the Buckroe area off Hampton. Sightcasters are having the best success cruising the lower Bay areas. Some

interesting reports are indicating a flurry of juvenile cobia catches coming from within Lynnhaven Inlet and Long Creek last week.

The drum bite is still good, as big reds continue to hit along the shoals and in the surf near Fisherman's Island, as well as the Nine-foot Shoals and Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel (CBBT) area. Large schools of bull reds are still roaming off the coastline for those looking for good casting opportunities. The black drum action on the Eastern Shore has fizzled, shifting now to the islands of the CBBT, which is common for this time of year.

Spadefish are attracting attention as usual, but anglers are not getting a lot of bites. Spadefish are showing up on lower Bay structures, inshore wrecks and around the Chesapeake Light Tower. A few fish have been hooked, with most weighing around 4 to 5-pounds. A report of noisy maintenance on the Light Tower is creating a

ruckus lately, and anglers are concerned this disturbance could dissuade the spade's appetites. Divers who are spearfishing are also adding to the commotion around the Tower. Sheepshead sightings around lower Bay structures and the CBBT are motivating anglers, but this action is still a bit slow.

Rockfish are still available, but interest is fading. Livebaiting over the tubes and near the rocks of the CBBT artificial islands is working and some fish are still responding to topwater lures along the spines of the islands at first light.

Tailor and snapper bluefish and croaker are available all over the lower Bay, as well as inside Rudee and Lynnhaven Inlets. The Fishing Center reports that Spanish mackerel are showing along the oceanfront, sporadic catches are still occurring for trollers in the lower Bay. Speckled trout anglers are keeping quiet (imagine that), but several nice fish are coming from Mobjack Bay and the Poquoson Flats, where some fish are pushing to over 28-inches. An exceptional run of sea mullet all over the lower Bay area is keeping bottom bouncers and pier anglers happy, with many fish hitting almost a pound.

Deep dropping boats are finding good numbers of black-bellied rose fish and some nice blueline tilefish. Scattered golden tilefish, grouper and wreckfish are also in these same areas. Boats targeting sea bass are finding some nice fish on a few offshore wrecks, and as a bycatch while deep dropping.


Offshore, warm continues to push within range for Virginia boaters where trollers are hooking into some nice yellowfin tuna and gaffer dolphin. A few mako sharks have also made it back to the docks and billfish sightings are on the rise, with a few bluefins encountered this week. Carolina waters are still yielding good yellowfin tuna catches, nice gaffer dolphin, scattered big eyes, and a rising number of billfish. For more information, go to www.drjball.com.

States schedule hearings on draft omnibus amendment for spot, spotted sea trout and Spanish mackerel

Maryland and Virginia have scheduled their hearings to gather public comment on the Draft Omnibus Amendment for Spot, Spotted Sea Trout and Spanish Mackerel. The dates, times, and locations of the scheduled meetings follow:

In March, the Commission's South Atlantic State-Federal Fisheries Management Board voted to take the next step in updating the management plans (FMPs) for three important South Atlantic species -- spot, spotted sea trout, and Spanish mackerel. With a combined coastwide commercial catch of 12.6 million pounds and a recreational harvest of 14.3 million fish, the three species represent a large draw for all fishermen.

The three FMPs had been adopted prior to passage of the Atlantic Coastal Fisheries Cooperative Management Act and adoption of the Interstate Fisheries Management Program Charter in 1995. The Board has been working since August 2009 to develop this amendment and update the plans in order to provide for more efficient and effective management.

The Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission was formed by the 15 Atlantic coastal states in 1942 for the promotion and protection of coastal fishery resources. The Commission serves as a deliberative body of the Atlantic coastal states, coordinating the conservation and management of nearshore fishery resources, including marine, shell and anadromous species.

Spanish mackerel is jointly managed by both Commission and the South Atlantic Fishery Management Council. Due to data limitations, the most recent stock assessment not successful establishing specific values for reference points. The original interstate FMP included a process to review and maintain federal consistency with management, which is essential maintaining conservation measures. Over the years, however, both federal and state regulations have changed, while the interstate FMP has unchanged. remained address this consistency issue, the Draft Omnibus Amendment currently includes both adaptive management measures as well as a process for Board review and action in response to changes in the regulations, which will allow for greater uniformity across the jurisdictions. Currently, the federal FMP has a proposed Amendment 18, which is scheduled for a final vote by the South Atlantic Fishery Management Council at its June meeting. The proposed Amendment 18 changes are included in the current Draft Omnibus Amendment public comment.

The original Spot and the Sea Trout FMPs included no requirements for either management monitoring. The current Draft Omnibus Amendment includes a management trigger for spot, which will help the Board in monitoring the status of the stock until a full coastwide stock assessment can be completed. High levels of spot bycatch challenge present a managers, in terms of both yearly management and overall assessment of the stock health. For spotted sea trout, the Draft Omnibus Amendment includes protect measures to spawning stock as well as a coastwide minimum size. These measures will be essential as increased coastal development management challenges to this very localized species. Coupled with adaptive management measures, the Draft Omnibus Amendment will provide options for both species to efficiently implement management measures should the Board determine that such measures are needed in the future.

