winter edition of Coastal Fisherman. In our last weekly issue in September, I wished you "light winds," among other things, but I must have jinxed us all, because that certainly hasn't been the case. We've had another fall and early winter of wind, wind and more wind, including some serious northeasters that have devastated the beaches from Delaware to North Carolina. Fishing during that time period has been hit and miss. We had a continued good white marlin bite in late September into October, and there were tuna offshore all the way into November, but very few anglers were chasing them. In their infinite wisdom, the feds saw fit to close the sea bass season just as the fall fishing was cranking up. This action, coupled with flounder closure the

Maryland, gave ocean bottom fishermen very little reason to even go out. Inshore, the speckled trout season was practically nonexistent, and after years of chasing specks, it is still a mystery to me why they are here some years and gone the next. At least I still have all those new lures I bought in anticipation of this year's season, not to mention a rod and reel or two. The fall red drum season was fairly productive, although one of those northeasters came right in the height of it and certainly didn't help matters. Good numbers of large reds were caught by anglers fishing the inshore shoals in boats, but for some reason (probably the abundance of food on the shoals) not too many of these fish came into the surf. Along the Virginia barrier islands, there were a lot of puppy drum and "yearlings" in

the 30-inch class, but not a lot of larger fish, at least in my experience. Oddly enough, there were at least two puppy drum caught the last week of November and the first week of December on Assateague. More proof that you never know what might happen if you have bait in the water. Even though we had a lot of wind, temperatures have been relatively mild, and water temps remained in the mid-50s into early December, so we had a striper season where the fish kind of "trickled down", though I think quite a few fish got by us in the bad northeaster in mid-November. There were still a lot of bunker in the ocean in early December, however, which meant that both stripers and big bluefish hung around. Even though a lot of striper anglers weren't too happy about it, this was probably one of the best seasons in recent memory for the big bluefish, both just off the beach and in the surf (good news for folks selling 9-inch plastic shad bodies). These slammers were big, too. I heard of at least one 39-incher from Assateague, and I caught a few

myself that would have probably topped the 15-pound mark. Anyway, as this is being written in early December, there are still blues and stripers around, but there is yet another "coastal low" coming up the beach...

I am sad to note the passing of yet another member of the local fishing community, as Capt. Walter Austin left us in November. Walt ran his charter boat, the "Arno", out of Talbot St. Pier for many years. He was a friendly, low key kind of guy, a true gentleman in every sense of the word, and he will be missed. Walt loved bottom fishing, especially the offshore winter fishery for sea bass and tautog, so here's hoping that wherever he is, the seas are calm, the sea bass are big, fat "knotheads", and there aren't any seasons or limits...

In this winter issue I often write about "what worked for me" in the fall season, but I have to be honest and admit that I had such a slow fall that there

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# 2009 Season in Review

It was an interesting 2009 season with 6 Maryland state records set and a couple of closures by our government friends that really threw things for a loop.

Following is a summary of the action we saw in each issue of the Coastal Fisherman this year.

May 6, 2009 - Capt. Kane Bounds graced the first cover of the year with a 19 lb. 8 oz. tautog caught in mid-March on an ocean wreck... The winter sea bass bite was excellent, with a few knotheads caught over 6 lbs... Paul Twilley caught a 7 lb. 5 oz. sea bass in the Wilmington Canyon... The Bow Mariner wreck produced a 7 lb. sea bass caught by Noah Fowler... Dean Lo caught a 6 lb. sea bass in the Wilmington Canyon... Scott "Eddie Munster" Hoffman released a striped bass on New Year's Day while trolling at Great



Through mid-December, larger fish were caught in the bay than by anglers fishing in the ocean. In early November, Dana Nelson of West Ocean City, MD boated this 45.5-inch, 37 lb. striper while fishing on the "Cup Cutter" with Mark Longanecker. The striper hit a live eel in the Thorofare and was weighed at Sunset Provisions.

Gull Shoal that was estimated at 50 lbs... The first flounder of the season was caught by Bo Smeltzer on the south side of the Assateague Bridge... In Ocean City, the early flounder bite was

best in the bay behind Assateague Island... Flounder started appearing in the Delaware Bay with a good bite around Brown Shoal and in the Lewes Canal... Tautog were biting around the Outer Wall in the Delaware Bay... Other notable catches... Ken Yuen's 6 lb. 3 oz. sea bass caught in February on an ocean wreck.

May 13, 2009 - Bob Houser captured a 6 lb. 1 oz. sea bass in 54-degree water on an ocean wreck... Mike Whiter caught a 17 tautog on an ocean wreck...The striped bass bite turned on off Assateague Island with several fish beached that measured over 40-inches... Ronnie Rueter caught a 49-inch striper off the beach at Fenwick State Park... The flounder bite was very good in the bay behind Assateague Island and around the Rt. 90 Bridge... In Delaware...

The best sea bass bite was around Site #11... Good flounder action in the Rehoboth Bay and the Lewes Canal... The black drum bite in the Delaware Bay turned on around the full moon at the Pin Top, Tussey's Slough and the Horseshoe on the Jersey side of the bay... Other notable catches... Johnny Coffiey's 13 lb. 13 oz. tautog caught at Site #11...Allen Sklar's 44-inch striper caught off Assateague Island.

May 20, 2009 - Donald Hatfield was on the cover with a 52-inch, 45.5 lb. striper caught while surfcasting Assateague... Several other large stripers, over 40-inches, were caught off Assateague as well... The first weakfish of the year was caught in the bay behind the Ocean City Airport... Headboats returned with good catches of sea bass and tautog from Russell's Reef, the African Queen and the subway cars at the Jackspot... Mike Whiter boated a pair of 16 lb. tog on an ocean wreck... The best flounder bite continued to be in the bay behind Assateague Island... In Delaware, striper action was good at night in the Indian River Inlet... Black drum fishing was excellent in the Delaware Bay, especially at Broadkill Slough... Other notable catches... Derek Bair's 46-inch striper caught in the Indian River Inlet.

May 27, 2009 -The "Nontypical" crew made the cover for the first make of the 2009 season. Jim Hughes landed the 185 pounder in the Baltimore Canyon... "Restless Lady" found warm water ouside the Poor Man's Canyon and caught 27 dolphin... Tom Vaughn caught an 18 lb. 4 oz. tautog near the Bass Grounds... The bay behind Assateague and the Thorofare both produced good catches of flounder... In Delaware... Flounder fishing was good in the back bays, the Lewes Canal and

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the Broadkill River... Striper fishing was very good in the surf and in the Indian River Inlet... Bill Hocker won the Lewes Canal Flounder Tournament with a 5 .26 pounder... the first weakfish of the season were caught along Broadkill Beach on Bass Assassins... The black drum bite was very good on the Coral Beds... Other notable catches... First dolphin of the year caught by Chuck Dammann on May 21st... John Rogowitz's 48.5-inch striper caught off Assateague Island.

June 3, 2009 - Mike Weber was on the cover with a 350 lb. thresher shark caught at the Fingers... Threshers were caught around "DB" Buoy and at the Fingers... Makos were caught at the Sausages, the Marine Electric and near the Jackspot... Excellent week for flounder fishing with the best bite behind the OC Airport... Great striper bite around the South Jetty and off the beach on Assateague Island... J.D. Eddy landed a 47.95 lb. snowy grouper between the Baltimore and Poorman's Canyon... In Delaware... stripers and shad were plentiful in the Indian River Inlet... Flounder

action in the Lewes Canal was very good... Notable catches... Anthony Lano landed an 82.3 lb. black drum at the Coral Beds... Troy Schifflett caught a 13 lb. 13 oz. bluefish at the 12 Fathom Lump.

June 10, 2009 - For the second week in a row, the "Nontypical" crew graced the cover, this time by winning the Mako Mania Shark Tournament with a 224.4 lb. mako shark caught in 25 fathoms inside the Washington Canyon... Excellent week of shark fishing highlighted with over 200 caught by 46 boats in the Mako Mania... Good striper bite around the South Jetty during the early morning hours and at night... It was a good week for sea bass fishing on ocean wrecks with several caught over 5 lbs... In Delaware... Fantastic striped bass fishing in the Indian River Inlet... Thresher sharks were caught in good numbers around "DA" and "DB" Buoys... Other notable catches... Ethan Spencer landed a 443.3 lb. thresher shark near the Jackspot... J.R. Pequignot caught an 81 lb. bluefin near the Parking Lot.

