

Another year and another first for the crew of the "Full Service" out of Sunset Marina. Last year they scored the first bigeye tuna of the season on May 5th, and this year it was the first yellowfin tuna! Capts. Jim Barbey and Brendan Barbey saw a temperature break east of the Washington Canyon and decided to make a run. They were joined by anglers Chris Mentlik, Jermey Heinz, Jeff Rosenkilde, Taylor Bakke and Todd Sauerwald with mate Mike Davis. After a 65 mile run east in mostly 40° water they found a temperature break with clear water up to 68.5°s and in 400 fathoms! They saw birds, whales and lots of sea life which was promising. Shortly after lines in they had a double hookup. One pulled the hook at the boat, but they got Chris' in the box earning him and the crew First Fish for yellowfin for 2024. Other than a few skipjacks, these were the only bites for the day.



# Offshore Report by Larry Budd De Larry Budd

#### This Week Last Year

- The sea bass bite continued to be picky and spotty, but what anglers were missing in quantity was made up in quality. Some big knotheads made there way into coolers.
- •This was the week the new regulations went info effect for stripers in Maryland. The *Slot* was reduces to 28"-31" in Maryland first, with Delaware and Virginia still a few weeks away from updating their regulations. Steve Goff hit the sands of Assateague Island in Maryland just a few days before the change and landed a sweet 32" striper and two others that were released.

Welcome to the Memorial Day edition of the Coastal Fisherman for 2024. Memorial Day is a solemn tribute to the brave men and women who sacrificed their lives for our freedom. It is a day to honor their courage, dedication and patriotism. As we gather with loved ones and friends on the long weekend, let us remember that our peace and liberty are built on their sacrifices. Let us cherish their legacy and strive to uphold the values they fought for.

Weather continues to be our adversary for getting offshore. Opening day for sea bass was last Wednesday, however howling winds, high seas and pummeling rain kept most captains in the slip. Capt. Chris Mizuak on the headboat "Angler" did get an intrepid crew to run out last Friday. They headed out about 40 miles

in some sloppy weather and set anchor in about 100′ of water. Capt. Chris reported that the bass were picky and the bite was slow to start, but eventually some knot heads began to come over the rails. Appropriately, or coincidentally, it was Bob Houser (aka Sea Bass Bob) who got the first keeper knothead earning the First Fish title for sea bass in 2024. He used a 6″ jig for that one, however others were getting some double hookups with hi/lo rigs & clam.



Saturday saw most of the fleet heading out despite conditions that were still less than ideal. Thankfully the conditions had settled enough that the bass were hungry and biting. Several boats reporting anglers with limit catches, like the "Surface Tension" out of Lewes and the "Angler" at the Talbot Street Pier.


We also got our first fish report from the canyons. The private boat "Full Service" out of Sunset Marina with Capts. Jim and Brendan Barbey at the helm took a run east of the Washington Canyon to explore an eddy they had been tracking. That was pretty good insight given that cloud cover had been hampering the satellite surface temp reports! They were east of the Washington Canyon when they found a temperature break





with clear water up to 68.5°! Shortly after lines in, they got a double hookup of yellowfin Angler Chris Mentlik got one in the boat; however the second one pulled the hook right at the boat. That secured First Fish honors for Chris for yellowfin! Capt. Jim reported seeing a lot of life out there and was convinced there would be more vellowfin action to come, but those were the only bites for the day, except for some skipjacks. Congratulations to Chris and crew.

Most of the captains I have talked to believe the tuna bite and perhaps mahi will turn on quickly as we move into June. Some research on Rip Chart's forecast would seem to support that, but the cloud cover is still limiting reports (see example to the right from Rutgers, all the white area is unreported). Our Windy App subscription shows a couple days this week that would be fishable. The weekend still looks like a question mark as I pen this report on Monday.

I concur with the option that things will turn on quickly and we will see not only the tuna action pick up, but perhaps our first white marlin in the next few weeks. Until then, keep your eyes on the weather east and take advantage of the fantastic action of the beaches for bluefish, striper and drum. As always, check our fishing reports from Capt. BJ Pietryak and Capt. Matt Abell for the details on the latest hot spots and baits. §



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



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## **WAVE DANCER**

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Last week in Maryland saw the start of the sea bass season on May 15. Unfortunately it was marred with high winds and rain. Big seas kept most of the boats at the docks. Friday was the best day of the week for nearshore sea bass fishing, however high seas made any attempt to get to the deep wrecks very difficult.

