Double Lines

A couple of friends and I spent two days on one of the Virginia barrier islands last week. We had good fishing for large red drum and beached over a dozen stripers, so I'm definitely not complaining, but another species, black drum, seemed scarce, and since I like to eat the small blacks, I was kind of targeting them. I managed to catch four small ones, but conditions and beach structure seemed ideal for the black drum, so based on that experience I might have thought that there weren't many drum around or they had moved on north or offshore. A friend, however, talked to some anglers who had been fishing another island very close by, and they had caught a lot of blacks but very few reds or stripers. The point I am trying to make is that our success with

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a target species very often doesn't have anything to do with the overall population of that particular fish, but with differences in seasonal, or even week-to-week migration patterns. These migrations can be affected by many factors, including water temps, water clarity, bottom structure, and especially the abundance, or lack of, food that the particular species prefers. In the case of the black drum, it might have been something as simple as a lack of bean clams on one island compared to another. If we have a good year on flounder in Ocean City, it may be because a particular set of factors brought the fish into that inlet. Warm, clear water and an abundance of shiners or small crabs, for instance. Another seaside port might have a poor season at the same

time, however. Likewise, a good year on white marlin offshore is usually simply a matter of water conditions and the presence of plenty of bait for the fish to feed on, not overall population numbers. Those conditions might only be limited to a small area of the Washington Canyon, and if you were fishing up in the Baltimore Canyon you might think there were no whites to If the overall be caught. population of a species seems very high, however, it might really mean there are more fish and they are spread all over competing for food. On the other hand, it might only mean that the fish are concentrated for some reason that we do not see. A few years back, for instance, the whole mid-Atlantic from the Carolinas up to New Jersey saw good numbers of speckled trout in the fall. You would think that meant the population was high, but the following year, there were practically no trout anywhere. Did those fish just disappear? I doubt it. More

than likely, something affected their migration, and the "good year" was just an anomaly that brought the usually more southern population of trout up the coast. Anglers who target stripers in the ocean in the late fall and early winter know that some years the fish come inside the 3-mile limit in good numbers and some years they don't, usually depending on things like wind direction and where the bait is. This is another reason I am leery of "trawl surveys" that fisheries officials use to determine populations. If you make your tows inside the 3-mile limit on bare bottom, even though the captain tells you there aren't any fish there, it will definitely affect your numbers. I guess the point of all this is that since fish have tails and live underwater, nobody really knows what is out there and where they are. Unfortunately, in these days of sometimes absurd overregulation, whether or not a fisherman can catch a fish is not only determined by migration patterns, but by someone else's Continued on page 6



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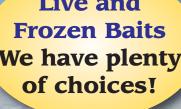
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The 2nd thresher shark to hit the docks this year was caught on Sunday by Brian Leader of Annapolis, MD while fishing on the "Keep Er Wet" with Bill Marvel of Chestertown, MD and Capt. David Sumpter. The guys were searching for bluefish in 58-degree water at the Jackspot when the 154 lb. thresher hit their trolled Hoochie lure on 30 lb. test line. After an 80 minute fight, the team was able to get a tail rope on the fish and get it into the boat. Weighed at Sunset Marina.



Ray Whittaker of Fenwick Island, DE boated this 25.5-inch, 6 lb. flounder on an Assateague Delmarva Double rig tipped with a live minnow. Ray caught the fish while drifting near the Rt. 90 Bridge and weighed his catch at Capt. Mac's High Performance Tackle.



On Sunday, the first bluefin tuna of the season was caught by Tom Dorwart of Manheim Township, PA while fishing on the "Margin" with Seth Obetz and Howard Cramer, also from Manheim Township, PA. The 66.4 pounder was hooked in 20 fathoms on a trolled ballyhoo, just north of the Norfolk Canyon. Weighed at Hook'em & Cook'em.

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Double Lines continued: guesswork...

The Cape Hatteras area has been experiencing one of the best cobia runs in a long time. Boat anglers have been doing especially well sight casting lures to "the man in the brown suit." Unfortunately, the Park Service has been busily closing the best beach areas to ORV traffic, so your odds of catching a cobia from the surf have been greatly diminished. Rumors are that the feds have also been trapping or killing predators such as foxes and raccoons so the piping plovers would have a better chance of survival. Apparently groups such as the Defenders of Wildlife condone this action. My question is: when did the life of a plover become more valuable than the life of a red fox? Kind of a waste of time, anyway, I think, since the crows and black backed gulls will eat the eggs and baby plovers like candy anyway. Last week, I sent one of those automated letters to Maryland Senators

Mikulski and Cardin asking them to support senate bill S1557, which basically would throw out the consent decree and let the Park Service go back to managing Cape Hatteras National Seashore under the Interim Management Strategy until they (NPS) issue a final rule for off-road vehicle use. I didn't hear anything from Mikulski, but Cardin did send a form letter, which basically said through a lot of convoluted politician speak designed to make you think he really cared, "screw you, I'm sticking with the Audubon Society", though not in so many words. I think Maryland voters need to clean house and get rid of all the incumbents come election time. Funny thing is, John James Audubon, after whom the Audubon Society is named, was an artist who was also an avid hunter, and he shot almost all of the birds he painted so he would have good close up models...he would probably turn over in his grave if he knew his name was being used

to raise millions of dollars to

pay a bunch of fat salaries and file lawsuits to keep the public off public beaches...

A gentleman asked me last week if I preferred braid or mono line. The answer is both. For my conventional surf reels, I still use mostly mono, either 15, 17 or 20 lb. test. This is primarily because I don't trust myself casting for distance into the wind with braid. A backlash in braid is not a pretty sight. The exception is on a Shimano Trinidad 14, which I have loaded with 50 lb. braid and (knock on wood) I haven't backlashed yet. For flounder fishing, it's braid hands down, on spinning conventional. You just can't beat the sensitivity. I also like braid for jigging with a metal or bucktail jig. I use both mono and braid for casting lures, depending on how and where I am fishing. For casting jig heads or Mirr-O-Lures in the surf for speckled trout, for instance, I still like 8 or 10 lb. mono, mostly to avoid the "wind knots" that sometimes

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plague braid. Fishing for the same species in the bays, however, where distance isn't as much of a factor, I often use 15 lb. braid. Casting around the inlet jetty or the bridge pilings, I find myself using 15 or 20 lb. braid more and more. Braid also excels for ocean bottom fishing, but for offshore trolling I still like the forgiveness (stretch) in mono. Both lines advantages have and disadvantages. Mono is cheaper, but braid generally doesn't have to be changed as often. Mono stretches and doesn't pull as many hooks, but braid is more sensitive and allows you to feel both the bite and every headshake. Mono is easier for knots, but there are several that will hold in braid with no problem. My advice is to try it all...there are so many toys and so little time...