Fishermen and other interested groups encouraged to provide input on the Draft Omnibus Amendment either by attending public hearings or providing written comments. Angler catches VA state record snowy grouper




Roger Burnley of Virginia Beach, VA has established a new state record for snowy grouper with a 70-pound, 7-ounce fish caught May 22, 2011. The record fish was weighed and certified on an Ohaus digital scale at the office of the Virginia Saltwater Fishing Tournament, located in Newport News. The digital scale registered 70.48 pounds but the weight was converted and listed as 70 pounds and 7ounces as the state record. The record-setting grouper bested the existing state record, set by Jere Humphrey of Norfolk, Virginia, on August 17, 2008, by nearly 2-1/2 pounds. Burnley is filing an application with the International Game Fish Association (IGFA) acceptance of his catch as the IGFA All-Tackle Record for snowy grouper. Humphrey's 68-pound snowy grouper currently holds the IGFA All-Tackle Record.

Burnley caught his grouper "deep-dropping" near Norfolk Canyon in 98 fathoms of water while fishing aboard the private boat Healthy Grin, skippered by Ken Neill, III, of Seaford. The fish had a length of 48 inches and a girth of 37 inches. The record fish was caught on a Shimano Trevala rod, mated with a Daiwa Saltist LD40 reel and spooled with 70pound test Daiwa Saltiga Boat braided line. The record-setting grouper hit a custom made two hook bottom rig baited with squid and cut fish.







But hands down, Ocean City is off to a blazing start for the summer season, making it the place to be if you are an avid fishermen. While low salinities the Chesapeake have confounded some fishermen and high flows from storm events have made mountain streams and river fishing a challenge, inshore and offshore, Ocean City continues to dazzle. Offshore, vellowfin tuna numbers are excellent along with solid action for bluefin. Shark fishing is at peak in terms of diversity, with threshers, makos, blues, sandbars and hammerheads all turning up at popular locations like the Fingers, Hambone, Hot Dog and the Sausages.

Sharks Take Center Stage

The 31st Annual Ocean City Shark Tournament starts this weekend at the Ocean City Fishing Center. Captain Mark Sampson is the master of ceremonies, and does a great job interacting with the dockside audience. In addition to being one of the most knowledgeable shark fishermen in North America (some would argue the most knowledgeable), Mark has been an innovator of techniques throughout his career and has championed conservation ethics to minimize the mortality of sharks through promotion of catch & release, use of non-offset circle hooks and proper boatside handling. Mark sits on the National Marine Fisheries Service's Highly Migratory Species Advisory Board, and his contributions affect national policy of the conservation of sharks. So be sure to stop down to the OC Fishing Center to see the weigh ins, and meet Mark. We are indeed lucky to have him as part of our community of knowledgeable and talented captains.

Cod Continue

A couple of weeks back, I

visionary captain in the Ocean City community has stepped forward to help biologists and managers with Federal and State agencies to get a better handle on what appears to be an unusual event. Captain Monty Hawkins on the "Morning Star" has been tagging cod and working cooperatively with scientists from Massachusetts and NOAA to document this late occurrence of Atlantic cod off the Delmarva coast. Monty often donates his time and his own money to tag, film and document information on a variety of species from black sea bass and tautog to tilefish and now Atlantic cod. His passion for habitat enhancement and preservation is unparalleled in the mid-Atlantic region. Over the past two weeks, cod tagged and released from the "Morning Star" have been recaptured, some moving to artificial reefs off Cape May and Atlantic City. Cod have been documented off the Maryland coast in the past, but typically during the winter months. Is their presence in early June an anomaly, or is it a function of cold inshore water temperatures, food availability or habitat? Or some combination of these? With the help of Monty Hawkins and others that want to advance our understanding of fish behavioral ecology, we may know more soon. In the meantime, as long as our fishermen are catching cod off the Maryland coast, please be reminded there is a minimum size of 22" and a creel limit of 10 cod per person, per day, for private boats. Party boats have a 22" minimum size and no creel

A Footnote on Spotted Sea Trout

Last week we answered a

question regarding the status of sea trout. On Friday, June 24th there will be a public meeting held by the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission (ASMFC) at the Tawes State Office Building in Annapolis, MD at 6:00 pm to address recommended changes to the interstate fisheries management plans (FMPs) for spot, Spanish mackerel and spotted sea trout. For spotted sea trout, the FMP recommends a 12" minimum size limit with comparable mesh size regulations in directed commercial fisheries. This size limit corresponds to the length at which data indicated 50% of spotted sea trout females reach sexual maturity. development of the Omnibus Amendment does necessarily mean that additional management measures will be put in place to regulate the harvest of Spanish mackerel, spot, and spotted sea trout; however, **ASMFC** the Management Board will consider a suite of measures that could be implemented through adaptive management should it become necessary.

What a Difference a Year Makes

Maryland's regulations for summer flounder last year, with a minimum size of 19- inches, resulted in a common theme of catches of undersize fish and frustrated anglers. Management measures allowed for a 1-inch reduction in minimum size for 2011. This year's regulations allow for anglers to keep up to 3 flounder per person per day at a minimum size of 18 inches. So far, we've heard of many more keeper fish, and several exemplary catches. This morning I had the pleasure of speaking to Barbara Skelley Manchester, MD. Barbara was fishing near Harbour Island last week when she landed a 24" flounder weighing in at 5 pounds, 3 ounces. Her fish was checked in at Ake Marine, one of over 90 award centers located across the State of Maryland. Barbara's fish qualified her to be eligible for the thousands of dollars in prizes that will be given away to qualifying anglers in DNR's 7th Annual Maryland