## Nearshore Wrecks & Reefs

The kickoff of sea bass season is our unofficial start of the fishing season. Big sea heights and high winds made it a slow start to nearshore fishing. When boats were able to venture out of the inlet, sea bass were found in big numbers with even bigger sizes of fish. Pat De Groodt made it out to Little Gull and was rewarded

with 3 black drum from 22-30 inches. The fish were caught on green crab. They kept a 25" one for the table and reported the fillets were perfect without any worms. On the way in, Pat stopped by the inlet jetty and even picked up a few flounder up to 18 inches. The "Judith M" out of Bahia Marina ran out for sea bass and was confronted with a very sloppy ocean and finicky fish. Despite the rough seas and picky fish, they did manage to bring home a few keepers for their clients. This has not been the usual rocking gangbuster start to bass season we are used to. I've received reports that many boats are returning to the docks with only a couple of keepers. Reports on Saturday from the head boats were that the seas have calmed down and the

fish were much more ready to bite a hook. Many boats returned with happy anglers and much fuller coolers as the week progressed The "Judith M" returned to the dock with reports of tough fishing and still snotty seas. The anglers caught a few keepers to bring home for dinner. The "Angler" braved the seas on Friday and returned home slightly battered, but with a few limits of bass and an overall good catch. On Saturday the seas layed out a bit and had a lot more limits. Capt. Chris stated the current was rolling hard, and if you were not at the right depth the dogfish were all over your bait. Good to hear that some limits were caught after such a rough last couple of days. Capt. Chris also reported the first sea bass of the year aboard the "Angler" despite sloppy weather. Bob Houser was the first angler to land a keeper sea bass. Even better, the fish was caught on a jig and not on bait. Beach to Bay Guide Service reports a great trip with numbers of reds and tog. They can't wait for the weather to calm and water to warm so they can capitalize on these nice fish coming through.

### **Back Bays & Inlets**

With the rough seas and wind, many anglers opted to stay in the back bays and fish for flounder, blues and rockfish. "Lucky Break Charters" said the weather wasn't great but they still found a few flounder willing to bite the lines. Hopefully the next couple of weeks will warm the water up some and the wind will die down.

Kevin McNelis got the first keepers of the year with a 19.5" and a 17.5" flounder. Kevin also reported tons of small blues and rockfish at the Rt. 50 Bridge. The area of the bridge www.coastalfisherman.net and the main Thorofare are the best spots for catching fish.

### **Surf Fishing**

Surf fishing remains strong on Assateague Island with big bluefish and black drum being the primary catches. Iohn Spence reported despite rough conditions, bluefish, including a 32 inch one, were caught. He used a bunker chunk to fool this nice sized Aiden Gottshal chomper. managed to pull in a few blues and even a nice rockfish from the surf. Justin Dipietro said that although it was a little rough, putting in the time paid off with several good sized bluefish as well as a few overslot stripers.

David Ochinero Assateague Island during a crazy NE blow. Despite having to use a 14 oz. to hold the bottom, he managed to hook and bring in one keeper for dinner. Many anglers reported 12-16 ounces or sputnik sinkers were needed to maintain the baits on the bottom without spinning out of control in the rough surf. Brian Reynolds had a good day on the island landing 5 bluefish and a nice black drum. Mullet rigs and clams on slider rigs accounted for the keeper fish.

"Freedom Baits USA" reported the "Nature Boy" has been an absolute terror lately. First he caught multiple blues off the beach, then keeper rockfish, and lastly a weakfish. The weakies were 20" and 25". The final tally also included 7 keeper flounder, all caught on their 5.5 bare knuckle swimbait. These baits are available at SeaHawk Sports Center as well as All Tackle in Ocean City.

Man Choi was using a fish finder rig and pulled in a big shark. Man also said he lost a few drum in the surf. He further reported he caught several lines and rigs that had broken off of other anglers due to the rough surf.