**June 17, 2009** - The cover featured the first white marlin

and blue marlin of the season along with a good yellowfin tuna catch on the "Marli"... Terry Layton on the "Nontypical" released the first white marlin in 1,200 fathoms outside the Poorman's Canyon... Jake Burger released the first blue marlin while fishing on the "Marlin Magic" only a mile from the "Nontypical"... the "Marli" returned with 17 yellowfin tuna (releasing 37) during a trip to the Norfolk Canyon... Bluefins were caught around the Hambone... "Game Over" landed a 506 lb. thresher shark, "Bill\$ 4 Bills" hooked a 443 pounder and "Teaser" boated a 450 pounder, all at the Fingers... Quite a few makos caught around the Hambone and the Sausages with weights ranging between 90 and 125 lbs... Good flounder bite in the East Channel and on the flats north of the Thorofare... In Delaware... Flounder, stripers and bluefish were caught in the Indian River Inlet, although most of the stripers were too small to keep... Flounder fishing was good in the Lewes Canal, Broadkill River and the Roosevelt Inlet... Other notable catches... Bud Ghigliotty caught a 45-inch Winter 2010 Coastal Fisherman Page 5 striper off the bank of the Broadkill River... Doug Sims caught a 180 lb. mako at the Hambone.

**June 24, 2009** - The big news of the week were the new state record make and thresher sharks caught. Jim Hughes on the "Nontypical" landed an 876 lb. mako shark during the Ocean City Shark Tournament. The fish ate a bonita fillet in 500 fathoms between the Poor Man's and Washington Canyons... The day before, Brent Applegit set a new Maryland state record by catching a 642 lb. thresher shark at the Fingers... Blue sharks continued to be plentiful... The "Reel Chaos" blistered the yellowfin, putting 20 in the box and releasing 45 others, all in the Poor Man's Canyon... Flounder bite moved to the East Channel... The new Assateague Tackle Deadly Double Flounder Rig debuts and becomes an instant hit... Large bluefish were caught around the Rt. 50 Bridge... Good catches of sea bass were made on ocean wrecks and reefs... Surfcasters found mostly sharks and rays and some chopper bluefish... In Delaware... good

isn't much to write about in that regard. I did have a pretty good early season on the small red drum, fish up to a little over 30 inches. I think I caught 15 or so, and one of the things that worked well was something old that is new again, as the saying goes, namely spinner blades. Many years ago I fished a few times with a gentleman named Joe Sparrow, who has been deceased for some time. Joe was from Onancock, VA, and in many ways he was a pioneer in fishing Virginia's Eastern Shore. With his friend Claude Rogers, who was the director of the Virginia Saltwater Sportfishing Tournament for a long time, Joe was the first to fish for cod off Virginia, and he and Claude also discovered the presence of tarpon in the Virginia seaside marshes in the late 50's. Anyway, Joe loved to fish spinner blade hooks, usually straight out of the package on a mono top and bottom rig. They inexpensive mostly bronzed hooks in an octopus style. He would use the same hook, just in different sizes, for

several different species. I think the largest they came in was a 5/0, and that was his "go to" hook for large red drum. For puppy drum he would use about a 2/0 or 3/0, and he "accidentally" caught quite a few big drum on the small rigs while fishing for puppies. I started thinking back about Joe and his spinner blades when another friend of mind told me he had burned small black drum in the surf down in Virginia on spinner blade hooks after he had run out of plain snelled hooks. I started making spinner blade versions of my short-leadered puppy drum rigs, and I was very impressed at how well they worked. Most of mine had 4/0 circle or octopus circle hooks with gold, silver or chartreuse blades and various colored beads. I tied them with 60 or 80 lb. line. With good hooks and high-end blades that won't rust, they are expensive to make, so I don't know if they will ever be available widely on the commercial market, but if you make your own rigs, they are definitely worth trying. Of course, you could do like Joe

and just use spinner blade hooks straight out of the package...

Consider the following random thoughts:

- Many years ago you weren't allowed to keep a striper over 15 lbs. in the state of Maryland. That was later changed to a 32-inch maximum, which is about the same size fish. Now we are encouraged to kill the large breeding females, but on most of the mid-Atlantic coast we can't keep even one small fish in the 18 to 26-inch range to eat.
- When size limits were first put in place for flounder (and I admit I pushed for a limit) we were told that at 12 inches at least 50 per cent of flounder would have a chance to breed. Now the limit is up to 18 and 19 inches or even more, and recreational anglers are facing stricter creel limits and season closures, even in the face of an ever growing flounder population.
- The Atlantic coast recreational catch limit of 250 billfish per year is an arbitrary and capricious number brought

www.coastalfisherman.net about by one gentleman testifying before a federal committee who was asked, "About how many billfish do sport fishermen bring in per year?", and answered something like, "Oh, I don't know, maybe 250." If he had answered 500, would the catch limit be twice as high?

The list of absurdities could go on and on, in the face of which I have come up with the following observations:

- The federal government should get out of fisheries management altogether, at least for recreational anglers, and let the states manage fisheries like they did successfully for many years, without strong arming them with threats of cutting off federal funding.
- Assuming the above, the regional fishery management councils and the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission (ASMFC) should be eliminated. They have failed miserably anyway, and this move would save the American taxpayers a lot of wasted dollars.
  - The Marine Recreational

Fisheries Statistical Survey (MRFSS) should be eliminated. Another complete waste of paper and taxpayers' dollars.

• The Sustainable Fisheries Act portion of the Magnuson-Stevens law should be repealed, thereby eliminating the basis for many of the time consuming and money wasting lawsuits brought by extreme environmental groups who are mainly just trying to justify millions of dollars in donations from individuals and companies with too much money on their hands and no understanding that they are being duped.

Of course, none of this will ever happen. The powers-thatbe, the lawyers and the bureaucrats are too entrenched, and the politicians are too cowardly to admit failure. So look on the bright side—it will be warm again in a few months, and maybe they will even let us catch a fish to bring home to eat...

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



Sea bass were caught around Reef Site #11 and at the Old Grounds near "DB" Buoy... Other notable Michael Branson catches... caught the first bigeye tuna of the season out of Ocean City while fishing in the Washington Canyon... "Hammy IV" returned with a 500 lb. thresher caught at the Fingers.

Juy 1, 2009 - Scott Pringle was on the cover with a 210 lb. bigeye tuna caught while fishing on the "Press Time" in the Washington Canyon... The East Channel was red hot for flounder fishing with several that weighed over 5 lbs... Ocean City's first bigeye of the season was caught on the "Restless Lady" in 250 fathoms outside the Poor Man's Canyon... Bluefin tuna were caught in Massey's Canyon and at the Hambone... Yellowfin were the star of the week with several boats coming back with double digit catches from the Poor Man's and Washington Canyons... Makos were found on ocean structure between 20 and 30 fathoms... Triggerfish showed up in good numbers on ocean wrecks, primarily the China Arrow... In Delaware... Flounder fishing was steady in the Lewes Canal, off the Cape Henlopen Pier and in the Delaware Bay... Stripers were plentiful in the Indian River Inlet... Croakers arrived in the Delaware Bay near the Star Site and the Shears... Other notable catches... The "Marli" hooked 51 yellowfin tuna in 150 fathoms in the Poor Man's Canyon.

July 8, 2009 - Anglers on the "That's Right" were on the cover with 4 yellowfins, 2 dolphin and a blue marlin release, all hooked in the Poor Man's Canyon... Three white marlin were released during Canyon Kick-off... The "Bluefin" caught 10 yellowfins in 70 fathoms inside the Poor Man's Canyon... Bluefins were caught at the Hambone with several fish in excess of 80 lbs. hitting the scales... Two big makos were caught... Dave Guinto landed a 232 pounder at the Fingers... William Marvel boated a 321 pounder in 1,000 fathoms between the Washington and the Norfolk Canyons... William

Wildbergh landed the first wahoo of the season on the southern end of the Poor Man's Canyon... Most of the keeper size flounder were caught in the East Channel, north of the Rt. 50 Bridge... In Delaware... Plenty of flounder were caught in the Indian River Inlet along with some stripers... Delaware Bay reefsites #6, #7 & #8 also produced flounder... Other notable catches... Brad Richwine and Kenny Schoen ventured out to the Fingers in a flat bottom skiff and captured a 389 lb. thresher shark.