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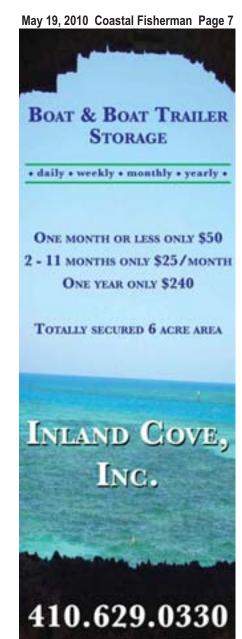


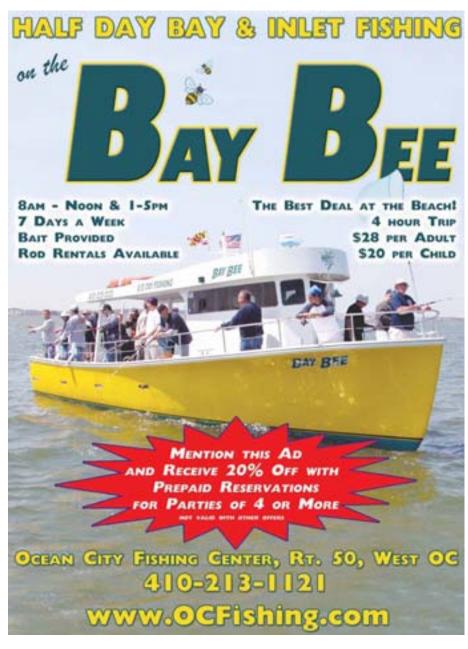


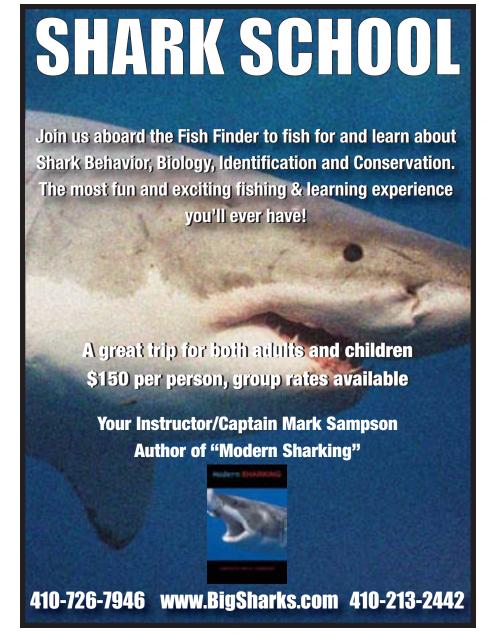

Ocean City Fishing Report

There was a good flounder bite on Saturday morning, and these anglers on the "Bay Bee" brought back some nice flatties to the dock at the Ocean City Fishing Center. Leon Yoon of Gambrill, MD caught the largest flounder on the trip, measuring 25-inches. The fish was caught on a cut bluefish and squid combination in the East Channel. Also pictured is Cheryl Bonsall of Morgantown, PA (22.5"), Chris Yun from Laurel, MD (19"), Dale Kline of Riverdale, MD (20") and Capt. Bob Gowar. Not pictured is Mate Spencer Cropper. Anglers also released over 60 flounder during the trip.

I want to start this week's column by addressing some questions that were raised concerning the striper on last week's cover. The fish was caught by Bill Winkler on a live hickory shad. As some folks know, anglers are prohibited from possessing both hickory and American shad

Maryland. However, Delaware, where the fish was caught, it is legal to keep both hickory and American shad in all waters except the Nanticoke River and its tributaries.

Now, onto the report...

The fishing gods were shining on Delmarva anglers this week with good bites from

the Delaware Bay down to the barrier islands of Virginia.

Sharks

Two thresher sharks were caught out of Ocean City on Sunday, nine days earlier than the first threshers caught in 2009. The first one to hit the scales was landed by Tenille Schrier at the Jackspot while fishing on the "Hookin' Wubbas". The shark ate a whole mackerel in 59-degree

Fishing right next to the "Hookin' Wubbas" was the crew on the "Keep Er Wet",

while trolling for bluefish. Another thresher

caught by a group of anglers out of Delaware on Sunday at the Twin Wrecks.

Further south at the Parking Lot, the crew on the "Nontypical" found what they were searching for, a make shark, but unfortunately lost it during the fight.

Big schools of blue sharks were spotted both at the Jackspot and at the Parking Lot. Scott Murray on the "Salt Addiction" called in on Sunday afternoon to report that they released 3 blue sharks at the Lower Sausages.

Striped Bass

There was an incredible bite in the Indian River Inlet during the day on Friday and on Friday night, so it's no surprise that anglers fishing off the beach in North Ocean City caught some nice linesiders. Stripers are still moving up the beach after spawning in the Chesapeake Bay and we should be getting close to the end of the big run, which usually lasts from the 3rd week in April through mid-May.

Anglers also picked up a few stripers around the South Jetty, but most of the catches in the bay continued to center around the Rt. 50 Bridge at night. It was not as hot as it has been, but some nice stripers were caught, in addition to some small snapper bluefish.

Anglers fishing off the beach are having the best luck with either strips of bunker or whole bunker heads. Those casting off the bridge and around the jetty had good results tossing Storm lures.

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Flounder

On Saturday, the flounder bite was the best we have seen all year. The water was really clear with temperatures pretty stable around 65-degrees.

The "Bay Bee" had an incredible trip on Saturday morning, bringing back 4 nice keepers and releasing over 60 fish. The largest keeper of the day was 25-inches.

The bay behind Assateague Island was definitely the hot spot on Saturday, with several flatties over 20-inches caught. Ronnie Spittle landed himself a 25-incher, one of 4 keepers caught by Ronnie and his wife. Steve Kansler caught a 22-incher down by the airport.

On Friday, Ray Whittaker caught a 25.5-inch flounder on an Assateague Tackle Delmarva Double rig near the Rt. 90 Bridge.

Anglers are having success drifting and trolling live minnows, Gulp! Alive! artificial baits, cut bluefish and squid.

have congregated around the Rt. 50 Bridge, creating a fun time for anglers tossing Gotcha plugs and other metal lures. Other anglers had good success catching bluefish and shad off of the Oceanic Pier.

Local angler Joe Molone did manage to catch a 6 lb. 11 oz. bluefish while using squid near Buoy #13 in the bay.

A good number of chopper bluefish were caught by surfcasters fishing off the beach in North Ocean City. Surprisingly, we didn't see any big bluefish caught further off the beach. Over the weekend, anglers trolled for bluefish around the Jackspot with no luck and shark fishermen at the Twin Wrecks and the Parking Lot never saw a bluefish.

Something is bringing the threshers, makes and blue sharks to these locations, and it is usually bluefish. I guess we will see in the next week or so.

Don't forget, the 1st Annual Ocean City Marlin Club Bluefish Tournament is coming up on May 29th and 30th. You do not have to be an Ocean City Marlin Club member to fish in the tournament.

Tautog

Anglers fishing both on headboats and private boats continue to peck away at tautog on inshore wrecks and structure in the bay.

The wrecks off 28th Street produced some nice catches for anglers fishing with green crabs and calico crabs.

In the bay, most blackfish anglers found success fishing around the South Jetty and along the rocks just south of Gudelsky Park.