Billy Thomas reports he finally got his black drum off the Assateague Island beaches. He said it only took 2 years to catch the 30 inch black. He also caught an out of slot rockfish which was returned to the water. Steve Maddox said it took throwing some 14 ounce weight to get the job done, however he did manage to catch a few overslot rockfish. These fish may not be keepers but are still a blast to catch off the surf. Mullet rigs, cut bait and clams on circle hooks can all be used to catch both rockfish as well as drum. Mildred Reyes-Ritter had a blast even though she had to toss 12 oz all day. She ended up catching several bluefish and black drum. Mildred also caught and released an overslot rockfish.

Jack Kutchen caught a 4 foot dog shark and a 41 inch striper near low tide. The 2 rods went down within one minute of each other. Both rods were baited with mullet chunks. He reported the incoming tide was filled with nothing but skates. Josh Barfield found a few Tuesday afternoon, landing 2 stripers on his new surf rod, a 13 foot Chase Haugh in fighting yellow color. That's a nice way to break in a custom new rod! Russell Lederman reeled in and released a 40" rockfish caught on sand fleas. Sandra Basham Lotz pulled in a big black drum caught on fresh surf clam. Steve Lewis put in 12 hrs and ended up with a nice eater drum. He was relieved he didn't get skunked. Claudia Popa finally hooked into a keeper rockfish off the beach at Assateague. Nowadays that is a difficult feat with the small slot limit. Great job!

Bryan Muffoletto was down for cruise week but found time to hit the surf and pulled in a nice blue usung a finger mullet.




















## GOVERNING FISHING FISH


## FISHI GCHARIERS FISHING







## FSHICE ARTERS






Greg Lohrman from Frankford, DE shared this sandy 34" bluefish he caught off the 3R's beach in Delaware. Mullet was his bait of choice.

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## DELANARE FISHING REPORT by Capt. BJ Pietryak

Last week in Delaware, the waters gave us rough seas and high winds. Sea bass season opened on the 15th but I was unable to find any boats that made it out for a successful opening day. Rough seas and finicky fish made it a bust all throughout the area. The surf is still very much our savior with big rockfish, blues and large black drum.

## **Back Bays & Inlets**

A few nice flounder are starting to come in off the rocks in Indian River along with the usual big blues. Sea trout are also coming in. Elenterio Abreu caught the biggest sea trout we have seen this year while fishing

the inlet. The fat 14 inch, 5.2 lb. fish was enough to earn him a citation and his name on our current leader board for heaviest weakfish to date. Great job!

The Cape Henlopen Pier has been a constant producer of quality fish last week. Taiwan took advantage of it and landed 6 of these hard hitters. He released all but one which he brought home for fish dip. Kevin Blouch fished the pier and caught 3 big blues. The fish were checked in at Lewes Harbour Marina. The pier produced for James Jones who caught a big 9.2 lb., 33" blue using a finger mullet. Frank Spence checked in to LHM with a 26 inch black drum caught in the

bay. He reported the fish was caught using a hi-lo rig with clam strips. He also landed a 20 " striper. The big girls are finally starting to show up for the spawn. Indian River near Massey ditch is producing some big blues on an incoming tide. Alan Beck states if you hit the tide at the right moment, the blitz is still on. The Lewes Harbour Marina Canal Flounder Tournament was held this last Friday. Over 500 anglers entered the tournament and the canal was loaded with anglers looking for the prized flatties. A few big fluke were caught, although many anglers reported the fishing was really tough. First place was taken by Freddy Wilkerson at 5.69 lbs., Chad Mitchell was second at 3.73 lbs. and Herbie Richards placed 3rd at 3.54 lbs. Renee Hartman was the Top Lady Angler with a 2.12 lb. fish and Colton Hartman was the Kid's winner at 2.06 lbs.

## Nearshore Wrecks & Reefs


Sea bass season usually inundates me with more reports than I can fit into my article. This year however, due to rough seas and dirty water, not many reports of sea bass are coming in. For those that did venture out for the black beauties, the going was rough and the fish were very picky about biting a hook. The Lewes Tog Club reported a good trip last week with almost 25-30 throwbacks along with some nice keepers. Bruce Carlton along with Dr. Keith started out slow but picked up as the tide changed. They reported catching sea bass

including a big 17" one. Unfortunately this was the day before opening season so all fish had to be returned to the water. Their biggest tog was around 8 lbs. That's some good eating! Many boats returning to the Lewes Harbour Marina loaded the table with big sea bass catches. I guess the seas have calmed down enough to allow the fish to bite on the weekend. The "Surface Tension" enjoyed limits of the black beauties making their clients very happy. The crew came home with over 50 keepers. The LHM reports all the headboats had traditional sea bass catches for the opening of bass season. What a difference a few days make. So even with the late start of the season due to bad weather, the weekend has shown a return to a more normalized beginning sea bass season. Hopefully as the weather and ripping currents return to normal the fishing will get even better.