July 15, 2009 - The crew on the "That's Right" were on the cover with a 158 lb. bluefin caught at the Chicken Bone that took Heaviest Tuna honors in the Ocean City Tuna Tournament... During the tournament, 20 to 25 bluefins measured 61-64 inches... Yellowfin tuna were scarce... The "Marli" returned with 17 YFT's from 65 fathoms inside the Poor Man's Canyon... Bluefin action centered in the triangle formed by the Chicken Bone, the Hot Dog and the Sausages... Large flounder were decked in the East Channel and on ocean wrecks... In Delaware... Plenty of flounder were caught in the back bays, at Brown Shoal and at Reef Site #10 in the ocean... Sea bass fishing was good at "DB" Buoy... Tautog and triggerfish were caught on Fenwick Shoal... Other notable catches... Matt McGuigan decked a 41 lb. cobia on Winter Quarter Shoal... Tassos Argyros speared a 60 lb. cobia on an ocean wreck.

July 22, 2009 - Junior anglers Taylor McCart, Spencer Cropper and Parker Kreppel were featured on the cover with releases of 2 white marlin and a blue marlin, winning the Billfish Division of the Kid's Classic... Over 380 kids participated in the Marlin Club Kid's Classic... Several bluefins over 60-inches caught around Hambone, Chicken Bone and Lumpy Bottom... Flounder bite moved to behind Bahia Marina... Some white marlin were released between the Baltimore and Wilmington Canyons... A blue marlin was released by Tony Burch in the Poor Man's Canyon... Croaker showed up in mass for anglers drifting in the bay... Bluefish continued to be caught in the surf and by anglers off of the Rt. 50 Bridge... In Delaware... The area between "DA" and "DB" Buoys produced

nice catches of flounder... Jody McCullough landed an 11 lb. 10 oz. doormat near "DB" Buoy... Flounder, weakfish and bluefish were all caught off Bowers Beach... Other notable catches... Tom Moran caught a 65-inch bluefin at the Hambone... Giuseppe Ferrarelli boated a 170 lb. bluefin.

July 29, 2009 - On the cover was Chris Toner who landed a 71 lb. cobia to set a new Maryland state record. The fish was caught in 70-feet of water outside Great Gull Shoal... The "Billfisher" took top honors in the Branch Kreppel Memorial Blue Marlin Tournament with 2 blue marlin and 4 white marlin releases... Over 30 white marlin and 9 blue marlin were released during the week from the Spencer Canyon down to the Rockpile... A couple of mako sharks were caught around the Hot Dog... Dolphin were caught in good numbers in 30 fathoms around the Hot Dog... Bluefins were caught at the Hambone... A couple of fantastic days of fishing produced good catches of yellowfin tuna around the Hot Dog... Striped bass showed up again around the South Jetty and also at night around the Rt. 50 Bridge... In the surf, croakers and bluefish dominated the action... In Delaware... Striped bass fishing in the Indian River Inlet turned on... "DB" Buoy, Reef Site #10 and Brown Shoal all produced some nice catches of flounder... Other notable catches... Wilson Hazzard caught a 75 lb. wahoo in the Baltimore Canyon... Joe Kossek caught a 10 lb. 2 oz. sheepshead at the Ice Breakers... Alex Levantowsky boated a 16 lb. 4 oz. tautog.

Dolphin dominated action at the scales with most ranging between 12 and 15 lbs... Croaker fishing was red hot in the bay, especially behind Assateague Island... Some stripers were caught around the

Rt. 50 Bridge... In Delaware... Back bays were loaded with croaker... Sites #6 and #7 at Brown Shoal and #8 Star Site were hot flounder spots in the Delaware Bay... Other notable catches... Greg Garman landed a 69 lb. wahoo at the Hambone... Taylor Harman released 2 white marlin to win the Junior Angler Division of the Ladies Tournament... 




Snapper bluefish, huge rays and large sharks provided action for surfcasters... In Delaware... Good flounder were caught at the Old Grounds and near Sites #6, #7, #8 and #10... Cobia were caught around Delaware Light... Other notable catches... Joe Sbriglia caught a 66.5 lb. yellowfin tuna in the Poor Man's Canyon... Mickey Payne caught a 10 lb. 9 oz. flounder to win 1st place in the Rick's Bait & Tackle Flounder Tournament.

August 26, 2009 - The crew on the "Toplesss" were featured on the cover for winning the Mid-Atlantic \$500,000 with a 95 lb. white marlin worth over \$653,000 in award money... 36 Ocean City boats released 114 white marlin during the 5-day tournament... Offshore action was very slow, with dolphin dominating the action up and down the line... Donnie Moore on the ""Predator" caught a 69 lb. vellowfin in the Poor Man's Canyon to win 1st place in the MA 500... A few wahoo were caught, highlighted by a 60 pounder landed in the Washington Canyon... Steve Hammond scored an 11 pound flounder in the East Channel... The better flounder bite was definitely in the ocean around the Twin Wrecks, African Queen and the Bass Grounds... Bluefish, kingfish and sharks kept surfcasters busy... In Delaware... Good flounder fishing was at "DB" Buoy, the Old Grounds and Reef Site #10... Sea bass were caught near "DA" Buoy... Snapper blues, croaker, spot and a few spike trout were caught from the beaches... Other notable catches... Daina Kazmaier released a blue marlin in 500 fathoms east of the Poor Man's Canyon... The "Lil' Man" recorded 2 sailfish and 2 white marlin releases Washington Canyon.

The Cape May Marlin & Tuna Club released 118 billfish to win the Challenge Cup with the Ocean City team releasing 89... Most of the action was in the Norfolk Canyon... White marlin were also caught at the Rockpile... The "Recon" boated a 71 lb. wahoo in 50 fathoms between the Poor Man's Canyon and the Hot Dog... Other wahoo were caught at the Hot Dog, the Tea Cup and in the Baltimore "Playmate" Canyon... The returned with 15 yellowfin tuna and some dolphin from the Elephant Trunk... yellowfins were caught at the Tea Cup and the Hot Dog... Tautog and sheepshead were caught at the South Jetty... Good numbers

of sea bass were caught at the Eastern Reef... Great Delaware... Rick Ritter landed a 10 lb. 15 oz. flounder in the Indian River Inlet...Brown Shoal produced good catches of flounder... Anglers anchored at the Star Reef Site picked at a mix of croaker, kingfish, snapper bluefish, small sea bass and triggerfish... Other notable catches... "Pumpin' Hard" released 4 white marlin in the Norfolk Canyon... Capt. Nick Clemente caught an 8 lb. 9 oz. sheepshead at the South Jetty.

#### October - December 2009 -

Weather-wise, it was a horrible fall with 6 or 7 nor'easters keeping most anglers at the dock.

A good white marlin bite kept offshore anglers excited through September. It was difficult to get a bead on the tuna bite with the weather making it tough to get offshore.

Inshore, with the flounder closure on September 13th and no trout bite, most anglers in the bay were forced to search for stripers, sheepshead and tautog. Sheepshead and tog bit around the South Jetty and off Martha's Landing.

Coming off of three straight years of excellent striper fishing inside 3-miles, the bite had not really materialized at the time this issue went to press. On a good note, stripers were still being caught off New Jersey, so local anglers are still hopeful.

At the end of September, the red drum bite was very good around the Mud Hole.

From the end of October through the beginning of December, it was all the bluefish you could catch with choppers showing up both along the beach chasing mullet and roaming the inshore shoals. Choppers, on average, were exceptionally large with many fish hitting the docks weighing over 10 lbs.

Our government friends closed the sea bass fishery on October 5th, causing incredible pressure on tautog until its closure for the month of December.

To end on a high note, congratulations go out to Steve Doctor for landing a 62 lb. great northern tilefish to set a new Maryland state record. The fish was caught in 800 feet of water in the Baltimore Canyon. Way to go, Steve!