Reef Foundation

Over the years, strong currents and storms have

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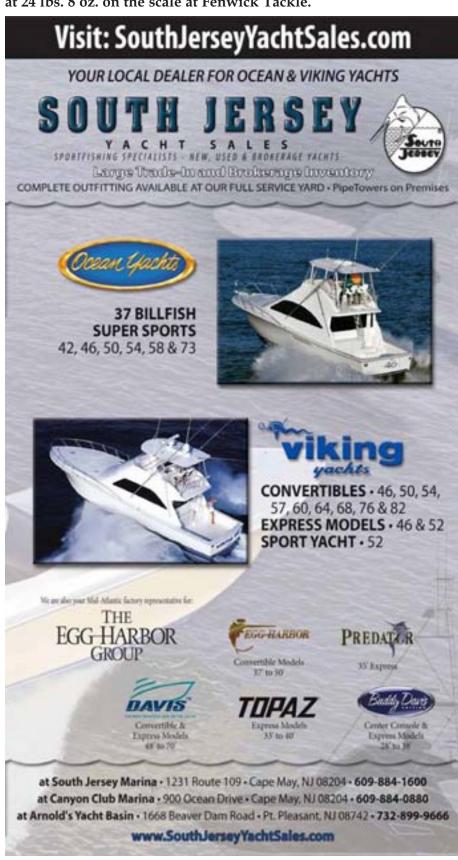

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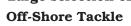
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Driftin' Easy

I love surf fishing and so could you. Surf fishing is fun, very relaxing, and an easy sport to get set-up and start fishing.

Frank Scott inspired this article when he sent me an email about his first surf fishing experience in April. He didn't catch anything, but he sure had fun and passed along some pointers for beginners. Thanks Frank!

So here are "Ten Things Every New Surf Fisherman Must Know":

- 1. Surf fishing is less expensive than other types of fishing.
- 2. The weather on the beach can change as quickly as the weather on any lake.
- 3. You need a cutting board to cut up your bait.
- 4. Sue Foster is a great person and a wealth of information.
- 5. Surf fishing is not a dry sport.
- 6. If you sit on a bucket, watch the waves or else you will get "splashed".
- 7. Surf fishermen are a friendly lot.
- 8. The ocean waves are remarkable.



9. Surf fishing is addictive.

10. Do not leave your bunker in a bucket overnight in your car. (If you do this once you will never ever do it again).

Frank learned several lessons on his first trip out surf fishing! Yes, surf fishing is less expensive because an entry level, 10-foot surf rod and reel with line costs as little as \$40 to \$50. If you want to upgrade your surf combo, you can buy a really fine one for less than \$150.

"What will a little more money get me?"

A fishing reel with more ball bearings will last longer and crank smoother for a longer period of time. fishing rod with more graphite will be lighter in the hand and cast a little easier. A 10 to 11-foot combination is what you want for surf fishing. The reel should be spooled anywhere from 15 to 20 pound test monofilament line. If you are only going to try surf fishing and are not sure if it's going to be your favorite past time, then a starter outfit is fine. See if you like it, and THEN you can always give it away later to your favorite buddy so he can go fishing with you. That will give you a reason to buy yourself an upgraded rod and reel.

"What else do I need to get started surf fishing?"

A sand spike is number one. It's a plastic PVC tube to put your rod in while baiting up and waiting for a bite. It's of utmost importance not to let your rod and reel fall in the sand while surf fishing. When you are finished for the day you should hose off your rod and reel with fresh water. Never, ever, rinse off your rod and reel in the ocean.

Besides the sand spike, get

yourself a 5-gallon bucket. The bucket is very useful, because you can carry all your stuff to the beach in it. As Frank says, you can use it as a seat. I like to keep my bait in it, because if you let your bait lie on the beach, the seagulls will steal it in an instant!

shy. Ask away!

Buy yourself a couple of surf rigs. Always buy at least one extra. Never go to the beach with one rig! What if you lose it? Or a skate mangles it?

Carry sinkers in a couple of

Carry sinkers in a couple of different weights. I usually



Other important items are:

1. A pair of pliers to take off skates, bluefish, sharks and other toothy critters. Never, ever, put your hands directly on a skate or ray. Never put your fingers in the mouth of saltwater fish that you are not sure of, especially bluefish! They bite!

- 2. A rag to wipe your hands and grip a fish or sand shark
- 3. A cutting board or piece of wood to cut your bait
 - 4. A knife to cut your bait.
- 5. Nail clippers, scissors, or some little tool to cut your line if you need to re-rig. (Use the knife in a pinch).
 - 6. Rigs, sinkers, bait....

Of course, you need surf rigs. All bait and tackle stores have plenty of surf rigs to choose from. Many have colorful surf floats that raise your bait off the bottom floor, away from the crabs. As the seasons change, so do the fish.

Frank said that I am a wealth of information. Well, any tackle store owner will be able to tell you which rig is working best, and what bait is the preferred bait that week. If you don't ask, you're not going to find out. So don't be

take a 3, 4, and 5-ounce pyramid or hurricane type sinker. (Any of the pointy type ones, so they don't roll back in after you cast them out there).

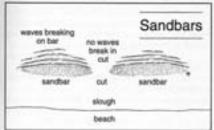
The weather! As Frank says, the weather can change in an instance. If it's a nice day, and you have the chance to go fishing, then go fishing! Don't worry about the perfect tide since that isn't as important in the surf as it is in the bayside.

"Where can I go? When is surf fishing allowed?"

Memorial Once Day weekend gets here, surf fishing is allowed before 10 A.M. and after 5:30 P.M. In the offseason, you can surf fish all day, as long as no one is in the water in front of you. If in doubt, ask a lifeguard. If there are no lifeguards around and no one is in the water, go fishing! If you want to fish in the middle of the day during the summer, you will have to go to Assateague Island and fish in the fishing areas, or go up on the Ocean Pier and cast your surf rod up there. You can also cast off the beach side of the Ocean City Jetty. You can also go into the Delaware Seashore State Park, BUT, you will need to get a Delaware Fishing License. These areas

www.coastalfisherman.net are real nice.

A lot of fish are caught on the beach from May through November, with some caught in April and December. Try to find a place on the beach that is not too flat. Drive to the ends of the streets at low tide and look for a hole, slough, or rip. Dark rolling water means



deeper water. Crashing white water means shallow water. Reading the beach is an art that is well worth learning about if you get into the sport of surf fishing. Ask the tackle store owner about it, and I'm sure they'll give you some tips.

"What else to know?"

Well, as Frank says, watch out for those waves! Don't leave your bait in the car and enjoy the incredible beauty of the beach!

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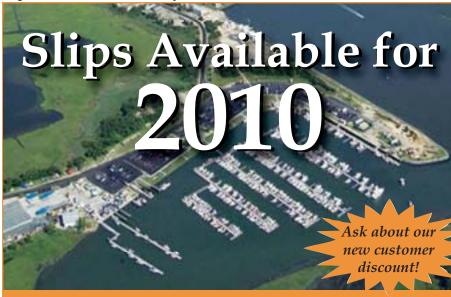

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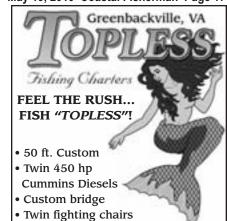

Crab Crostini **Appetizer**

1 French baguette

3 TBSP. butter, melted

1 lb. fresh lump crabmeat, drained

2 TBSP. dry sherry

1 TBSP. chopped fresh parsley

11/2 tsp. hot sauce

3/4 tsp. salt, divided

1/2 cup sour cream

2 TBSP. mayonnaise

2 tsp. minced green onion

1 tsp. lemon zest

2 tsp. fresh lemon juice

1/4 tsp. pepper

Preheat oven 350 to degrees.