Site 11 was the hotspot for bass. Many boats did not venture out to the NJ/DE Reef due to poor conditions. It seems that despite the slow opening day the bass are here and ready to finally start biting.

### **Surf Fishing**

The beach has been the most consistent of all our waters for producing quality fish. Big stripers are still being caught on both mullet rigs as well as cut bait. Grant Barnhart got a whopper of a fish measuring 40 inches on the south side of the inlet. Even though the fish was overslot and had to be returned, it was still a great fish on a surf rod. Steve Maddox pulled in a nice black drum last weekend using fresh surf clams. Steve always seems to know just the right beach to fish for these big uglies. Chase Haugh



www.coastalfisherman.net scored his personal best, a 49" rockfish. There have been some good reports of the big rock moving through our area last week. If you want to hook one of these big girls, now is the time, because as the water warms they will quickly head north out of our area.

Josh Frantz had his little helper son with him on the beach and caught a citation 35.5" bluefish weighing 12.25 lbs. Ryan Leonardo fished right by the inlet and pulled in a 10.5 lb., 32 inch blue. Billy Settle and his wife had a great day on the beach using mullet rigs to catch their big blues. They landed 3 nice ones to take home and lost a few more. Jon Clemmer was rewarded with a steady diet of blues from the beach just south of the jetty. He reported nothing big but did have a blast catching fish after fish. Josh Frantz fished 3R's with finger mullet and caught a nice 12.25 lb. bluefish. The fish was weighed in at Rick's Bait and Tackle. Steve Hamburg spent his day chasing the blues up and down the beach. He caught them on popsicle mullet but stated that anything would have worked as fired up as they were.

#### Crabs & Clams

Crabbing has been producing a ton of juvenile crabs with pots averaging 2-5 crabs per pot on a 3 day soak. Numerous crabs with eggs as well as crabs just undersized are in each of the pots indicating the ratio of keepers should increase after the spawn is over.

Clams are slow as the water is still cold and they are still buried deep in the mud bottom.







#### **Baked Stuffed Clams**

#### **Ingredients:**

24 middle-neck clams or topneck clams rinsed well to remove sand and grit

3 tablespoons onion fine dice

3 tablespoons bell peppers finely diced

1 clove garlic minced

2 slices bacon finely chopped

1/4 cup butter 1/2 stick

2 tablespoons parsley finely chopped

1 tablespoon lemon juice

1 cup bread crumbs, plain

1/4 cup clam juice liquid from steaming the clams, more if needed

¼ cup Romano cheese grated



1 teaspoon oregano ¼ black pepper

1/4 crushed red pepper

12-14 clam half-shells well rinsed, foot removed

#### Directions:

Rinse clams in cold running

water changing out the water frequently until the water starts to run clear. Remove all sand and grit.

\*Discard any clams that are not closed or that won't close when you tap them on the counter. These clams are dead and should not be consumed.

Over high heat in a medium to large pot add 1 tablespoon olive oil and ½ cup water. Add thoroughly washed clams to the pot and cover. Allow to cook for 6-10 minutes or until the shells have all opened.

Remove the clams from the pot and let them cool until you can comfortably handle them.

\*\*Save the clam broth that you don't need for this recipe for later use in soups or sauces.

Remove the clam meat from the clams (not the clam foot which is attached to the shell) and chop into small pieces.

Pick the best clam shells for stuffing, gathering enough for the amount of clams you're making. Break apart the clamshells from their hinges removing the foot from the shell. Rinse the shells in cold running water until clean. Set aside until needed.

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F

In a large sauté pan over medium-high heat, melt the www.coastalfisherman.net butter. Add the bacon, onion and peppers, saute for 2 minutes then add the garlic and continue to saute for another minute.