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# Maryland Anglers Must Register in 2010

Beginning January 1, 2010 anglers in Maryland will be required to sign-up with the National Saltwater Angler Registry. The purpose of the registry is to assist NOAA in accumulating catch and effort data by creating a national registry of anglers that will be used for telephone surveys.

#### Who Must Register?

All anglers fishing in Maryland waters must register EXCEPT for:

- Holders of Chesapeake Bay Sportfish License.
- Anglers who fish only on licensed party, charter, or guide boats. These vessels are surveyed separately from angler surveys.
- Anglers holding permits to fish for highly migratory species, such as tunas or swordfish, and those fishing under commercial fishing licenses or subsistence fishing permits.
- Anglers registered or permitted to fish in a formal state or federal subsistence fishery.
- Anglers under 16 years of age.

#### What Information is Being Collected?

The goal is to collect just enough information to make it possible to correctly identify and contact anglers to conduct surveys about their catch and effort. Registrations will include an angler's name, date of birth, address, telephone number, and the regions where they intend to fish, though anglers will not be restricted to only fishing in those regions, and will not be required to register separately for each region they fish in. As is the case already, surveys may be handled by representatives of NOAA Fisheries or state fisheries agencies.

#### Will It Cost Money to Register?

Fishermen who are automatically included in the registry because their state has a Memorandum of Agreement to share angler information with NOAA will NOT be required to pay a federal registration fee (though they will need to pay any costs associated with their state license). For others, Congress gave NOAA Fisheries the option of collecting a fee to cover the administrative costs of running the registry. There will be no charge for the registry until 2011, at which time it is expected to cost about \$25 for those required to pay. All fees collected through the Registry will go to the U.S. treasury, not a specific program.

#### How Do You Register?

Anglers can register by phone at 1-888-674-7411 or online at www.countmyfish.noaa.gov.

Note: Delaware anglers DO NOT need to register with the national database since the State of Delaware already has a licensing program in place.





The 2009 Atlantic striped assessment update indicates that the resource remains in good condition. Estimated fishing mortality rates in 2008 are equal to or less than 0.21 and below the

total biomass have and remained relatively stable over the last several years, stock abundance declined from 2004 to 2007 with a small increase in 2008. The decrease in abundance is reflected in a decline in coastwide landings in 2007 and 2008. The decline is more prevalent in areas largely dependent contributions from the Chesapeake stocks (such as Maine) than areas that are dominated by the Hudson stock (such as New York). The spawning stock has remained relatively stable due to the

The striped bass stock complex is determined to be not overfished with overfishing not occurring.

growth and maturation of the 2003 year class and the accumulation of spawning biomass from year classes prior to 1996. Analysis of tag also suggests increasing natural mortality in Chesapeake Bay, likely the result of the mycobacteriosis.

Recruitment estimates have averaged 12.5 million fish since 1995 when the stock

complex was declared restored. The 2006 and 2007 estimates were the lowest in recent years at 7.4 million and 5.8 million fish, respectively. The 2003 cohort remains the largest since 1982 at 22.8 million fish. Recruitment in 2008 of 13.3 million fish was slightly above the recent average.

Striped bass are one of the most sought after species by recreational anglers along the Atlantic coast. In recreational anglers landed over 2.2 million striped bass weighing 12,310 metric tons. Recreational landings have ranged from a low of 336 metric tons in 1989 to a high of 13,814 metric tons in 2006. The coastwide landings in 2008 reflect a 17 percent decline from a high of 2.7 million fish in 2006. Changes in landings have varied by state, with Maine, Conneticut, and New York showing an increase in landings and the remaining states showing a 32% decrease average. Recreational discard mortalities (assuming an 8 percent mortality of releases) in 2008 were 950,000 fish, a 64 percent decrease from a high of 2.1 million fish in 2006.

Landings the from commercial striped fishery have been consistently lower than the recreational catch. Commercial landings increased from 63 metric tons

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
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

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# **Driftin' Easy**

#### THE SURF ANGLER

Atlantic Coast of Maryland and adjoining offer a fishing Delaware experience like no other. The angler needs no boat nor does he need an array of fancy equipment. The surf angler, unlike other "shore" anglers, will experience very few snags. These fishermen have miles of beaches to explore so there is an element of freedom independence that seems to

radiate from surf anglers. The surf fisherman rarely feels confined.

Surf fishing begins in March with a few stripers and sharks. It picks up in April with more striper action and the first bluefish. By May we see a good run of stripers and bluefish. Some black drum are also reported, mostly on Assateague Island. Once we get into June, the fish run smaller and we get into the summertime fare of snapper blues, kingfish

when big red drum run offshore of Assateague. In October we see big stripers once again, along with larger bluefish. This can last into the first week of December.

> to the beach (rolling dark water) with an outer bar further out (white water.) A perfect surffishing scenario is a "cut" in this outer bar (rolling dark water) where the water cuts through the outer bar into the deeper water close to shore (a slough.) This is also sometimes called a "rip." This is where the polarized sunglasses come into play. Sometimes the cut in the bar is hard to see. Cleaner looking water coming into the slough from across the bar will be a tell tale sign of a cut in the bar. These cuts are the passageways where the fish come across the bar and into the slough. Like any other kind of fishing, cleaner water will make your bait more visible and make

Surf fishing is like any other kind of fishing. Fish like structure and feed at changes of depth. A perfectly flat beach is not a good surf fishing beach. A beach that offers a simple dip as you walk out into the ocean will attract baitfish, little crabs and tiny clams that in turn attract the larger fish you are trying to catch.

it easier for the fish to feed!

Many anglers ask about tides when surf fishing. An incoming tide is the tide between low tide and high tide. This tide is very popular with surf fishermen because the water is cleanest and the crabs tend to steal the bait less. The very best tide, however, is probably three hours before high tide and three hours after the high tide. Some anglers make the mistake of looking at the tide chart and going exactly at high tide. They miss several hours of a good tide that happens before the peak!

Time of day is also very important when it comes to surf fishing. Fish seem to come in closer to the shore during the early hours of the morning, between 4 A.M. and 10 A.M., and again in the late afternoon to


dusk between 4 P.M. and dark. If this coincides with a good tide and a favorable breeze, all is well with the fishing world.

The wind direction is very important when it comes to surf fishing, especially during the summer months. An east, southeast, or northeast breeze brings fish closer to the beach. A westerly wind can make the surf nice and flat and very easy to fish, but it may not produce.

What other weather factors make surf fishing good? Like any other kind of fishing, a falling barometer will make fish feed. They sense a front or a storm coming and they will feed more readily. Like most kinds of fishing, the time between the new moon and the full moon also gives surf fishermen the "edge." Nocturnal fish such as drum, stripers and trout tend to feed on a full moon.

The most important part of the surf fishing experience is the rod and reel. As we said before, the key to surf fishing is to get your rig, bait and sinker out past the crest of the waves. To do this, you need to cast a certain amount of distance. Therefore, you need a rod in the 8 to 13 foot range. The most popular lengths are 10 to 11 footers.

Like in any sport, the nicer the equipment, the more enjoyable the sport will be. A quality surf rod will have more graphite in it, thus making it more sensitive and lighter in the hand. It doesn't necessarily make it stronger, just more pleasant to use. Some higher dollar surf rods have a skinny cork-wrapped grip that also makes the rod lighter to hold. The guides are usually of a higher quality. The guides on an inexpensive surf rod are made out of ceramic and are thicker and heavier. The guides on a higher quality surf rod may be made out of Aluminum Oxide that is thinner yet stronger, and they also weigh less. Since the diameter of the rings is larger, your casting distance will increase. They will also hold up longer. If you are Spectra line such as Power Pro, it is important to invest in a higher quality rod. The thin Spectra line can eventually cut through ceramic guides.

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A higher quality surf reel will have from 4 to 13 ball bearings. The more ball bearings a reel has, the smoother it will feel and the longer it will last. Some reels, such as Shimano, have ball bearings that are sealed. This is important when surf fishing.

Quality surf reels have a ball bearing in the line roller. This keeps your line roller on your bail turning so your line does not wear a groove in it. This is a plus when it comes to surf fishing. A line roller that does not turn correctly creates friction that can slow you down when casting.

A quality reel will have heavier gears, more drag discs in the drag system to make the drag work better, and some even have a Waterproof Drag System.