Cut bread into 1/4 inch thick slices.

Place on a baking sheet. Brush tops with butter.

Bake 12 to 14 minutes or until golden brown.

Bread may be stored in an airtight container for 3 days.

Pick crabmeat free of shells.

Gently toss crab with sherry, parsley, hot sauce, and 1/2 tsp. of salt in a bowl; cover and chill 1 to 24 hours.

Meanwhile, stir together sour cream, next 5 ingredients, and remaining 1/4 tsp. of salt until blended; cover and chill

bread slice; top each slice evenly with crab mixture.

Serve immediately. Makes 8 to 12 appetizers.

Hearty Sea Bass Soup

2 TBSP. olive oil 2 cloves garlic, minced 1 tsp. dried red chile flakes

chile pepper flakes; cook over medium heat.

Add onion, 1/2 cup of the fish stock, salt and pepper.

Stir in dried thyme, oregano and basil.

Bring to a boil; reduce heat to low, and simmer for 10 minutes.

During the last 2 minutes of cooking, add thyme, oregano and basil.

In a large saucepan, stir together remaining fish stock, potato, carrot and bay leaf.

Simmer for 5 minutes.

Add green beans and simmer for another 5 minutes.

Add tomato sauce, fresh tomatoes, parsley, cannellini beans, and the sauteed onion mixture.

Stir well and continue to simmer for 5 more minutes.

Add the fish pieces and spinach; simmer for another 5 minutes or until the fish is cooked through and just beginning to flake.

Makes 4 large servings.

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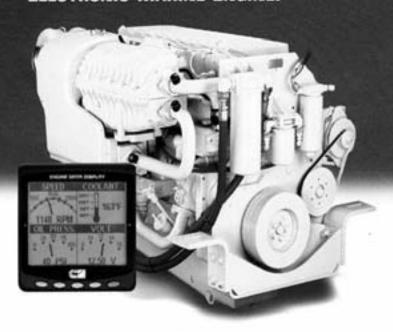

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Tackle Shop

I'm usually not a fan of stereos on boats. I like my boat time to be nice and quiet, away from people and all the hustle bustle.



That was until I had a Fusion MS-IP600G marine stereo installed on my boat. The feature I absolutely love on this stereo is that I can plug my iPod right into it, enabling me to play all my favorite songs during the trip to the fishing grounds.

I've had stereos on my boats in the past, but I never had any luck with them. Radio reception was usually sub-par and cd's would usually skip.

The Fusion MS-IP600G provides a 360-degree waterproof design, multi-zone volume control, die-cast construction to withstand the

harsh marine environment, a large, ajustable backlit LCD, complete integration with iPods and an advanced power saver, which enables high output efficiency and low battery drain.

The integration with the iPod is key, and I'm sure there are other marine stereos with this feature, I just haven't used them. On this model, you flip down the front and actually slide your iPod into the stereo so that is it completely protected. It comes with sleeves that fit every type of iPod, including an iPhone.

The stereo is very easy to use. The backlit LCD display is bright enough to read, even on the sunniest days and the integration with the iPod is flawless. Can you tell I love it?

You can pick up a Fusion MS-IP600G, at local marine electronic stores. The stereo retails for \$299.00.

By now, everyone should be

familiar with the Berkley Gulp! Alive! line of artificial soft baits. Most anglers have been using the Swimming Mullet, which looks like the standard curly tail. However, there are many other types in this line of soft baits that are effective.



Recently, I spoke with Sue Foster at Oyster Bay Tackle and Capt. Bruce McGuigan at Capt. Mac's Bait & Tackle. They were both telling me about the good results anglers are getting from the Gulp! Alive! Ghost Shrimp.

"These Gulp! baits are really incredible." said Capt. Bruce. "Flounder fishermen have really been catching some nice fish on the Ghost Shrimp this spring."

The Ghost Shrimp is a 3-inch soft bait, impregnated with, and floating in, Gulp's "Magic Gravy" formula. It comes in six different colors.

Most tackle shops in our area have a great selection of Gulp! baits to choose from. You can purchase a 7-pack of each color for \$6.99 or a bucket of assorted Assateague Tackle rigs have become a hot seller along the Delmarva coast and this year they introduced a new drum rig that has already produced some quality catches.

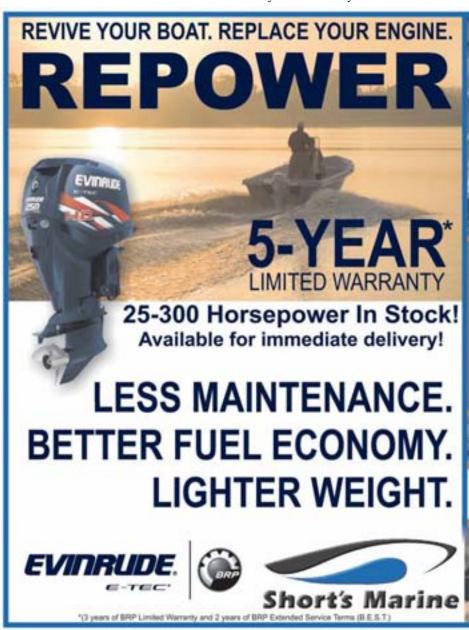
The Double Blade Puppy Drum Rig is made with an 80 lb. main leader, 4/0 or 5/0 Gamakatsu circle hooks, brightly colored beads and 2 copper blades.

According to Dale Timmons, the rig seems to work better with strips of bait rather than chunks. A finger mullet fillet or a strip of spot is ideal.



In the spring, Dale says that using this rig with peeler crabs is ideal. It also works well for flounder and sea bass on ocean wrecks.

The rig retails for \$3.99 and is available at local tackle shops.

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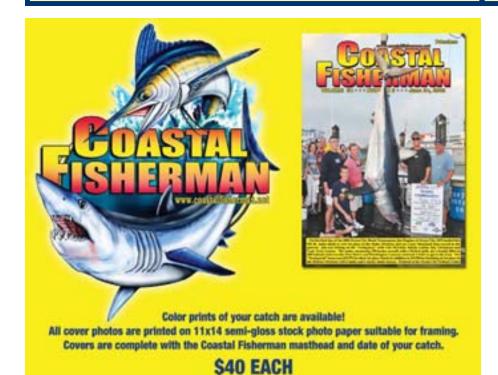

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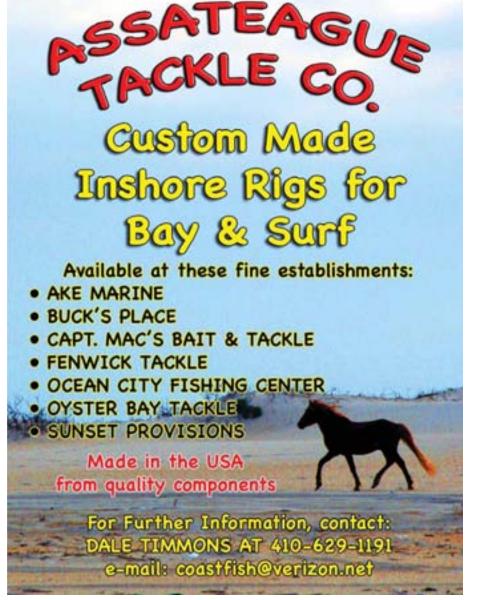
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Delaware Fishing Report

by Rick Willman



Hi folks! Fishing this past week has been pretty good.