Turn off the heat and add the minced clams, bread crumbs, parsley, lemon juice, seasonings and clam juice.

Stir until the stuffing mixture is completely moistened. The stuffing should be moist but not soggy. Add more clam juice if too dry or more bread crumbs if too wet.

Stuff clam shells with stuffing and place on a baking sheet.

Bake for approximately 20-25 minutes at 375 degrees F. Or until the tops start to brown.

Serve with lemon wedges and cocktail sauce.

#### **One-Dish Rockfish**

#### **Ingredients:**

5 cups fresh spinach

2 (6 ounce) rockfish fillets

10 cherry tomatoes, halved

½ cup vegetable broth

2 tablespoons minced fresh dill

½ teaspoon lemon pepper

¼ teaspoon garlic powder¼ teaspoon onion powder

Salt and ground black pepper to taste

2 slices lemon slices

2 slices onion slices

1 teaspoon butter

#### Directions:

Gather all ingredients. Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F

Layer spinach on the bottom of a 2-quart baking dish. Arrange rockfish on top; scatter tomatoes around fillets. Pour in broth and season the fish with dill, lemon pepper, garlic powder, onion powder, salt and pepper. Place a slice of lemon and onion on each fillet and top with butter. Cover the entire dish with aluminum foil.





Bake in preheated oven until the fish flakes easily, 20 to 25 minutes.

#### **Sheepshead Fish Stew**

#### **Ingredients:**

- 3 tablespoons bacon fat or vegetable oil
- 1 large yellow or white onion, chopped
- 1/2 pound fresh okra, sliced (or 1 cup dried)
- teaspoons Cavender's seasoning (optional)
- 1 quart chicken or seafood stock
- 1 quart water
- 1 cup crushed tomatoes
- 2 cups cooked hominy or other corn (canned or frozen is fine)
- 2 cups cooked black-eyed peas or butter beans (canned or frozen is fine)
- 1 pound smoked sausage, sliced
- 2 pounds sheepshead fish, cut into 1-inch chunks
- 1/4 cup chopped chives or parsley

Saltines (optional)



#### Directions:

In a large soup pot, heat the bacon fat over medium-high heat and saute the chopped onion, stirring often, until it just begins to color around the edges, about 5 to 8 minutes.

Add the okra and Cavender's seasoning and stir well. Saute this for 3 minutes or so if you have fresh or frozen okra. If you are using dried, just mix it around a bit.

Pour in the water, stock and crushed tomatoes. Bring to a simmer and add salt to taste. Add the hominy, beans and sausage. Simmer, don't boil, for 15 minutes.

Add the fish and simmer another 10 minutes. Stir in the chopped chives and serve. If you want to bulk this up a bit, crush Saltines into the soup while eating.

#### Fish Taco Bowls

#### **Ingredients:**

4 - 6 oz. boneless skinless fish fillets, such as blackfish, cod, mahi, cut into 1 inch pieces

Olive oil spray

2 to 3 teaspoons cajun seasoning, or to taste

1/4 cup mayonnaise

1 teaspoon sriracha or chipotle in adobo sauce

2 limes

5 cups slaw, red cabbage, white cabbage and shredded carrots

1/2 tablespoon olive oil

1/2 teaspoon kosher salt

Cilantro, optional

#### **Directions:**

Spritz fish with oil. Apply seasoning over entire fish. Cut 1 lime into wedges and halve the other.

Fish Taco Seasoning:

Combine mayo and sriracha or chipotle and squeeze 1/4 of the lime. Add a little water until it's easy to drizzle later.

Air fry the fish 6 minutes 400F shaking the basket half way.

Air Fryer fish taco:

Meanwhile, combine with 1/2 tablespoon olive oil, remaining half lime and 1/2 teaspoon salt.

Divide on 4 plates, add fish on the side and drizzle the spicy



mayo over the fish.

Serve with lime wedges and 1 tablespoon minced fresh sage garnish with cilantro.

No air fryer, no problem! Heat a skillet on high heat, spray with oil and cook 5 to 6 minutes.