If you choose a 9 to 10 foot rod and reel combination, I would spool with 14 to 17 pound test line. If you choose an 11-foot or longer rod and reel combination, I would spool with 17 to 20 pound test. Also, if you plan to cast lures with your surf rod and reel, you need to use lighter 10 to 14 pound test. Thin diameter lines are also a good choice.

Spectra Fiber lines such as Power Pro or Berkley Fire Line lines are great for surf fishing. Most experienced surf anglers use these types of line because of the strength, small diameters, and sensitivity.

The appropriate surf rig is of utmost importance when surf

fishing. If you are new to surf fishing, the basic rule of thumb when choosing surf rigs is to look for the rigs that have brightly colored Styrofoam floats on them. These are all surf rigs. The float does three things when fishing in the surf. They make your baits more visible to the fish; they elevate the bait off the bottom floor so the moving sand does not cover up your bait, and it helps keep the troublesome speckled crabs from chewing off your bait.

The surf angler needs to decide what he or she will be fishing for and what kind of bait the angler will use in order to choose the correct rig. If you are using any kind of cut bait such as squid, mullet, herring, butterfish or bunker, you will be fishing for bluefish, stripers, drum, flounder, trout and sharks and can use a surf rig with medium to large-sized hooks. (Sizes #4 and larger) If you are fishing with some kind of worm, you will likely be fishing for kingfish (whiting), croaker, spot, pompano and small sea trout so you can use a kingfish or spot rig that is made with smaller size #6 or #8 hooks.

A great rig for surf fishing is the mullet rig. Some people feel these rigs are complicated, but they are actually quite simple. Always buy a couple extra hooks, as sometimes they fall off or bend when catching the bluefish. snapper advantages to the mullet rig is that you don't need a knife to cut your bait; the bait stays on the hook, and since the rig comes with a fairly long leader and a big float, the crabs generally stay away from it.

Serious surf anglers like to make their own rigs for big stripers and drum. They use 50 www.coastalfisherman.net to 80 pound test leader material with a #6/0 to #10/0 circle hook. The 18 to 30-inch leader is tied to a 3-way swivel and snap, or set up with a fish finder rig.

Ranger long cast rigs are also available, pre-made in some tackle stores. These rigs are available with or without floats. These specialty rigs allow the angler to cast out with the baited hook attached to a plastic hook holder, so the rig and sinker do not go into two different directions when casting. These rigs allow anglers to cast 30 per cent further.

The sinker is probably the most important aspect of surf fishing. Round or bay type sinkers will roll back in with the waves. You need to use pyramid, hurricane, or sputnik type sinkers. Hurricane type sinkers will hold better per ounce than the traditional pyramid types. If the surf is extremely rough or the current is running hard, sputnik sinkers are available. These sinkers have retractable wires that need to be reset after every cast. Only use these sinkers when you have to, but always have one or two around.

The cast is an important element in surf fishing. There are several techniques that surf anglers employ to get a distance cast. If the angler is a beginner, just getting the bait out beyond the crest of the wave is the most important thing to do. If you are right handed and casting with a spinning rod and reel, put your right hand at the reel seat with your thumb above and your fingers below. Flip over the bail, holding the line with your index finger. Be sure to position the line towards the end of your index finger so you

Bring the rod tip over your head, and then cast forward, propelling your bait into the ocean. It takes practice to get a "long cast." If your rig goes too high in the air, you won't get the distance. If you cast is too low, it will drop inside the first big wave. Follow through and extend your casting arm to get that extra couple yards. Keep your eye on the ocean where you want to land your cast, not on your hands. If your finger gets sore, purchase a finger guard.

If you have no bait on the hook, you can't catch fish. The serious surf fisherman needs to check the bait often and either hold the rod in his or her hand, or watch the tip of the surf rod in the sand spike like a hawk! The smaller the baits, the more often you need to check your bait.

Big fish are often lost in the wash in the surf. If you hook a nice fish, be sure to use your drag and let the wave action help you bring the fish to shore. The biggest mistakes an angler can make is to pull too hard

when the fish gets close to shore or let slack get in the line. Keep tension on the fish the entire time, but wait for the next wave to bring it closer.

To have an enjoyable day of surf fishing, there are only a few key items you need besides the rod, reel, line, rigs, bait and lures:

- A simple PVC sand spike will protect your investment.
- A 5-gallon bucket or a cooler to hold your bait and fish.
- A sharp knife is necessary to cut your bait.
- A pair of needle nose pliers or some sort of hook remover to extract the hook is very important, especially when fishing for bluefish!
- A ruler is important to make sure your fish are legal.

The surf angler is a special type of fisherman. Rarely is he or she disappointed; even if the fish aren't biting, the mere experience of being on the beach fishing is very special. Sunsets, sunrises, birds diving, and porpoises jumping are all part of the surf fishing experience.

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

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### Fishermen To March on Washington, DC

In a historic show of solidarity, recreational and commercial fishermen will gather together on the steps of the Capitol on February 24, 2010 from noon until 3 p.m. in an organized demonstration against the unintended negative impacts of the Magnuson Stevens Conservation Management Act (MSA), the federal fisheries law which was revised in January of 2007.

"We need to let Congress and NOAA know that we are the collective voice of the recreational fishing community and the collective voice does not accept the current broken management system," said Jim Donofrio, Executive Director of the Recreational

Fishing Alliance.

Nils Stolpe, a consultant to the commercial fishing industry and columnist for SavingSeafood.org, said that over the past three decades since the original Magnuson established, was fishermen have been gradually phased out of the fisheries management process, regardless of sector. "The scientists have been put in charge, and as the list of closures and restrictions demonstrates, the Act has been turned into a weapon that is now being used against fishermen fishing communities."

Some participants have questioned the timing of the march, coming in one of the coldest months of the year. "We can't let seasons stop the momentum, and if we wait any longer none of us will be fishing." said Donofrio. "Many members of Congress will be standing shoulder to shoulder with us"

### Sea Bass Season Only Open for 2 Months in 2010

The Mid-Atlantic Fishery Management Council (Council) met in Wilmington, Delaware from December 8 through December 10, 2009. The Council met with the Atlantic States Marine **Fisheries** Commission's (ASMFC) Summer Flounder, Scup and Black Sea Bass Board (Board) on December 8 and adopted the following 2010 recreational fishery management measures:

For the 2010 recreational black sea bass fishery, the Council and Board voted to adopt a 12.5 inch total length minimum fish size and maintain the current 25 fish possession limit. The season would be open June 1st through June 30th and September 1st through September 30th.

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# Fishing with **Light Tackle**

I know that to some folks the thought of pursuing fish with lighter than normal tackle makes about as much sense as going fishing without hooks. After all, most anglers just want to go out and "get the fish" so they can bring it home for dinner, and they prefer to do so using the most effective tackle possible. So if I made the argument that light tackle fishing would make their fishing experience more fun, exciting or rewarding, many folks would probably respond that they're already enjoying every minute of their time on the water and don't need to spice their fishing up with the hassle of light tackle.

During these times when closed seasons, smaller catch limits, and larger size limits seem to be making it harder all the time to bring home a catch, I'd also expect to hear from some anglers that the last thing they want to do is handicap themselves with light tackle. But to that note I'd contend that in times like this fishermen should find it all the more appealing to have light tackle be a part of their angling pursuits. After all, as regulations tighten, anglers more likely to find themselves in situations where they are forced into catch-andrelease either because the season is closed, they've caught their limit, or the fish are too small.

Consider our bluefin fishery. When the tuna are biting like crazy but folks can only keep one or two per boat, or the fall run of rockfish when it's quick and easy to catch a two-fish limit, or when schools of snapper bluefish invade the inlet. If you're hooked up to a fish that you can't or don't wish to keep anyway, why rush it to the boat on heavy tackle just so you can cast back out and repeat the process on another fish? I don't know about the rest of you, but for me that kind of fishing starts to get a little too repetitive, particularly when the fish are of all the same type and general size. Those are the times when just a slight change-up in tackle

very transform monotonous routine into a thrill from every fish.