Flounder are being caught in the back bays especially at the VFW Slough, Burton's Island, Gull Island and Massey's Ditch. Rehoboth Bay is also providing some keeper size fish as well.

The Indian River Inlet has been keeping anglers busy hauling in stripers and shad. Jared Becker caught a 37.5incher while fishing the jetty. Debbie Hannum and Freddie Burton fished from the rails near the Coast Guard Station and banged the stripers. Debbie weighed in a 29 pounder and Freddie had a 21 pounder.

So all in all fishing has not been bad and if the winds ever lay down it should be fantastic. Activity in the ocean should start to pick up with the sea bass season opening on Saturday.

A few reports of ocean



The striper bite was epic in the Indian River Inlet on Friday and especially on Friday night before a storm rolled through. Erin Schuster, Ray Halfen, Sr. and Ray Halfen, Jr. from Newark, DE and Jesse Coulbourn of Dagsboro, DE were casting Storm lures and bucktails off the North Jetty at night when they landed these 8 keeper stripers during the incoming tide. The fish measured between 34 and 40-inches and the largest tipped the scales at 22 lbs.

flatties have come in by anglers fishing for threshers and dragging a bait on the bottom. When you begin fishing that deep water for flounder, be sure your bait is on the bottom. The use of braided line will allow you to accomplish this with less weight and you will also find it much easier to detect a light bite. Another thing to keep in mind when fishing the deeper water is to use bigger bait. If you are using cut bait, use a longer strip than you might use in the back bays. Be sure to give the fish enough time to get the whole bait in its mouth before you set the hook.

Bill's Sport Shop reported that William Rawlings of Laurel, DE caught a 28.25", 9.45 lb. flounder to sit in first place in the Bill's Sport Shop Flounder Tournament.

Joe Coyne caught and released a 50" striper on clams at Herring Point. The day before, Joe also caught 4 stripers (all released) up to 37".

Bobby called from the Cape Henlopen Pier and reported that an angler was fishing next to the Pier when a school of porpoise

pushed a school of bunker right up to the beach. Pete Hoerner casted a Gulp! artificial bait right into the school and pulled out a 38", 17.75 lb. striper.

Deanna from Hook'em & Cook'em Bait & Tackle reported that if you were looking for good fishing action, then it was a great week to fish the Indian River Inlet and a bad week to be a rockfish. The week started slow, but around Thursday it all changed.

Stripers started showing up on Thursday at the mouth of the Inlet and steadily moved in for this weekend.

The night bite was great on Friday with some people referring to it as a "Frenzy" all along the inlet. Many anglers caught their limit within an hour or two.

Fishermen reported catching stripers anywhere from the bridge to the Coast Guard Station on both the north and south sides of the Inlet.

Most fishermen have been catching their keepers using white bucktails with white worms, although some have had luck fishing with Tsunami and Storm Lures.

Most of the fish have been reported from 30" up to 45". We have had several brought to the fish cleaning table that ranged in weight from 13-24 lbs.

Not to be outdone by the inlet fishermen, surfcasters had a few stripers on Friday evening, before sunset.

Snapper bluefish, ranging from 12-16 inches, were also caught in the inlet, but not in any large numbers. Along with the bluefish, shad are schooling out in the inlet also. Most anglers are snagging these fish with spec rigs of various sizes and colors. One man reported that he caught shad for almost 2 hours the other night.

Flounder action has slowed a bit, but only because more fishermen have turned their attention to fishing for stripers. A few flounder were brought in on Saturday. Minnows on plain hooks or bucktails, or Gulp "Pearl White Swimming Mullet" on a 1/2 oz. jig head are still the ticket when fishing for the flatties. These fish are still being caught in the back bay around Massey's Ditch and the VFW Slough.

Only a few days left until we can fish for those sea bass, and we are counting down the days!

Joe Morris at Lewes Harbour Marina said black drum turned on around Friday's new moon. Crews reported good action with boomers on the Coral Beds and near the submerged piles off Slaughter Beach. The best bites occurred during the evening flood tide. Surf clams were the favored bait.

Guys on the "Pirate King Two" returned to the dock by 10 pm on Friday night with 6 drum weighing up to 70 lbs. Captain Carey Evans' group aboard the "Grizzly" scored 6 black drum on Saturday night. The "Grizzly" got 5 big drum on Friday night, including an 83.5 lb. behemoth for Dan McDermott.

Drumming should be in full swing for Memorial Day weekend, and normally peaks with the full moon at the end of May. Joe said the shop will be carrying surf clams through the run, but suggests reserving bait early in the week.

Stripers continue to roam the surf. Drew Stuchlik and Judah

Lynam limited out with 4 big bass on Saturday. The largest was Judah's 32.8 lb. bruiser. Their success came while soaking bunker heads near the Herring Point jetties. Boaters casting artificials along the Outer Wall also caught striped bass. Bomber plugs and Storm Shads were popular lures.

Flounder came from the Lewes Canal, Roosevelt Inlet and the Cape Henlopen Pier. Gulp! Swimming Mullets in pink, white or chartreuse were quite effective for flatties. Some anglers combined Gulp! with shiners, minnows or a strip of cut bunker for a deadly flatfish sandwich.

Joe said there's been a good response to the Canal Flounder Tournament to be held Friday May 21, and he's expecting a big turnout

A friend of mine has a boat that he's really quite proud of. Actually it's not the boat so much as the electronics he has installed on his vessel that he just can't quit raving about. At 22-feet it's not a huge boat but he has it rigged-out with enough 12-volt "stuff" that the console looks like it should be mounted on something ready to be shot up to the space station.

A couple years ago I was striper fishing with this guy and the fish were being a little obstinate. We trolled all over the ocean but just couldn't seem get on the fish. My friend wasn't about to give up eyes though; with his bouncing around his colorful array of LCD screens he kept us in the hunt as we zigzagged our way up and down the coast. He just knew that at any moment one of his trusty machines would locate some fish and have us hooked-up and happy.

At one point I looked back and saw some terns diving about 200-yards back in our wake. At my suggestion that we might want to loop around and troll where the birds were working he told me, "I didn't see anything on the machine when we came over that spot, there's nothing there."

So we trolled on-and-onand-on. Later I saw a whale blow about a half-mile away. "Did you see that?" I shouted as I pointed to the north.

Momentarily lifting his face from one of the screens "What-where?" he squawked.

"Out there," I said, again pointing in the direction of the spout that was, by then, gone.