#### **Blackened Redfish** "On the Halfshell"

#### **Ingredients:**

2 large redfish fillets, scales left

Extra virgin olive oil

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For the Blackening Mixture:

- 1 tablespoon salt
- 1 tablespoon garlic powder
- 1 tablespoon onion powder
- 1 tablespoon paprika
- 2 teaspoons freshly ground black pepper
- 1 teaspoon cayenne pepper

For the Herb Butter

- 6 tablespoons butter
- 1 tablespoon minced flat-leaf parsley
- 1 tablespoon minced fresh rosemary

Coarse salt

1 Freshly ground black pepper

#### **Directions:**

Make the blackening mixture, if using. Combine the salt, garlic and onion powders, paprika, black pepper and cayenne pepper in a bowl and mix with your fingers. Alternatively,



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use your favorite commercial blackening rub.

Run your fingers over the fish fillets, feeling for bones. Pull out any you find with needlenose pliers. Lightly oil the fish fillets with olive oil, then season generously with the blackening mixture.

Set up your grill for direct grilling and heat to high. Brush or scrape the grill grate clean and oil well.

Make the herb butter: Melt the butter in a small saucepan.

Arrange the fish fillets, flesh side down on the grill grate and grill until nicely browned, about 3 minutes. Using a

spatula and tongs, carefully turn the fish over and continue to cook for 3 minutes until the fish is cooked through. To check for doneness, press the fish with the tip of your finger. It should flake easily.

Transfer the fish to a platter or plates, scale side down, and drizzle with some of the herb butter before serving.

#### Smokey & Savory Sea Bass

<u>Ingredients:</u>

24 oz skin-on boneless sea bass fillets

2 tbsp olive oil, divided

1/2 tsp ground black pepper

1/2 tsp garlic powder

1/2 tsp cayenne

1/4 tsp cumin

1/2 tsp oregano

1 tsp paprika

3/4 tsp salt, divided

6 oz corn kernels

3 1/2 cups cooked mediumgrain rice (from 1 3/4 cups uncooked)

1/4 cup scallions, chopped

1 tbsp lime juice

2 tbsp parsley, chopped

**Directions:** 

Marinate the Sea Bass:

Add 1/2 tsp ground black pepper, 1/2 tsp garlic powder, 1/2 tsp cayenne, 1/4 tsp cumin, 1/2 tsp oregano, 1 tsp paprika, and 1/2 tsp salt to 24 oz fillets. Rub well to coat both sides evenly.

For the Blackened Sea Bass:

www.coastalfisherman.net Mix the rice: In a large mixing bowl, add 3 1/2 cups cooked medium-grain rice, 6 oz corn kernels, 1 tbsp lime juice, 1/4 tsp salt, and 1 tbsp olive oil. Toss well.

Cook the sea bass: Add 1 tbsp olive oil to a skillet over medium heat, then place the



fillets skin side down and cook for 8 minutes. Flip to the other side and cook for 3 more minutes.

Garnish and serve: Transfer the fillets to serving plates with mixed rice. Sprinkle 2 tbsp chopped parsley and 1/4 cup chopped scallions on top. §

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



#### What We Know (Part 2)

In last week's column I relayed a true story from 1978 about a 14-year old boy who caught a 124-pound swordfish from a Fenwick Island beach, thus proving beyond a shadow of doubt that "maybe" there's a "chance" swordfish might be spending at least some of their time meandering about our surfline and perhaps no one else has ever caught one from the beach because no one has been fishing for them. Recreational fishermen, commercial fishermen, marine scientists we all think we know so much about the fish out there, but I don't think anybody saw that one coming!

So that has me wondering missing maybe we're opportunities to catch other types of fish in places we'd least expect them to be just because we've never fished for them there. For instance - "marlin in the bay". Who do you know has ever tried to catch a white or even a blue marlin in any of our back bay waters? I know what you're thinking, "considering all the people who fish the bay each year, and all the boats

that use the coastal bay waters "someone" would have caught or at least seen a marlin if there were any in the bay!" Well "yes" maybe by now some evidence of billfish in the bay could have or should have shown up. But let's face it, have you ever heard of a blue marlin crashing a Roy Rig or a white marlin snatching up a Gulp paddletail or a shiner that's being bounced along the bottom? Never! We all know that Marlin don't eat little things like that, that's why offshore anglers troll rigged ballyhoo, mullet, squid and other relatively big baits for them. So of course no one is going to catch a marlin in the bay, just like hooking a swordfish in the surf, everyone is using the wrong bait! It just stands to reason that if you want to catch a marlin in the bay you've got to fish for them properly.