Going light can spark new fun into "same-old-same-old" fishing action by providing anglers with the chance to milk an extra measure of enjoyment and challenge from fishing opportunities that they might otherwise not consider to be worth pursuing. As an added bonus, the lessons learned while rigging and using light tackle for everyday fishing adventures can pay big dividends later if anglers find themselves accidentally or purposefully doing battle with oversized opponents.

Here on Delmarva we have enough light tackle opportunities that anglers looking to add a little (or a lot) of zest to their fishing adventures shouldn't have much trouble finding an adversary that'll put their stamina and tackle to the test. Inshore and offshore, from bluefish to bluefin tuna, local anglers need only to pick a quarry, consider circumstances, devise a strategy, rig their tackle, and execute their plan to experience the kind of challenge and fun that most just read about in fishing magazines.

So, what constitutes "light tackle?" Actually, there's no written standards that define when tackle is considered to be "light," it's pretty much up to the angler to decide for themselves, taking into account the weight of the line, size of the fish, the angler's own skill level, and environmental issues such as the sea conditions, depth of the water, or strength of current. There's so many variables. For instance, 10-pound test would certainly not be considered light tackle for catching 2-pound seabass in 15-feet of water. But put those same fish among a wreck with 200-feet of water above them and 10-pound test would surely qualify as light for the task.

Anglers may occasionally experience times when an unexpected bite from unintended fish suddenly forces

them into an unplanned light tackle battle-royal, such as when a 400-pound thresher shark snaps up a strip of squid on a bottom rig with 20-pound test intended for seabass. Unfortunately such incidences seldom end well for the fisherman, not because the line is too light but because the rest of their tackle (hooks, leader, reel, etc.) will not likely be set-up to handle the forces of such a large fish. Compounding the problem, the crew probably doesn't have the boat rigged and ready to give quick chase. However, even using the same 20-pound line, anglers who choose to intentionally target such a fish can dramatically swing the odds of success in their favor with some advance planning and tackle preparation. Light tackle catches that make it into the record books seldom happen by accident, they start with a goal and end with the execution of a well-planned strategy to achieve the objective.

**Choose a quarry.** First things first - choose a quarry. It would be a mistake for someone to think that a good strategy would be to just grab some light tackle, head out on the water and "see what they can catch on it." To do it right, anglers should pick a species and then focus their efforts on that particular fish. Of course folks have to make sure they choose the right adversary. Light tackle fishing can mean a lot of lost fish so anglers should consider targeting species that abundant and the opportunity for hook-ups are relatively great.

Some fish are not "doable." Anglers must also understand that some fish in some situations are simply not candidates for light tackle. For instance, giant bluefin tuna on 4-pound test just isn't going to happen because the breaking strength of the line will never allow the angler to exert enough pressure on the fish that it would even know that it's hooked - let alone wear it down until it could be brought to the boat. It would also be futile to use such tackle to try and catch tautog over relatively deep wrecks or reefs because before the angler could pull it away from the structure the fish would simply swim into a hole or around some debris and


break itself off.

Too deep. Extreme depth is also a major obstacle to the success of light tackle fishing because it often requires so much weight to get the bait or lure down to the fish. That weight, plus the added forces applied by water pressure on the line, can be too much for the line to take. When you factor in the pull of a fish, which probably doesn't even have to "pull" because at great depths a big fish could stop swimming altogether and its dead weight alone would be too much for the line to withstand, it's obvious that light tackle doesn't mix well with deep water.

Problems with currents. Since too much water pressure on a light line can pop it just as easily as a frozen drag, anglers sometimes encounter situations where the current is so strong that there is no way to effectively fish light tackle, particularly if they are fishing from the shore and not able to move freely with the flow of the water as they could from a boat.

Too many fishermen - too many fish. Another obstacle is the presence of too many other fishermen. Because light tackle often has the fish taking a lot of line and the angler following it around with the boat or up and down the shoreline, the last thing that needs to be thrown into the mix is other fishermen with lines, anchors, boats, and anything else that might hinder the battle. Light tackle fishing requires that fishermen find a place away from everyone else where they can focus 100% on the task at hand. A similar problem can result from too many fish. When a fish is hooked from a school it will likely try to stay with the school during the fight creating a good opportunity for the line to be broken on a fin, a tail, or even in the mouth of another fish. This can also happen when anglers chum or chunk-up a bunch of fish up behind the boat.

Consider the health of the fish. Light tackle anglers must also take into consideration the health and survivability of their quarry. To the fisherman, a "break-off" might be just another lost fish and a chance to get lines back in the water to try again.

But it's not such a good deal for fish if it dies from physiological complications resulting from the stress and struggle or because it's left too weak to avoid becoming lunch for sharks or other predators. Also, what happens if the line breaks and the fish is left to swim around trailing leader and line until the hook eventually corrodes away? Anglers must take such things into consideration to determine if it's ethical to use light tackle in the first place. Of course, anglers looking to increase their fun without running the risk of killing the fish in the process have the option of dropping down just a single line class or two. A 50-pound tuna caught and released on 20-pound tackle is going to fair a lot better than one caught on 6-pound!

Devise a strategy. Most anglers will encounter times when, purely by accident, they find themselves in a light tackle situation; a huge blue marlin slurps down chunk bait intended for small dolphin, a 100-pound stingray bites a kingfish rig in the surf, or a giant

bluefin pounces on a lure intended for bluefish. Sometimes the angler will emerge triumphant from such encounters, but more likely the victor will be the one wearing scales. Then again, the record books are filled with incredible catches of fish weighing hundreds of pounds taken on line testing in the single digits. Such catches don't just "happen" because the angler got "lucky," they represent what's possible when anglers research a species, formulate and plan, prepare their tackle, and execute a strategy.

Have enough time to make it happen. When planning out a light tackle adventure, anglers should keep in mind how long it could take to land whatever fish they might be doing battle with. Hooking some big monster on sewing thread at the end of the day might not be such a good idea if the battle runs past sunset; light tackle battles get a lot more complicated in the dark, so too during periods of bad weather and rough seas. Light tackle anglers have enough adversities to overcome;

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
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Some methods are just not doable. One of the first things anglers learn when they "go light" is that they cannot always employ the same baits, lures, hooks, or leaders that they are accustomed to using with heavier tackle because the light line cannot withstand the added pressure when the terminal tackle is cast, trolled, jigged, or drifted across the bottom. A green machine behind a bird simply cannot be snapped to 10pound test and trolled at six knots because the line will break before the rig is towed ten feet. To fish smaller lures, lighter weights and thinner leaders effectively, light tackle almost always requires that some kind of concessions be made in the terminal tackle used. The silver lining to this imposition is that in many instances fish that might otherwise shy away from hitting big rigs with heavy leaders will more readily snatch up the lighter rigs.

Setting big hooks. It used to be that hook setting was an issue with light tackle because only so much pressure could be applied with the light line to plant the hook into the fish's jaw. But today with small but very strong laser or chemically sharpened hooks, getting a good hook-set is not so much of a problem with light tackle, particularly when circle hooks are used.

Use good knots, line and leader. Paramount for light tackle success is that anglers use good quality knots, line and leaders. While the line and leader part of this equation is simply a matter of buying topnotch materials, when it comes to knots there's no easy solution other than learning, practicing, and then being able to tie the proper knot as needed. Knots are typically the weakest link between fish and fisherman and during a long fight they are going to be stressed to the max. Anglers will find that when working with super light lines it can be hard enough just to see the line, let alone tie a smooth and effective knot, so as much rigging and knot tying as possible should be done beforehand in a stable and controlled environment rather than out on

the water. By making rigs, tying knots, and (most importantly) testing those knots before heading out to sea, anglers should be able to avoid a terminal tackle malfunction after hook-up. It's far better to have a knot fail while being tested by the fisherman than later on when tested by a fish.

Use the right tackle. Since light tackle hook-ups can result in long drawn out battles between man and fish, anglers should ensure that their tackle is in perfect working order and designed for the task. Drags should be properly set and silkysmooth, roller guides should all turn freely, and fishermen should know exactly how much line they have on their reels to work with. In fact, the two most important considerations when choosing a light tackle reel is drag and line capacity. For most inshore fishing where the water is relatively shallow, capacity is less important because the fish won't likely have as much room to run. But anglers fishing the open ocean need to have a lot of line on their reels, because even if they plan on chasing the fish with the boat there's a good chance that it'll take many hundreds of yards of line before they can get the boat moving. While there are certainly times when spinning reels will do the job, to end up with right combination of line capacity and smooth drag, most light tackle fishermen, particularly in the ocean, usually up fishing conventional type reels.