"I'll find it. " He said with confidence as he returned his gaze to the console and started pushing buttons and turning knobs.

The fact was he never did see the whale, even though it spouted about three more times as we trolled past it about a quarter-mile away. He also didn't see the group of gannets diving inshore as we made a turn to head south and back to the inlet after he declared, "I can't find anything – anywhere, there's no fish out here today!"

I don't have to tell anyone incredible marine electronics are these days. They've made boating much safer for mariners of all skill levels and certainly have the ability to make us more efficient at locating fish. Unfortunately, a byproduct of all this technology is that many anglers are losing the ability to do things that require more than the push of a button or a tap on a screen. I'm already surprised at how many mariners are willing to

leave the dock these days without real "paper" charts aboard because their GPS units have electronic charting capabilities. Modern marine electronics can only "enhance" not "replace" the need for common sense and practical experience in both navigation and fish-finding.

Last week, my wife and I hopped in our little boat to spend the last couple hours of the day casting to bluefish and shad near the inlet. The evening before, we were there and the fish were so thick that we had one on almost every cast. We were hoping for a repeat of the fun, but when we arrived, even with the same state of tide, it was obvious from the start that the bite wouldn't be the same. No birds, no schools of baitfish, no fish jumping out of the water, nothing going on. On that particular boat we have no electronics so we only could guess what was going on below the surface, but from all that we could "see" it looked like it wasn't going to be a repeat of the day before - and we were right.

We drifted along and did some "blind-casting" just in case the fish were there but just not showing. Our attempts were to no avail until we spotted a couple terns make a quick dip and a couple circles about 50-yards to the south. We moved the boat close enough to get off a couple casts just as more birds were moving in and bluefish started to break around the boat. The fish were only up for about 30seconds but the five-minute advance tip-off by the birds gave us plenty of time to move within casting range - no electronics necessary.

Electronics can be great for finding fish, but anglers will often find Mother Nature to be a much more reliable source for clues to what's going on above and beneath the waves. But to recognize the signs anglers need to know what to look for and that takes a little bit of knowledge about the surrounding environment. In

the case I just described the birds we saw were "terns" which are a common and relatively small species of seabird that feeds primarily on small fish. Unlike the big herring or black-back gulls, terns aren't going to get all worked up over a floating bluefish carcass or a dead crab. If terns are diving, they're over little fish that are being chased to the surface by bigger fish underneath.

Terns are good birds to see working either inshore or offshore. Gannets will usually be offshore and are the big diving birds with long pointed wings, head and tail that we see mostly in the cold weather months. They're also live fish eaters and great indicators that predators like big bluefish or rockfish might be in the area. Gannets are known for diving from great heights straight down into the water and then swimming even deeper to catch their meal. Armed with knowledge, anglers should know that fish below these birds could actually be quite deep and not necessarily willing to come to the surface to take a bait.

A white egret standing on the edge of a marsh and peering intently into the water can be a good indicator of baitfish below. If the marsh is adjacent to some deep water, the bait it's watching and hoping to grab could be being pushed up by some type of predator fish below.

Whether they're schools of big bunker offshore, shiners under a bridge, bull minnows in a marsh, or grass shrimp around a dock, seeing natural bait can be a good indicator of the presence or absence of big fish if anglers are able to properly interpret what they're seeing. A "happy" school of bait that's just casually swimming around or holding in a current might indicate that there's nothing in the area that has them worried. It's possible that big fish could be close by and just waiting to pounce on the unsuspecting bait, but anglers



probably shouldn't waste too much time fishing around happy bait.

On the other hand, when bait schools are broken up and the little critters can be seen dashing haphazardly about or periodically maybe "showering" out of the water, fishermen had better get their lines working fast because some kind of carnage is definitely going on below. Of course what can be seen from the surface may only be the tip of the iceberg as to what's going on below so anglers should pay keen attention to even the smallest little flip of a tail, swirl, or splash they observe because it could be the only indication of big stuff happening underneath.

Slicks can be one of the greatest things to encounter while fishing because they not only show that fish are in the area but they also indicate that the fish are feeding. Slicks are nothing but a sheen on the water created when some sort of oily fish has been ripped apart by another fish. But not

all feeding activity creates slicks. Of course it takes an oily bait to make a slick, but it also means the feeding fish must tear-up its prey if the oils are to be released. A bunker will probably be slashed-up and release a lot of oil if it's taken by a bluefish, but that same bunker might not release any oil of it's swallowed whole by a rockfish. Therefore, slicks can help anglers understand both what's being eaten as well as what's doing the eating.

Modern electronics will certainly help put fishermen over fish, but anglers can miss a lot of opportunities if they don't balance the time they spend staring into LCD screens with that which is spent paying attention to what Mother Nature has to show.

High Definition Captures the Marine **Electronics Market**

It started small but now seems to be the standard for marine electronics, especially in the fish finder category That is the use of digital processing and so-called high definition displays. But what do they do for you and are they really a big deal or just more "hype" to sell a product.

First you need to realize that the term "high definition", as it applies to marine equipment, is not exactly the same as your new LCD Hi-Def television, although the principle is the same. In general, high definition refers to the process of pixilation and scanning of the image that is produced on the LCD display. The average pixel count (number of dots of color) for most marine displays out today is 800 x 600 as compared to those without so-called Hi-Def presentations that have 400 or less. The end result is that the images are crisper, brighter, and sharper. If I had my choice between a fish finder with Hi-Def and one without, all other things being equal, I would definitely go with the Hi-Def model.

The other technology that

is being used by most better fish finders today is "digital processing", although it may go by different names. Several manufacturers are using their own version of it with their own "patented" design but they all do basically the same Digital processing thing. removes excessive noise and unwanted signals resulting in clearer, less cluttered images. The technology of how this is achieved is something we don't need to get into here but it is true, some will argue, that the resulting images suffer some loss as noisy returns are eliminated. However, remaining images that are the really important ones are more defined, especially when combined with Hi-Def presentations.

Here is how some of the main manufacturers of fish finders describe their products:

FURUNO

FURUNO's digital filter optimizes the gain to obtain highly defined images of underwater conditions. clearly shows target fish close to the seabed. The digital filter also eliminates noise to deliver sharp and detailed echo presentation, achieving detection of fishing reefs and

even individual fish with absolute clarity.

SIMRAD

The Navico (SIMRAD) Broadband Sounder technology is a truly different approach. The BSM-1 brings together a very clean, low power signal, an adaptable long pulse and an extremely sensitive linear receiver. The resulting high quality signal and the best digital signal processing allow the BSM-1 to provide superior clarity and fantastic echosounder images. In addition, the long pulse widths and clean, efficient signal provide an exponential difference in the ability to "Go Deep". No longer is power the measure of echosounder performance. Side by side comparisons with existing technology prove that a "whisper" is better.

LOWRANCE

LOWRANCE HDS® Highest-Definition Broadband means less noise, more targets, crystal-clear clarity, greater detail shallow-water coverage and incredible deepwater performance

SI-TEX states its sounders have a digital signal processor (DSP) for a clearer image that enhances fish targets shallow and deep depths

Some manufacturers do

give detailed not any explanation. They simply state that they have HD digital in some form.