Naturally, marlin fishing in the bay might lead to some confusion during any billfish tournaments that stipulate what time boats are allowed to leave the inlet in the morning. After all, a team that fishes in the bay won't leave the inlet at all, so does that mean they can fish whenever they want to or must they follow the same fishing schedule as all the fishermen who will be running 60-miles out to catch fish that might be swimming around their docks? And if a team shows up at the weigh-ins with a marlin that's still alive (because they caught it 5 minutes ago just 100-yards away) can they win the heaviest fish category then turn it loose and get release points as well? These are questions the tournament organizers must be prepared to answer once bay marlin fishing is discovered and becomes popular.

Certainly once they start catching swordfish in the surf and marlin in the bay anglers will be looking to land other offshore species in locations they've never considered. I've never tried it but I'm wondering why chunking for tuna off the Rt.w 50 bridge might not work? There's a lot of natural bait that hangs out under that structure and I'm sure the rockfish and bluefish aren't eating them all. As a matter of fact, the local stripers and blues probably make for a nice snack for any giant bluefins that might be swimming about the bridge pilings.

Of course catching tuna from the bridge might not be as easy as it seems as it would require anglers to not only be able to hook and fight the fish to the bridge, but also get the thing 20-30 feet up and over the railing. I envision a really large bridge net and more than just a couple pair of hands to haul the catch up from the water. And as it's not uncommon for fish to fall back in the water while they're being lifted up, it would probably be good for tuna anglers on the bridge to make sure there aren't any curious boaters below during the landing process as 50-pounds of tuna falling from the sky never seems to end well for those on the receiving end. However, such concerns for the well-being of anyone on a PWC is entirely unnecessary being that so many of them obviously liken themselves as some kind of kama-kazi thrill seekers and would probably find it a badge of honor to be crushed by a tuna. Of course bridge anglers who have not yet caught a tuna should feel free to deliver fish carcasses, horseshoe crabs, or rotten bait until they have acquired a tuna fitting for the occasion.

Hearing all this, I'm sure a lot of folks are already beginning to worry that the bay is going to become an even more crowded



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place to be if all the offshore guys start fishing inshore. Fortunately, nature always seems to make things like this work out. Just as ocean species could be in our bays, there's no reason not to expect that bay fishermen might not be able to catch their quarries offshore. Think about flounder - it used to be that no recreational angler went out on the ocean to catch flounder. Now, that's where almost all the big ones are taken. So if flounder, then why not other bay targets like blue crabs, clams, or anything else you can catch from a kayak or a 20' tri-hull deck boat with a 900hp motor? Yeah I know, crabbing in 300 feet of water is going to require a lot more string and probably bigger chicken necks, and clammers will need extensions on their rake handles, but knowing local anglers the way I do I'm certain that in time they'll figure out a good system to make it work. After all, they know everything about everything! §

# STEVE'S MARINE SERVICE by Steve Katz

#### **Batteries**

What is 12.6? That is the voltage of a fully charged standard lead acid (traditional, sealed or AGM) marine battery at rest. If you have a 24-volt system, then 25.2v represents a fully charged 24v bank. If your battery is reading 12.0 volts at rest, it is 50% discharged! If a battery remains discharged, sulfation can occur.

Sulfation is a buildup of lead sulfate crystals and is the number one cause of early battery failure in lead-acid batteries. Sulfation occurs when a battery is deprived of a full charge, lead sulfate crystals build up and remain on battery plates. When too much sulfation occurs, it can impede the chemical to electrical conversion.

Sulfation can be avoided by properly charging and recharging your battery.

#### What's that smell?

When your engine is running or your battery charger is on, the battery voltage should be between 13.7 volts-14.7 volts. If your battery area smells like rotten eggs, then you have a battery problem.



Batteries contain an electrolyte comprised of water and sulfuric acid. When overheated, the sulfuric acid is converted into a gas called Hydrogen Sulfide and it is this gas that smells like rotten eggs. Over-charging a lead acid battery can also produce hydrogen sulfide gas. The gas is colorless, poisonous, and flammable. If you smell this odor on-board your boat, turn off the charger, vent the area and stay away until the odor disappears.