Anglers should also know that they can't just take any reel, put light line on it and expect it to perform properly. Reel drags are designed to handle lines within a certain range. Slip out of that range and the drag won't perform properly. So loading a reel designed for 20-30 pound line with 8-pound test would be a mistake because, even though it would hold a lot of the lighter line, the drag would probably not do it's job properly at the lower settings.

For the record books. If all this talk isn't enough to sell someone on the idea of using light tackle, maybe the thought of setting a world record might do the trick. The International Game Fish Association (IGFA) is

the one organization recognized around the world for properly qualifying, recording, keeping records for most of the game fish caught around the world in both fresh and saltwater. Records maintained not just for heaviest "all-tackle" catches in each species, but also for "line-class" catches in 2, 4, 6, 8, 12, 16, 20, 30, 50, 80, and 130 pound test line, fly-tackle records in 2, 4, 6, 8, 12, 16, and 20 pound tippet, as well junior-angler catches. Records are also broken down into men's and women's categories. So there may be over 20 individuals who hold world records at the same time for a given species of fish. You can bet that with so many species of fish in the world, there are not only a lot of records on the books, there's also a gang of potential records still waiting to

To keep the world record process fair for the anglers, the IGFA has a trunk-load of rules that stipulate how fish must be landed, what type of bait and tackle may and may not be used, and what procedures must be followed after the catch to officially qualify it as a record.

All records are still "potentials" until IGFA receives a properly completed application, a sample of the fishing line and all terminal tackle used to catch the fish, as well as a barrage of photos showing the angler with the fish, the tackle, and the fish on a certified weigh scale. Finally, before qualifying a record the IGFA uses some kind of high-tech gizmo to check the true breaking strength of the line.

To many fishermen the thought of setting a "world record" might seem like such a longshot that it's pretty much dismissed as a dream that will never come true. That's probably because many assume that world records are set by anglers who just luck into an extra ordinarily large fish one Maybe sometimes it happens that way, but more times than not records are set by anglers who are specifically trying to set a record. They do their research and know what size and type of fish they have to catch, are very aware of IGFA tackle requirements and angling

www.coastalfisherman.net rules, know ahead of time where they can weight their catch on a certified scale, and have all the extra necessities such as cameras, tape measures, IGFA forms, ready for action when the time comes.

With just a little research some folks might find that getting in the record books could be within their reach. I'm not saying it'll be easy - but it's certainly not impossible. The place to start is the IGFA website (www.igfa.org) where you can get all the details about what the organization requires for a record. Unfortunately, you have to be a member in order to access all their information, including the complete record list. But it's worth the \$40 membership fee just to stay abreast of all the record standings, not to mention all the stuff they send you.

Once you have the rules and all the record lists you can lookup whatever type of fish you want to pursue and see if there is a record in a line class category that you think you have a shot at beating. Then make sure all your tackle conforms to IGFA specifications and go fishing! Particularly if you're trying for a super light line category like #2 or #4, don't expect things to go your way - right away. Figure you're going to break off a lot of fish in the process but with each mishap you'll gain a little more experience that will hopefully get you closer to your ultimate goal of getting in the official IGFA record book.

A lot of fishermen will be quick to claim that they "aren't into that light tackle stuff," but sometimes Mother Nature will have other ideas and impale a big-old-something-or-other on the end of our line when we least expect it. While no one can be totally prepared to handle anything that might bite their line, having at least some knowledge of light tackle fishing could sometimes mean the difference between returning to the dock with a "one that got away" story - or a pose for the cover of the Coastal Fisherman.

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

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




On November 9th, Ed Moore of Showell, MD muscled in this 43inch striped bass while tossing a Wind Cheater in the bay behind Assateague Island.

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



#### Shrimp and Scallop Scampi with Linguine

1 lb. linguine
12 jumbo shrimp, peeled
and deveined
12 large sea scallops
Salt and pepper
3 1/2 TBSP unsalted
butter
2 cloves garlic, minced
2 TBSP fresh lemon juice
1/2 cup dry white wine
1/4 cup torn fresh basil
2 TBSP chopped fresh
parsley

Cook the pasta in salted water according to directions on box.

Meanwhile, heat a large skillet over medium-high heat.

Pat the shrimp and scallops dry; season with salt and pepper.

Add 1 1/2 TBSP of butter to the pan and cook the shrimp until golden on one side, about 3 minutes.

Turn the shrimp and add half of the garlic; cook until garlic is fragrant but the shrimp are still translucent, 1 to 2 more minutes.

Transfer shrimp to a plate. Add the scallops to the skillet and cook until golden on one side.

Turn the scallops, add the remaining garlic and cook another 1 to 2 minutes.

Add the lemon juice and wine and bring to a boil, scraping up any browned bits with a spatula.

Cook until sauce is reduced by half.

Return shrimp to the pan, then add the basil and the remaining 2 TBSP. butter; season with salt and pepper.

Drain the pasta and transfer to a large serving bowl

Toss with shrimp, scallops

and sauce; garnish with parsley and lemon.
Serves 4.

## Striped Bass with Crispy Spuds

3 TBSP extra-virgin olive oil 16 boiled potatoes Salt and pepper 4 striped bass fillets, skin on, 6 oz. each 12 roasted tomato halves

Preheat oven to 475 degrees.

Lightly oil a rimmed baking sheet.

Smash each potato with the base of your palm and place on sheet.

Drizzle with 2 TBSP of oil; season with salt and pepper.

Roast until crisp, about 20 minutes.

Roast tomato halves, about 10 minutes, watch closely.

Meanwhile, score fish skin in a few places; season with salt and pepper.

In a large nonstick skillet, heat 1 TBSP of oil over medium-high heat.

Add fish, skin side down; cook until browned and crisp, 6 to 8 minutes.

Reduce heat to medium; flip fish and cook until opaque, 2 to 4 minutes.

Serve fish with potatoes, tomatoes and your favorite sauce.

Serves 4.

## **Chesapeake Oyster Bisque**

1 pint fresh oysters, drained, reserving liquid1/4 cup celery, sliced thin1/4 cup onion, chopped fine2 TBSP butter

3 TBSP flour

1/4 tsp salt

1/4 tsp white pepper

2 cups milk

12 oz. can evaporated skim milk

2 TBSP snipped fresh chives

Chop oysters; set aside.

Stir in flour, salt and white pepper.

Cook over low heat 1 minute, stirring constantly.

Gradually stir in milk and evaporated milk until smooth and slightly thickened, stirring constantly. DO NOT BOIL.

Add oysters, reserved liquid and chives.

Heat over low heat until thoroughly heated.

4 sea bass fillets

1 1/2 tsp. coriander seeds
Salt and pepper
Fresh orange slices with
peel intact
Olive oil
Nonstick foil

Drizzle 2 sheets of nonstick foil with olive oil.

Sprinkle each with 1/4 cup sliced almonds and 3/4 tsp. crushed coriander seeds.

Brush the fillets with more olive oil; season with salt and pepper.

Place each fillet, skin side down on top of nuts.

Top with a few orange slices, then add another fillet, skin side up to form a sandwich.

Sprinkle with more almonds and coriander seeds.

Fold up the foil sheets and grill over high heat until fish is just cooked through and almonds are toasted, 8 to 10 minutes.

Carefully loosen the almond crust from the bottom of the foil with a spatula; slice in half and serve.

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
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

Each year, all the big-wigs in the fishing tackle industry gather in Las Vegas at the ICAST show to display their products and introduce a host of new ones that they hope will be selected as a "Best of Show" winner in its category.

I picked a few of the winners from the 2009 show.

#### **Best Fishing Accessory**

If you are like me, your key ring looks like a weapon, with car keys, boat keys, dock box keys and numerous other keys. These products are the first codeable locks, meaning that you determine what vehicle key you want to use to open the lock. For example, if you want to use your truck key, all you do is insert your key, turn it once and the lock learns your key. Very simple and very convenient.