So what is the buyer to make of this new flashy nomenclature? When it all filters down, you can conclude that your fish finder is not going to look as sharp as your new TV but it will be better depending on its actual resolution. So forget all the patented terms and look for the specs on a unit. More resolution is better. If the unit says it uses digital processing, that is a good thing and it might make the difference in deciding one model versus another. You have to be an informed buyer, however. Sometimes a manufacturer's claims may be a little overstated so check with your local dealer or someone who has actually used the unit before deciding.

Some fish finders use the term sonar but they are not true sonar units and we'll talk a little bit about that in future articles. Next week, we'll spend some time on the Hidigital/ Def/ broadband features as it relates to radar units and in at least one sounder made by Simrad.

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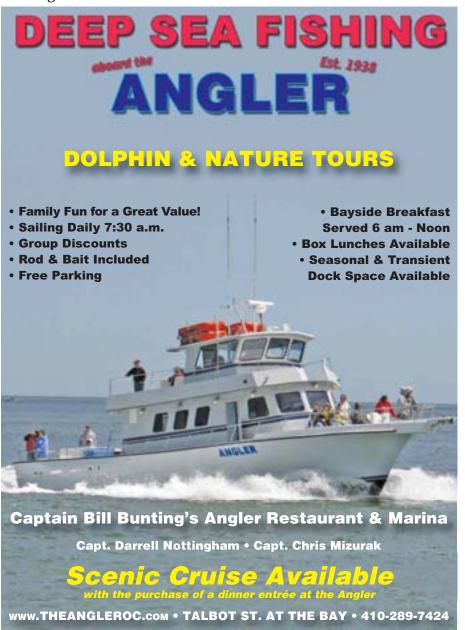


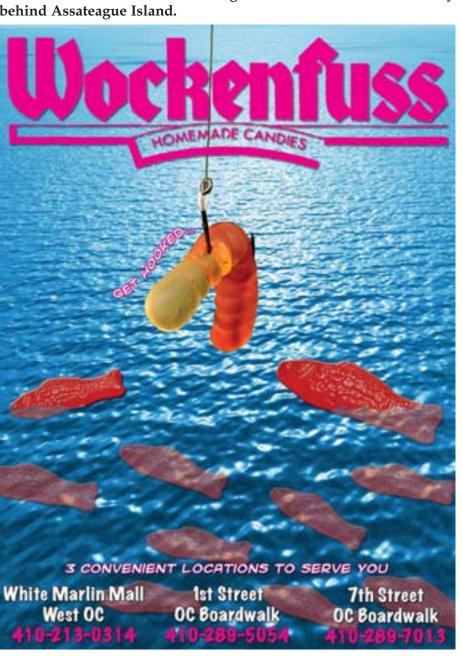

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VA / NC Fishing Report

Virginia Marine Resources Commission "The Saltwater Review"

Chincoteague

According to Donna at Captain Bob's, the wind really kept people off the water last week. Hot spots for flounder last week were the Four Mouths around Marker 5, Queen's Sound, and the Assateague Channel near Tom's Cove.

Bluefish have also been caught around the Four Mouths. Surf fishing is excellent with large striped bass and a few black drum being caught.

Wachapreague

Despite the poor weather, there was a lot of fishing activity out of Captain Zed's last week. Anglers were catching numerous flounder, and there were several hot spots in the area. Those included Millstone Creek (south of the Coast Guard Station) Drawing, Green and Bradford's channels (near Bradford's bay on the west side of the island has been exceptional), and Gates Channel.

Black drum fishermen have also been doing really well in the inlet on both sides near Dawson's Shoals. The area approximately a mile and a half south of Wachapreague Inlet (near the old Coast Guard Station location for you long-timers) has been doing really well for black drum.

Cape Charles

At Chris' Bait and Tackle, staff reported a few black drum catches last week. They are expecting to see good drum fishing when the weather allows

anglers to go out. Anglers near Oyster are reporting the best flounder action they have ever seen! There are also rumors of a few croaker arriving.

Captain Ray Cardone, of Cherrystone, reports that kingfish (sea mullet) were biting really well last week. He has not yet seen black drum but has heard rumors of large schools being sighted around the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel.

Lower Bay/Bridge Tunnel

Windy conditions were reported from the York River Fishing Center. When anglers can go out, really nice croaker fishing has been reported in the York River. Small flounder are also beginning to bite (only a few keepers). Speckled trout have not fully shown up in the Mobjack Bay area; however, staff is expecting to see them soon.

Ken Neill, of the Peninsula Anglers Club and IGFA representative, contributed the following:

The black drum bite has been good on the seaside of the Eastern Shore, such as inside the Great Machipongo Inlet. A few fish have shown at the usual bay black drum areas like the Cabbage Patch. This bite should heat up this week.

Red drum continue to be caught in the surf of the Eastern Shore, though the action is not as hot as it was a few weeks ago. Some fish have been caught on 9-Foot-Shoal. This fishery will pick up later this month.

Striped bass fishing is very good around the islands of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel. Right now, you can keep one fish per person of at least 32 inches in length. Boats are coming in with their limits and releasing other fish.

A reminder to all striped bass anglers. Regulation 4VAC 20-252-10 ET SEQ. requires all striped bass kept during the trophy season be reported. You can report online through the Virginia Saltwater Journal (www.vasaltwaterjournal.com) or filling out and mailing in a form (included on pages 6 and 7).

The flounder bite has been hit or miss, with more misses lately. Most of the flatfish caught are too short to keep. The seaside inlets of the Eastern Shore have been producing some good catches of flounder.

A few nice speckled trout are being caught in the Mobjack Bay area.

Offshore, there have been some tuna caught out of Virginia, but we are still waiting for a consistent bite to develop in range of Virginia boats.

Dr. Julie Ball, IGFA International Representative for Virginia Beach, contributed the following:

Anglers anxiously are awaiting the big rally in the drum action that usually occurs around time each spring. Unfortunately, the drum have yet to receive the memo. Verv scattered catches of both black and red drum are frustrating drum seekers. The few black drum hooked so far are coming from Quinby, Great Machipongo Inlet near Hogg Island, the shallow surf off the Eastern Shore Barrier islands, and near buoy 13 on chowder and sea clams. Although most of the blacks are ranging around 30 pounds, a few fish are pushing to over 46inches. This bite should pick up

Surf anglers are still pulling some red drum from the surf lines along the Eastern Shore, and scattered catches are coming from off Fisherman's Island. Many of these hook-ups are a result of spotting a swimming school on the surface. Most boats are reporting poor results, with the luckier boats managing only one release. Blue crabs and bunker work well fished on a fish-finder rig on the bottom.

Rockfish are making up for some of the lull with other species lately. Striped bass measuring up to 46-inches are hitting near the 3rd and 4th islands on both live bait and top water lures. The third island is the most popular area lately.

According to the Virginia Beach Fishing Center, Rudee Inlet is still an excellent source of respectable bluefish around 4 to 5 pounds. Speckled trout are also hitting twister tail grubs within Rudee. A few keeper flounder are also coming from the mouth of the inlet.