Most marine batteries last 3 to 5 years, depending on how they are cared for and how many discharge and recharge cycles they have been through. There are some technical differences between standard lead acid batteries (traditional, sealed or AGM) marine batteries and the popular AGM style batteries,

though a little bit more expensive, are very resilient to charging and discharging and have become the highperformance standard for marine batteries.

#### Recharging

If your only source of power to recharge your battery is the alternator on the boat's engine, it is a good idea to confirm your alternator(s) are working properly. Alternators produce electricity measured in volts and amps. Most alternators produce about 14 V of DC power and the amperage varies depending on the size of the engine/alternator combination. Minimally, a small outboard alternator may produce around 30 A and upwards to over 100 A on a large diesel engine.

Voltages are easy to measure and confirm since the volt reading is easily available on the engine gauge or other gauges on board the boat.

The alternator(s) amperage is more difficult to measure and often, an amperage gauge is not included in a standard package. The voltage should be consistent, and the amperage

www.coastalfisherman.net will vary depending on the load. Once the batteries are charged, and the electrical loads are reduced, the amperage will automatically lower to a minimum amount.

If you do not have an amp gauge, there is no need to worry since the volt gauge can still give you the relative health of the electrical system. If the voltage is consistent and steady, your alternator is most likely working properly and producing the correct number of amps.

Though, if you notice your voltage dropping during a boat trip, it would be a prudent idea to investigate the cause, because today's modern engines rely on good electrical power.

If your boat has an onboard battery charger, the battery charger will maintain and top off the batteries to keep them full, with or without the engine alternator operating. A modern battery charger will slow the charge down as batteries become full and maintain their charge by using a small amount of voltage and current called a float charge. A charger without this feature could overcharge the batteries and permanently damage them.

Checking the health of your batteries and maintaining them throughout the season will help provide a reliable season of battery power. §

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# FISHING REPORT by Capt. Matt Abell

Wicked Eastern Shore easterly's have swept across bountiful paradise, pushing up tides and adding environmental obstacles that would dampen the hopes of even the saltiest of shore men. However, tides turn, seas calm and fish have to eat. So get out there and make wonderful whitecap memories with your friends and family.

The Chesapeake has offered some sheltered shallow shorelines which has supported some superb spec, spot-tail, and striper action. And yes, I did say striper, as the long awaited Maryland and Virginia rock season has finally commenced. Both states are supporting a 19-24 inch slot limit and one

fish per person Chesapeake regulations. Most of those who seek saltwater sport have done so with chunks of crab, both presented on fish finder and top and bottom rigs, as well as under a popping cork. Some of the red action has consisted of not only trophy reds that we had come to expect, but also a few slot puppies to invite home for a delicious dinner. In addition to skinny water scrappers, some black drum have taken up residence on the knolls and shoals of the lower Chesapeake. Anglers dropping chunks of crab and clam have tested their rigging on these head shaking heavyweights in depths of water to 25 feet. If you are lucky enough to connect

with one of these Chesapeake treasures, keep in mind the 1 fish per person creel limit.

The barrier islands have been equally as fruitful even during these C- conditions. Flounder fishing has been good on the tides where the turbidity has allowed some visibility. Silversides and minnows coupled with squid strips and or Gulp have provided opportunities to use your landing net as well as your frying pan. Due to the cloudy water brightly colored teasers like chartreuse, pink and orange have conjured up bites from the hungry hunters of the salty seaside. While searching the coastal bays for fillets of flatfish, a few anglers have been the recipient of a true springtime

surprise. Chopper blues have bent rods and breached the surface. Some of these fork tailed torpedoes measured up to the low 30 inch mark, which could only have been dwarfed by the size of the smile of the lucky guy on the order end of the line.

sands The have been anything other than serene as big surf made most of the week unfishable. However, during the first part of the week our very own Mean Dean PHD beached what only could be considered the trip of a lifetime as he and his buddy beached over 30 rock and blacks on peeler chunks soaked on modified fish finder and hi-lo rigs. Just remember, the coastal rock regs are 1 fish from 28-31"

Even if the wind is howling and the rain is falling, grab some bait, find a leeward bank and revel in this wonderful place we call home! §