In their Codeable Lock Series, DuraSafe offers a receiver lock, padlock, cable lock, motorcycle disc brake lock, spare tire lock and a swing away tongue trailer

All of the locks are made with a solid zinc core and have highest the rating corrosion resistance.

I've always been a big fan of Costa Del Mar sunglasses, owning multiple pairs of their Hammerhead model.




This year, the company introduced their "Zane" frame which features a medium large lens size in a large nylon frame, Costa's signature 3hole venting system to alleviate fogging and no-slip Hydrolite nose pads. The CR-39, Costa 580 or glass lenses are are available with the Zane frame. Frames come in matte black, silver or tortoise.

The suggested retail price for the Zane glasses are \$139.99 with the CR-39 lenses and \$239.99 with the Costa 580 lenses. Big price difference and I'm personally not sure it is worth it. Check out the 580 lenses for yourself and make the call on whether they are worth the extra \$100. In any case, you can't go wrong with Costa Del Mar sunglasses. The company stands behind their product. They are great on the water at cutting down glare and they look good.

When it comes to trolling for striped bass, a good pair of outrodders really comes in handy. My boat has an 8-foot beam, so by placing a pair of outrodders on the boat, I pick up an additional 14 feet of width to my trolling spread.

If you are unfamiliar with outrodders, they are typically metal tubes welded into an "L" shape. The bottom part sticks into your rod holder and the top section is where you place the butt of your fishing rod so your rod points directly off the side of your boat.

Unfortunately, the stress placed on the fishing rod from the weight of the fish or even Continued on page 90

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just the tension from the lure can make it difficult to get your rod out of the tube.

Tournament Grade Tackle came up with a great set of outrodders that are much easier to use. They call theirs the TGT Rod Rigger.



The red rod rigger goes into your port side rod holder and the green rod rigger slips into your starboard side rod holder. The neat thing about these outrodders is how easy it is to get your fishing rod out of the outrodder. Instead of having to reach over the side of your boat and pull the rod out of the tube, with the TGT Rod Rigger you simply use one hand to lift the foregrip up and use the other hand to

push the butt end down. Then you simply slide the rod out of the Rod Rigger. It really is that easy.

Another excellent feature of the Rod Rigger is the patented Z Notch that locks the Rod Rigger into the rod Anybody who has holder. the traditional owned outrodders I'm sure has experienced their outrodder almost falling into the water as they were trying to remove their rod during a hook-up. The Z Notch will prevent this from ever happening.

The set is made from marine grade stainless steel and has rubber pads to protect your reels while they are sitting in the Rod Rigger. Each Rod Rigger comes with a safety strap to secure your rod and reel.

TGT's set costs \$289.00 which is more expensive than your traditional outrodders that typically run around \$150 to \$200, but they are definitely worth the money.

If you like to troll, and you

want to add some space between your lures, then give these Rod Riggers a try. I think you will like them.

Back in December, I swung into Lewes Harbour Marina to pick up some pictures for the Winter Issue. As you see in this issue, some really nice stripers were caught in the Delaware Bay. Several of them were caught while trolling. I asked Joe Morris, owner of Lewes Harbour Marina, what the "hot" trolling lure was this past fall and he showed me a Stretch 30 Cabo Sunset. Wow! What a good looking lure. I have always been a fan of Mann's Stretch 25's and 30's, and have caught a good number of stripers bluefish on them. immediately bought the last two that Joe had and tried them a couple of days later.



Well, needless to say the first time out of the box the lure produced. I caught 18 good size striped bass and easily 6 or 7 were caught on this lure and another 2 came loose during the fight. I trolled the 11-inch lure on 60 lb. braid line with a 4-foot monofilament leader.

The Cabo Sunset also comes in a Stretch 25 model that is 8-inches in length and weighs 2 oz.



A lot of anglers troll Stretch 25's and 30's, and I'm sure there are several others that work well. All I know is that the Cabo Sunset has become a mainstay in my spread, right along another Stretch product that always produces for me, the Stretch Imitator Dolphin.

This past fall, I purchased new boots for fishing at Foot Management in Pittsville, MD. I ended up buying a pair of Muck Scrub Boots and I absolutely love them. They are light, waterproof, warm and extremely comfortable.



The boots have a rubber bottom with a neoprene top. The rubber bottoms are reinforced in the toe, heel, achilles and shank areas. The neoprene upper is seamless, waterproof and actually extends down into the boot for a warm, comfortable feel. The sole is a ribbed tread that really grips the deck of my I haven't had any problem with slipping, which is always a good thing. The boot even has a kick rim so you slip your boots off without using your hands.

The boots retail for around \$75. Foot Management really does a great job fitting you with the boot and carry a bunch of sizes. They are located just off Rt. 50 on Friendship Rd. in Pittsville.



Another product that enhances the comfort of the boot, and any other shoe you would wear, are the new Action Arch Marine Insoles. Quite honestly, I now have a pair of these insoles for every shoe I own. They are that comfortable.

I can really feel the difference in my legs after a long day of running around the ocean. My legs aren't as tired and they definitely aren't as sore. These inserts in the Muck boot really make a great combination.

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### Over Closure of **Black Sea Bass Fishery**

In a 40-page legal challenge submitted before the U.S. District Court of New Jersey November 4, the Recreational Fishing Alliance (RFA) and industry allies have officially brought legal action against the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS), and U.S. Secretary of Commerce Gary Locke due to the recent recreational closure of the Atlantic recreational black sea bass fishery. The challenge contends that the recent closure is not only unprecedented for a fish whose stocks are considered rebuilt and not overfished, but that the action is also based upon "misapplication and misuse of a fatally flawed angler survey which **NMFS** itself acknowledged is not to be used for this type of decision."

Filed for a dozen specifically named plaintiffs, the official complaint for declaratory and injunctive relief requested expedited consideration in hopes of reversing the six-month sea bass closure as quickly as possible on behalf all saltwater anglers and fishery dependent businesses. According to Capt. Tony Bogan, plaintiff of the United Boatmen, the recent closure of sea bass is only a part of the legal equation. "This goes way behind sea bass," Bogan said of the legal argument, adding "it addresses the potential action by

NMFS in the future to arbitrarily close fisheries on a whim or because of survey trends or ideology.'

By closing a recreational fishery based on the fatally flawed recreational (MRFSS), the suit contends that government violated numerous provisions of the Magnuson-Stevens Conservation and Management Act, the Regulatory Flexibility the Procedure Act, and National Standard guidelines issued by NMFS. Additionally, it charges the defendants with ignoring countervailing information and for failure to consider less severe alternatives.

counsel said the disregard for the spirit and intent of the Magnuson Stevens Act is one thing, but the clear disregard for the legal requirements of the federal fisheries law is something that leads him to be cautiously optimistic. "These cases are very hard to win, but I think we've got some very strong arguments," Moore said, adding "NMFS was extremely arrogant with their sea bass decision and we're calling them out on this one." Moore charges that NMFS was very deliberate in their actions, explaining "they purposely chose an insular approach designed to block public scrutiny by claiming that they had good cause to waive prior notice and the opportunity public for comment."

As of the court filing date, \$18,855 in donations have been collected towards the initial challenge, though the plaintiffs expect that the real fight is now set to begin.

"This is the beginning of the battle, not the ending by any means," said Moore.


#### **Ex-Navy Destroyer** To Be Sunk at Del-Jersey-Land Reefsite


As part of the first multi-state reefing effort, Delaware soon will take title to the decommissioned Navy destroyer Arthur W. Radford to have the former warship sunk in 2010 at a new artificial reef off the Indian River

The Radford, at a length of 563 feet, will be the longest vessel ever reefed in the Atlantic, with the sinking to take place at the Del-Jersey-Land inshore site located 26 miles southeast of the Indian River Inlet.

The sinking is expected to take place in spring or summer of 2010, over the jointly-developed Del-Jersey-Land reef, which is equidistant from fishing ports in Indian River, DE, Cape May, NJ, and Ocean City, MD. The reef is a collaborative effort of the three states and comprises an area of about one square mile with a depth of 120-130 feet.

This will be the first multistate reefing effort since the site was permitted in 2006 with the purpose of joint development by the three states' reef programs. Funding the for ship's transportation, clean-up, preparation, sinking and monitoring will be shared among the three states and the Navy.