If blueline tilefish are your desire, these fish are available in deeper water over 300 feet, along with a variety of grouper and other deep water species. On May 22, black sea bass will be back in season.

Outer Banks, NC

Offshore fishing out of Oregon Inlet continues to see a good bluefin tuna bite. The best action has been a little closer to shore than the last few weeks.

Dolphin and wahoo were also available to those looking for some surface action.

Deeper water bottom-droppers continue to catch amberjack, tilefish, and vermillion snapper. The artificial reefs produced sheepshead, black drum, and triggerfish.

Pier fishing and surf fishing from the Nags Head beaches were producing puffers, sea mullet, croaker, and bluefish. Inside the inlet and sounds, speckled trout were around the area bridges, while flounder continue to be caught in the skinny water around the small islands.

South of Oregon Inlet, bluefish have been biting very well. Scattered reports of red drum in the surf were floating around, with Rodanthe being whispered as a good area. Sea mullet were around, and even a few pompano were being caught around Ramp 55.

Offshore fishing out of Hatteras has seen an early run of cobia. Dolphin were also around, and people were able to catch their limits of amberjack.

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Last of NYC subway cars sunk on Delaware's artificial reefs

It's the end of the line for the deployment of New York City subway cars on Delaware's artificial reefs—at least the end of it until the next line of subway cars are shunted into retirement. The last 24 older model cars made available as reefing material recently went down onto the Del-Jersey-Land Inshore Reef, bringing the total number of subway cars sunk on the state's artificial reefs to 1,329 since the first deployment in 2001.

The retired cars came to Delaware waters as always from New York's Metropolitan Transit Authority.

Between 2001, when reefing of the subway cars began, and 2003, 619 stainless steel cars were sunk. A second stage of deployment on Delaware's reef sites, from 2008 to the present, saw another 710 cars sent to the ocean floor as reefing material. The subway cars make ideal reefing material, because their windows and other cavities provide the perfect sanctuary for reef fish. Within a few weeks, blue mussels, sponges, barnacles and soft corals attach to the structure, and in about a year, the reef will be fully productive, resembling natural habitat.

The cars in the last deployment, like all those previously dropped onto Delaware artificial reefs, were 60-footers, while New York's Metropolitan Transit Authority now runs 75-foot subway cars on its rails.

The deployment on the Del-Jersey-Land brought to almost 350 the number of subway cars along a stretch of man-enhanced marine habitat that is the state's newest artificial reef. Delaware's largest artificial reef, the Redbird Reef, has nearly three times that subway cars placed throughout the more than 1.3 square nautical miles of ocean bottom comprising it 16 nautical miles off the Indian River Inlet. The Redbird Reef's name is in fact a derivation of New York City's "Red Bird" subway cars

that make up much of the reef.

ASMFC expands black sea bass season

It's official. The Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission's Summer Flounder, Scup and Black Sea Bass Management Board has modified the 2010 season length for the black sea bass recreational fishery. The season will now run from May 22 to October 11, 2010 and from November 1 to December 31, 2010.

The season represents an extension from what was originally planned. When the original season was developed, the Board only had 2009 harvest estimates for January through June. Harvest estimates for July through December 2009 were projected using previous years' data to calculate a total harvest estimate. Based these on preliminary projections, the original season was developed with the intent of reducing recreational harvest by 44% from

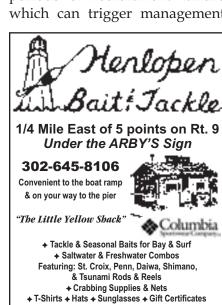
Final 2009 harvest estimates were made available at the end of April. The estimate indicates that harvest is less than previously projected and only a 21.4% reduction is required for the 2010 recreational season. The newly approved season is anticipated to achieve a 26% reduction and allows for a reasonable conservation buffer to account for uncertainty in the harvest estimates and the effectiveness of regulations. The season was further expanded into November and December to allow for increased access by party/charter boats and private boat/shore-based anglers that did not have a late fall/early winter season last year.

Increased Commercial Striper Quota Proposed

The Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission's Atlantic Striped Bass Management Board has approved Draft Addendum II to Amendment 6 to the Interstate Fishery Management Plan for Atlantic Striped Bass for public comment. The Draft Addendum proposes two changes to the striped bass management program: (1) an increase in the coastal commercial quota, and (2) revising the definition of recruitment failure based on Technical Committee advice.

The proposal to increase the coastal commercial quota is intended to improve equality between the commercial and recreational fishery sectors. Although Amendment established management programs for both fisheries based on the same target fishing mortality rate, the implementation of state-specific quotas for coastal commercial harvest (and not for recreational harvest) has prevented the commercial and recreational fisheries from responding equally to changes in striped bass population size. Since 2004, coastal commercial harvest has decreased by 3.6 percent, while recreational harvest increased by 13.7 percent. Under the option, the Board would select a percent increase to be applied to the coastal commercial allocations assigned Amendment 6.

The Management Board voted to include a second issue in the Draft Addendum based on information presented at the meeting. As part of its review of the juvenile abundance indices, the Striped Bass Technical Committee recommended to the Management Board a revision to how striped bass recruitment failure is defined. Juvenile abundance indices are important component of the striped bass monitoring program and are used to determine periods of recruitment failure which can trigger management

Adopting the proposed recommendation would result in a fixed value to determine recruitment failure in each surveyed area rather than a value that changes from year to year. Use of either the Amendment 6 definition or the Technical Committee recommendation for recruitment failure does not result in any necessary changes to the current management program.

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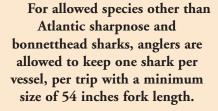
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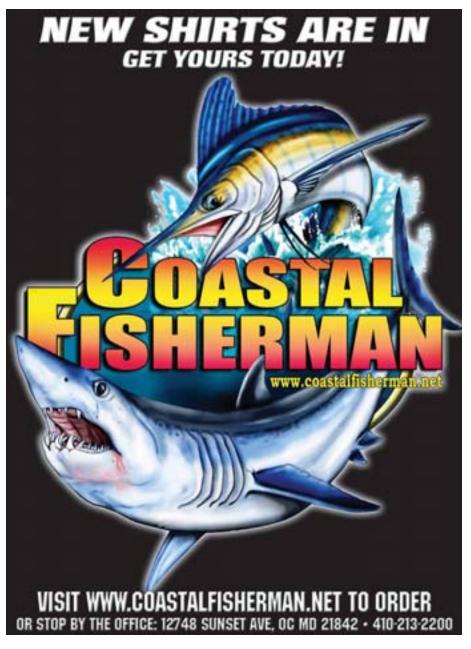






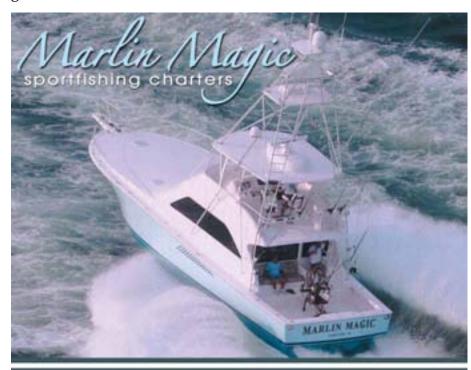
